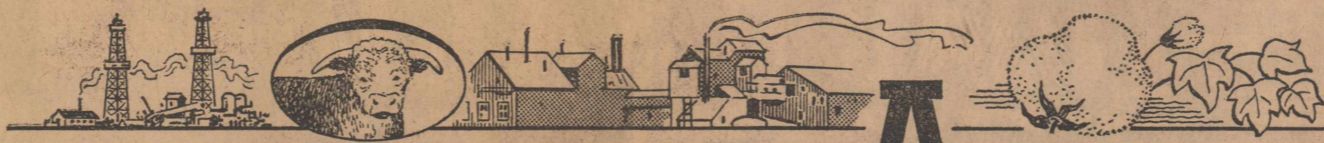

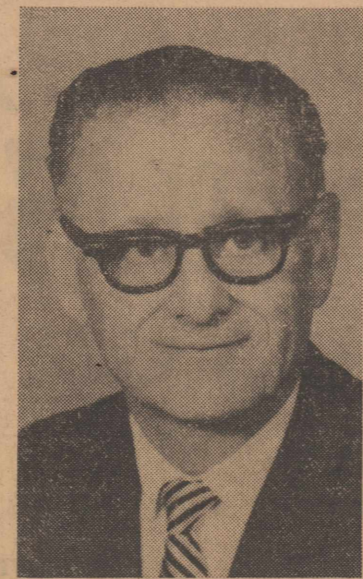

Dr. A. B. Lightfoot, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Snyder, is a native of Santa Anna, Coleman County where he was born August 10, 1917.

He and Mrs. Lightfoot, the former Vesta Evans of Santa Anna, are the parents of two sons, Dr. Stanley Lightfoot and Lt. Richard Lightfoot.

It was after his marriage that Dr. Lightfoot felt the call into the ministry. He was licensed and ordained to the Gospel ministry by the First Baptist Church of Santa Anna.

He attended Howard Payne College in Brownwood; East Texas Baptist College in Marshall; Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene; and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth.

His Doctor of Divinity Degree was conferred by Howard Payne College.

Dr. Lightfoot served as pastor of the Oak Street Baptist Church, Colorado City; Sylvan Heights Baptist Church, Fort Worth; and First Baptist Church, Big Lake. He also served as superintendent of missions for the Austin Baptist Association and the Odessa-Midland area. He led in the establishing of the Crescent Park Baptist Church in Odessa where he pastored for seven years before going to the Snyder church.

**Register If You Want To Vote**

The new system of voter registration is gaining little attention in Fisher County. This free registration replaces the poll tax system and may be done at City Hall in Rotan or with Tax Collector's office in Roby.

Tuesday, January 31 is deadline.

Only persons registering by Jan. 31 will be eligible to vote in any up-coming elections this year (unless they are persons age 60 and over.)

All registered voters who have lived in the state if Texas for one year, and in County for 6 months are eligible to vote in city, county and state elections.

Any legal age person (21 and over unless disfranchised by law) living in Fisher County may register free. One member of the family may register for other members if authorized to do so. For example, a husband may pick up both his and his wife's registration slips by signing for them. Caution is urged in registering for another member of the family.

Persons over 60 years are not required to register. Several important elections will be held this year and possibly some special elections.

Don't fail to register, so you will be able to vote.

**Conservation Program Active**

Systematic and complete conservation farm and ranch planning along with cost-sharing of 50 percent to 80 percent by the Federal Government for installation of conservation structures and practices is making the Great Plains Conservation Program very popular in Fisher County.

According to Jimmy D. Smith, local soil conservationist, 11 contracts for some \$65,000 were processed by the local office in 1966. At present the following 8 contracts in excess of \$52,000 have been processed, they are: Alice Cross of Sylvester Stanley Nowlin, Mack Blair and Horace Carter of Rotan; Max Stuart, J. A. Murff and Jake Lewis of Roby; and W. T. Lawless farm near Sylvester.

Applicants for planning and assistance for the Great Plains Conservation Program are; John Ashton, R. T. Williams and Lawrence Weatherman of Rotan; Paul Cooper of Hamlin and O. B. Lee of Sweetwater.

The most popular conservation measure being installed at this time is parallel terraces. On the 8 new contracts this year there is in excess of 500,000 feet with another 150,000 feet in the planning stages.

Smith urges all persons interested in parallel terraces, brush control, range seeding, stockwater ponds, etc. to contact the local Soil Conservation Service office in Rotan.

### Leasing For Hunting Planned

In the regular monthly meeting of the Fisher County Technical Action Panel the members voted to promote the leasing of agricultural land for Quail and other game bird hunting.

"Recreation is fast becoming one of the larger businesses in Texas", says Bob Price, work unit conservationist with the SCS in Rotan. Hunters are willing to pay substantial sums of money for the right to hunt on private land. Fisher County has great potential for small game bird hunting.

The Fisher County TAP plans to serve as a non-profit gathering agency to aid land

owners and sportsmen in getting together. This will be strictly a voluntary program. Plans are to sponsor a meeting of interested landowners and businessmen in which the State Parks and Wildlife Service will give a program on the advantages of leasing land for hunting. This meeting will be scheduled in the near future.

In other areas where this program has been used, results have been very good from a financial standpoint for both the landowners and the business community.

Landowners interested in leasing their land for hunting will give their names to any Panel member and a list will be compiled. Publicity will be sent to Chamber of Commerce throughout the state. Hunters will be able to obtain

the list from the TAP members and local businesses. At this point the responsibility of the TAP is completed. Any lease agreement will be made strictly between the sportsman and the landowner. Once a landowner places his name on the list, he is not obligated to lease his land. This list will only show those interested in possibly leasing their land.

The Distinguished Service Award was presented to Mr. Cappleman in recognition of the assistance given by the Agency through many years of active support of the Young Farmers Education Program. The Farmers Home Administration has presented educational programs on Farm Management and Farm Financing to Young Farmers Chapters throughout the State.

Over twenty percent of the more than 18,000 loans made by the Agency in Texas have been made to young farmers. Cappleman feels very strongly that the 4,247 loans the Agency has made to young farmers under 35 years of age are the mainstay of Texas agriculture, and he intends to continue the Agency's efforts to assist young families become established in farming.

### 4-H Calves Show Seed Fertility At Abilene

Four Fisher County 4-H Club members are exhibiting beef calves at the Abilene and Fort Worth Stock Shows this week, according to James S. Norman, County Agricultural Agent.

Janet Guelker, two steers, one Hereford and one Angus; Mark Guelker, one Hereford steer, and Karla Kreidel, one Hereford steer exhibited at the Abilene show.

At the Fort Worth show the last of the week and the first of next is Mike Herron, with two Angus steers and registered Angus heifer.

The club members were accompanied to the shows by their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Morris Guelker, Mr. and Mrs. Carl Kreidel, and Mr. and Mrs. C. D. Herron and Norman.

### Seed Fertility Is Checked

Wheat variety, fertility, and wheat, oats and barley varieties, and cotton fertility result demonstrations were conducted in Fisher County during the 1966 crop year, according to James S. Norman, County Agricultural Agent.

The plots were planted and fertilized through the cooperation of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, the Extension Service and the county crops subcommittee. The seeding and fertilizing of the wheat variety and fertility and cotton fertility demonstration was supervised by Dr. James Mulkey, superintendent of the experiment at Chillicothe.

The small grain varieties and fertility demonstration was on the Dickie Ferguson farm a mile and half west of Hamlin. Another wheat variety and fertility demonstration was on the A. Branscum farm six miles west of Hamlin. The cotton fertility demonstration was on the Timmons farm, which is operated by Kiefer Cauble, two miles south of Roby.

High wheat yielding varieties, on the Ferguson farm were: Improved Triumph, 52.5 bu. per acre on dryland. This was followed by Crockett at 45.9, Caddo, 45.9; Comanche, 45.9; Tascosa, 43.7; Scout, 39.3; Warrior, 39.3; Bison, 37.1, Kaw 32.8, and DI-23 (Experimental variety) 32.8.

Oat yields were as follows: Maregrain at 94.3 bu. per acre; Ora at 86.0; Bronco, 73.8; New Nortex 73.8; Bu-boise, 65.6 and Alamo X, 49.2 Barley — Zora, 62.9; Rodgers, 49.2; and Cordova, 38.3.

Wheat fertility results on the Branscum farm was as follows:

Caddo, no fertilizer 28.7; 30 pounds of Nitrogen, no phosphorus or potash per acre, 28.6; an application of 30-0-0, 28.8 bu.; 60-0-0, 28.4 bu.; 60-60-0, 39.6 bu. DI-23 no fertilizer 25.9 bu.; 30-30-0, 25.8; 60-0-0, 26.7; and 60-0-0, 26.5 bu.

Cotton fertility results were: no fertilizer treatment, 1061 pounds of lint per acre; 0-40-0 (pounds of phosphorus per acre) lint 1087 lbs.; 40-0-0 (Nitrogen), 1149 lbs.; 40-40-0, 1123; 0-0-40 (potash), 1056 lbs. 40-40-20, 1116 lbs.; and 40-40-60, 1154 lbs. The cotton was a storm-proof variety planted two rows in and four out.

These tests are based upon one year and on single farms and are not necessarily meant as a recommendation. Under different rainfall conditions and on a different type land varieties and rates of fertility might result differently.

A report of these demonstrations and others conducted in Fisher County during 1966 will be ready for distribution the middle of February.

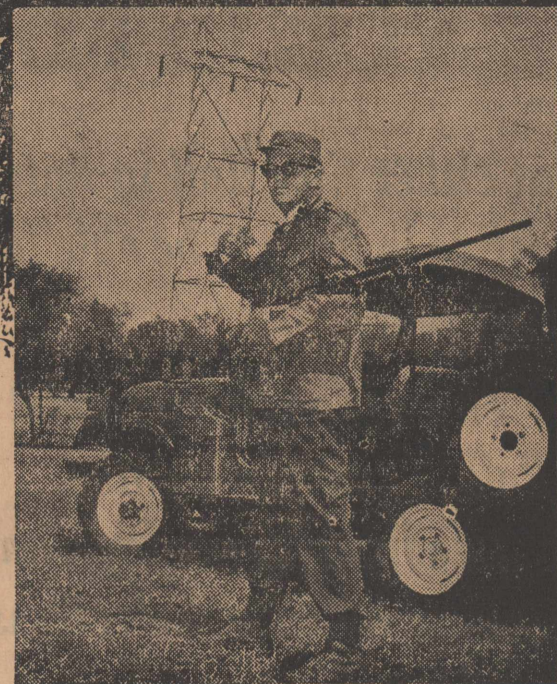

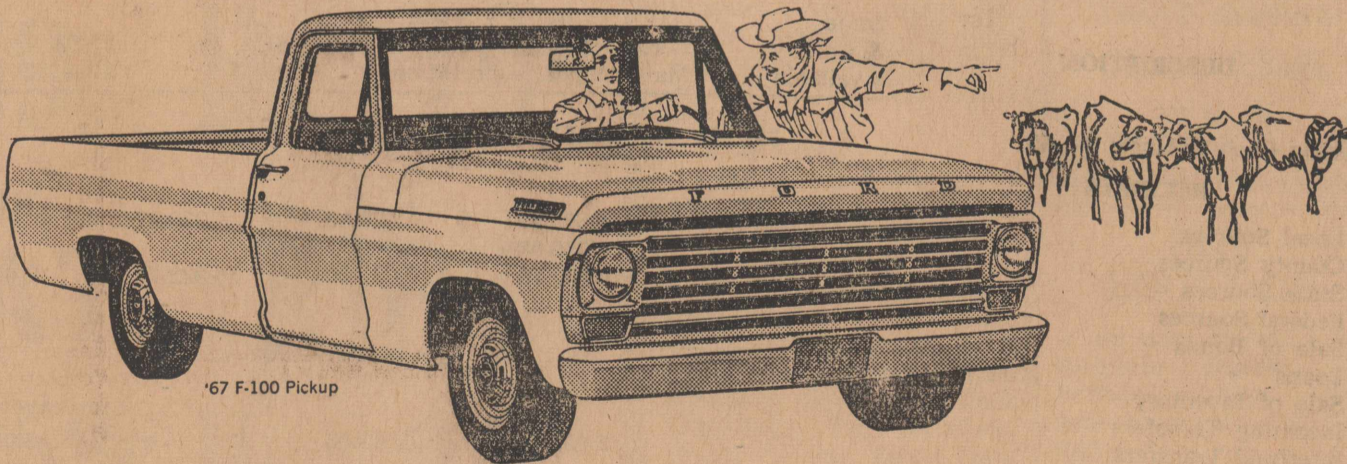
