## County Insect Situation Given

Fisher County Cotton insect situation for the week of August 17-19 as reported by the Rolling Plains Cotton Insect Survey Team, checking 19 fields week in the county.

Boll weevil and bollworm populations continue to increase in most of the 19 fields, said James S. Norman, County Agricultural Agent.

Bollworms: have increased during the last two weeks, in several of the fields. Bollworm damage to green squares and bolls was heavy (4 percent to over 5 percent) on the following farms: Bernice Hargrove and Thurman Terry. Damage of 2 percent to 4 percent was observed on farms by Lester Hardin, C. D. Herron, Lee Rasberry, Frank Mitchell, Max Carriker, Donald Coker, Jack Whitworth, Kiefer Cauble, and Waldo Gatewood. Damage of none to 2 percent on James Cave, A. F. Dozier, Stanley Jackson, Frank Kemp, A. Branscum, Charles McCall, Willie Gruben, and Truitt Strickland farms. Number of bollworms found per acre was from none to 1831.

Boll Weevils: Population of boll weevils ranged from none to 8,325 per acre. Punctured green square counts of 14 percent to 23 percent were observed on these farms, Jackson, Hargrove and Dozier. Damage of 1 percent to 14 percent on the following: Herron, Rasberry, Terry, Mitchell, Gatewood, Kemp, Gruben, and Strickland. No damage to 1 percent, Cave, Hardin, Carriker, Coker, Whitworth, Cauble, Branscum and McCall.

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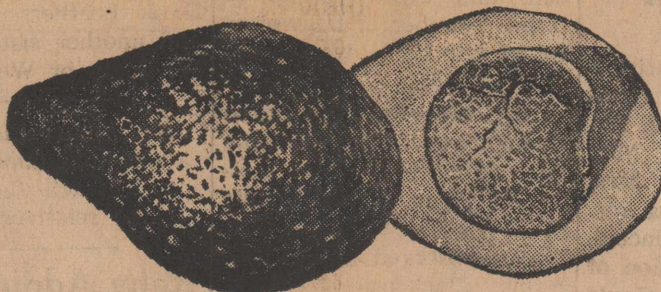

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When cutting hay, cure it as quickly as possible. By curing and baling almost immediately, you keep most of the leaves, color and nutrients — and conserve the quality. The moisture content of hay plants when cut ranges from about 60 to 80 percent. They must be dried to 12-13

percent for safe storage. Curing time for large-stemmed hay plants such as alfalfa and Sudan may be reduced by one-third to one-half with a hay conditioner. The machines are most effective when used immediately after hay is cut. Hay should be put through a conditioner no more than 15 to 20 minutes after it's cut. Some people also use a conditioner on Bermudagrass hay because the fluffing action causes faster drying. Hay conditioners are two general types; one cracks the stems of plants lengthwise,

while the other crimps the stems at close intervals. Conditioning hay permits moisture to evaporate quickly from the stems. This means less exposure of the hay to sun, wind, dew, and possible rain. Hay quality is often lost by baling too wet. This results in excess heating or molding. Hay allowed to dry too long also is lower in nutrients than hay baled at the proper time. Timing is important — don't wait too long, but don't bale too wet for highest quality hay. Breeding heifers should not be allowed to get too fat. This will help avoid calving difficulties. Excess weight has a harmful effect on fertility and calf production. Research shows heifers that are excessively fat have a high percentage of dead calves. They also have more calving difficulties. It is sometimes a good idea to breed heifers to a smaller type bull rather than one that is extremely large and growthy for his age. This means smaller calves that can be dropped without difficulty. After a heifer has dropped her first calf, the size or breed of bull does not seem to be an important cause of calving difficulties. Breeding heifers when they are too young is another cause of calving problems. Breeding heifers should not be too fat, bred when they are too young, or bred to a large growthy bull — follow these guidelines for

less calving difficulties. For continued flower production throughout the summer and fall, don't neglect your rose bushes. Continue to use a disease and insect control program. A preventive spray of folpet every 7 to 10 days will prevent blackspot and help to control mildew. An application of complete fertilizer scattered over the surface of the rose bed at the rate of one to two pounds of 10-8-6 or 16-20-0 per 100 square feet of bed area every four weeks will insure continued growth and strong canes for late summer and fall bloom. To conserve moisture and reduce soil temperature, use a two to three inch mulch of sawdust, shavings, pine straw, cotton burrs or other organic matter. As the mulch decomposes, it should be replaced.

**Water Board To Meet At Lubbock**  
Austin — A Texas Water Development Board hearing team will return to Lubbock on September 9, to receive testimony on the Texas Water Plan as it affects West Texas, Joe G. Moore, Jr., Executive Director of the Texas Water Development Board, said Wednesday. The hearing will begin at 9:30 a.m. in the Lubbock City Auditorium on the Texas Technological College campus. The Lubbock hearing will bring to a close the series of public hearings on the Texas Water Plan that began in the High Plains city in mid-June, and continued through the summer in all sections of Texas. The September 9 hearing will follow generally the format that has been used in all basin hearings this summer; however, there will not be a review by staff members of the Texas Water Plan in order to permit more time for testimony. Moore will open the hearing with some general remarks, then the Board will begin receiving testi-

mony. Moore said persons desiring to testify should present written statements of their testimony to the Board so they may be made a part of the official record. "This however, will not preclude hearing anyone who desires to speak from notes or extemporaneously," he said. The hearing will cover the High Plains, the Trans-Pecos, and West Texas, Moore said. 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**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**  
NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT  
PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 48 proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts created under Article IX of the Constitution.  
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
Section 1. That Section 9, Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:  
"Section 9. The Legislature may by law provide for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of hospital districts composed of one or more counties or all or any part of one or more counties with power to issue bonds for the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping same, for hospital purposes; providing for the transfer to the hospital district of the title to any land, buildings, improvements and equipment located wholly within the district which may be jointly or separately owned by any city, town or county, providing that any district so created shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care for its needy inhabitants and assume the outstanding indebtedness incurred by cities, towns and counties for hospital purposes prior to the creation of the district, if same are located wholly within its boundaries, and a pro rata portion of such indebtedness based upon the then last approved tax assessment rolls of the included cities, towns and counties if less than all

(1) determining the desire of a majority of the qualified voters within the district to dissolve it;  
(2) disposing of or transferring the assets, if any, of the district; and  
(3) satisfying the debts and bond obligations, if any, of the district, in such manner as to protect the interests of the citizens within the district, including their collective property rights in the assets and property of the district, provided, however, that any grant from federal funds, however dispensed, shall be considered an obligation to be repaid in satisfaction and provided that no election to dissolve shall be held more often than once each year. In such connection, the statute shall provide against disposal or transfer of the assets of the district except for due compensation unless such assets are transferred to another governmental agency, such as a county, embracing such district and using such transferred assets in such a way as to benefit citizens formerly within the district.  
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:  
"FOR the constitutional amendment providing the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts."  
"AGAINST the constitutional amendment providing the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts."  
Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to establish the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office.  
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
Section 1. That Article III, Section 3, of the Constitution of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:  
"Section 3. The Senators shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of four years; but a new Senate shall be chosen after every apportionment, and the Senators elected after each apportionment shall be divided by lot into two classes. The seats of the Senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the first two years, and those of the second class at the expiration of four years, so that one half of the Senators shall be chosen biennially thereafter. Senators shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified."  
Sec. 2. That Article III, Section 4, of the Constitution of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:  
"Section 4. The Members of the House of Representatives shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of two years. Representatives shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified."  
Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State, at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:  
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office."  
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment establishing the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office."  
If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such Amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.  
Sec. 4. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for such election and this Amendment shall be published and the election shall be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 65 proposing an Amendment to Section 3-b of Article VII of the Constitution of Texas providing that school taxes theretofore voted in any independent school district or in any junior college district shall not be abrogated, cancelled or invalidated by a change in boundaries nor shall bonds voted, but unissued, at the time of such change, be invalidated by such change; authorizing the levy of taxes after such change without further election in the district as changed; providing an exception in the case of the annexation or consolidation of whole districts; providing for a proclamation therefor.  
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
Section 1. That Section 3-b of Article VII of the Constitution of Texas be amended to be and read as follows:  
"Section 3-b. No tax for the maintenance of public free schools voted in any independent school district and no tax for the maintenance of a junior college voted by a junior college district, nor any bonds voted in any such district, but unissued, shall be abrogated, cancelled or invalidated by change of any kind in the boundaries thereof. After any change in boundaries, the governing body of any such district, without the necessity of an additional election, shall have the power to assess, levy and collect ad valorem taxes on all taxable property within the boundaries of the district as changed, for the purposes of the maintenance of public free schools or the maintenance of a junior college, as the case may be, and the payment of principal of, and interest on all bonded indebtedness outstanding against, or attributable, adjusted or allocated to, such district or any territory therein, in the amount, at the rate, or not to exceed the rate, and in the manner authorized in the district prior to the change in its boundaries, and further in accordance with the laws under which all such bonds, respectively, were voted; and such governing body also shall have the power, without the necessity of an additional election, to sell and deliver any unissued bonds voted in the district prior to any such change in boundaries, and to assess, levy and collect ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the district as changed, for the payment of principal of and interest on such bonds in the manner permitted by the laws under which such bonds were voted. In those instances where the boundaries of any such independent school district are changed by the annexation of, or consolidation with, one or more whole school districts, the taxes to be levied for the purposes hereinabove authorized may be in the amount or at not to exceed the rate theretofore voted in the district having at the time of such change the greatest scholastic population according to the latest scholastic census and only the unissued bonds of such district voted prior to such change, may be

subsequently sold and delivered and any voted, but unissued, bonds of other school districts involved in such annexation or consolidation shall not thereafter be issued."  
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:  
"FOR the Amendment to Section 3-b of Article VII of the Constitution of Texas providing that taxes or bonds previously voted in any independent school district or in any junior college district shall not be abrogated, cancelled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizing the continuance of the levy of taxes after such change without further election."  
"AGAINST the amendment to Section 3-b of Article VII of the Constitution of Texas providing that taxes or bonds previously voted in any independent school district or in any junior college district shall not be abrogated, cancelled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizing the continuance of the levy of taxes after such change without further election."  
If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective on and after the date of its adoption.  
Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

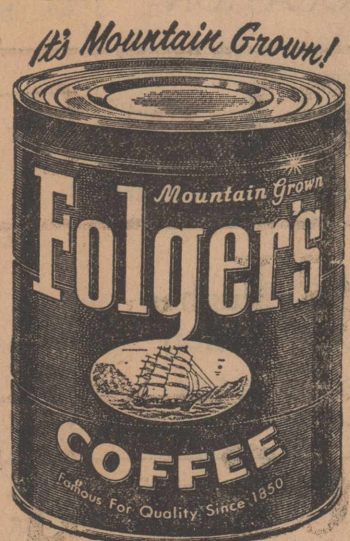

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37 proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section, Section 51-d, so as to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or full-paid firemen who suffer violent death in the course of the performance of their duties as law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 51-d to read as follows:

"Section 51-d. The Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or of full-paid firemen who suffer violent death in the course of the performance of their duties as law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November,

1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or full-paid firemen who suffer violent death in the course of the performance of their duties as law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen."

## 'As It Looks From Here'

Continuing Last Week's Discussion on the economic status of our Country, the question is do we really have an "affluent society"?

It Is Not A Matter Of Raising Alarm That an economic collapse is imminent or that it may occur even in the lifetime of most of us. Rather, this an attempt to raise some signs along the road on which we are traveling to warn "Slow Down," "Caution," "Slippery Road."

It Appears Fairly Safe To Assume That most people who take these matters seriously find confusion at every turn. The obvious reason for it is the awful complexities involved. It is complicated by the powerful tendencies towards politicalization and centralization. (Perhaps these are one and the same.)

If We Are Going To Politicize Every Problem then they will all run together and can no longer be identified. If the Government must decide what to do about housing on Blub Street or a sewer system for the town of Rocky Branch, it must also involve itself in solving every other problem. For the many crises to be solved, the package must be sent all the way on the road to Washington and back before action can be taken on the simplest principles of common sense to meet our needs of local police, housing, schools, welfare and wages.

When The Economy Is Completely Entwined with politics, both seem to be hidden and made mysterious by propaganda and statistical veils. As Governmental programs are made available throughout the Nation, the demands become great, which is understandable. By reason of the moderate start, which is common to most all

programs, money is not available for every request. The request, however, furnishes the statistics for the programs to become larger, financed with additional appropriations.

The So-Called "Liberals" Believe that we have created a new and better economy which they sometimes call "welfare capitalism," which produces far more and takes far better care of the people than a free enterprise economy has ever done.

When Challenged On The Question of Liberty, they counter that, without jobs who can be satisfied with liberty.

The So-Called "Conservatives" say that the American economy is efficient and highly productive and that the "liberals" have repaired its weak places in such a way that the surface is patched up. They warn that internally the balance of the structure is weakened and frictions are increasingly dangerous. If we continue with these "remedies," they contend, the result will be disastrous and eventually a total breakdown.

Put Another Way, The Economic Conservatives believe the idea of a welfare state has been consistently paying the losses of a patch work system by ever increasing doses of inflated money, thus hiding the fact that the true earning assets of the economy are shrinking. If allowed to continue, irreparable damage will be the price. This brings us back to the Ponzi theory discussed in this column last week — the illusion that there is a difference between a false individual financial empire and that of a nation.

There Are A Great Many Well Meaning People who believe that the affluent society can be maintained and increased if the Government takes over the responsibility of distributing the wealth. The "Planners" convince these people that they can

## Social Security Benefits Spread 10 Years Ago

Just 10 years ago this month, on August 1, 1956, the social security law was broadened to provide monthly cash benefits to totally disabled workers between the ages of 50 and 65. R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager of social security in Abilene, said today.

"From that beginning, just a decade ago, the social security disability program has steadily grown and developed. In 1958, Congress made it possible to pay benefits to dependents of disabled workers exactly the same as to those of retired workers. The 1960 amendments removed age 50 as the earliest age that disability insurance benefits could be paid, with the Congress recognizing that the needs of a younger worker. In 1965, the law was changed to eliminate the requirement that the disability be of a kind that could be expected to continue indefinitely and substituted the qualification that the disability must have lasted or be expected to last at least 12 months," he said.

Another change in the law in 1965 provides that if a worker who has applied for reduced retirement benefits between the ages of 62 and 65 becomes disabled, he may apply for the higher disability benefits. Previously, he pointed out, this was impos-

The disabled themselves, who might be able once again to go back to their old jobs or be placed in employment within the range of their capabilities, would certainly be benefited. ## WTU NOTEBOOK-PATTERNS FOR PROGRESS

### INDUSTRIAL FOUNDATIONS

#### ... to finance industrial growth

Competition between states and cities to improve their competitive abilities to attract new payrolls has increased the forming of Industrial Foundations in Texas. Many industries want and need someone else to own the land, brick and mortar, keeping their money available for plant operations. Industrial Foundations indicate the interest and desire of a community for new industry. Local citizens who participate usually figure that they get a return on their money in a Foundation by having an additional payroll circulating in their community.

— PURPOSE — is to give a community a corporate entity to assist industry to create jobs within the community — can be an existing industry as well as a new one. Foundations usually assist industry that cannot or will not use normal commercial financial institutions.

— EXTENT OF ACTIVITIES — usually are to acquire and develop industrial property . . . construct buildings for lease . . . provide funds for training works . . . purchase machinery and equipment . . . prepare promotional material and prospecting expenses and any other function that would give the community a competitive advantage for a new payroll.

— ORGANIZATION — is usually by a group of businessmen who are interested in the economic growth and development of their community. A local attorney should prepare the application for the charter and by-laws in order to conform to state laws and internal revenue service regulations. The local bankers' support is very helpful in forming an Industrial Foundation.

— TYPE — of Industrial Foundations vary — profit or non-profit — stock or contributions — the type a town needs depends upon the attitude and characteristics of the local people and its competitive position with other towns to attract new manufacturing payrolls. In most cases, Industrial Foundations are only used to assist industries where labor cost is a big factor in the operation, as the payroll provided is the important thing to the economy of the community.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ELEVEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.  
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 49 proposing an Amendment to Section 49-d, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, declaring state policy regarding optimum development of water reservoirs; providing for the use of the Texas Water Development Fund under such conditions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law in the acquisition and development of storage facilities and any system of works properly appurtenant thereto; providing for the sale, lease or transfer of such facilities under General Laws; providing for long-term contracts for water storage facilities; authorizing the issuance of an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds by the Texas Water Development Board upon a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected members of each house; providing that anticipatory legislation shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory character; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot; and proclamation and publication. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 49-d. It is hereby declared to be the policy of the State of Texas to encourage the optimum development of the limited number of feasible sites available for the construction or enlargement of dams and reservoirs for conservation of the public waters of the state, which waters are held in trust for the use and benefit of the public. The proceeds from the sale of the additional bonds authorized hereunder deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund and the proceeds of bonds previously authorized by Article III, Section 49-c of this Constitution, may be used by the Texas Water Development Board, under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by General

Law, including the requirement of a permit for storage or beneficial use, for the additional purposes of acquiring and developing storage facilities, and any system or works necessary for the filtration, treatment and transportation of water from storage to points of treatment, filtration and/or distribution, including facilities for transporting water therefrom to wholesale purchasers, or for any one or more of such purposes or methods; provided, however, the Texas Water Development Fund or any other state fund provided for water development, transmission, transfer or filtration shall not be used to finance any project which contemplates or results in the removal from the basin of origin of any surface water necessary to supply the reasonably foreseeable future water requirements for the next ensuing fifty-year period within the river basin of origin, except on a temporary, interim basis.

"Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law the Texas Water Development Fund may be used for the conservation and development of water for useful purposes by construction or reconstruction or enlargement of reservoirs constructed or to be constructed or enlarged within the State of Texas or on any stream constituting a boundary of the State of Texas, together with any system or works necessary for the filtration, treatment and/or transportation of water, by any one or more of the following governmental agencies: by the United States of America or any agency, department or instrumentality thereof; by the State of Texas or any agency, department or instrumentality thereof; by political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the state; by interstate compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party; and by municipal corporations. The Legislature shall provide terms and conditions under which the Texas Water Development Board may sell, transfer or lease, in whole or in part, any reservoir and associated system or works

which the Texas Water Development Board has financed in whole or in part.

"Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law, the Texas Water Development Board may also execute long-term contracts with the United States or any of its agencies for the acquisition and development of storage facilities in reservoirs constructed or to be constructed by the Federal Government. Such contracts when executed shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as state bonds issued under the authority of the preceding Section 49-c of this Constitution, and the provisions in said Section 49-c with respect to payment of principal and interest on state bonds issued shall likewise apply with respect to payment of principal and interest required to be paid by such contracts. If storage facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the state's investment.

"The aggregate of the bonds authorized hereunder shall not exceed \$200,000,000 and shall be in addition to the aggregate of the bonds previously authorized by said Section 49-c of Article III of this Constitution. The Legislature upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected members of each House, may authorize the Board to issue all or any portion of such \$200,000,000 in additional bonds herein authorized.

"The Legislature shall provide terms and conditions for the Texas Water Development Board to sell, transfer or lease, in whole or in part, any acquired storage facilities or the right to use such storage facilities together with any associated system or works necessary for the filtration, treatment or transportation of water at a price not less than the direct cost of the Board in acquiring same; and the Legislature may provide terms and conditions for the Board to sell any unappropriated public waters of the state that might be stored in such facilities. As a prerequisite to the purchase of such storage or water, the applicant therefor shall have secured a valid permit from the Texas Water Commission or its successor authorizing the

acquisition of such storage facilities or the water impounded thereon. The money received from any sale, transfer or lease of storage facilities or associated system or works shall be used to pay principal and interest on state bonds issued or contractual obligations incurred by the Texas Water Development Board, provided that when monies are sufficient to pay the full amount of indebtedness then outstanding and the full amount of interest to accrue thereon, any further sums received from the sale, transfer or lease of such storage facilities or associated system or works may be used for the acquisition of additional storage facilities or associated system or works or providing financial assistance as authorized by said Section 49-c. Money received from the sale of water, which shall include standby service, may be used for the operation and maintenance of acquired facilities, and for the payment of principal and interest on debt incurred.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the issuance of an additional \$200,000,000 in Texas Water Development Bonds and providing for further investment of the Texas Water Development Fund in reservoirs and associated facilities."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the issuance of an additional \$200,000,000 in Texas Water Development Bonds and providing for further investment of the Texas Water Development Fund in reservoirs and associated facilities."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

 During the past week rain was reported in a large part of the Rolling Plains Area. In fields where boll weevils and bollworms have not been

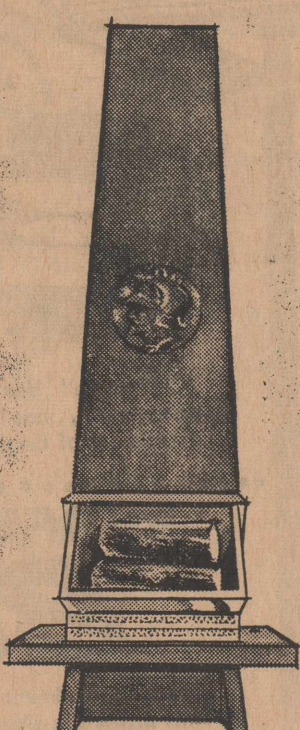

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13 proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, effective, February 1, 1968, by deleting the following language: "and provided, further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt therefor. In like manner, the wife may pay the poll tax of her husband and receive the receipt therefor." and by substituting therefor the following language:

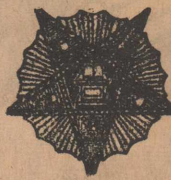
"provided, however, that before offering to vote at an election a voter shall have registered annually, but such requirement for registration shall not be considered a qualification of an elector within the meaning of the term 'qualified elector' as used in any other Article of this Constitution in respect to any matter except qualification and eligibility to vote at an election. Any legislation enacted in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory nature. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. And this provision of the Constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation. Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof; or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of en-

tering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces." "Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; and provided, further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt therefor. In like manner, the wife may pay the poll tax of her husband and receive the receipt therefor." "Section 3. If any other Amendment to Sections 2 or 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, being for a different purpose, is adopted at an earlier election or at the same election, the adoption of this Amendment shall not be construed as nullifying any change made by such other Amendment.

Section 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR repealing the poll tax as a requirement for voting." "AGAINST repealing the poll tax as a requirement for voting." "Section 5. If the foregoing Amendment is adopted, the proclamation of the Governor declaring the adoption of the Amendment shall set forth the full text of the amended Sections, as amended herein and as amended by any other proposed Amendment which is submitted by the 59th Legislature and which has been duly adopted prior to such proclamation. Section 6. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

while decreasing in others. Bollworm damage to green squares and bolls was heavy (4 per cent to over 6 per cent) in one or more fields in Wilbarger, Hardeman, Cottle, King, Jones, Fisher, Scurry, Mitchell, Runnels, Tom Green and Knox counties.

Damage of 2 per cent to 4 per cent was observed in one or more fields in Foard, Shackelford, Callahan, Haskell, Taylor, Coleman, Concho and Baylor counties.

Control measures for bollworms should begin when bollworm eggs and 4 to 5 young worms are found per 100 terminals, or 5 per cent of the small squares and bolls have been injured by small bollworms. Control measures should be applied at 5 day intervals, or less. Fields should be checked closely 2 to 3 days following each application to insure effective control.

### Boll Weevils

Populations of boll weevils ranging from 1000 to 7200 per acre were observed in Wilbarger, Wichita, Jones, Shackelford, Haskell, Stone-wall, Fisher, Nolan and Knox counties. Populations ranging from Clay, Cottle, King, Mitchell and Runnels counties.

Punctured green square counts of 25 per cent to over 50 percent were observed in one or more fields in Collingsworth, Wilbarger, Wichita, Clay, Childress, Stone-wall, Tom Green and Schleicher counties.

Boll weevils are capable of causing significant losses if left uncontrolled. Growers should inspect fields regularly and make insecticide application if 15 percent to 25 per cent or more punctured squares are found. Other Insects:

Medium infestations of plant bugs (lygus, stinkbugs, and rapid plant bugs) were observed in several fields in Haskell, Stonewall, Tom Green and Concho counties. Light populations of these insects have been observed in many counties in this area.

Cotton square borer infestations were reported as light in many fields in this area. Spider mites were reported as light in one field in Cottle county.

Grasshoppers continue to damage the margins of fields in several Rolling Plains counties.

Moisture and Insecticide Use Records:

The Area Entomologist wishes to remind producers, whose fields are being checked by the Rolling Plains survey teams, that they should fill out their Moisture and Insecticide Use Records currently. This information will be very important in the final analysis of this program's survey work.

## "Death of God Theologies" to Be Discussed

What do the radical theologians mean when they say "God is dead?"

This question — which has stumped and distributed laymen and clergy in recent months — will get a unique

airing this fall at Trinity University in San Antonio.

The department of religion on the Skyline Campus will conduct a graduate seminar on "Death of God Theologies." It will be taught by Dr. Lonnie Kliever, associate professor of religion and a contributor to national and scholarly magazines of arti-

cles dealing with the new theology.

According to Dr. Kliever, the seminar will offer advanced students an opportunity to analyze critically the strengths and weaknesses of the "Death of God" theology.

The course will deal with the far-reaching proposals advanced by such "Death of God theologians" as Thomas Altizer, William Hamilton, Paul van Buren, Bishop Robinson and Harvey Cox.

The meeting of the death of God varies among these contemporary thinkers. For some, it means the denial of certain traditional inadequate concepts of God. For others, it means the emergence of a stage of human development when God has withdrawn from the world as a supernatural guide and helper. But all the radical theologians share the conviction that Christian belief and practice must be radically transformed if Christianity is to remain a vital force in the lives of men.

Why offer a course in what has been called "atheistic Christianity" at a Presbyterian University? Trinity is the University of the Synod of Texas, United Presbyterian Church in the USA.

"The church must equip laymen and clergy for theological understanding," Professor Kliever explains. "In previous generations, a theological debate such as this would probably not have received much attention. But modern communications have changed this. New religious upheavals now reach the general public as soon as the theologian speaks."

For good or ill, Dr. Kliever says, churches can no longer settle family quarrels out of earshot of the general public.

"Some think of a religion departments as teaching schools for the Bible," Dr. Kliever says. "Although this is a very important part of study at Trinity, we also have in the religion department specialists in the whole spectrum of theological study."

Offering the course in radical theology is consistent

with Trinity's belief that a liberal education, as well as a Christian education, requires an understanding of the nature and function of faith.

"The radicals are trying to illuminate the religious experience of contemporary man," Professor Kliever says. "In the process, they are calling for a thorough reformulation of beliefs which will make sense of our religious experience."

Few people understand the death of God theology, he adds. To many, the question is "Can a Christian think and live as an atheist?" The thinking of the radical theologians is alien to much of traditional religious experience and belief. But these modern thinkers may have opened a dialogue that could bring new vitality into the church, Professor Kliever believes.

"There seems little likelihood that Death of God theologians will ever win a widespread following. They certainly do not offer an adequate account of the whole of Christian faith. And yet, they may succeed in awakening the Church to a new maturity of faith and to the present reality of God."

The seminar, Religion 392, will meet twice weekly — Tuesday and Thursday afternoons from 3:05 to 4:20 p.m. For those interested in enrolling, application blanks, graduate catalogues and further information can be obtained from the Graduate School of Trinity University.

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Section 62 of Article XVI a new subsection to be denominated subsection (c), of said Section 62; authorizing the Legislature to enact laws establishing, subject to the limitations stated, a State-wide System of Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation benefits for the officers and employees of the counties and other political subdivisions of the state, and of the political subdivisions of any county.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a subsection (c) which shall read as follows: "(c) The Texas Legislature is authorized to enact appropriate laws to provide for a System of Retirement, Disability and Death Benefits for all the officers and employees of a county or other political subdivision of the state, or a political subdivision of a county; providing that when the Texas Legislature has passed the necessary enabling legislation pursuant to the Constitutional authorization, then the governing body of the county, or other political subdivision of the state, or political subdivision of the county shall make the determination as to whether a particular county or other political subdivision of the state, or subdivision of the county participates in this System; providing further that such System shall be operated at the expense of the county or other political subdivision of the state or political subdivision of the county electing to participate therein and the officers and employees covered by the System; and providing that the Legislature of the State of Texas shall never make an appropriation to pay the costs of this Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System.

The Legislature may pro-

vide for a voluntary merger into the System herein authorized by this Constitutional Amendment of any System of Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Benefits which may now exist or that may hereafter be established under subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution; providing further that the Texas Legislature in the enabling statute will make the determination as to the amount of money that will be contributed by the county or other political subdivision of the state or political subdivision of the county to the State-wide System of Retirement, Disability and Death Benefits, and the Legislature shall further provide that the amount of money contributed by the county or other political subdivision of the state or subdivision of the county shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each officer and employee covered by this State-wide System.

"It is the further intention of the Legislature, in submitting this Constitutional Amendment, that the officers and employees of the county or other political subdivision of the state or political subdivision of a county may be included in those systems regardless of whether the county or other political subdivision of the state or political subdivision of the county participates in the Retirement, Disability and Death Benefit System authorized by this Constitutional Amendment, or whether they participate in a System under the provisions of subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution as the same is herein amended."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election in November, 1966, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Texas Legislature to establish a State-wide Cooperative System of Retirement, Disability and Death Benefits for the officials and employees of the various counties or other political subdivisions of the state, or

political subdivisions of a county; authorizing the Legislature to provide for a voluntary merger into the system authorized by this Amendment by those officers and employees covered by the provisions of subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution as now existing or may hereafter be established; providing that costs of this System shall be borne by the counties and other political subdivisions of the state and political subdivisions of the county electing to participate therein and the officers and employees covered by the System; and forbidding the Legislature from making any appropriations for the operation of this System."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Texas Legislature to establish a State-wide Cooperative System of Retirement, Disability and Death Benefits for the officials and employees of the various counties or other political subdivisions of the state, or political subdivisions of a county; authorizing the Legislature to provide for a voluntary merger into the system authorized by this Amendment by those officers and employees covered by the provisions of subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution as now existing or may hereafter be established; providing that costs of this System shall be borne by the counties and other political subdivisions of the state and political subdivisions of the county electing to participate therein and the officers and employees covered by the System; and forbidding the Legislature from making any appropriations for the operation of this System."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes have been cast in favor of such amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have notice of said proposed Amendment and of said election published as required by the Constitution of Texas, and laws of this state.

### PUBLIC NOTICE

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 79 proposing an amendment to Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding Section 1-d to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 1-d to read as follows: "Section 1-d. (a) All land owned by natural persons which is designated for agricultural use in accordance with the provisions of this Section shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use. 'Agricultural use' means the raising of livestock or growing of crops, fruit, flowers, and other products of the soil under natural conditions as a business venture for profit, which business is the primary occupation and source of income of the owner.

(b) For each assessment year the owner wishes to qualify his land under provisions of this Section as designated for agricultural use he shall file with the local tax assessor a sworn statement in writing describing the use to which the land is devoted. (c) Upon receipt of the sworn statement in writing the local tax assessor shall determine whether or not such land qualifies for the designation as to agricultural use as defined herein and in the event it so qualifies he shall designate such land as being for agricultural use and assess the land accordingly. (d) Such local tax assessor may inspect the land and require such evidence of use and source of income as may be necessary or useful in determining whether or not the agricultural use provision of this article applies. (e) No land may qualify for the designation provided for in this Act unless for at least three (3) successive years immediately preceding the assessment date the land has been devoted exclusively for agricultural use, or unless the land has been continuously developed for agriculture during such time. (f) Each year during which the land is designated for agricultural use, the local tax assessor shall note on his records the valuation which would have been made had the land not qualified for such designation under this Section. If designated land is subsequently diverted to a purpose other than that of agricultural use, or is sold, the land shall be subject to an additional

tax. The additional tax shall equal the difference between taxes paid or payable, hereunder, and the amount of tax payable for the preceding three years had the land been otherwise assessed. Until paid there shall be a lien for additional taxes and interest on land assessed under the provisions of this Section.

(g) The valuation and assessment of any minerals or subsurface rights to minerals shall not come within the provisions of this Section."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use.

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

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
