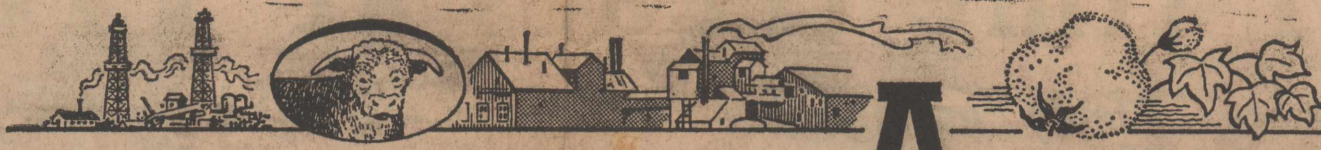

Mrs. Hardy Attends Meeting

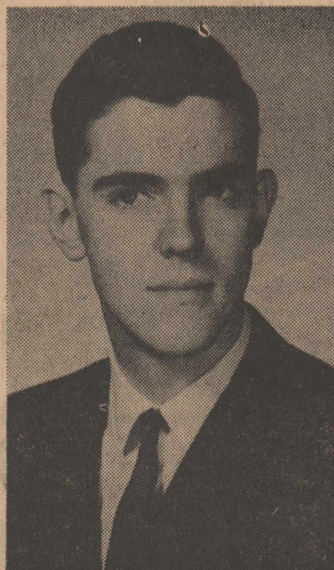

McCaulley Votes Against Merger

For the third straight time McCaulley voters turned down proposals to merge their school district with another district.

Saturday, 99 persons voted to consolidate with Hamlin, but 139 rejected the proposal.

Overwhelmingly for the proposal, Hamlin voters voted 135 to 10 to merge.

Both school districts must approve the consolidation for it to become effective.

In a previous election, Aug. 5, 1965, McCaulley Voters opposed the proposal 119 to 97 while Hamlin voters favored the issue 165 to 31.

In recent months, McCaulley voted not to merge with Roby.

New Green Stamp Book Out

Distribution of the 1967 S&H Green Stamps merchandise catalog containing 2,000 items, to Rotan residents starts tomorrow.

The catalog -- called the Ideabook -- will be available at J. D. Burk Grocery and other leading S&H merchants, according to J. D. Burk. About 40 percent of the merchandise -- over 800 items -- is in the catalog for the first time. Mr. Burk said, "The 1967 Ideabook represents a continuing search by S&H to up-grade merchandise value, variety and quality for its stamp-savers."

Among new items being offered are a pet grooming kit, propane gas grill for barbecuing, rose bushes, a fire alarm, a utility garden cart, wall-to-wall bathroom carpeting and rattan furniture.

Travel is the featured theme of the S&H catalog. It lists more than 200 festivals across the country in the Festival USA program, promoted by the United States Travel Service. It also promotes the Discover America program designed to encourage travel in the United States.

S&H will print approximately 33 million copies of its 1967 catalog.

The printing of the S&H catalog is believed to be the largest print order for any commercial publication in the United States.

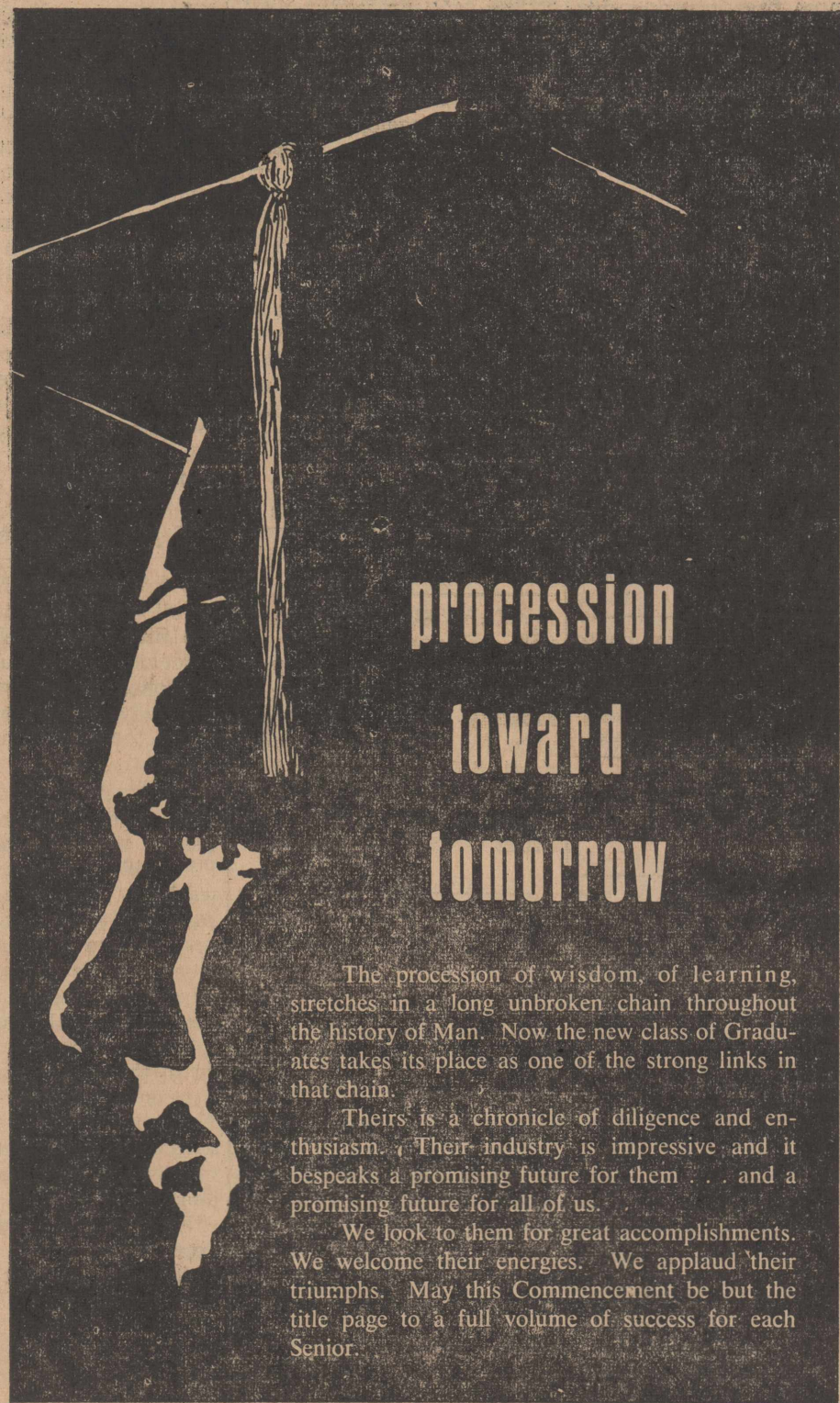

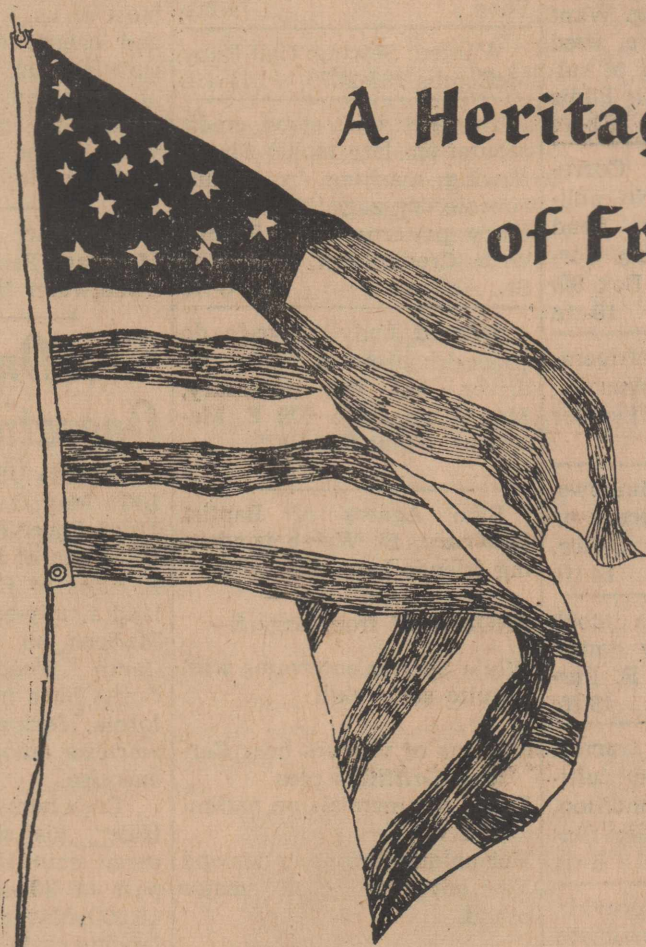
Procession toward tomorrow

Health and Safety News

The home gardening season
is in full sway across the na-
tion again this month.

After long months of win-
ter, followed by spring rains,
millions of American house-
holders are back at the an-
nual battle with crab grass
and insects in the perennial ef-
fort to add a touch of natu-
ral color and beauty to the
American scene.

The American Medical As-
sociation recommends gar-
dening as good therapy and
good exercise for almost
everyone. Gardening also en-
tails some hazards of health
and safety, most of which
can be avoided.

If you have done nothing
more strenuous than sit by
the fire most of the winter,
by all means take it easy for
the first few weekends of
gardening. Give your muscles
a chance to regain strength
gradually, rather than trying
to do too much on the first
day out.

Gardening often brings
cuts and scratches from
twigs, thorns, sharp tools.
First aid usually consists of
washing the scratch with
soap and water and applying
an adhesive bandage. Let it
bleed a little to wash away
impurities. Deeper cuts may
require medical attention.

Tetanus germs are harbor-
ed in the soil, particularly if
barnevad fertilizer is used.
The home gardener who fails
to protect himself with tetanus
immunization is courting
lockjaw.

Power tools, particularly
lawn mowers, are standard
equipment for the modern
home gardener. They save
many an aching back, but
they are potentially danger-
ous. Your power mower
comes with instructions on its
safe use. Study them care-
fully. If you're in doubt,
check with a mechanic as to
potential hazards of power
tools.

Insect sprays and powders,
plus poisons that kill weeds,
are useful adjuncts to garden-
ing. These, also, have inher-
ent hazards if improperly or
carelessly used. Once again,
read the directions, especially
the warnings.

Bees, wasps and spiders
are out for the spring season,
too, and now and then one of
them may sting you. For
most of us, a sting is painful
and causes swelling, but it
isn't serious. If you are one
of those individuals with an
allergy to insect bites, ask
your doctor about the des-
ensitizing injections.

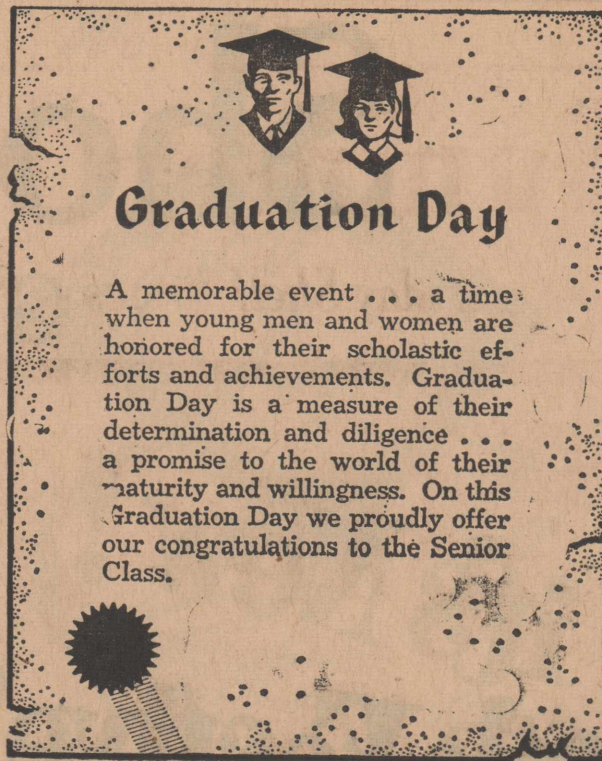

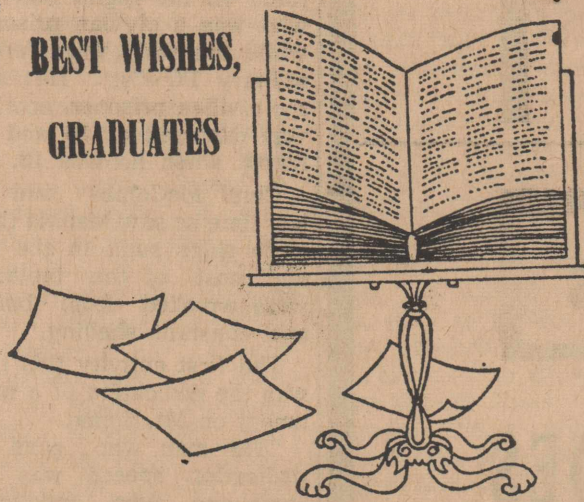

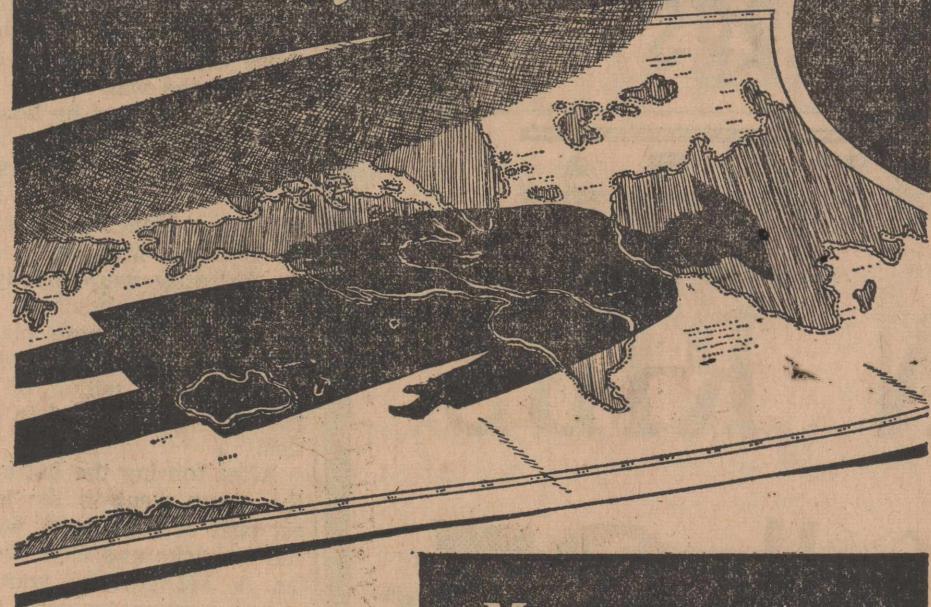

Bataan Prisoner Revisits Scene

The following article is from Hobbs, N. M. Daily News in regard to Laverne McCombs and wife. He was born and reared here and his many friends will enjoy reading of his trip. He is Fire Chief at Hobbs and his wife is employed by an oil distributor.

"Fire Chief Laverne McCombs and his wife returned Tuesday from a "Pilgrimage to Bataan," where he was a prisoner of war and participant in the Bataan Death March. The pilgrimage was made along with 500 to 600 other former prisoners of war and their wives.

McCombs said he "enjoyed every minute" of the trip, and memories flooded back to him "both good and bad". It was the first time he has seen Bataan since 1945, when he was liberated after 3 1-2 years in five different POW camps.

The pilgrimage began April 1, when the first of three "707 champagne jet flights" carrying 165 persons each flew toward Manila. "They treated us royally" said Helen McCombs. "We were fed five times on the plane from San Francisco to the Philippine Islands."

McCombs said there was one member of the liberating force on his flight, and one who was a civilian prisoner, while the rest were former military POW's. He said the civilian prisoner, now 39, was captured at 16 and released when he was 18.

Chief McCombs said the last time he saw Manila there were ships sunk in the bay and most of the buildings were wrecked from bombs and constant shelling.

The first activity this time was the dedication of a monument on Mt. Somat.

"The man who gave the dedication speech was the same one who announced 'Bataan has fallen,' McCombs related.

After the dedication, the group visited the National Cemetery for both the American and Philippines.

McCombs said many prisoners died from either malaria or dysentery. He said nearly everyone in the prison camps contracted both malaria and dysentery. "I had malaria several times and dysentery once."

While at the cemetery, a speech was given by the President of the Philippines, also a Bataan veteran, Ferdinand Marcos. Also there were ceremonies there for the Gold Star Mothers, those who lost a son or daughter in the war.

The group went by boat to Corregidor Island the next day where they toured sites of the batteries which held off the advancing Japanese on Bataan. McCombs said the batteries were mostly in ruin from the bombing and strafing by Japanese planes. There was a sign by each of the batteries, telling of the part they had played in battles.

After touring the batteries, the group went to the highest part of the island, where the barracks and Gen. Douglas A. MacArthur's wartime quarters were located. Also there were the ruins of the main powder magazine, built of three foot thick reinforced concrete and several feet of dirt. McCombs remembered that the planes could not blow up the magazine by dropping bombs on top of it, but finally managed to destroy it by slanting bombs in at the doors.

They stayed in the Bay View hotel "overlooking Manila Bay. "We had a beautiful view," said Mrs. McCombs. They were on the ninth floor of the 10 story hotel.

Mr. and Mrs. McCombs, returned to the U. S. on April 15, visiting his brother in Sacramento, Calif. before returning to Hobbs. They have two daughters, Sherry, a senior at Hobbs High School, and Jan, a freshman at Houston Junior High School."

Dry Peanuts Are Low Calorie

Dry roasted peanuts were the first of the lower calorie peanut products to appear on the market, reports Gwendolyn Clyatt, Extension consumer marketing specialist with Texas A&M University.

These peanuts are roasted in a high temperature oven without the use of oils or sugars. The result is an unusually crisp peanut that is dry to the touch, lower in calories, and tangy to the taste.

You will find that the dry roasted nuts are often seasoned with specially selected spices. The latest innovation is partially defatted peanuts. A process was developed by the USDA which makes it possible to remove up to 70 percent of the fat content of the nuts, which in turn reduces the calorie content by one-half.

These peanuts are pressed by a hydraulic press to remove more than half their oil. The shape of the nut is then restored by boiling it in water before roasting. Research is being done constantly and other new processes are being developed for peanuts and peanut products. Peanuts are high in protein, nutritious, and easily digestible. They and peanut products deserve a place on your menu this week, Mrs. Clyatt suggests.

June Draft Call Is Heavy

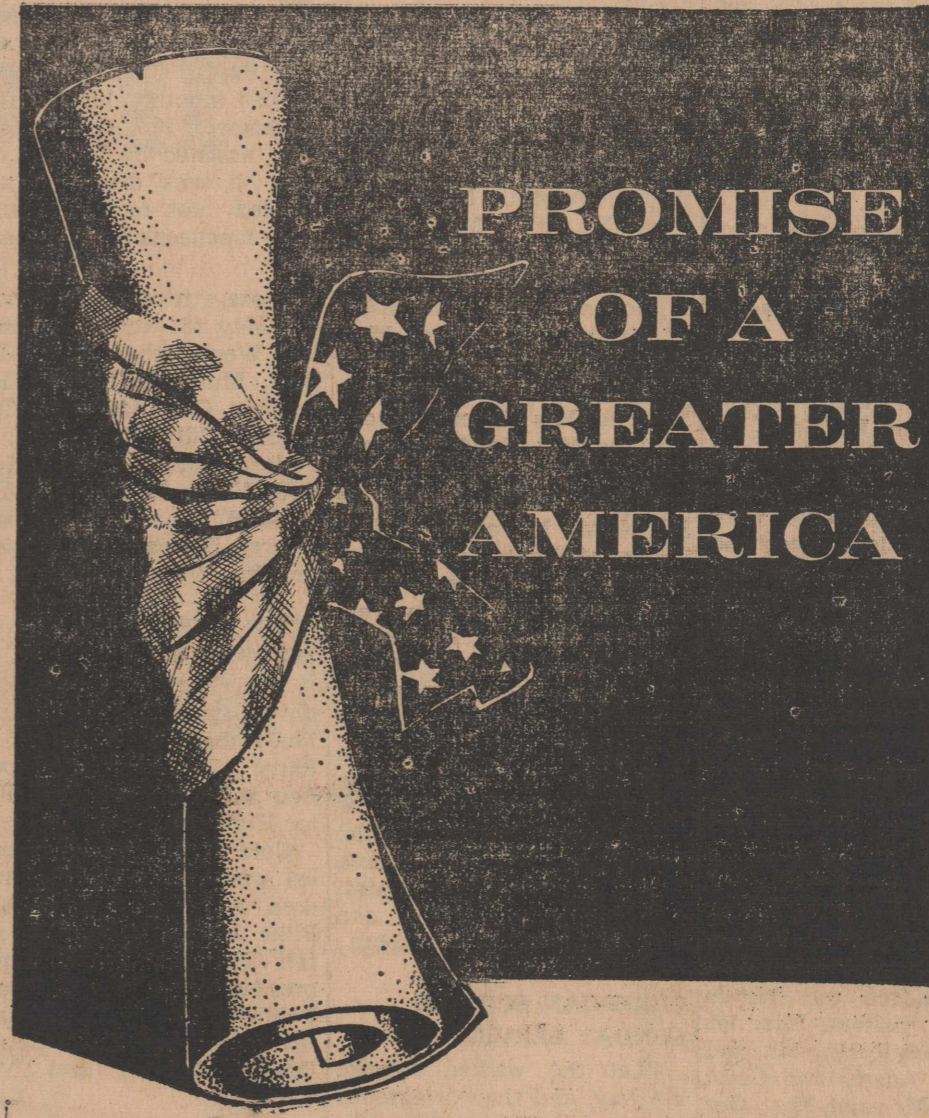
Austin, May 22 — State draft boards will be called upon to furnish 975 men for the armed forces in June, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Tuesday.

This compares with quotas of 885 for May, 675 for April, 761 for March, 675 for February, and 1,110 for January.

The Selective Service boards will forward approximately 4,000 men in June for pre-induction examination Colonel Schwartz said, and they have scheduled 3,000 for this examination in May.

Local board quotas for induction and pre-induction examinations for June were to be mailed from state Selective Service headquarters on or about May 10. May calls for the local boards already have been assigned.

The Texas quota of 975 for June is the state's share of a national call of 19,800. This manpower is for the army.

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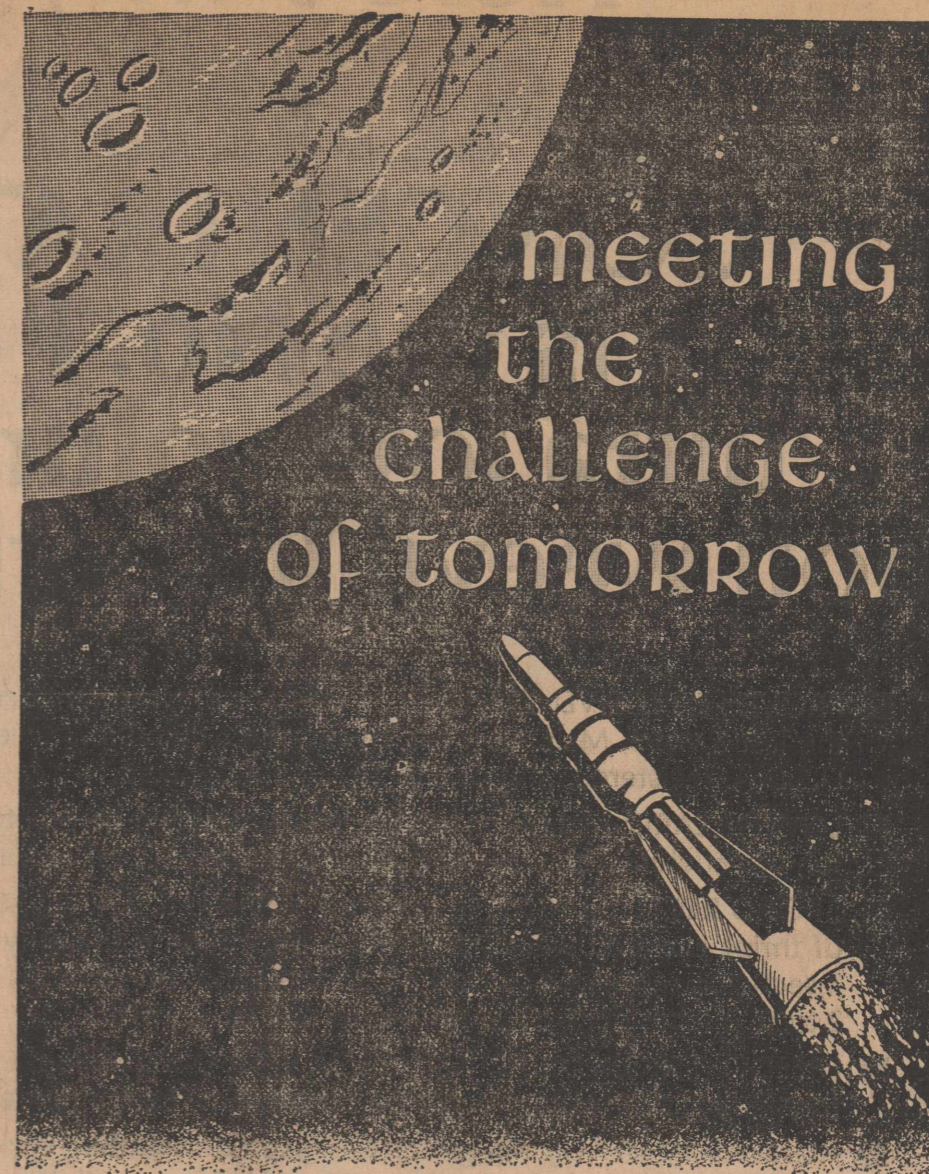

Now that we are graduating seniors and we will be leaving soon, I took a glance back over our first eleven years of school. This information was obtained from the annual, with no intention of leaving anyone out.

When the school year of '56 opened, we had 87 first graders enrolled. Today we still have 25 of the original 87 with 17 added through the years. The original 25 were Connie Hill, Becky Petty, Mary McDonald, Susan Weatherman, Stephen Baugh, Perry Hunsaker, Sherry Edwards, Debby Day, Kenneth SoRelle, Janice Aldridge, Robert Patton, Archie Overby, Carroll Patton, Stanley Edwards, Barbara Early, Johnny Hicks, Charles McCall, Starmie Partin, Geneva Gable, Brenda Head, Gary Baker, America Velez, Mary Medrano, Aurora Price, and Joe Molina.

When our first grade started, we were divided into 3 classes under Mrs. Edwards, Mrs. Weathersbee, or Mrs. McKinney. That year each class elected a King and Queen, and Stephen Baugh and Sherry Edwards were chosen King and Queen of Primary. We all took part in the May Fate presentation of the "Wizard of Oz" being either fairies or animals. We learned and played and the year came to a close.

Our second year we were divided into classes under Mrs. Fann, Mrs. Sumerlin, and Mrs. Witherspoon. Perry Hunsaker and Connie Hill were the king and queen of our class and we had 68 students that year. The May Fate came again with "Cinderella" and parts such as birds, pots and pans, or flower girls. Also Gerald Ashbrook joined our classes.

Robert Patton and Becky Betty were Captains; Carroll Patton and Stephen Baugh were 1st Lt.; Perry Hunsaker, 2nd Lt.; Sherry Edwards and Kenneth SoRelle, 3rd Lt.; Debby Day and Charles McCall, 4th Lt.; and Conaie Hill 5th Lt.; Barbara Early was queen while Perry Hunsaker and Becky Betty were chosen Outstanding Boy and Girl. "Sleeping Beauty" became our May Fate because we had the lead parts. Sherry Edwards and Charles McCall were Sleeping Beauty and the Prince, Debby Day was the witch and Robert and Carroll Patton, the King and Queen. Connie Hill and Archie Overby the Narrator and Master of Ceremony; Stephen Baugh, the court jester, Gerald Ashbrook, town crier, and Janice Aldridge, the old lady. Others were in the King's Court, fairy godmothers, and choral readers. Our teachers had been Mrs. Smith, Mrs. Hill, and Mrs. Morrow. We had 85 in our class that year. Carolyn Whitley joined us.

Now we had made it to Jr. High with once again 87 in our class, Glen Murphree joined us and we had Mr. Armstrong, Mrs. Weatherman, and Mrs. Rankin for teachers. Once again another switch to another end of the hall and we became all of R1 7th graders. This was our first year to play football and Debby Day and Sherry Edwards were Cheerleaders. Some of us made the choral club and the band won Sweepstakes. Lana

Cave, Earnest Kiker, Floyd Garcia, and Aurora Martinez joined us that year.

Then our last year of junior high began with football and Connie Hill added to Sherrie and Debby for our cheers. We again had choral club, band, librarians, a Christmas Party, and an 8th Grade Banquet. At the banquet Becky Petty read our history and Sherry Edwards, the Prophecy. Robert Patton was named honor student in Math, Mary McDonald in Science, Carroll Patton in English, and Archie Overby in History. Becky Petty and Robert Patton were the only honor students named. Iris McDonald and Carolyn Stewart joined us.

Our next year was a big step in our life—we were in high school. We elected Frankie SoRelle Secretary-Treasurer; Mike Rushing, President; and Kenneth SoRelle, Vice-President of our class. Stephen Baugh was our class favorite. Carroll Patton and Glen Murphree were Freshmen runner-up for Mr. and Miss R.H.S. and Sherry Edwards was majorette. That year we had 67 in our class with Frankie SoRelle, Mike Rushing, Jeanie Bollinger, Sherry Moore, and Everlina York added to our class.

During our sophomore year we were eligible for more honors and Lana Cave was elected Cheerleader. Sherry Edwards remained majorette, and Stephen Baugh was named team hustler. A chain of restaurants she now does own.

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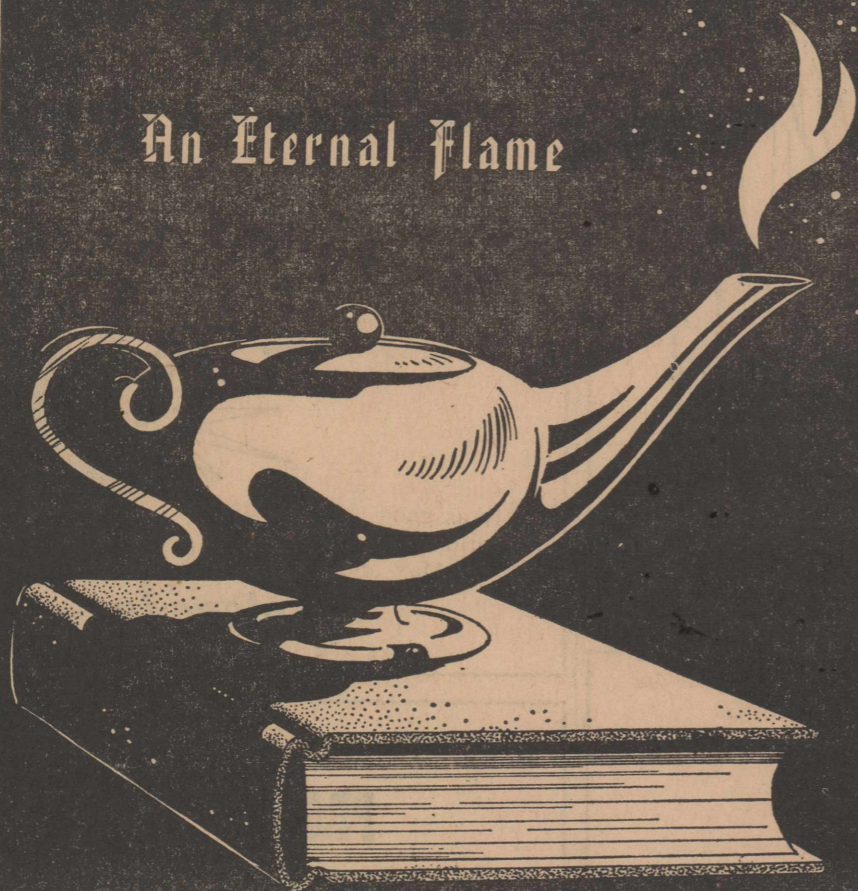

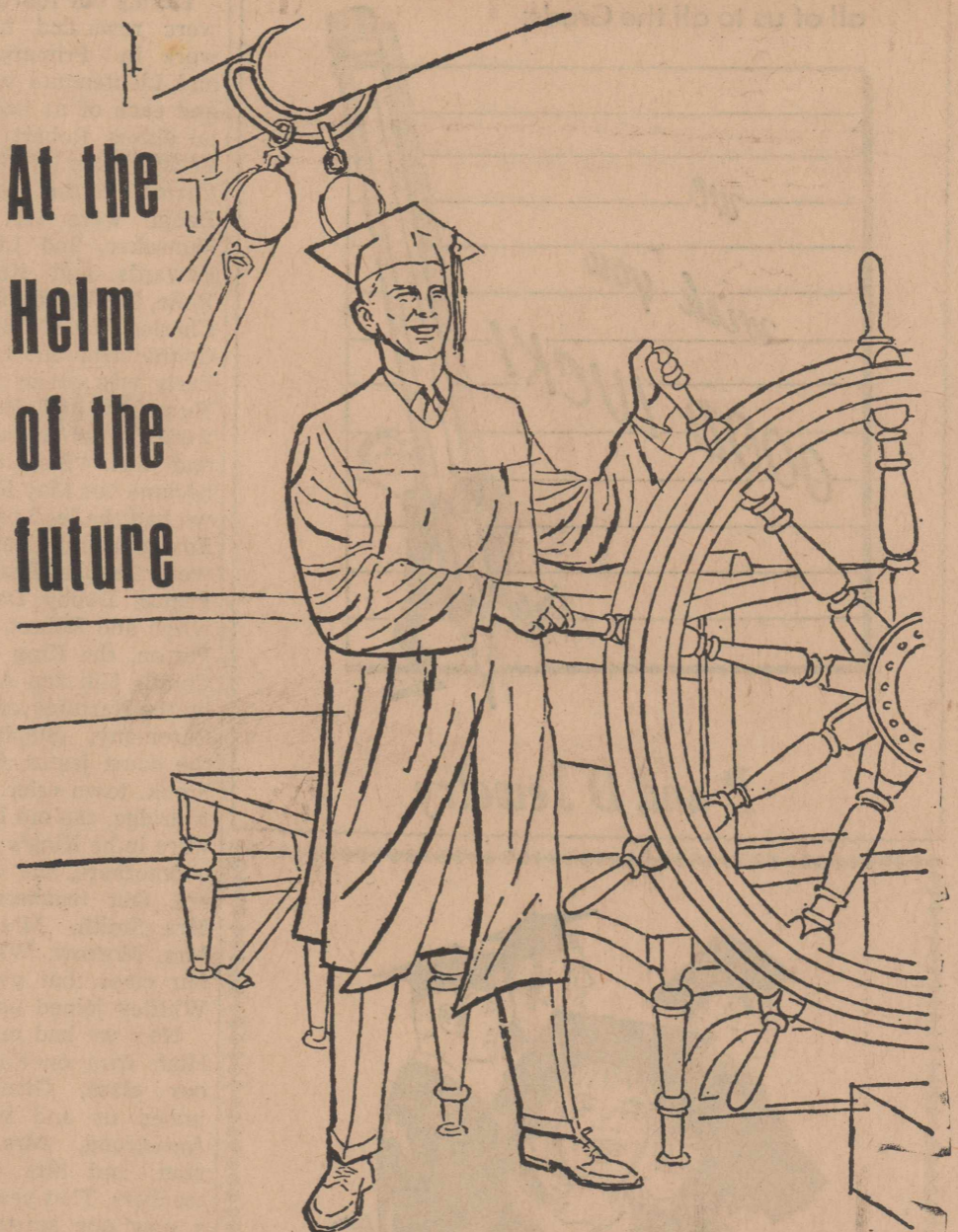
