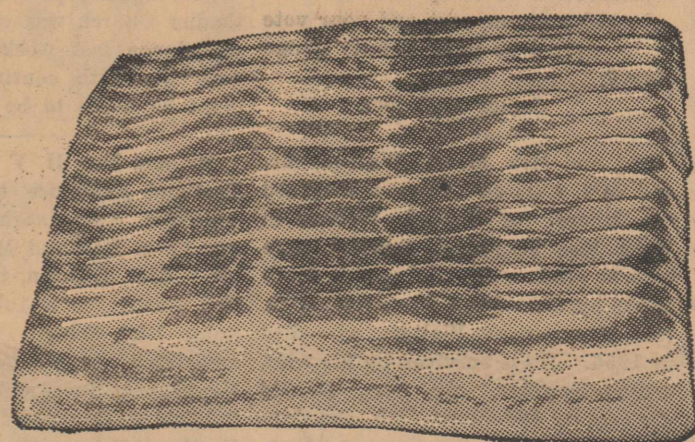

This Is Senior Citizens Month

May is Senior Citizens Month. Under the new law passed by Congress, May is also the month that persons who reached 65 before March 1, 1966, will have to sign up for doctor bill insurance if they are to have coverage by July 1, 1966, the date that medicare coverage begins.

R. R. Tuley, Jr., District Manager for Social Security in Abilene urged all senior citizens are 65 or over who have not signed up for doctor bill insurance to visit their social security office immediately, so that they may have protection when the program starts on July 1.

Almost all persons 65 or over are eligible for the two types of health insurance under the medicare program, hospital insurance and doctor bill insurance. Social security beneficiaries are automatically enrolled in the hospital insurance program, but persons who are still working or who do not receive social security benefits must sign up for hospital insurance. On the other hand, in order to get protection toward the cost of doctors bills at a cost of \$3 per month, all persons must enroll.

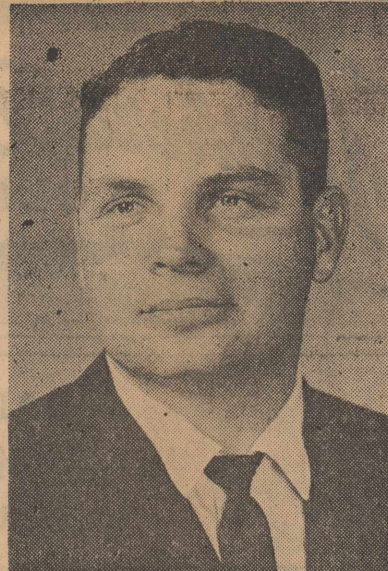
According to Tuley persons who were 65 before March 1, 1966, and fail to enroll before the deadline, May 31, will have to wait till October 1967 before they will have another chance to apply for doctor bill protection. He added that as senior citizens become 65 they should visit their social security office no later than the month before their 65th birthday to have protection as soon as they reach 65.

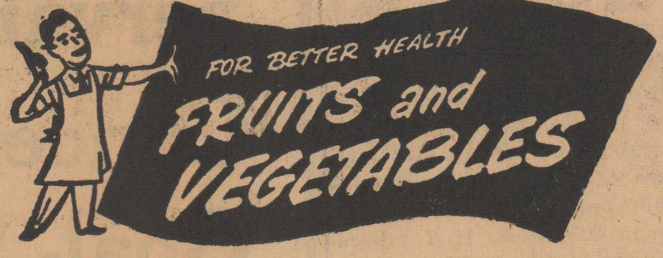

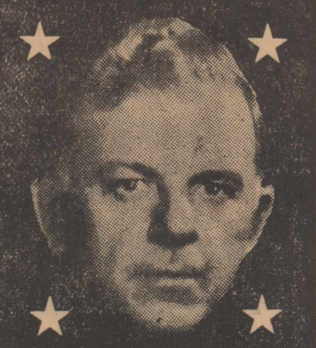

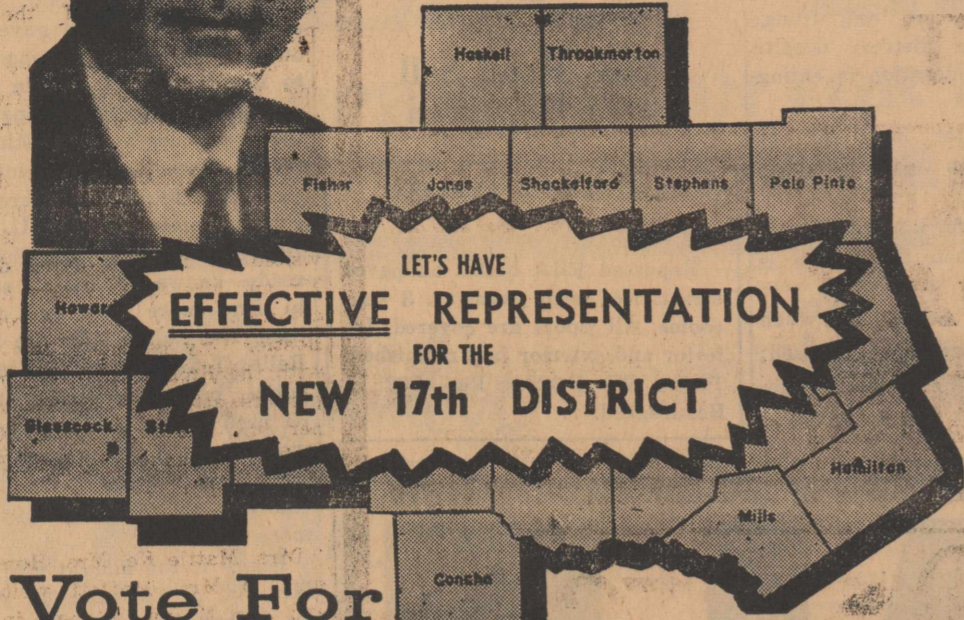

Travel Industry Report
Made By Hiway Dept.

AUSTIN, Texas — A preliminary Travel Industry Report by the Texas Highway Department reveals its Tourist Information Centers played host to a record 753,350 travelers last year. This total is an impressive 133,000 greater or a 17% increase over 1964.

The Department's information centers are located at key points of entry and in the rotunda of the State Capitol in Austin to provide professional travel counseling to the public. Visitors are provided with current travel information, literature on points of interest, travel maps and information about Texas' attractions. Current road condition reports are also available to motorists stopping at the centers.

The importance of the travel industry to the State's economy has long been recognized by the Texas Highway Department. Through its Travel and Information Division it strives to bring visitors to Texas in ever-increasing numbers. This is accomplished by publicizing the State's many attractions and providing information and descriptive literature to prospective visitors.

Last year alone, the Travel and Information Division, in addition to assisting 3-4 million visitors in its Tourist Information Bureaus, also received and processed 224,092 mail inquiries for information and literature on Texas. Of this number 16% or 35,574 were coupons received by the Texas Tourist Development Agency as a result of its media advertising program.

A record 3,575,000 pieces of travel materials were distributed by the Travel and Information Division during 1965. Of this total, 2,000,000 were published by the Texas Highway Department and the rest provided by chambers of commerce and

At the present time this District contains approximately one-half of the total scholastics of the four districts in the county. It has much less than the legal limit for bonded indebtedness. The District has a very well rated evaluation. In view of these facts, the Board is unanimously opposed to consolidation.

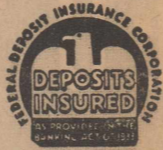

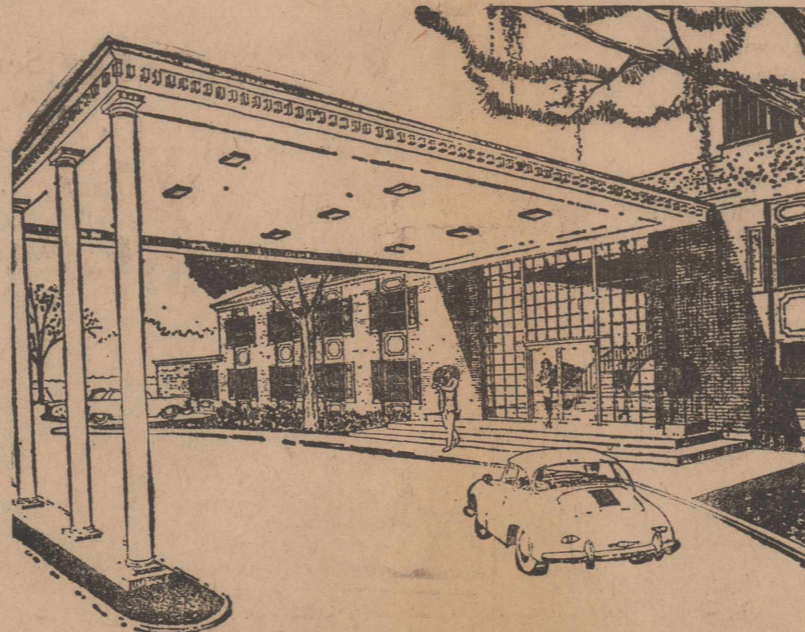
