## Obscene Phone Calls Decline

Annoying, obscene and crank telephone calls have declined almost 50 per cent in North Texas since Southwestern Bell Telephone Company declared war on annoying callers in mid-June.

Mike McCoy, Mgr. for Southwestern Bell, said that new call tracing devices have been a major factor in the decline.

The devices — the polarity trap and the line identification detector — are installed in dial switching mechanisms when customers are taunted with silence, threats or obscenities over the telephone. The electronic devices keep the crank caller's line open while the party's number can be positively identified.

He also cited the cooperation between local police officials, telephone technicians and harassed customers as another important factor in apprehending annoying callers.

Mike McCoy noted that more than 25 persons in North Texas alone have been arrested since the company began its campaign against nuisance callers.

He pointed out that under Texas law, it is a misdemeanor for a person to use vulgar, profane or obscene language over the telephone, or to use the telephone to harass, annoy, torment, abuse or threaten another person. A violator can be fined as much as \$1,000 and imprisoned up to one year.

However, the telephone official said that Southwestern Bell is now offering its customers a booklet which will, in many cases, "help our customers handle these nuisance calls and perhaps keep them from recurring."

The best advice is handling a nuisance call, Mike McCoy again pointed out, is to hang up.

## Council Opposes Amendment No 1

The Rotan City Council adopted a resolution opposing Amendment No. 1 on the November 8 general election ballot.

Amendment No. 1 would, if passed, alter the Texas Constitution to permit land designated by the owner for agricultural use to be assessed for all tax purposes on consideration of only those factors relative to such use.

A number of objections and potential ill effects of the amendment were raised, however by the City Council.

The resolution passed today stated that the proposed amendment:

(1) would result in a boom in land speculation by holding so-called agricultural land out of development at low tax value

(2) would increase the cost of utility service as a result of the extra cost of providing service to developed areas beyond the undeveloped agricultural land

(3) would cause an increase in litigation as a result of vague definitions and provisions of the amendment

(4) would create confusion in planning for orderly municipal development

(5) would increase probability of higher tax rates by holding the agricultural land at artificially depressed value.

The Council's Resolution concluded that Amendment No. 1 represented unsound tax policy detrimental to cities and other political subdivisions of the State.

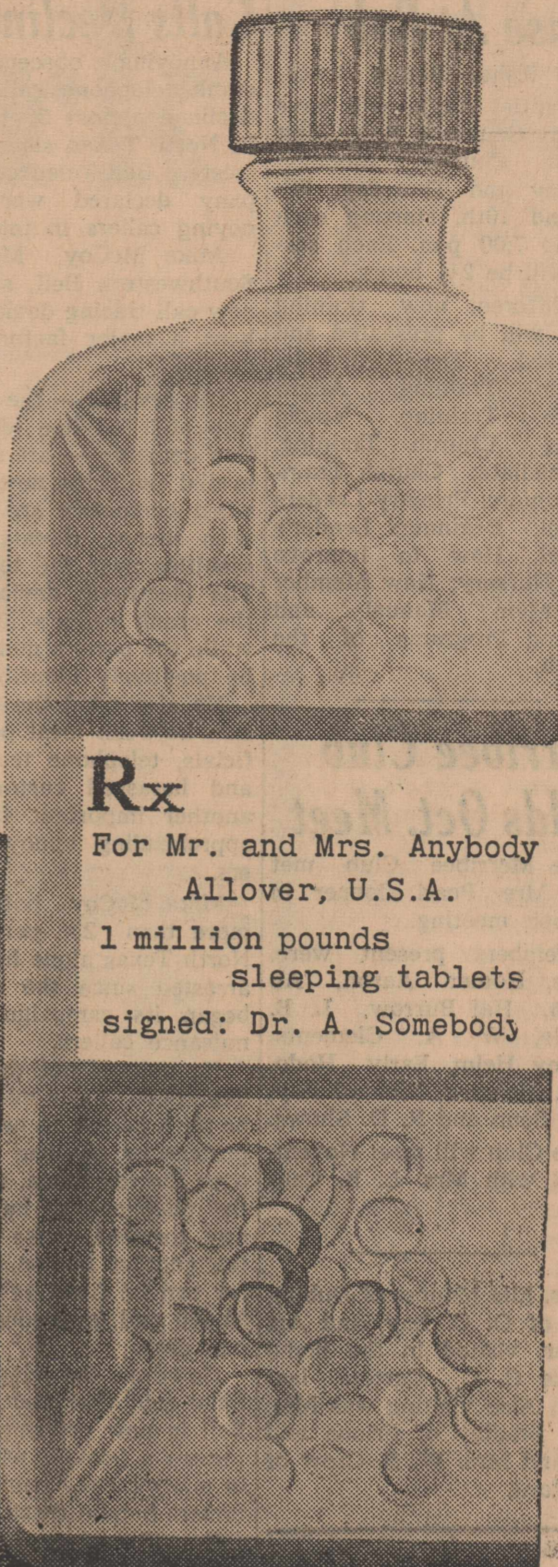
