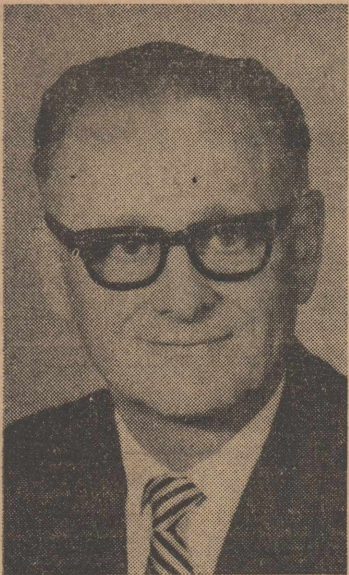

Brucellosis Retesting Soon

Fisher County is due for
Brucellosis recertification by
May 21, 1967, according to
James S. Norman, County
Agricultural Agent.

By May 21 at least 73 rep-
resentative herds of 1,166
cattle should be tested, ac-
cording to information received
from the Texas Animal
Health Commission.

During the period June 2,
1964 to date, a total of 391
herds of 1,072 cattle were
tested under the Market Cattle
Testing Program. Six other
complete herd tests of 170
cattle have been recorded in
the county. The total cattle
tested under MCTP at this
point is less than one-half of
the 15% minimum require-
ment in the Uniform Methods
and Rules. Therefore, the ad-
ditional testing will need to
be completed by May 21 if
Fisher County is to recertify
and maintain its present sta-
tus as a Modified Certified
Brucellosis Area.

Mr. Bobby Gillis, Livestock
Inspector with the State Animal
Health Commission,
Sweetwater, will be doing
the testing.

Ranchers and cattlemen in
the county, willing to have
their cattle tested, are request-
ed contact Gillis, at Sweet-
water, phone BE 4-4951 or
Curtis Martin, Livestock In-
spector, Abilene, phone OR
3-2025, or the County Extension
Office in the Courthouse
at Roby, said Norman.

If the required number of
cattle and herds are not re-
tested by the deadline, Fish-
County will lose its present
rating. Before the county
could be certified again there
would have to be an initial
testing program like was
done in 1961, said Norman.

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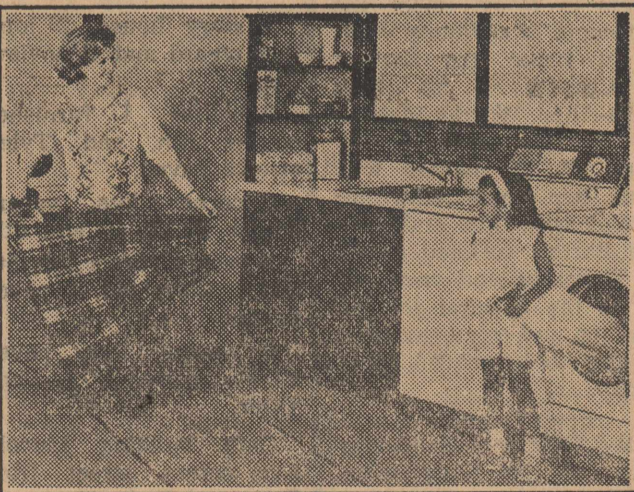

Oral Cancer Dangers Cited

Oral cancer — cancer of the mouth and associated areas — took the lives of almost 7,000 men and women in the United States in 1966.

This number may not seem large in terms of the millions of adults in this country. But it is large — large because so many of those deaths could have been avoided, in many cases with no great inconvenience to the person involved.

Today only 36 per cent of those who develop oral cancer survive for five years or more after treatment. The survival rate could be improved by vigilance on the part of the individual, the physician and the dentist.

According to Dr. Jerry A. Marshall, D.D.S. oral cancer is one of the most accessible for early detection and successful treatment. Because of this, oral cancer control has been made an especially significant part of the American Cancer Society's five-year minimum achievement program to save more lives from cancer now.

"This action program, now in its second year, seeks to involve at least 50 per cent of all dentists and physicians in a program to make cancer detection a part of every checkup examination," Dr. Marshall said. "At the same time it is hoped to persuade the public to exercise greater personal vigilance."

"The 50 per cent involvement goal is only half what the ideal calls for, but the Society believes it is an achievable goal. The Society knows from experience how difficult it is to motivate people to act, even if they know such action would be in their interest. If the 50 per cent can be achieved and many more people can be made personally vigilant, the number of deaths from oral cancer would be drastically reduced."

Dr. Marshall explained: "The oral region, the tongue and the lining of the throat are highly sensitive. Instances of unusual sensation, pain swelling or other abnormalities such as bleeding, sores and white spots should be acted upon without delay. These are warnings that a person can recognize and do something about."

"In the case of oral cancer, the dentist can be a real source of protection. The regular dental examination focuses on the mouth, and abnormalities may come quickly to the dentist's attention."

"This is why the American Cancer Society puts great emphasis on the significant role of the dentist in the detection of cancer. This is one instance in which the dental and the medical professions can combine the weaponry of modern cancer detection in the fight against cancer."

Everyone interested in farm products has the right to see that the programs are written and administered to suit their own interest, which is the democratic way. Processors, handlers, shippers, storage people, exporters, importers, chain stores, etc., seek to protect and promote their interest by expressing their views through organization. Unfortunately, too often these people are able to increase their profits at the expense of farmers and ranchmen. To see that we get a square deal, we must have and support an effective organization.

We are a minority group, comprising only 6.4% of the population. Like any minority group in a well organized society, we must use organization to work for us as teachers, doctors, lawyers, labor and others have done successfully. It is up to us to band together in an effective influential organization to see that farm programs work to benefit us.

Farmers Union can do the job best, because it is a bona fide, producer controlled farm organization, and its policies are written by farm and ranch people.

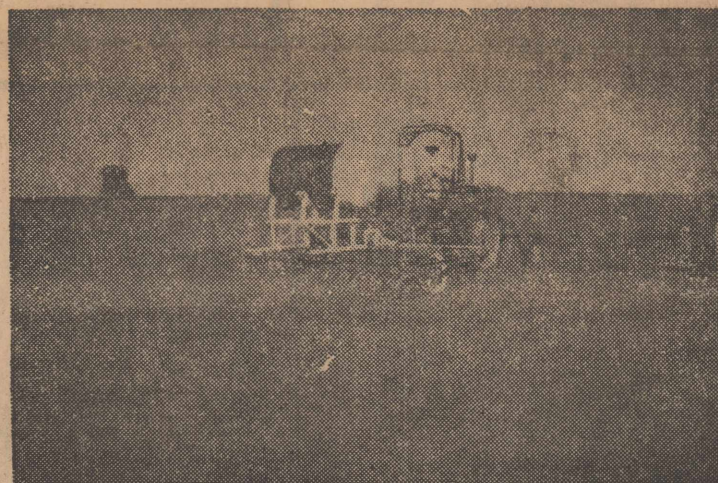
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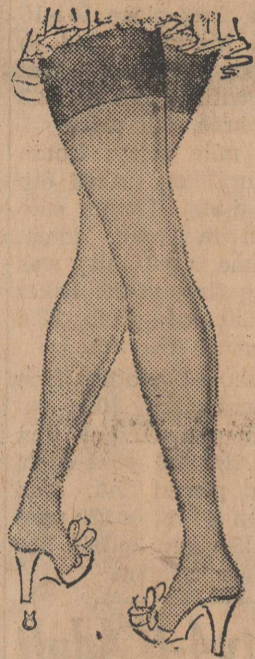
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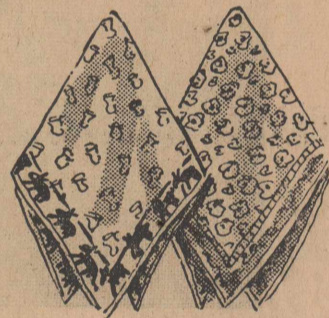
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
