Hiway 70 To Be Widened In Roby

AUSTIN, July 5 — Widening of a section of State Highway 70 in the City of Roby was authorized today by the Texas Highway Commission.

The section extends from the north city limit to the south city limit, a distance of approximately 0.8 mile.

Commission action follows a request for the assistance by the City of Roby and is subject to its acceptance of certain maintenance construction responsibilities required of local governments by the Texas Highway Department.

The State Highway Engineer was directed to proceed with the development of plans for the work and to submit the work for finance consideration of the Commission in the next available highway program.

Telephone Nos. To Be Changed This Fall

All telephone numbers in Rotan will be changed late next fall when All Number Calling comes to Rotan and Roby, according to Mike McCoy, manager for the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company. McCoy said a new telephone directory showing the number changes will be issued at the time of the changeover.

He said the new plan calls for eliminating the present telephone numbering system of two letters and five numbers in Rotan and the four number system presently in effect in Roby. He said the new telephone numbers will consist of seven numbers, the first three of which will indicate the prefix or exchange and the last four will identify the individual telephone.

McCoy said All Number Calling is being introduced in Rotan and Roby as a part of a plan which will eventually be nation-wide. "The telephone company can force the day when the old-fashioned two-letter and five number method of telephone identification is no longer practical," the manager said. "So, this is one of the first steps in a plan which eventually will be nation-wide."

He also said the company is planning an extensive education program to inform customers about the number changes in Rotan and Roby. "Changing telephone numbers is something we do not like to do," McCoy stated, "but it is necessary for continued orderly telephone growth in these two cities."

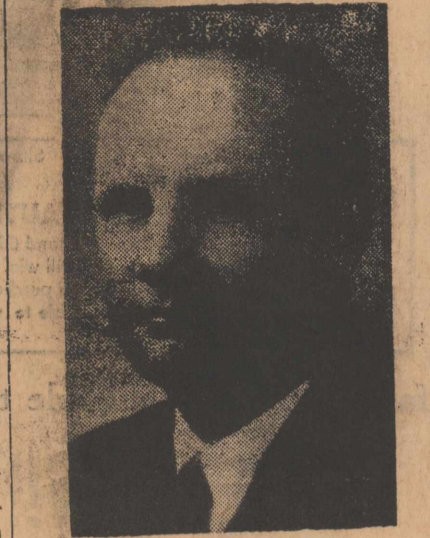

The USS Brush operated as a unit of the Seventh Fleet, furnishing Anti-Submarine warfare protection for the fast carrier strike forces of USS Hancock, USS Enterprise and USS Ticonderoga.

During her deployment, operating off the coast of Vietnam, she expended more than 1500 rounds of high explosive ammunition in providing naval gunfire support in defense of friendly forces in Vietnam.

Burleson Urges Caution In Off-shore Leasing

WASHINGTON, June 29 — Congressman Omar Burleson (D., Tex.) today commended the Department of Interior for "slowing down" its program for additional leasing of Outer Continental Shelf Lands off Louisiana for oil and gas purposes.

Rep. Burleson said Interior Secretary Stewart Udall had advised him that after careful consideration of the overall situation as to the effects of a large offshore lease offering this year, there will be no

Louisiana offshore lease sale in 1966.

Secretary Udall said, however, that Interior was "considering a small drainage sale" for which plans will be announced soon.

Congressman Burleson said postponement of a major lease sale in the offshore Louisiana area, originally planned for this year, "should provide time for re-evaluation of the timing, the size, the economic impact - and indeed, the necessity - of additional large scale federal leasing off the Gulf Coast in the near future."

In an exchange of letters with

Secretary Udall, the Texas congressman had urged that Interior give "proper balance" to oil and gas leasing programs on the Outer Continental Shelf "in view of continued depressed oil exploration activities" in Texas and mid-continent oil states.

Rep. Burleson pointed out that 76 percent of total federal OCS acreage under lease as of last December was offshore Louisiana, and added: "this would seem to raise the question as to the proper balance of offshore leasing as between the Gulf of Mexico and other OCS areas, such as the domestic oil

deficit area of the West Coast.

Noting that 1965 oil production on federal leases in both disputed and undisputed areas offshore Louisiana averaged about 400,000 barrels daily, Rep. Burleson said production in this area had shown healthy growth in the past five years. "with every indication that existing leases will sustain a healthy growth in the future."

The rapid growth during recent years from federal leases offshore Louisiana has "undoubtedly" had an adverse effect on Texas and other oil producing states where oil exploration and drilling have been declining, he said.

He expressed concern that an unbalanced program for development of offshore production, through accelerated federal leasing, "could very well undermine and reduce the effectiveness of the Mandatory Oil Import Program."

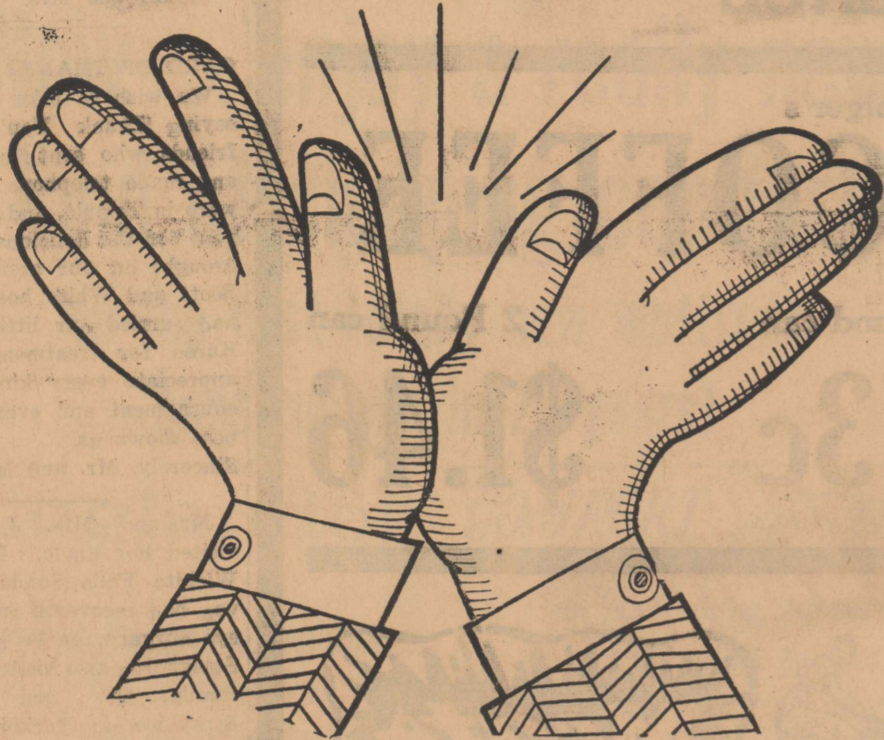
"For these reasons," he wrote Secretary Udall, "I urge your department in planning its program of offshore leasing, to give very careful consideration to a proper balancing as between offshore areas and also as between offshore areas and onshore development . . . in the interest of maintaining a strong domestic petroleum producing industry in all areas of the United States."

The Congressman expressed hope that the "offshore leasing problem" will be resolved in a manner consistent with the decision by Defense Secretary McNamara to halt 30,000 barrels daily of military jet fuel imports, "an action which is in the direction of providing badly needed encouragement and incentives to the domestic petroleum industry."

Noting that the decision by the Defense Secretary to end his Department's petroleum product imports, in the interest of reducing the balance of payments deficit, was limited to a six-month period, Rep. Burleson said:

"This action by the Defense Secretary was commendable. It will contribute to solving our balance of payments problem. It will bolster our domestic oil producing industry. It will therefore, help assure our security as to petroleum supplies. These goals are of such overriding long-range importance that short-range actions are of little help. Therefore, I am confident this action to end these military product imports will be permanent."

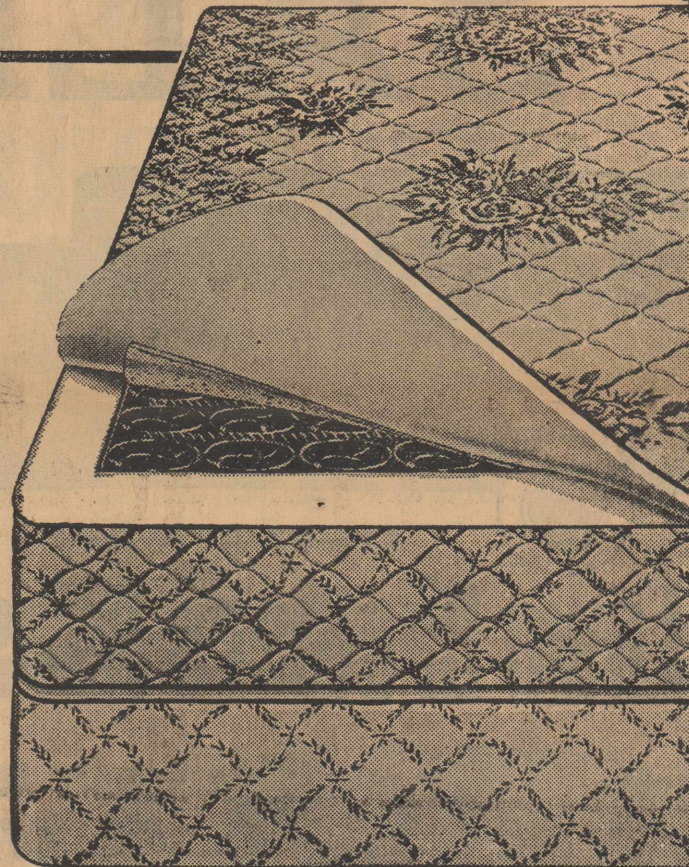

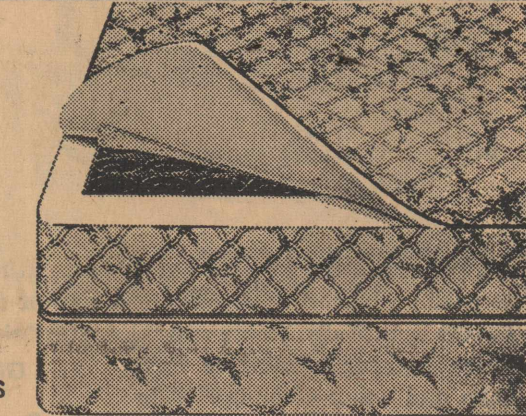

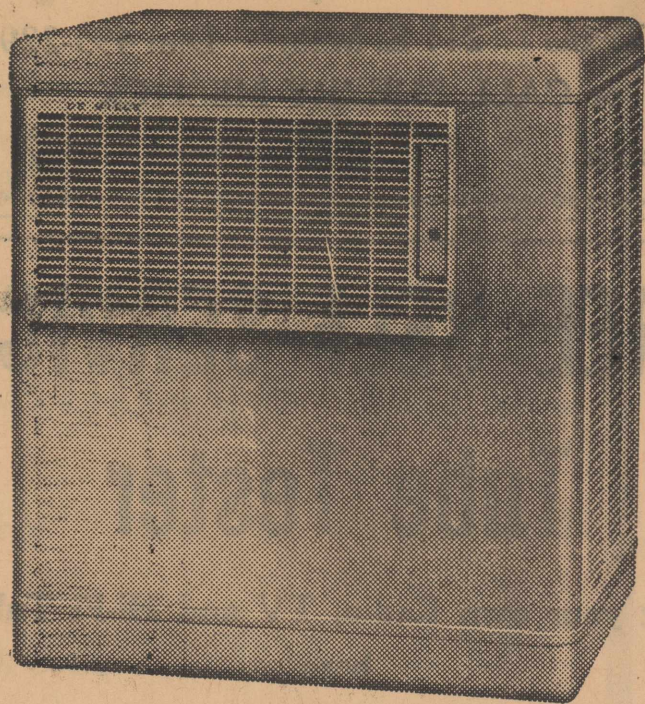

Cotton Insect Report-3

Situation at a Glance

In most of the Rolling Plains the cotton is up to a stand. During counties eighty percent or more of the past week several fields in the northern counties were still being planted due to weather conditions at planting time. Some of the early cotton is squaring and much of this cotton will soon reach the one-third grown square stage. A few fields in the Rolling Plains area have passed the one-third grown stage of growth.

Thrips

From many fields during the past week, reports of light thrips infestations were received. Thrips infestations have decreased during the past week. Cotton plants seem to be outgrowing damage caused by thrips earlier in most counties. Medium infestations of thrips were reported from fields in Haskell, Hall, Throckmorton, Nolan and Jones counties.

Aphids

Light infestations of aphids were found in many fields in the area. Reports of medium infestations came from two fields in Taylor County.

Fleahoppers

Fleahopper activity has increased during the past week. A few fields reported economically important infestations in several counties in this area.

Cotton should be checked for fleahoppers as it starts squaring. Excessive loss of young squares to fleahoppers can account for reduced yields.

Boll Weevils

Overwintering populations of boll weevils were reported from fields in Haskell, Stonewall, Hardeman, Wilbarger, Wichita, Scurry, Baylor, Taylor, Nolan and Callahan counties. These reports ranged from 50 to 75 weevils per acre. Reports of 131 to 196 overwintering weevils per acre were received from fields in Mitchell and Tom Green counties.

Producers should check squares after they are one-third grown for boll weevil punctures. Punctured squares flare open and usually fall to the ground within a week. When the punctured square count reaches 15 to 20 percent, producers should consider control measures.

Bollworms

Bollworm eggs have been reported from fields in several Rolling Plains counties. Two young bollworms were reported in one field in Cottle county.

Cabbage Loopers

Infestations of cabbage loopers have been reported in fields in Shackelford, Jones, Wichita, Wilbarger, Hardeman, Foard, Runnels, Throckmorton, Childress and Cottle counties.

Producers should keep a close watch on fields with infestations of cabbage loopers. This insect can completely defoliate plants if it reaches a heavy infestation.

Other Insects

Yellow-striped armyworms and beet armyworms have been reported in several fields throughout the area. Infestations of these insects have decreased during the past week.

Infestations of garden webworms have been reported in Jones, Haskell, McCulloch, Runnels, Nolan, Taylor and Mitchell counties during the past week.

Grasshoppers have caused damage to many fields in this area. Heaviest damage resulted from grasshopper infestations in Stonewall, Childress, King and Nolan counties.

For control recommendations, please refer to L-508 (Texas Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects in the High Plains, Rolling Plains and Trans-Pecos Area of Texas). Copies of this guide may be picked up at the office of your county agriculture agent.
