## Search For Diabetic Youth

Rotan Jaycees, searching for diabetic boys and girls. Camp Sweeney Educational Center, Gainesville, operated by the Southwestern Diabetic Foundation, Inc., and sponsored by the Texas Jaycees, will operate three 3-week semesters as follows:

- 1st session June 4 to June 24.
- 2nd session, June 25 to July 15
- 3rd session, July 16 to August 5.

Under supervision of a specialized staff of doctors, nurses, dietitians, and counselors these young diabetics are taught their proper diet, with regulated exercise, how to take their own urine tests, give their own insulin injections, and of major importance — through this group association, overcome their inferiority complex of fear and shame.

Camp Sweeney is recognized as the largest training center in the world for diabetic children, and since opening in 1950, almost 4200 have learned how to live, physically, mentally and emotionally with their incurable, yet controllable disorder — diabetes.

Any diabetic child, 6-16 years of age, is not only welcome, but urged to share in this life-saving experience, and the tuition is based on parents' ability to pay.

### Rotan Gin To Build New Plant

Annual stockholder's meeting of Rotan Gin Co., met Saturday and dividends of \$63,594.80 were announced to be paid to some 300 patrons. This was on a 10,390 bale run the past season.

During the business meeting which was attended by 90 stockholders and visitors, four directors were named to serve two-year terms. Re-named were Dick Edwards, Bobby Smith and Charles C. Call. A new director named Stanley Nowlin.

Highlight of the meeting was a vote by the stockholders to give the board authority to build a new gin plant. Location of the high capacity, push-button gin has not been decided, but work will begin soon in order that the new facility will be in operation this fall.

The two gins now operated by the co-op will be demolished to make way for the new large plant.

Guest speaker was Charles Stenholm of Stamford, executive vice-president of the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers Inc. Stenholm gave a report on the operation of the organization in the 32 counties it serves and outlined some of the prospects for the future. One of these is an effort to get all cotton machine grade instead of hand graded.

## Hunsaker On Constellation

(GO473) USS Constellation (CVA-64) FHTNC) March 24 — Boatswain's Mate Third Class Wesley M. Hunsaker, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Forrest E. Hunsaker of Route 1, Rotan, is in Saan Diego, Calif., serving aboard the attack aircraft carrier USS Constellation.

The Constellation was built at a cost of two hundred million dollars and launched in October of 1961. She is equipped with four elevators to raise her aircraft from below decks to her 1,072-foot long flight deck. This mobile, floating airfield is manned by a crew of 119 officers, and 2,540 men, not including the crews of air squadrons which embark for a cruise.

The big carrier is part of the United States First Fleet, which operates primarily off the West Coast of the U.S. The Constellation has been in San Diego since early December of last year, following a seven-month assignment with the Seventh Fleet in the Western Pacific.

## Jaycees Sponsor County Cancer Chapter Crusade

With the organization of the American Cancer Society's 1967 educational and fund raising drive rapidly taking shape, the Fisher County Crusade Co-Chairmen have issued an appeal for "additional urgently needed volunteers." Mrs. Helen Heathington and Mrs. Dorothy Waddell will co-chairman the event with the Eastern Star Chapter No. 52 to assist in the Rotan area and the Young Homemakers Club to have charge of the Roby area.

While the response from these two fine groups has been enthusiastic and gratifying, many more workers are needed, especially in the smaller communities, if an outstanding job is to be done. Those wishing to volunteer may contact Mrs. Heathington or Mrs. Waddell.

Many jobs need to be done before the Crusade starts the 18th of this month. We must organize and train sufficient volunteers to reach every home in Fisher County; record must be kept; people must be contacted; and our communities must be studied and organized so that a strategic attack can be made when the Crusade is launched. A shortage of volunteers could mean failure in the Society's struggle to save lives.

One of the main objectives of the volunteers is to alert every adult to what can be done now about cancer, especially in the six most common sites — the uterus, colon and rectum, Breast, oral cavity, lungs and skin. Plans call for every family in Fisher County to receive a list of them to be distributed in person by American Cancer Society volunteers. The list of warning signals will be designed so they can be detached and pasted in the family medicine cabinet.

These cancers account for about 60% of all cases of cancer diagnosed today and for more than 48% of all deaths from the disease. Medical knowledge of detection and treatment, if properly applied, could save additional thousands of lives from these six types of cancer.

According to Mr. Jim Glenn, District Executive Director, American Cancer Society, District No. 2, Midland, in 1965 the death rate from cancer in District No. 2 was one person out of every 1000. However, the rate for our own Fisher County was twice that amount — Fourteen persons died of the disease in Fisher County. Mr. Glenn said statistics for 1966 should be received in the near future.

With this excessive death rate in Fisher County, every resident should give generously of his time and money to make the 1967 Cancer Crusade a success.

Survivors include his wife, of Rotan, his mother, Mrs. Charles Branch of Rotan; three brothers, W. I. of Rotan, Leonard of Aspermont and George of Jayton; three sisters, Mrs. George Gannaway of Monahans, Mrs. Tom Stinson of Rotan and Mrs. Floyd Bullock of Breckenridge. He was preceded in death by his father in 1936 and by one sister, Mrs. E. C. Nickols, in 1962.

Animal Health and External and Internal Parasites, by Dr. C. M. Patterson, Veterinarian, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, College Station.

Wednesday night, Cow and Calf and Stock Calf Operations, Purebred Versus Crossbreed Operations, Breed Selection and Genetics, by L. A. Maddox, Jr., Animal Husbandry, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, College Station, Texas.

Thursday night, Pregnancy Testing and Freeze Branding by Dr. Barry Allen, Veterinarian, Rotan. Feeding the Breeding Herd, Supplemental Feeding, Minerals and Vitamins, and Utilization of Home Grown Feeds, by U. D. Thompson Animal Husbandman, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, College Station, Texas. A certificate of completion will be presented those who attend all three sessions.

## the Sabbath Day to keep it HOLY

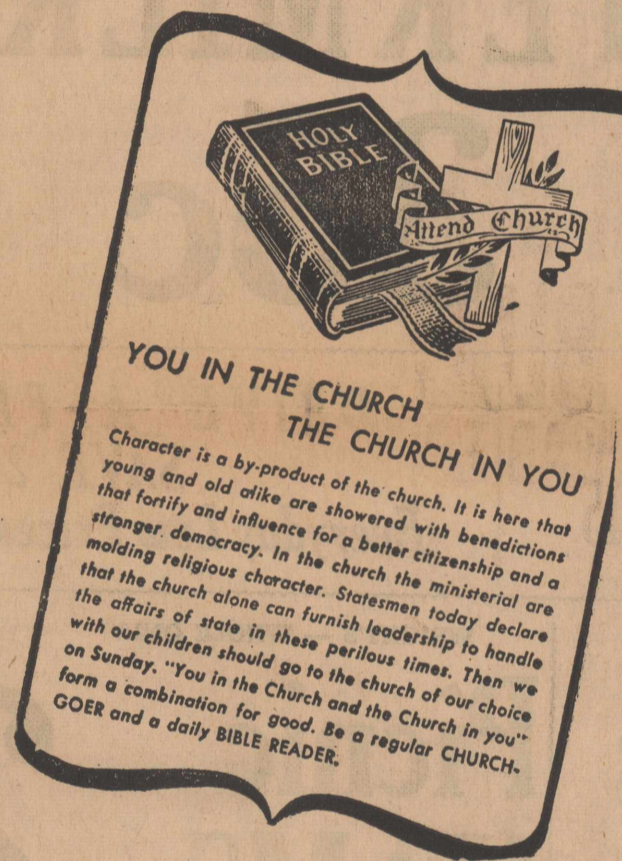

**Y**ou are under the command of God; you are a part of His creation; there is nothing more important for you than that you remember God and your relation to Him. The Sabbath is such a time of remembrance. The church bell, the rest from daily toil, the quietness in the busy street, the need of your own soul, unite to remind you of your God and His day. The law giver commanded His people to keep this one day sacred to the Lord; to use it for one's own profit is to rob God of the time which belongs to Him.

**H**ERE is an ancient command, never more important than today. The press of the material and the secular was never more insistent; things want to get in the saddle and ride mankind. Remember the Sabbath; then you will worship God and know that you are the eternal child of the Highest. He who remembers the Sabbath most is most likely to remember to attend his church.

**As It Looks  
From Here--**

Washington, D.C. - This  
Space Has Been Dedicated To  
a discussion of law enforce-  
ment on a great many occa-  
sions. This appears an ap-  
propriate time for another.

The Preservation of Law  
And Order is a first and  
fundamental function of gov-  
ernment at any level. Every  
citizen has a right to expect  
and is entitled to expect, his  
government to protect his  
person and property. Laws  
from city ordinances to the  
Federal Government are  
made for this purpose, but  
laws not enforced, not res-  
pected and the criminal not  
punished for violations, are  
no laws at all.

Since 1790, Congress Has  
Authorized the revision of  
criminal statutes on three oc-  
casions. The first revision be-  
gan shortly after the Civil  
War, in 1866, when the cri-  
minal laws were scattered  
through 14 volumes of Stat-  
utes at Large.

President Andrew Jackson,  
with the Congress assenting,  
imposed a commission to  
examine criminal provisions  
to eliminate obsolete provi-  
sions and to collect the sta-  
tutes for republication in a  
body.

In 1879, Congress Again  
Authorized a commission to  
revise and codify penal laws  
of the United States. These  
were updated in 1909, and 39  
years passed before another  
study was made to modernize  
the Criminal Code.

At The Present Time The  
President is appointing an-  
other commission to revise,  
clarify and codify.

Many of our Laws have  
been complicated by Federal  
Courts which render deci-  
sions in some 30,000 cases a  
year. Loopholes need to be  
closed as an excuse for some  
of the "do-gooder" opinions  
which have recently been de-  
cided. In many instances, the  
Courts have in effect rewrit-  
ten sections of our criminal  
laws and have acted more  
like a legislative body than a  
judicial body. The public is  
becoming more and more  
aware of these actions and  
certainly police and other law  
enforcement to officials are  
more so. They are finding  
their tasks and responsibil-  
ities to be exceedingly diffi-  
cult.

It Is Well That The Presi-  
dent Of The United States is  
calling for revision in our  
criminal statutes but what we  
need immediately is to stop  
coddling criminals and give  
greater regard for the victim  
of crime. There are advoc-  
ates of the idea that the vic-  
tim of crime should be com-  
pensated from public funds  
but the real need is the en-  
forcement of law to make  
"crime not pay". Law abiding  
people have a right to expect  
protection from criminals.  
Good intentions are worth-  
less.

It is Encouraging that com-  
munity and Civic authorities,  
educators, religious leaders  
and people from all walks of  
life are speaking out, dem-  
anding justice.

Law Enforcement Will Be  
Effective if they are permit-  
ted to do the job they are  
capable of doing. The detect-  
ing and apprehending of  
criminals is not the whole  
answer. The criminal must  
know that his destiny includ-  
es prompt prosecution and  
substantial punishment. He  
must know that the Courts  
are for the protection of peo-  
ple against criminal acts and  
not alone furnishing technical  
procedures behind which the  
violin can hide.

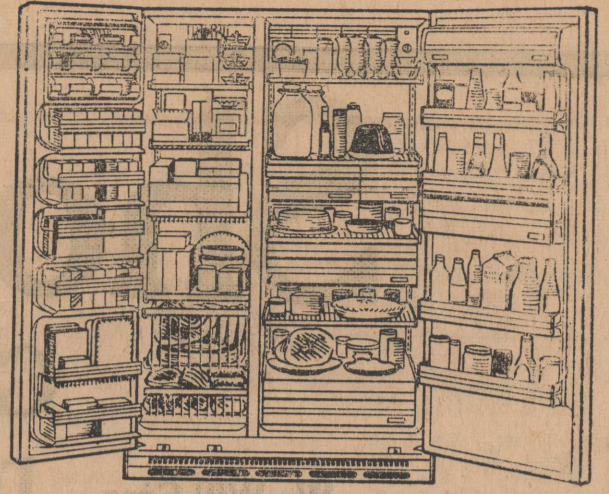
## Proposal Passes For Air Conditioning
