Kind of Dairymen

At the Starkville plant we found that 563 of these patrons were negroes, and we found that all of the milk plants! had negro patrons; many of these negros are tenants. All of them until recently had practiced a system of exclusive cotton farming and since this section of Mississippi has until recently been devoted almost exclusively to cotton it follows that practically all dairymen there are men who have followed the all cotton type of farming. It is remarkable how many in this old exclusive cotton section have taken up dairying as one of their major farm enterprises and found it satisfactory and profitable. None of them want to go back to all cotton although most of them are still growing cotton

Dairying Has Proven Profitable As indicated by the volume of dairy business done and the general accep-

tance of dairying by everybody there one would expect to find the dairyman making money. We found this to be true. The best evidence of this is the fact that the old time credit merchant has gone a cash basis and doing more cash business than he did on a credit basis. Bankers told us that bank deposits were increasing rapidly and that saving accounts had increased enormously most of which were farmers. saing accounts.

Further evidence that dairying is paying is the fact the number of patrons is constantly increasing at all these plants. Furthermore, new plants are being completed every few months

We are thoroughly convinced that dairy farming is profitable in Mississippi to the farmer, the merchant, and the banker. We all agreed that Texas farmers, particularly those in north and northwest Texas could accept dairying as a part of their regular farm program with just as good if not better, results than have the farmers of Mississippi.
