## Hammers Win Double Mt Re'lys

Rotan Yellowhammers took a top heavy lead in Double Mountain Relays held here Saturday. The Hammers led the annual event with 104½ points to Wylie's 83 and Spur's 74½.

Spur and Wylie tied for the most first place finishes with four apiece.

Spur did especially well in track events where firsts went to its 440-relay team and Neal Harralson in both the 100 and 200 yard dashes. Teddy Castro of Spur also won the high jump.

Wylie's Don Wagner won the 440 and its mile relay team tied for first with Merkel. Other Wylie firsts were George Holland's broad jump and Ricky Parrish's pole vault.

Rotan firsts came by Larry Helms in the 120 high hurdles, Larry Van Loon in the shot put, Glen Murphree in the discus.

Three records were shattered in the meet. Jim Rabburn of Roscoe set a mark with a 42.7 performance on the 330-yard intermediate hurdles and Neal Harralson of Spur heat a year-old record in the 220-yard dash with a 22.7 time.

Spur's mile relay team, composed of Lindsey Hoover, Mike Sweet, Allan Harvey and Neal Harralson, ran a 45.2 440-yard relay for a record. Old figure was laid down by Merkel four years ago.







## When Easter Happens . . .

The meaning of the Easter event is renewed when we begin to discover in ourselves the capacity for that "greater love" of which Christ Jesus spoke.

It is really inevitable. And we know this in the first stirrings of our own deepest spiritual intuition. It can happen in July on a city street, in a classroom, in an office. Easter comes when it happens in the heart.

Writing of the new birth, Mary Baker Eddy, the founder of Christian Science, said:

"It begins with moments, and goes on with years; moments of surrender to God, of childlike trust and joyful adoption of good; moments of self-abnegation, self-consecration, heaven-born hope, and spiritual love" (Miscellaneous Writings, p. 15)

Our intuition grows into perception and understanding. Gradually, we gain the conviction that the lives of all men are ultimately bound together, in Truth. Then we begin to find the courage, strength, and intelligence we need to lay down our lives for each other, day by day — to sacrifice whatever is self-satisfied or self-seeking in our hearts, to break through the barriers of mortal ego.

Then Easter comes. And then we begin to see ourselves — and each other — in this new light.

For this is where the "greater love" leads — to clearer views of what is actual, to resurrection, to a life that is new and to life that is endless.

Jesus said, "He that loseth his life for my sake shall find it" (Matt. 10:39.)

## Need For New Values

Nothing shows more forcefully how far out of perspective values of human life have become than the need for the American Cancer Society's five-year educational program to drastically reduce unnecessary deaths from cancer. The Society has selected six sites of cancer, representing over 60 per cent of all cancer cases and some 48 per cent of all cancer deaths, for special educational emphasis.

These sites of cancer — uterus, breast, colon and rectum, oral cavity and skin — accounted for nearly 150,000 deaths in 1966, many of them due to lack of personal responsibility and personal vigilance.

Take three samples: lung cancer took more than 50,000 lives last year; most lung cancers are caused by cigarette smoking. (Despite intensive warnings more than half of all teen-agers ignore the scientifically proved dangers to their health and become regular cigarette smokers by the time they are 18.) Skin cancer took nearly 5,000 lives; most skin cancers are caused by too frequent over-exposure to direct sunlight. Uterine cancer took the lives of about 14,000 women; yet, due to the Pap test, it should be possible to detect this cancer at a stage when chances of cure are virtually 100 per cent.

Need for intensified and broadened instruction about cancer is in itself a harsh tragedy. People just do not behave as they should. Motivating people to take proper action can be difficult and frustrating, as it has been to the American Cancer Society. How difficult it is, is shockingly apparent in the five-year educational goals fixed by the Society. The goals are minimal, far below ideal, but goals, based on hard experience, that the Society believes can be achieved.

We urge our readers to learn cancer's warning signals, act on them; have an annual health checkup, and contribute to the very important work of the American Cancer Society.

## Carter Receives TV Diploma

Chicago (Spl.) — "Not only do you personally stand to gain from your accomplishment, but so does your country," a leading technical school educator told a local man recently.

Occasion of the prophecy was the completion of a specialized home training program in Electronics by Sterling Carter of Rotan. He was awarded a diploma in TV-Radio Servicing by Robert E. Rufener, Director of the Home Study School, DeVry Institute of Technology Chicago, one of the nation's outstanding technical education centers.

"Men such as yourself, Rufener explains, "are helping to close the gap between the United States and some foreign powers, as regards skilled Electronics scientists and technicians. Then too, education such as you have may also qualify you to benefit from Automation, rather than to fear it — as do many unskilled men."

## Heavy Draft Call Slated For May

Austin, March 21 — The state's 155 draft boards will be called upon to furnish 885 men for the armed forces in May, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Thursday.

This compares with quotas of 675 for April, 761 for March, 675 for February, and 1,110 for January.

There will be no quotas for the physical and mental pre-induction examination of men in April, Colonel Schwartz said.

This continues a ban on examinations since early January because of the budgetary limitation of travel funds.

The state Selective Service director said no decision had been made as to whether or not examinations would be held in May.

He said Texas currently had sufficient examined and acceptable men to fill current quotas.

Induction quotas for the Army by Texas draft boards in the fall of 1966 reached as high as 2,700 monthly.




