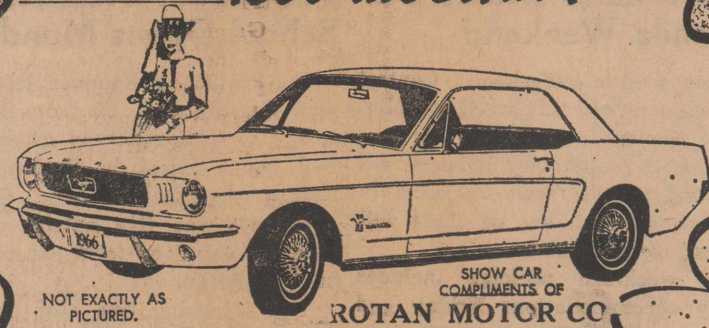

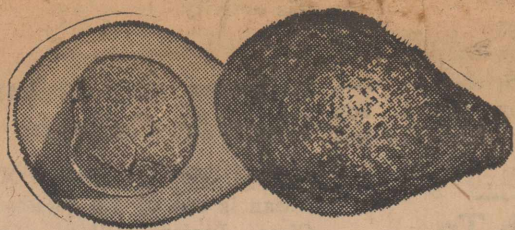

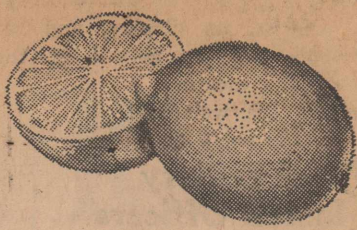

SS Payments Are Heavy In County

991 people in Fisher County received a total of \$699,012 in social security benefits in 1965, R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager in Abilene, revealed today, an increase of \$98,304 and 73 people over 1964.

A large part of the increase in payments resulted from changes made by the Social Security Amendments of 1965, Tuley said. Those changes which were in addition to the new program of health insurance for the aged, included a 7% increase in monthly benefits retroactive to January 1965; benefits for widows as early as 60; benefits for full-time students between 18 and 22; benefits for some people over 72 who hadn't worked long enough to get social security before; and the payment of disability insurance benefits to workers who are unable to work because of a disability that lasts 12 months or more.

"In addition," Tuley continued, "a good many older people, upon applying for Medicare, found they were eligible for regular social security benefits, too. All in all, the 1965 figures for Fisher County include 58 retired workers, 71 disabled workers and their families, and 281 wives and children of retired or deceased workers. In addition, 111 widows, widowers, or dependent, aged parents receive benefits. The aver-

age monthly social security retirement benefit for Fisher County beneficiaries amounted to \$68.04 in 1965."

"These figures," Tuley said, "show how wide the protection offered by social security has become. Just about every man, woman, and child

in Fisher County has in social security the assurance that loss of income because of retirement, disability, or death will not result in destitution -- and now with medicare the aged have the assurance of help with the costs of operations or medical services."

Authority Gives Rabies Information

In order to better understand the disease we know as rabies it is important to correct some of the more common misconceptions, according to Dr. V. H. Driscoll of Wharton, a practitioner in that area of the State and a member of the Texas Veterinary Medical Association Public Information Committee. Few diseases have been recognized for a longer period of time nor have been more misunderstood than rabies.

"This is not a disease confined to our canine population but includes other domestic pets and all warm blooded animals as well. This disease is not, as is the common belief, a seasonal problem. In fact the disease in Texas occurs more frequently in the winter and spring than in the summer and fall. Symptoms of the disease are not always expressed in violent and vicious actions. Indeed any change from the animal bite is the best first aid is sometimes the first observed symptoms.

Since rabies is a disease of the central nervous system it is commonly confused with many other conditions. Definite diagnosis is usually impossible until pathological studies are made of the brain tissues. The appearances of inclusion bodies that enable diagnosis to be rendered does not occur until the disease has run its course and the victim is near death. This makes it imperative that the animal not be destroyed but rather confined safely until the disease terminates in death.

Which raises the question of how the animal should be confined. Even though the animal does not appear to be strong or vicious, if it is suspected of having rabies the place

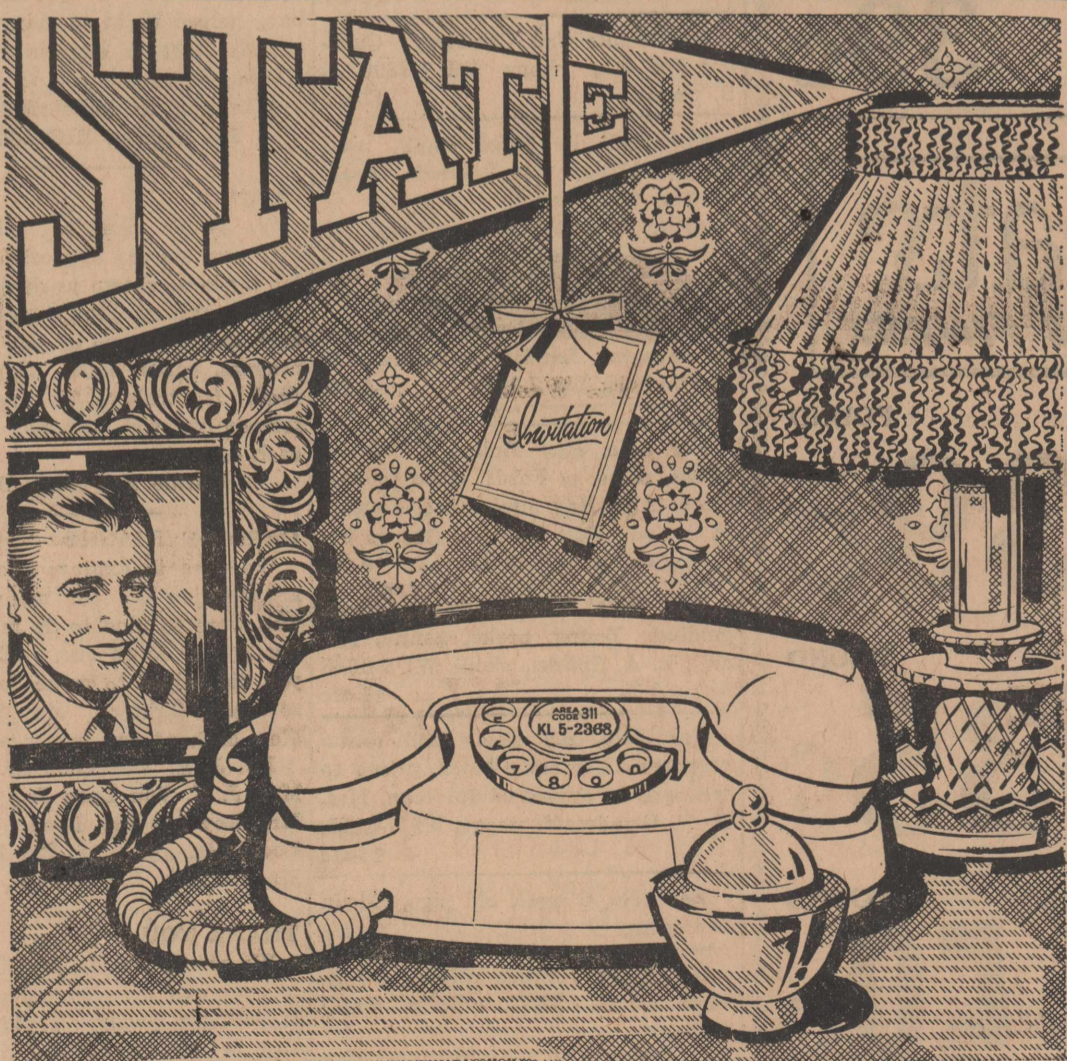

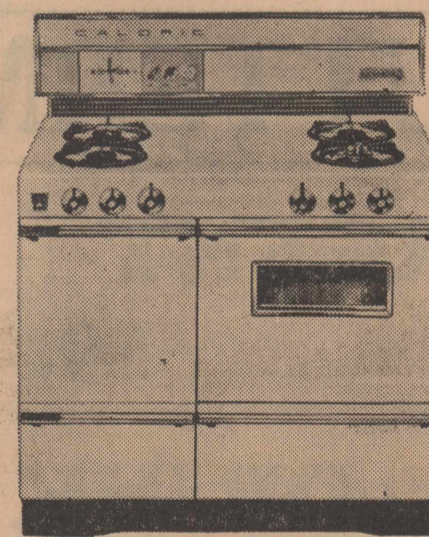

Medicare Extension Deadline May 31

"Although the earlier deadline of March 31 was extended," advises R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager of social security in Abilene, "the new one of May 31, 1966, for enrollment in Medicare for those born before April 1901 will be their last chance before October 1, 1967."

"As persons reach age 65 in April 1901 will be their last chance before October 1, 1967."

"As persons reach age 65 in April of 1966 and later months, they will have a seven month period for enrollment, from three months before age 65 through three months after reaching that age," he added.

Although well over 97% of the residents of the fifteen county Abilene district have notified Social Security Administration of their decision, special arrangements have been made for the convenience of

the undecided of mind-changers. Both the district office in Abilene and the branch office in Brownwood will be open Saturday morning, May 28, and all day Monday, May 30, though normally they would not be open on Saturdays or on National Holidays.

Tech. Institute To Offer 15 Study Areas

The James Connally Technical Institute, a part of the Texas A&M University System, will offer courses in 15 areas of study when its doors open for the first time in September.

The Institute was created by an act of the Texas Legislature in April 1965. The legislation authorized the Board of Directors of Texas A&M University to establish "a coeducational institution . . . which may offer courses of study in vocational and vocational-technical education for which there is a demand within the State of Texas."

Information on the new educational facility, located near Waco, is now available at the office of all county agents. According to County Agent James Norman, agents have been supplied with a copy of the Institute's general catalog for the 1966-67 session.

Norman said the instructional programs of the Institute are designed for training and retraining youth

and adults so they may join the state and nation's work force as skilled workmen or technicians. A major objective of the Institute, he added, is to provide occupational training needed by Texas business & industry and for which there is sufficient demand by students.

The county agent said that persons desiring to enroll must submit applications for admission. High school graduates can be admitted as regular full time students. Mature individuals who have not graduated from high school will be permitted to register if they furnish evidence that their preparations is substantially the same as required of other applicants and have the ability and desire to profitably pursue their desired course of study.

Co. Program Building Committee Met May 10

The spring meeting of the Fisher County Program Building Committee was held Tuesday evening, May 10, at the Agriculture building in Roby.

The vice-chairman, James Cave, presided in the absence of chairman, W. P. Schubert.

In reporting for the crops' committee James Norman stated that a number of the committee plans have been carried out or are in the making for the near future. A tour to observe small grain demonstrations was set up for May 19 with James Mulky of the extension department conducting the tour program.

Another project is a cotton fertilizer demonstration that has been set up on the Timmons farm south of Roby.

Also there has been a meeting set for May 27 on pecans with the horticulturist specialist from A & M giving demonstrations on grafting and budding and other valuable information on growing pecans.

Mrs. Alice Ballenger reported on some of the women's programs that have been done this far. She stated that she, in cooperation with the local school homemaking teacher, has assisted low-income families in the county by teaching them how to use the commodities they receive to more advantage and by giving them other useful information. She and Miss Hambright will hold a workshop with the colored women in the near future.

Three drapery workshops have been conducted with women from all over the county.

4-H work is progressing in the county with as many as 9 adult leaders actively working with clubs.

George Dorman and Milburn Cook of the technical action panel discussed as one of their greatest problems, the prevent of wind erosion on diverted acres. Some sort of cover crops and residues must be used.

A few plans for '67 were discussed. A tentative appointment has been made with Mr. Charles Baker to conduct some short-courses to help small rural business and all people involved in agri-business. A workshop on parliamentary procedure was also suggested. The committee will meet again in September and our county agents urge that more people from all over the county meet and offer their suggestions so that more and better programs of all types can be worked out.

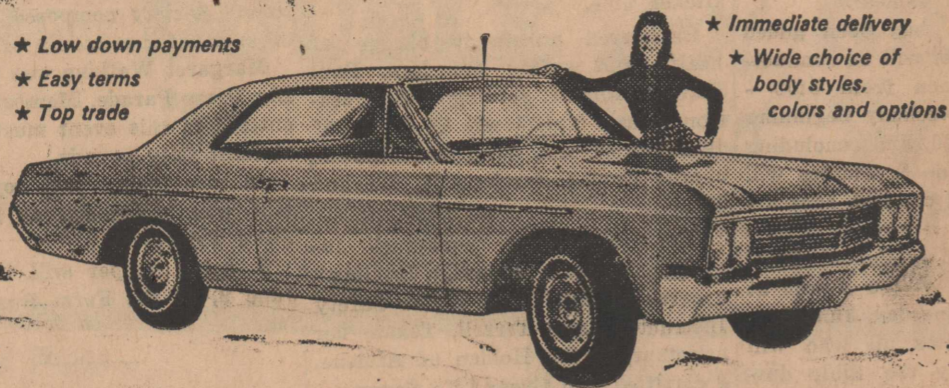

No Vacation From Voting

"Summer soldiers" and "sunshine patriots" threaten to dictate the election results June 4 by their conspicuous absence from the polls.

A poor voter turnout could mean that a very small minority of Texas citizens choose the candidates who will be governing all the citizens.

The June primary falls in vacation season and lots of voters may take a vacation from their duty as citizens as well as from their work.

Absentee voting for the second primary begins May 25 and continues through May 31, but the Memorial Day Week-end takes out one work-day at the courthouses where the county clerks will handle absentee ballots. Persons living within county seat towns who want to vote absentee must go in person to the clerk's office to do so, and can vote only on May 25, 26, 27 and 31 since the offices will be closed Saturday, Sunday and Monday.

Mail applications for absentee ballots from residents outside the county seat must be received in the clerk's office by 5 p. m. May 31.

Absentee voting for the second primary begins May 25 and continues through May 31. It can be done in person or by mail through the county clerk's office.

An exhortation to vote merely for the sake of voting is inadequate. It needs to be amplified with the reminder that voters should thoughtfully consider the candidates and the issues and cast an intelligent vote.

Fisher County voters will face a very short ballot, but it is still important to voice your choice.

One state race, Attorney General, with Franklin Spears of Bexar County and Crawford Martin of Hill County.

Only local race is for District Clerk and names appear on the ballot in this order; Nealy A. Morton and Pearl M. Hughey.

The School Board feels that the present high school building (which was built in 1925) is inadequate and proposes the building of a new one. This proposed building would be located on present school property and would be designed along with a new auditorium and gymnasium to make the Rotan campus a unitized whole.

In order for this type of unit construction to be carried out, the issuance of bonds would be necessary.

We feel that the District is in good financial shape and the erection of the cafeteria, the addition to the Primary building, and major improvements in the athletic plant, all without additional taxation, indicate the soundness of the financial policies of the Administration.

At the present time this District contains approximately one-half of the total scholastics of the four districts in the county. It has much less than the legal limit for bonded indebtedness. The District has a very well rated evaluation. In view of these facts, the Board is unanimously opposed to consolidation.

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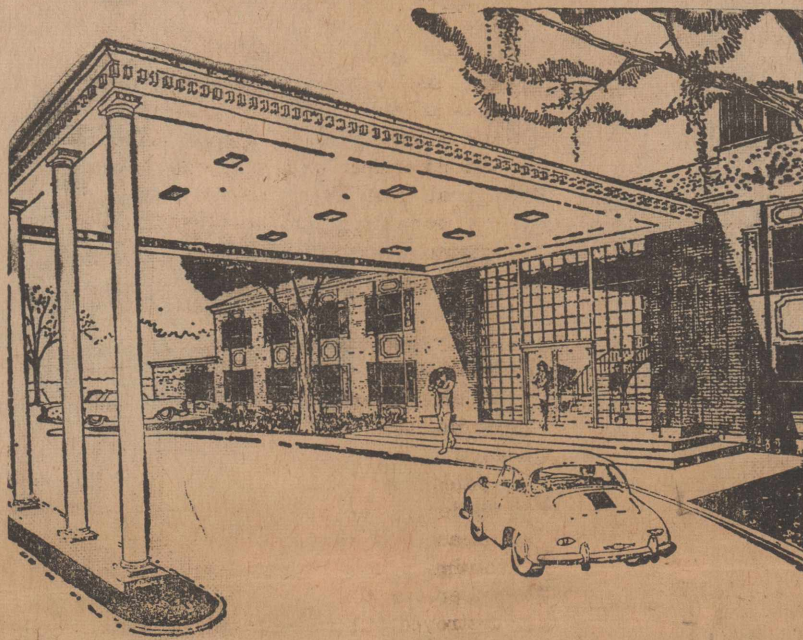
