The local program, which includes the first six grades, involves hiring three aides at Primary, two for junior high, and a part-time nurse and secretary to serve the two Talk schools.

Since the major difficulty in 21-Coahoma vs. Rotan - T learning progress at primary stems Jan. 4 from language difficulties, much Jan. 4-Wylie vs Rotan - H work will be concentrated on teaching the Latin Americans the English language. Each of the 124 children involved in the primary program will spend two periods daily 6 weeks with the special helpers.

Of the three aides, one is a librarian, one a music teacher, and the other will conduct a special reading class.

Other funds will be used in buying special equipment, including a tachistascope, record players, tape recorder, films and projector, and phonics records and charts.

According to Mrs. Jewel Tillotson, Know Your Senior-Primary Principal, the program is fully accepted and approved with personell already selected. She says it is "carefully organized so that each child will receive full benefit of the materials and helpers."

Of the 124 primary students which wil receive benefit from the aid, 109 are Latin American or Negro. Junior High will have a program similar to that of Primary, according to M. T. Hill, principal.
