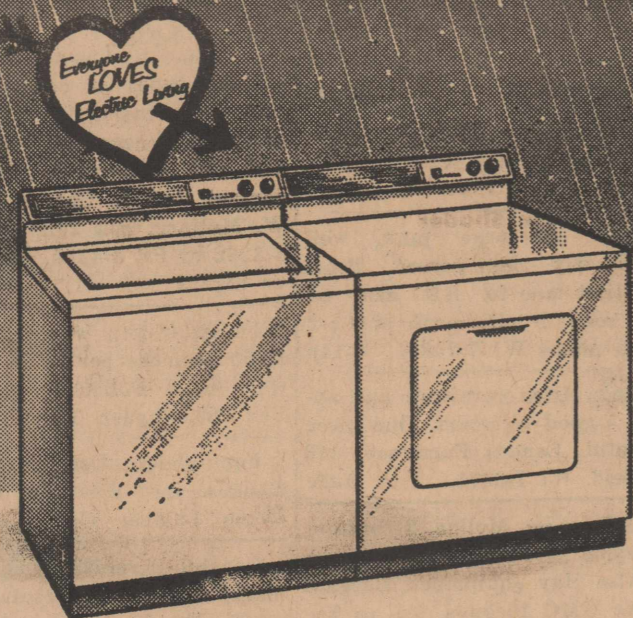

Little Hammers Fifth In 6-A Track & Field

The Rotan Little Hammers placed in ten events enroute to taking fifth place in the District 6-A Junior High Track and Field Meet here April 15.

Tetanus or lockjaw is a threat to any wounded horse. Horses are the most susceptible of domestic animals to the disease.

The tetanus organism is especially abundant in areas where horses are kept, and they can contact the disease from the slightest puncture wound. In spite of new treatments, tetanus is both difficult and expensive to cure.

In case your horse is wounded, it is recommended that you get a veterinarian to give the animal a preventive injection of tetanus antitoxin as soon as possible.

Permanent protection from the disease is possible by giving horses two doses of tetanus toxoid at 6-week intervals and then a single dose each year thereafter. Tetanus prevention is cheap insurance against what could happen to your horse.

A properly managed farm pond can provide excellent fishing and serve as a source of recreation and income to farmers and ranchers. Most ponds should be fertilized for maximum fish production. Fertilizer increases the supply of plankton which is the main food supply for small fish and water insects.

Early in the spring, when the water temperature reaches 60 degree F., is the time to begin the fertilization program.

Most Texas waters respond to an initial application of 100 pounds of 20-20-5 analysis fertilizer per surface acre, followed by successive treatments of 20 to 40 pounds per acre at two-week intervals until a desirable bloom has been reached. In water surrounded by soils with ample potassium, 16-20-0 gives good results. Nitrogen and phosphorus seem to be essential for good plankton production in most ponds regardless of the surrounding soil type.

The plankton bloom is sufficient if a person's cupped hand disappears when the arm is immersed in the water to elbow depth (about 18 inches). The bloom usually appears in 1 to 5 weeks after the beginning of the fertilizer program. Subsequent applications should be made only as needed to maintain the bloom.

Other information on farm pond management is available at the county agent's office and you are invited to come by for a visit.

Texas Poison Control Centers - Texas county agents have been supplied with a revised list of the poison control centers located in the state. The list was provided by the Texas Department of Health. Poison control centers are designed to provide information, treatment and public health information. The services are available to local physicians who may not be acquainted

with the proper treatment and antidotes for specific pesticides or other poisonous materials. Entomologists of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service emphasize the importance of keeping doctors informed on what pesticides or other chemicals are being used in an area. The time interval between onset of poison symptoms and initiation of treatment is often critical.

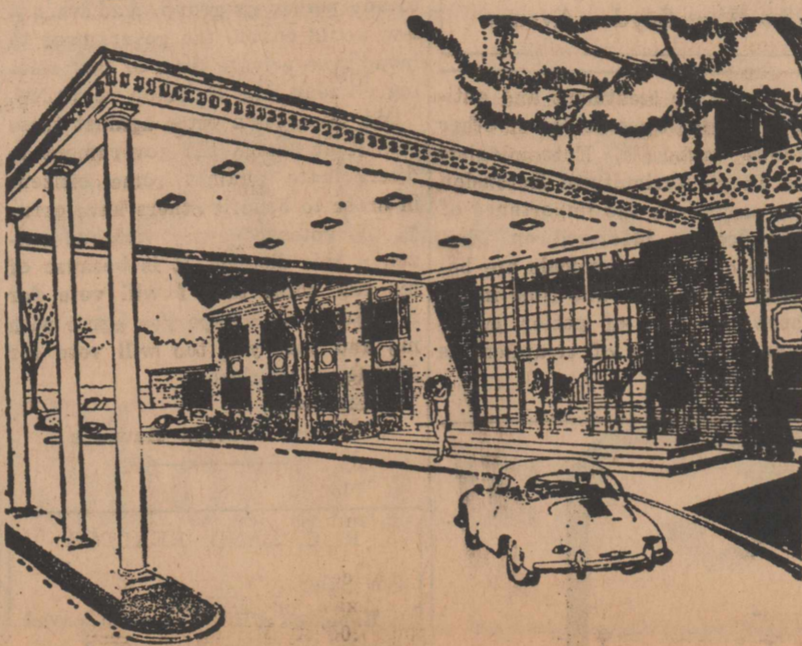
