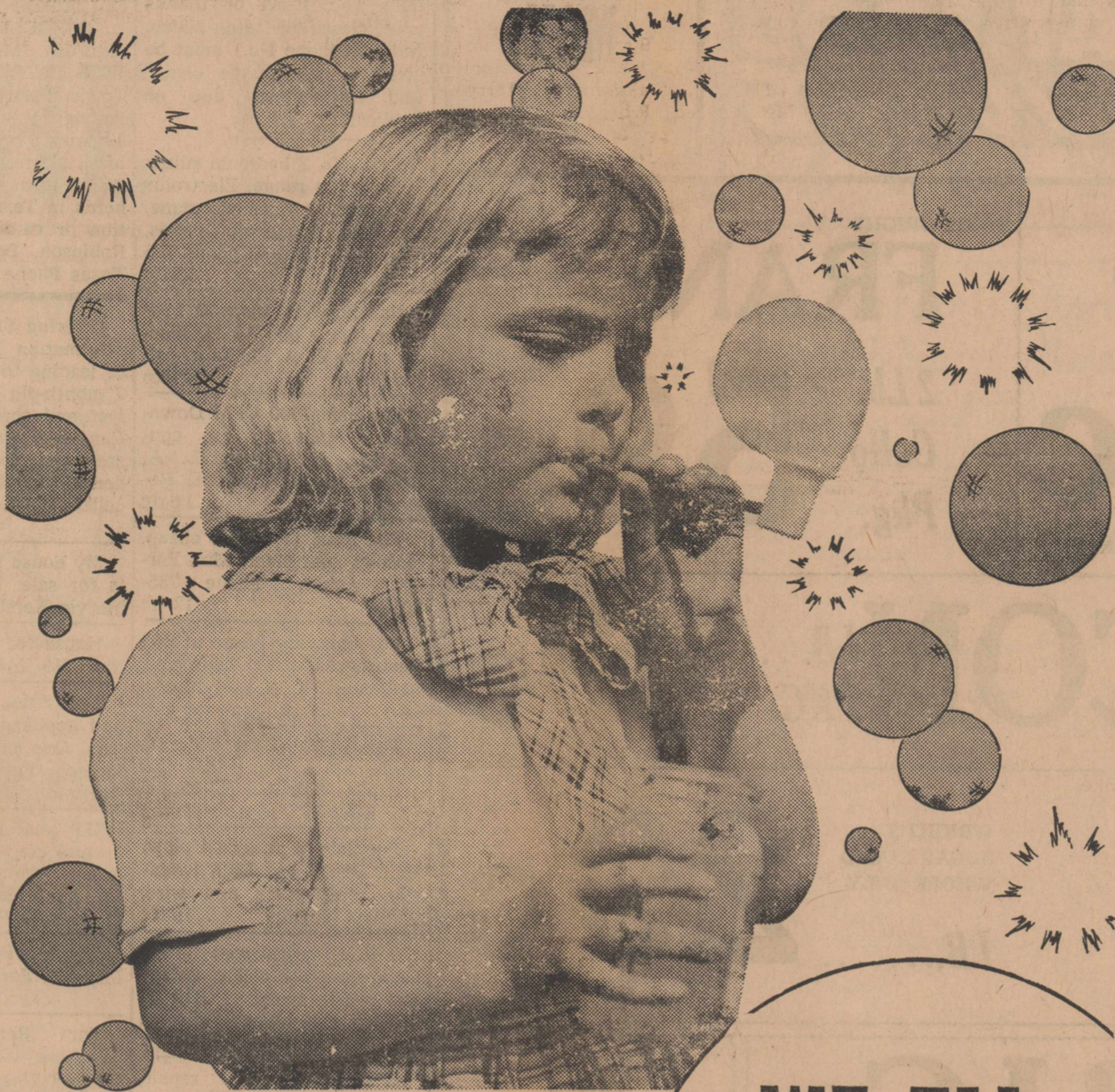

The purpose of daylight savings is to give people more daylight hours for activities.

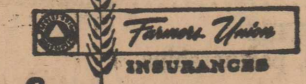

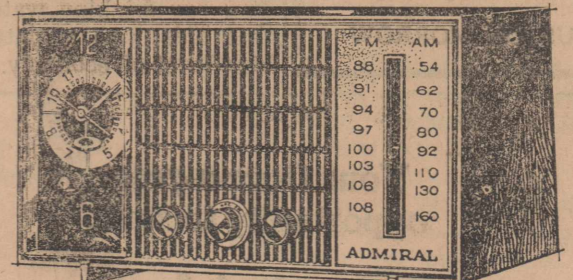
