

Baugh Going Good At Tech

Lubbock — David Baugh grew up thinking "interception" was a dirty word.

No wonder, when his dad, Sam Baugh, was writing a whole new book of National Football League passing records for the Washington Redskins after setting the aerial pace in the Southwest Conference with Texas Christian's Horned Frogs.

But David Baugh's ability to come down with opponents' passes is a big reason why the Texas Tech safety will be playing in the North-South Shrine Game at Miami Dec. 26. David again led the Red Raiders in interceptions, with five thefts this past season.

Two of Baugh's thefts this season were off the talented arm of Baylor's Terry Southall. David was named Tech's outstanding back in that game.

Some may find it difficult to adjust to the idea of a Baugh specializing in defense.

Not so Dutch Meyer, Sam's coach at Texas Christian.

"Sam was quite a defensive player himself," Meyer recalls. "He saved a touchdown in the Sugar Bowl (won by TCU over Louisiana State 3-2). LSU had a runner in the clear with a man running interference. But Sam just jumped over the blocker and made the tackle."

David grew up on the Baugh's ranch near the West Texas town of Rotan, about 100 miles east of Lubbock. He was all-district in football, lettering also in basketball, baseball, and track. He was the state 880 champion in Rotan's classification.

A two-way player as a freshman, David specialized in defense the rest of the way at Tech. He even started some games as a sophomore, but had his troubles.

For example, there was his first encounter with Terry Southall and company, in 1964.

Sam, scouting talent for a pro club, asked David if he'd seen Larry Elkins, Baylor's All-America end.

"Yes," replied a crestfallen son, "and until I did I was first string."

Ruby Clegg At O-S University

Stillwater — Ruby F. Clegg of Rotan, Texas Graduate Student at Oklahoma State University, is one of 16,003 students enrolled on the OSU campus this fall.

Total O-State enrollment is 19,072 and indicates 2,422 at Oklahoma State Tech, Okmulgee, and 647 at OSU's Technical Institute in Oklahoma City.

Overall enrollment is up 1,169 over last year's 17,903 and on-campus enrollment increased 924 over the 15,079 of one year ago, said Registrar Raymond Girod.

By colleges, arts and sciences enrolled 4,444, up 291; business 2,405, up 159; engineering 1,928, down 78; education 1,828, up 247; agriculture 1,506, up 39; home economics 1,283, up 129; veterinary medicine 183, up 2, and the graduate college 2,063, up 178.

The Technical Institute on the Stillwater campus totals 363, down 43. Okmulgee's total of 2,422 is up 128, and the Oklahoma City Technical Institute enrollment rose 117, from 530 to 647.

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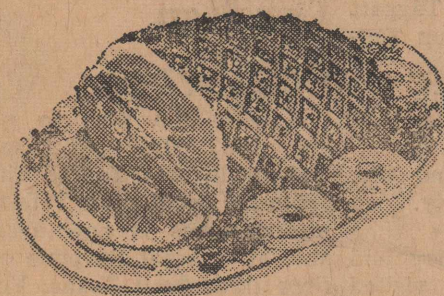
