Hammers Hold Double Mt. Relay Championship

Rotan Yellowhammers, defending champions retained their title of Double Mountain Relays here last Saturday.

Two records were broken both by Rule performers, and another was tied by the fast field which saw the Yellowhammers score 35 1/2 points to run-off and hide from second-place Aspermont which scored 30 to barely nudge out Rule and Roscoe who followed with 28 and 27 respectively.

Larry Van Loon won the shot with an effort 49-3 3-4 and the discus with 136-3 3-4 heave. Teammate Frankie SoRelle provided the other Rotan first with a 2:02.8 clocking in the 880-yard run.

Aspermont had two first places, Earl Copeland in the low hurdles and Freddie Weaver in the broad jump.

Rule's Cornelius sped to a 23.3 reading in the 220-yard dash for one new record and Jerry LeFevre also of Rule, captured the other new standard with a 51.3 performance in the 440-yard dash. Ricky Harris of Wylie went 11-6 to tie the old pole vault mark.

Larry Holliday of Ira joined Van Loon as the meet's only double winners, copping the high hurdles and the high jump.

More Charges Filed In County Fires

A second series of misdemeanor complaints charging destruction of property by fire in Fisher County have been filed in Fisher County Court this week, it was learned Tuesday.

The first set of misdemeanor complaints against nine persons was filed last week in connection with a house being destroyed by fire last Jan. 15. This apparently will replace felony complaints filed previously in the same case and considered by a grand jury.

Five of the defendants have been tried before Judge E. G. Perkins in Roby and fined \$50 plus \$38.40 court costs and five days in jail.

The five served time in the Roby jail over the weekend.

There are still four defendants to be arraigned on the charges.

Five additional charges are filed in a similar fire in an abandoned house near Gannon, some of the defendants being the same in both cases.

District Attorney Weldon Kirk said that officers are investigating a series of fires apparently of incendiary origin in Nolan County and several cases may be filed.

Red Cross Is Important Link With Servicemen

Washington, D. C. -- More than 300 messages a day -- well over 100,000 a year -- are sent to and from South Vietnam by the American Red Cross on behalf of U. S. fighting men there.

Some messages contain good news, the birth of a new child -- others tragedy for an American serviceman far from home such as a death in the family. All are delivered with utmost speed and the sheer numbers are in indication of the up-swing of services for U. S. forces in Southeast Asia.

There are currently 138 ARC staff on duty in South Vietnam serving the U. S. Armed Forces there and this number will increase to more than 200 by July 1, 1966. They assist with immediate personal and family problems, with emergency communications, conduct recreation programs in hospitals and with center-clubmobile units, and furnish emergency financial assistance when necessary.

ARC has workers in five hospitals in South Vietnam, plus two on the USS Repose, the hospital ship just off the Vietnamese coast. Other hospitals affected in the Far East are in the Philippines, Japan, Okinawa, and Guam.

Similar increases in Red Cross services are taking place in chapters throughout the country as sudden and lengthy separations caused unusual problems and hardships on military families. In addition chapter volunteers are producing everything from the "ditty bags" to cast socks -- which cover and protect the part of the foot not covered by a cast.

During March some 1,800 ARC chapters will campaign for funds to finance their services in the fiscal year beginning next July 1. The remaining 1,600 R C chapters participated in all United Fund appeals for all or part of their financial requirements. During March they will conduct education drives to recruit volunteers, blood donors, and students for safety and health classes.

Ray Womack said that all four of the heifers were of much better quality than last year's entries.

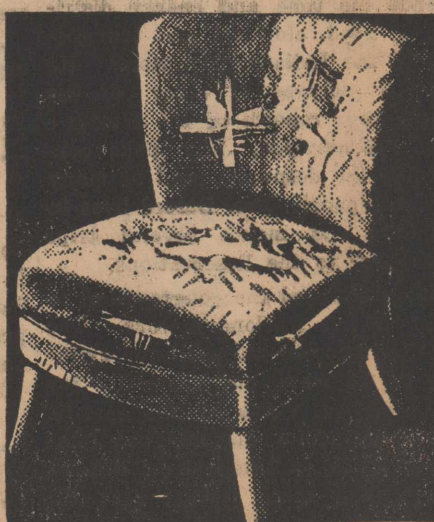

Weed control in Cotton, always a major problem—may be even more so this year in parts of the state because of the moisture situation. Wet fields have kept land preparation at a snail's pace and weeds, and grass growing, says Fred C. Elliott, Extension cotton specialist at Texas A&M University.

But, he adds, chemicals are available which can be used at planting time or later after the cotton is up and growing. Still one of the best machines for fighting weeds and grass, he says, is the rotary hoe equipped tractor and more than 51,000 were used last year.

As for the pre-emergent chemicals Elliott says the following are recommended for use in Texas: caparol, CIPC, dacthal, diuron, herbam, monuron and trifluralin. In the recommendations on the amounts to use and the kind of soil each works best on, available from the offices of county agents, Elliott emphasizes the effectiveness of the materials depend upon a proper application job and the use of the proper amount of the chemical.

The post-emergents recommend for use in Texas include caparol plus a surfactant, diuron plus a surfactant, DSMA plus a surfactant, herbicidal naphthas, sodium dalapon, and various oils for spot treating johnson-grass. Elliott says flame cultivators may also be used on small weeds after the cotton is 8-10 inches tall and the stalk diameter around 3-1/8 of an inch.

Because of the complications involved in using chemicals in agriculture, Elliott recommends that producers contact the local county agent for details on their use. He adds that in all instances the recommendations from the manufacturer of the product as well as those based on research be followed to the letter.

Fencing costs can be reduced by using preservative-treated wooden fence posts.

In addition to decay resistance, properly treated wooden posts are more resistant to grass fires.

Commercial pressure-treated pine posts which have been treated with good preservatives like penta or creosote are usually the best buy. They provide superior service at the lowest cost per year of effective life.

Good untreated posts come from such naturally durable woods as cedar, mulberry, bois d'arc, locust. However, caution must be used in selecting posts of these types because only the heartwood or darker-colored center portion is resistant to decay. Because the sapwood of these trees is not durable, posts of these woods should have at least two-thirds heartwood.

Properly home-treated pine posts will last 25 years or longer when treated by the method developed by researchers of the Texas Forest Service.

PRECAUTIONS LISTED ON INTERPLANTING CROPS—Farmers are cautioned by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service to get complete details on regulations, problems of application and other facts regarding pesticide usage on interplanted crops. They emphasize that compatibility of production practices must be considered along with net profit per acre when planting decisions are being made.

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Medicare Sign-Up Deadline Is Nearing

When the deadline of March 31 was only two weeks away, all but 35 of the 1,000 persons over 65 in Fisher County had replied to social security's Medicare inquiries, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., District Manager for Social Security in Abilene.

Tuley knows who 29 of the 35 are, from records of his office and the State Department of Public Welfare. They are being phoned or written again to see whether they have just overlooked replying or are failing to reply as their way of saying "No" to the voluntary doctor bill insurance offered at a \$3 per month premium rate. He doesn't know the identities of the remaining 6. He

asks our readers to check with their friends and relatives and, if they have taken no action as yet on Medicare, urge them to write a card or a letter to "Social Security, Abilene, Texas 79604." They should say they do or not want to sign up for Medicare.

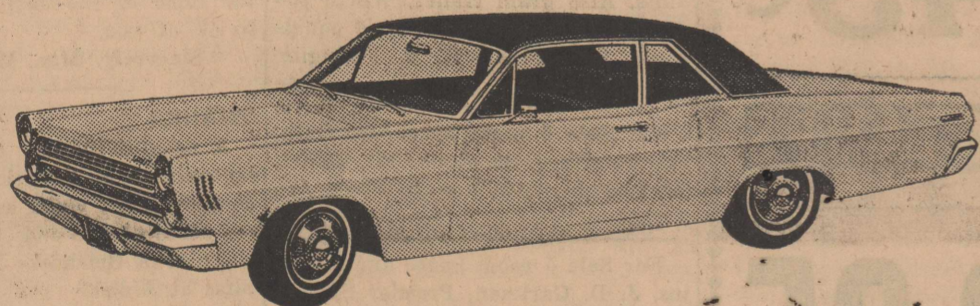
"I'd like to suggest that every person over 65 who has not yet notified the Social Security Administration do so before 31. Those who say "No" or who just don't reply, will get another chance in October of 1967. However, a person who signs up by March 31 can cancel his enrollment anytime before July 1; in effect, he is getting 90 more days to reach a final decision," Tuley added.

Any card or letter, asking to enroll for Medicare, postmarked Mar-

ch 31 or before, and signed by the over age 65 person (or by a responsible person on his behalf) will be treated as a valid enrollment, he concluded. As a service to our readers, the coupon below may be used:

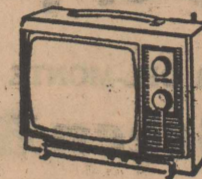

Mental Health Conference In Lubbock

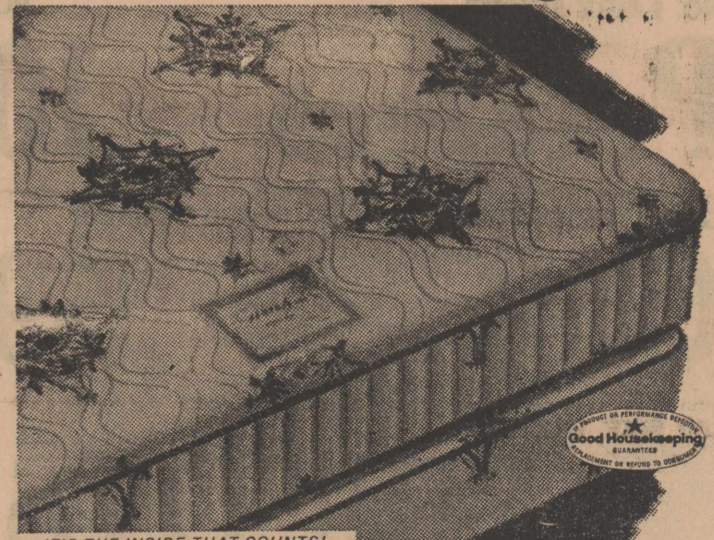

**\$80,000 Cash Paid
For School Cafeteria**

Superintendent of Schools, K. C. McCasland revealed to the "Flicker" that the \$80,000 public schools cafeteria completed this year was paid for entirely in cash with no change in the citizens' tax payments and no indebtedness to the school system. Contract price for the building was \$74,000, including \$13,000 kitchen equipment and \$2500 of tables and chairs. A six per cent architecture fee and other incidental expenses brought the total to the \$80,000 figure mentioned above.

The cafeteria was the second major building project of the school in as many years. A primary addition including two classrooms and a library had been built at a cost of \$40,000, also paid for in cash.

A mistaken belief and rumor was that the cafeteria opening was delayed because of financial difficulties. According to McCasland, the delay was due to minor mistakes in construction and had nothing to do with money.

No formal open house will be held because the building was part of the Public Schools Open House March 8.

This Is Poison Prevention Week

Each year a half-million children swallow medicines and household products which have the potential to cause serious injury and even death. And each year the President is authorized by law to designate the third week in March as National Poison Prevention Week, in hopes that local communities will emphasize the dangers of accidental poisonings and take such preventive measures as these dangers warrant.

This year is no different. The week of March 20-26 has been officially designated by President Johnson as National Poison Prevention Week. It is the hope of the Texas State Department of Health that the week will not go unnoticed by the parents of young Texans.

It's the youngsters with whom health authorities are concerned here, since of the total poison reported, 90 percent involve children under the age of five years.

This is because children in this age group are in the learning process. They learn by exploring their environment. What they see they try to reach, and what they reach they put into their mouths.

Here, then, the concern shifts from youngsters to parents. Children are completely dependent upon adults for protection and when these accidents happen they are, in the main, the direct result of adult carelessness or lack of awareness of these potential dangers.

Generally, these accidents happen because potentially poisonous products are within reach of the child. As the child grows, his agility, ingenuity and mobility will allow him to get into storage areas previously considered inaccessible.

More specifically, a poisoning accident can result from storing inedible household products in cups, glasses, soft-drink bottles, etc. A child associates these containers with refreshments. Such an accident can result if medicines are taken in the dark; or if medicines are referred to as "candies" if products are not properly labeled, or if the label is not read before using.

Another factor worth noting is the tendency of children to imitate adults and the taking of medicine in their presence can be stimulation in itself.

These are but a few aspects to be considered not only during National Poison Prevention Week, but throughout the year to help safeguard youngsters against poison accidents.

More information on poisons and their control can be obtained from the Texas State Department of Health or from private physicians.

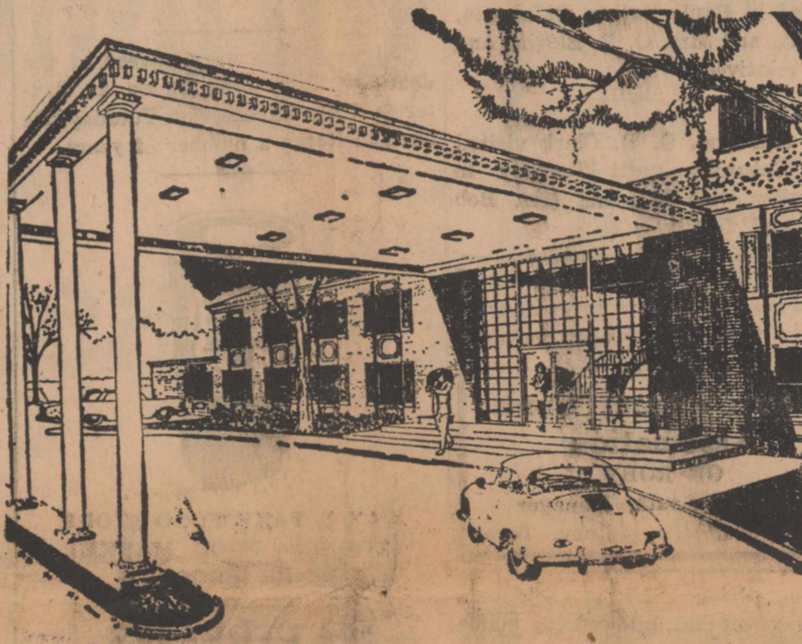

New GI Bill Affects Many Area Veterans

Approximately 6000 veterans in Texas' 17th Congressional District are potentially eligible for benefits and services under the new GI Bill just signed by President Johnson, Congressman Omar Bureson said today.

The new GI Bill provides education and training programs generally patterned after the highly successful GI Bills of World War II and the Korean Conflict. Rep. Bureson was a strong supporter of the bill.

The Congressman pointed out that in the first year alone, over 700 veterans are expected to take advantage of the educational benefits, according to statistics from the Veterans Administration. This educational provision is expected to provide the veterans in the district almost \$491,000 in direct benefits in that first year, according to Congressman Bureson.

He said the educational provisions of the new bill go into effect June 1, 1966, giving the veteran ample

time to plan his schooling program.

The veterans covered under this bill are also eligible for hospital benefits and 1000 patient days at a cost of \$2,000 are expected to be made available to applying veterans in the first year.

All veterans are eligible for educational and guaranteed home loan benefits who were on active duty more than 180 days after January 31, 1955, and honorably discharged, or who were discharged with less than 180 days service because of a service-incurred disability.

Under the education and training sections, monthly payments for full time training are:

\$100 for veterans without dependents.

\$125 for veterans with one dependent.

\$150 for veterans with more than one dependent.

Veterans eligible can receive up to 36 months of schooling or training on the basis of one month for each month spent in uniform.

The veteran must complete his program of education within eight

years after discharge.

The Congressman hailed the President's action and praised the meritorious way Congress acted in this urgent matter.

He noted the GI home loan provisions of the bill would increase real estate activity throughout the country.

The formula for eligibility of the veteran to participate in the GI

home loan program is the same as that already in existence; that is, 10 years from the date of discharge, plus one year for each three months served. Entitlement shall not continue beyond 20 years, nor shall it expire before 10 years.

Guaranteed or insured loan ceilings remain at \$7,500 while the top for direct loans, made where no private financing is readily available,

has been increased from \$15,000 to \$17,500.

Medical and hospital care is available on the same basis as for wartime veterans. Other benefits include burial benefits, employment assistance, and veterans' preference in Federal employment.

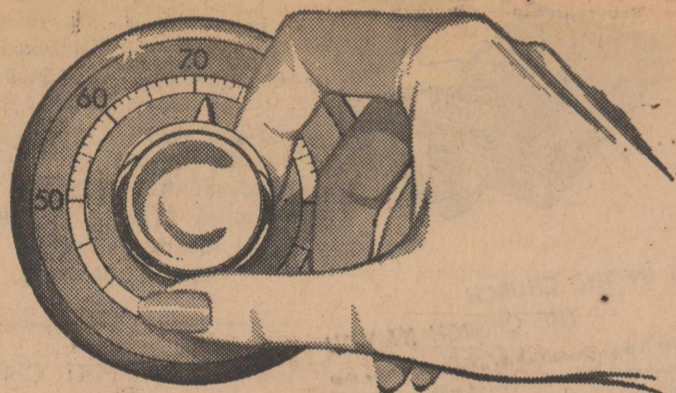

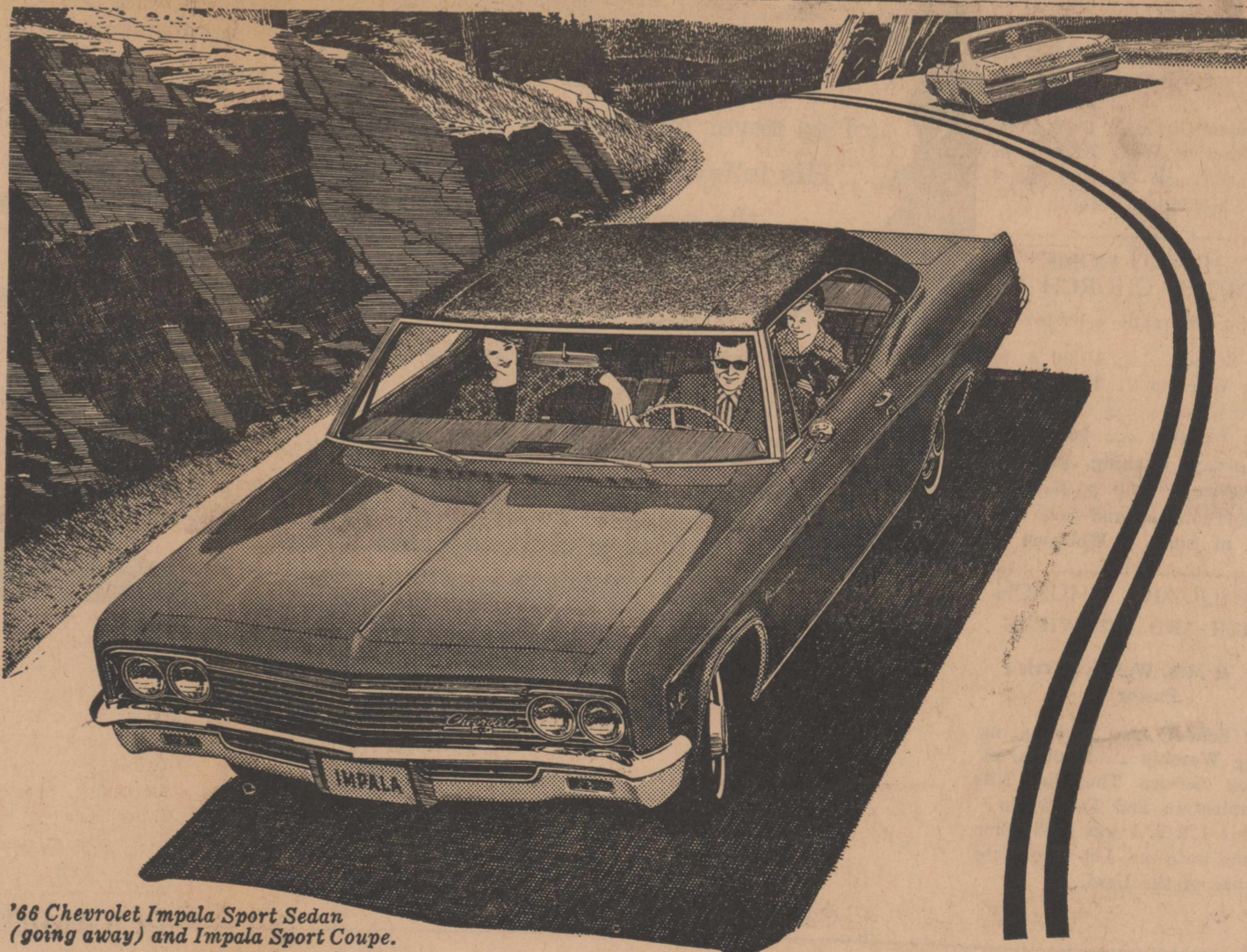
