





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Reserach For Cotton

WACO-- (Spl) -- Texas Farm Burvisited with Mr. Clark who is in eau President C. H. DeVaney was among farm leaders asking Congress Feb. 9 to reject proposed legislation to establish a governmentdirected cotton research and promotion program financed by a "largely compulsory check-off" of farmers' money.

DeVaney appeared before the House Agriculture Committee with American Farm Bureau Federation President Charles B. Shuman and other Farm Bureau leaders from cotton-producing states.

In a prepared statement, Shuman said the proposed check-off program "clearly provides for the creation of what amounts to a governmental organization of producers.

"The amount of authority that would be given to the Secretary of Agriculture by the enactment of H. R. 12322 is unprecedented," he asserted. He added that the bill, if enacted, would make the program largely compulsory rather than voluntary.

"The thing that is most needed in the present situation with respect to research and promotion for cotton is for the Congress to make it clear it does not intend to torpedo present voluntary promotion efforts," the Farm Bureau spokesman said.

Shuman told the committee that all of the groups interested in the survival of cotton as a healthy and dynamic industry will find ways and means of launching and financing needed research and promotion programs for cotton.

In behalf of Farm Bureau members throughout the country -- and' especially in the cotton belt -- I want to reassure this committee, and the proponents of this legislation, that we continue to stand ready to lend our full assistance to such an effort," Shuman said. He reminded the Committee that Farm Bureau "has been in the thick

The operator and owner deposit with the Department cash or bond security in an amount sufficient to cover any judgment or damages resulting from the accident that might be obtained by damaged or injured persons, which in no case shall be less than \$200. 




