Spotted Rains Cover County

Almost every part of the county received rain in some amount during the week. Saturday showers fell over scattered points, with Fred Byerly gauging .35 inch in town. Monday night he gauged .65, giving an even inch here.

Monday night's rain ranged from showers to up to 2 1/2 inches. Hobbs had an average of about an inch, which was the first moisture in several months. Considerable stock tank water was caught Monday north of Rotan and heavy hail swept in a strip of that country. Some row feed crops were destroyed in this area. Small hail fell in Rotan for a few minutes. Fall was heavier to the south and from Clear Fork, south thru Roby an average of 1 1/2 inches was reported.

Some farmers have planted many more acres of moisture to plant and others need more rain.

Savings Bond April Report

April sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds amounted to \$3,211 in Fisher county were reported today by R. L. Springer, Chairman of the Fisher county Savings Bonds Committee. This is 41 per cent of the county's goal of \$60,000.

Total purchases of E and H Savings Bonds in Texas for the month of April amounted to \$13,817,202. The January-April sales for the state totaled \$56,389,496 which is an increase of 8 per cent over the same period of 1966.

Nationally, cash sales of E and H Bonds for the first four months of 1967 amounted to \$1,770 million, 4 per cent above sales during 1966. Sales of E Bonds alone for the first four months were \$1,640 million, an increase of 6.3 per cent over 1966's \$1,543 million.

SS Benefits In County

708,120 in social security benefits was paid to residents of Fisher County last year, up 5.8 percent from the year before.

At the end of 1966, 1,032 men, women, and children in Fisher County were receiving benefits at a monthly rate of \$59,010. R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager in Abilene, reported today, 864 were older people, he said receiving benefits as retired workers, the wives and husbands of retired workers and as the surviving widows of aged dependent parents of workers who have died.

"But social security is not just for older people," Tuley pointed out. 113 young widows and children in Fisher County were receiving benefits amounting to \$5,252 at the end of December. 55 disabled workers and dependents were receiving benefits at a monthly rate of \$2,520.

Texas totals were \$68,178, 133 going monthly to 1,068, 955 persons. The national figures were \$1,638,548,392 to 22,767,252 persons.

"Practically every young family in Fisher County has survivors' protection under social security that can be worth up to \$75,000 or more, and equally valuable disability insurance protection.

Monthly payments to the family of a worker who dies, leaving 2 or more children, can range from \$66 to \$368 a month, depending on the worker's average earnings under social security.

Social Security survivors benefits, Tuley said, can be paid to the family of a young man who has worked and paid social security contributions for as little as a year and a half during the three years before his death.

Benefits to the mother and children continue until the youngest child reaches 18, or indefinitely, if the child has a disability which began before his 18th birthday and makes it impossible for him to work and become self-supporting. Under a change in the law enacted in 1965, a child's benefits can be continued up until age 22 if he or she continues in school, and is unmarried.

"As pointed out in testimony before the Ways and Means Committee of the House of Representatives in hearings on changes in the law now being considered" Tuley added, "the financing of the social security system allows for increases in the benefit level as earnings rise in the future without any change in the contribution rates."

Comparing social security's retirement and survivor coverage for persons past age 65 to the state old-age assistance program, he noted that out of each 1,000 such Texans, 757 received social security and 256 received old-age assistance. The national ratio was 822 on social security and 110 n old-age assistance per 1,000 persons over age 65. New Hampshire, with 892 of each 1,000 that age on social security, had the highest rate, while Louisiana, with 455 of each 1,000 aged on assistance, was high in that category.

Small Towns Can Flourish If The People Want Them To

—Waco Tribune-Herald, What may well be the most important handbook for small town progress in all the history of Texas has just been published by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. It is the fruit of a seven-month task force study by 23 West Texas leaders, into which were drawn hundreds of other West Texans as suppliers of information and ideas, and it ought to be required reading for all persons who look on their own small towns with misgiving or skepticism.

Even more, the WSCC publication, entitled "The Small Community in West Texas," should be required reading for all persons who hope to or want to do something about improving the quality of life in a small town.

The stories of success and failure as recited by West Texans in their own direct, colorful language in this publication can be sources of ideas for Central Texans who want their small communities to live and thrive.

The scope of the WTCC task force study of small not only embraced scientifically selected cross sections

of 140 communities of 12,000 or fewer population but reached to the state and federal government levels and to industrial organizations active in West Texas. All of this is reflected in the publication by the task force. For small towns not involved, the handbook gives the directions and road signs for similar studies, starting with an inventory of assets and handicaps and going on from there.

Cultural, social, economic and geographic factors affecting small towns are laid out in the West Texas study in a way that anybody can understand. So are the human elements, including the influences of strong personalities, business and industrial leadership, church groups and agricultural families. . . . In short, the handbook gets down to earth in the preface and stays there through the index.

Lest anyone make the mistake of assuming that this handbook is of interest only to residents of small communities, it should be remembered that no metropolitan area can grow and prosper

without the adjacent smaller communities' support. It is as much a matter of Waco's interest that the small communities in the heart of Texas find new life and spirit and strength as is Waco's own future development for Wacoans.

There hasn't been enough close communion in Central Texas between the people who make things go in the counties comprising this populous and prospering section. It is hard to find the time to get together and even harder to find the time for farsighted unified planning.

The Heart O' Texas Council of Governments, organized here last week, is a step in the right direction. So is the Economic Development District to be based at James Connally Technican Institute. For all concerned in these new public bodies as well as for all others who take an interest in the health and strength of Central Texas, the WTCC handbook can become a most important source of knowledge and ideas.

John Ben Shepperd, president of WTCC and inspiration for the task force study of small towns, said on the subject:

"Small towns are our last citadels of graciousness; neighborly concern and true hospitality. . . . they have been and can continue to be an important element in West Texas' economy and are representative of the democratic way of life in which a man is free to make choices and achieve security through his own efforts.

The small town is a symbol of freedom and of self government and loss of that independence, identity and image so characteristic of the initiative and self-reliance that has made West Texas great would be irreparable.

monly considered nonwoven.

As in woven fabrics, two layers of yarn are normally used to make Malimo cloth. A sheet of warp, or lengthwise yarns, and a sheet of filling or crosswise yarns, are used. But rather than being woven together, the two layers are placed one on top of the other and passed beneath a needle bar. The needle bar contains hundreds of needles which simply stitch or sew the two layers together. Malimo fabrics can be sewn with either a lock stitch or tricot knit stitch. In this way, Malimo can be made to look like a knit or woven fabric. Variations of the Malimo machine can also make pile or terry-like cloth.

The speed of the Malimo machine is so great that it has been estimated that three of these machines can replace ninety conventional looms with respect to the number of yards of fabric produced. Malimo fabrics may provide a real cost savings to consumers.

In general, Malimo fabrics have good laundrability, strength, and wrinkle resistance. There are no limitations on the fiber content of Malimo fabrics.

The Malimo machine, developed in East Germany and now widely used in Europe, is still in its infancy in the United States. A great deal of developmental work and testing is presently being done

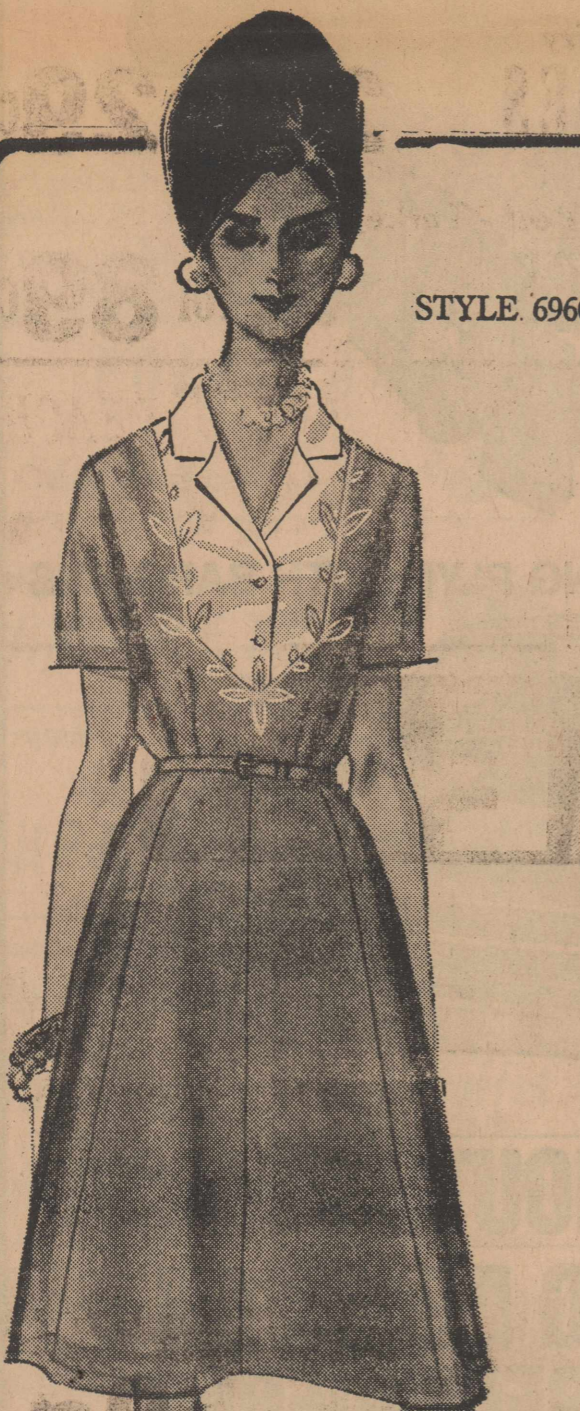

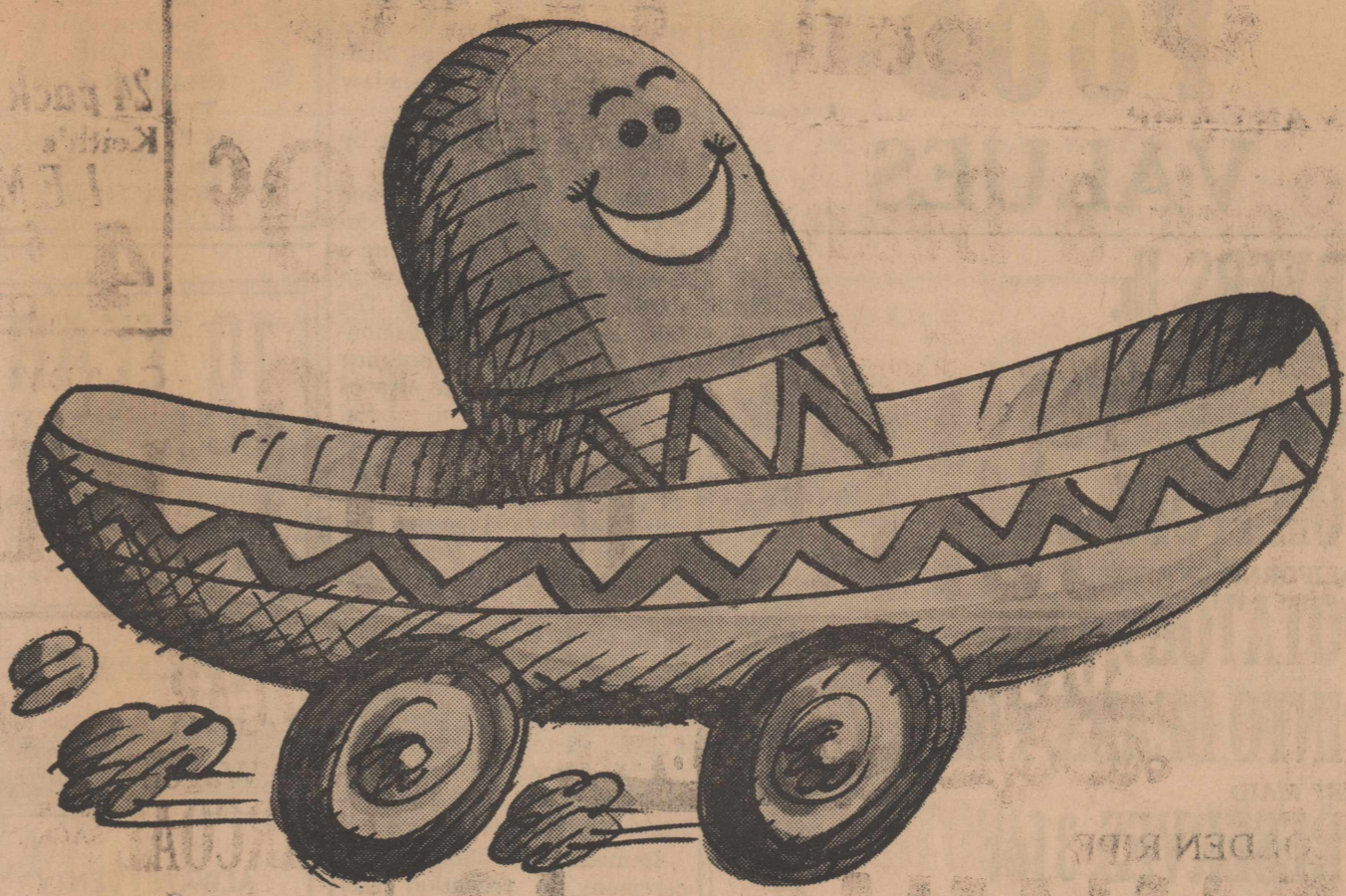
