





eight county area with a total of 31 areas. counties surveyed. The teams inspected a minimum of four fie per county, at weekly intervals. These fields were selected with the aid of county agricultural agents on the basis of past history and heavy insect popultions. These fields were inspected for all insects and not limited strictly to boll weevils. Inspections began the first week of June and continued through August.

This year's survey showed that early season pests such as thrips, aphids, spider mites, cutworms, garden webworms and yellow-striped armyworms were rather widespread

over the area. Almost every county reported these pests, but the degree of infestation varied considerably. Grasshoppers were present early and caused considerable damage in some areas, particularly in Shackleford, Fleahopper counts began to increase the area as a whole.
