### Relative of Mrs. Smith Fatally Injured at Olney

Freddie Millican, 35, of Olney and native of Throckmorton was fatally injured Saturday afternoon in an explosion at an abandoned oil well. The blast also seriously injured Frank Gray, uncle of Mrs. Millican, who is in Olney Hospital for treatment.

Mrs. Millican, the former Willie Odell has visited in Rotan a number of times and is niece and namesake of Mrs. D. J. Smith. Mr. and Mrs. Smith went to Olney Sunday to be with the family.

Millican and Gray were welding when gas fumes escaping from the ground exploded. The site is at Lake Cooper, four miles north of Olney. The two men were repairing leak on the well, which they owned.

The blast hurled Millican 70 feet and wrapped steel cabling around his body.

Millican had lived at Olney about eight years. Born Sept. 9, 1930, at Throckmorton, his mother, Mrs. Lowell Millican, still lives there.

Funeral was held at 2:30 p. m. Monday in the Olney First Christian Church. Burial in Throckmorton Cemetery.

### LVN School To Be At Sweetwater

There will always be a demand for qualified people to care for the sick. A vocational nurse is trained to work under the direction of Licensed Physicians or registered nurses. A vocational nurse is trained to care for subacute, convalescent, and chronic patients at home or in institutions.

Some of the opportunities for employment are in the hospitals, Doctor's offices and clinics, public health nursing, civil service, and industrial organizations. At this time there is a great demand for licensed vocational nurses in all these fields. This school is operated through the Sweetwater Public Schools in cooperation with Simmons Memorial Hospital. Our School is affiliated with the Texas Education Agency and is accredited by the State Board of Vocational Nurse Examiners.

The course is 12 months with experiences in all phases of nursing. After completion of the course you will take a state board exam and of passed satisfactorily will become a licensed vocational nurse.






