



Victory Bell **Gets Permanent** Stadium Home

> The RHS Victory Bell, acquired last fall from the city of Rotan, will have a new home next football season in Yellowhammer Stadium. The 400-pound bell proved too unwieldy to transport to out-oftown games, and instead had to generate, spirit only at home football contests.
