School System Receives \$38,000 Federal Grant

Rotan Public Schools have received a federal grant of \$38,000 to be used in special aid for educationally deprived children.

This program was inaugurated under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, which authorizes Federal support to local public educational agencies for special education programs for educationally deprived children in attendance areas where low-income families are concentrated. Its aim is to help broaden and strengthen education for the children of poverty.

The local program, which includes the first six grades, involves hiring three aides at Primary, two for junior high, and a part-time nurse and secretary to serve the two schools.

Since the major difficulty in learning progress at primary stems from language difficulties, much work will be concentrated on teaching the Latin Americans the English language. Each of the 124 children involved in the primary program will spend two periods daily with the special helpers.

Of the three aides, one is a librarian, one a music teacher, and the other will conduct a special reading class.

Other funds will be used in buying special equipment, including a tachistoscope, record players, tape recorder, films and projector, and phonics records and charts.

According to Mrs. Jewel Tillotson, Primary Principal, the program is fully accepted and approved with personnel already selected. She says it is "carefully organized so that each child will receive full benefit of the materials and helpers."

Of the 124 primary students which will receive benefit from the aid, 109 are Latin American or Negro.

Junior High will have a program similar to that of Primary, according to M. T. Hill, principal.

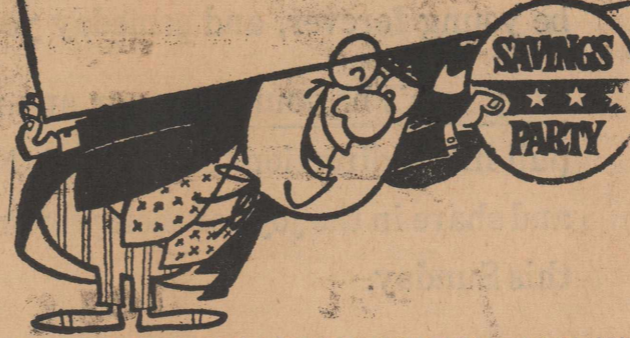

Bark Reducing Value of Cotton

(Consumer and Marketing Service Cotton Division, Abilene)

Farmers in the area took advantage of favorable weather last week and got a lot of cotton in bagging and ties. Harvesting in Jones County and the Counties south of Abilene remained at its peak, but should drop off sharply in the next few days. Harvesting in the Roscoe, Rotan and other more western areas picked up considerably, but ginners are still looking for the "big rush" after a killing frost. The Cotton Classing Office, a division of the Consumer and Marketing Service, reported its busiest week so far this season. The 37,000 samples classed pushed the season total above the 180,000 mark.

B. B. Manly, Jr., In-Charge of the USDA Office said the quality of samples was unusually good considering the rains, fogs, and dews of the past weeks. Grades of last week's receipts held steady, while a little drop was noted in staple lengths, micronaire and pressley readings. Manly said the most significant change was in the number of samples containing bark. The percent of "bark" samples ranged from one percent in the San Angelo area to 5 percent for the area west of Abilene. Bark is the most common cause for reduction in grade in this area of the cotton belt, Manly continued.

"Barkies" are bales of cotton with fine pieces of bark from the cotton stalks mixed with the lint. They usually come from fields of large rank cotton that are machine stripped. Stalks that have been dead for an unusually long time, caused by root-rot, or other plant diseases or sometimes by leaving the cotton too long after desiccation, are often

the cause for "barky" bales. An improperly adjusted or improperly operated machine stripper along with any of these conditions will surely harvest cotton which contains bark.

Bark is difficult and sometimes almost impossible for gin machinery to remove since it is flexible and cotton fibers cling to it. If it is removed, some cotton lint must be removed with it. If left in the cotton, mill machinery must remove it before spinning the lint, which increases spinning costs, or else produce a lower grade product.

There are no standards or set rules as to how much bark a sample must contain before it is reduced in grade. High grade cotton can not have as much as the lower grade bales and still go unpenalized.

A reduction of one grade on account of bark may lower the value of a bale of cotton as much as \$10.00, and possibly more. Samples are sometimes but rarely, reduced two or more grades due to extraneous matter such as bark. The Commodity Credit Corporation loan penalizes a "barky" bale 50 points or about \$2.50 and accepts the bale on the grade to which it was reduced.

Cotton producers are urged to take all precautions in setting and operating "strippers" as those little pieces of bark are very costly when sold in a bale of cotton.

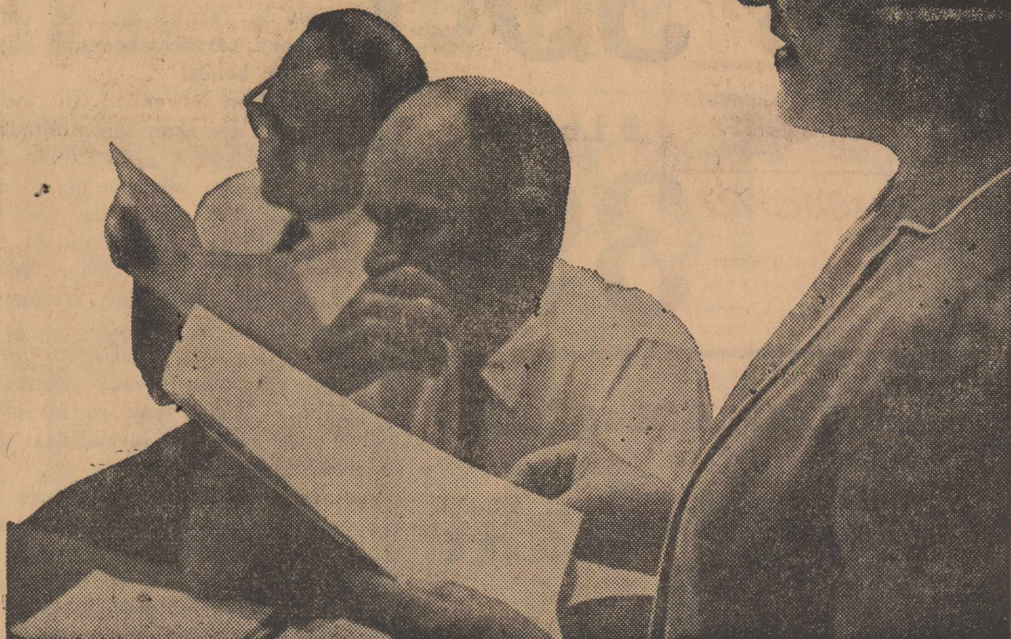



COTTON PRODUCTION EDUCATIONAL ACTIVITIES CONDUCTED BY THE TEXAS AGRICULTURAL EXTENSION SERVICE IN THE ROLLING PLAINS DURING 1965

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service, in cooperation with Rolling Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., has conducted an intensified cotton educational program during 1965 in the 31-county Rolling Plains area. Counties included in the area are Baylor, Childress, Cottle, Fisher, Foard, Hall, Hardeman, Haskell, Jones, Knox, King, Shackelford, Stonewall, Throckmorton, Wichita, Wilbarger, Collingsworth, Conley, Mitchell, Scurry, Nolan, Taylor, Coke, Runnels, Coleman, Tom Green, McCulloch, Callahan, Clay, Concho and Schleicher.

The County Agricultural Agent is the local representative of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. He plans and conducts a county educational program through a broadly representative County Program Building Committee. The cotton educational program is developed and initiated through the Field Crops Subcommittee of the County Program Building Committee. The county agent and the subcommittee worked closely with the county committee of Rolling Plains Cotton

Growers, Inc., in conducting educational programs in cotton production. The program consisted of numerous producer meetings on all aspects of cotton production, result demonstrations, and timely releases through various mass media.

Cotton Production Meetings
Ninety-two meetings covering many subjects such as cotton varieties, fertilization, diseases, weed control, defoliation and harvesting were held in the 31 counties. Attendance at these meetings numbered 2705 producers and other interested persons.

Insect Control Meetings
A total of 3,381 producers attended 177 cotton insect meetings during the season. The identification of various pests was discussed, demonstrations given on how to determine infestation levels and recommended control measures explained at each meeting. The Extension Service Area Entomologist participated in 51 of these meetings and the insect survey teams—a cooperative effort of Rolling Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service—participated in 33 meetings.

Result Demonstrations
Result demonstrations were established at 131 locations in the area. These demonstrations were on varieties, skip-row planting, date of planting, fertilization, disease control, nematode control, insect control, weed control, cotton and guar rotation, use of cotton burrs for building soil organic matter and defoliation.

Survey findings in Fisher County showed damage from early season pests to be generally moderate in

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the sample fields. The chief early season pest was fleahoppers. Fleahoppers were first found on June 30, when infestations averaged 18 percent. Bollworm damage was generally light, with the highest average population of 5 percent occurring during the week of July 30. Boll weevils were first found on June 18 in the Lawlis flat area of the county. Weevil populations resulted in the highest average punctured square count of 75 percent on August 27.

Other pests reported from cotton fields in the county included thrips and aphids.

This year's crop is running above average with 30-35% already harvested.
