

### TELLING THE WORLD

We made a tour through the northern part of the county last Thursday and noting the county's condition regarding a stand of row crops which seemed to be at least three fourths of ground had a stand of cotton and other row crops. While in some cases the farmers were planting over and quite a number of them were plowing the growing crop. Last week according to many farmers was one of the hardest spells of weather on the young crops because of the intensity of the heat and hot winds which in many instances killed the cotton and maize from many acres of ground which will have to be replanted. Floyd McGuire of Cottonwood, a splendid young farmer had us send him the paper for six months while in the city not long ago. We appreciate our young friends who begin life aright.

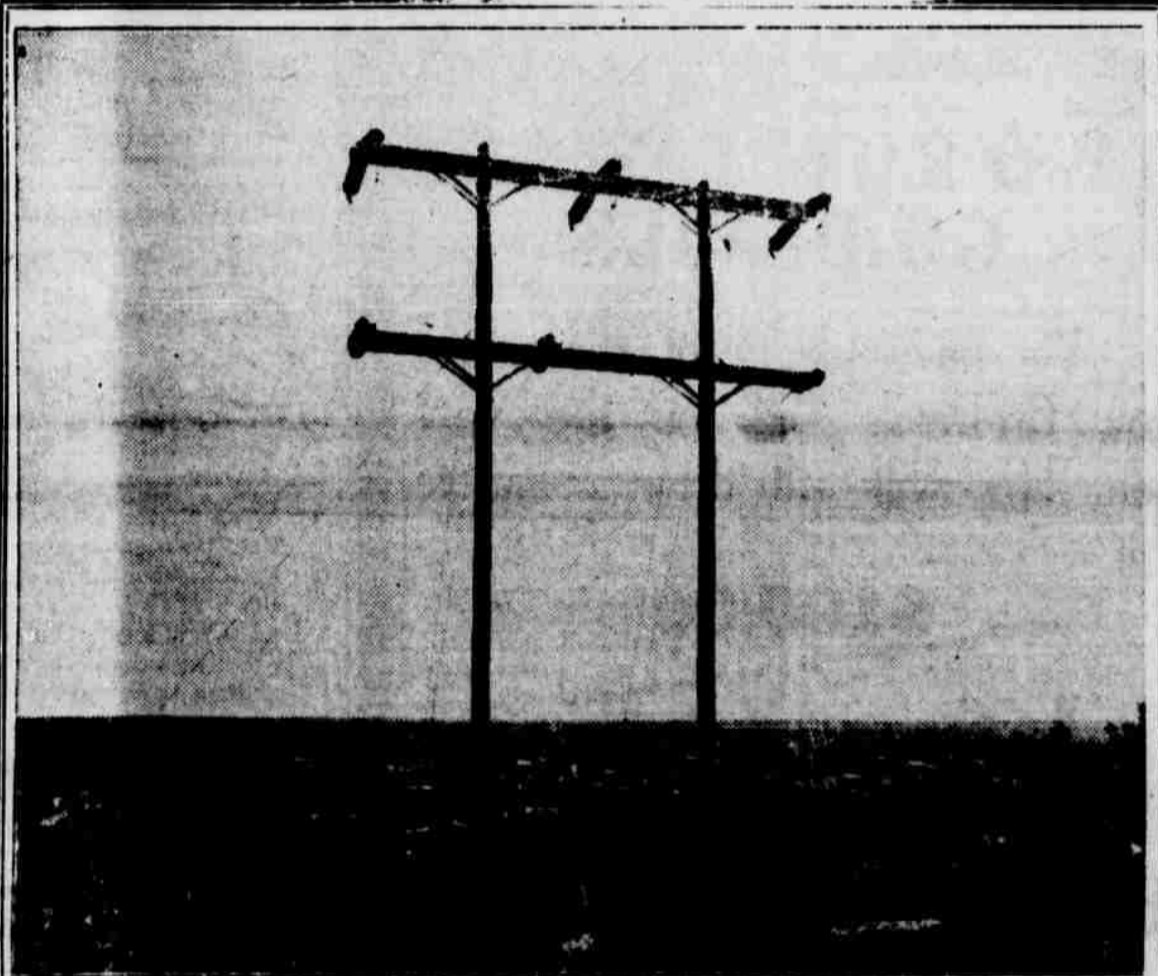

**HEAT AND SPEED CAUSE TIRE TRENDS TO WEAR**

Summer weather, which is now making its welcome return to sections of the country which are affected by extreme variations in temperatures, will bring many tire problems to the motorist, according to Isbell Burton-Motor Co. Goodyear tire dealers here.

Mr. Burton pointed out that internal heat and friction are two of the worst enemies of tires and declared that the progressive tire manufacturers, like the Goodyear Company, are doing everything possible to combat them.

"The three outstanding effects caused by heat generated in the pneumatic tire," he said, "are: decrease in the flexing life of the tire; decrease in fabric strength and increase in the rate of tread wear. Combined, they mean shorter tire mileage.

"The amount of flexing which a tire will stand, before it begins to break down, decreases with the rise in temperature; that is the body of the tire is weakened by extremely warm weather, especially if run at high speed and high load.

"The tensile strength of the cords in a tire carcass varies with the temperature. When the temperature is 200 degrees Fahrenheit, the tensile strength is 80 per cent, while at 300 degrees it has been reduced approximately 50 per cent.

**Heat Causes Wear**

Tread wear is also faster when the temperature is high and it is well recognized that tread wear in summer is enormously greater than in winter. Consequently, as a rise in the internal temperature of the tire is reflected proportionally in the temperature of the tread, it follows that it will be reflected also in increased wear.

"The lines of attack followed by progressive tire manufacturers to combat the effects of internal heat are: first, to reduce the heat generated in the tire, involving scientific cord construction and carcass and tread design, as well as the use of rubber compounds of high resilience; second, to increase the rate of heat dissipation from the tire; and third, to increase the inherent heat resistance of the component parts of the tire."

The program is incomplete but will include a grand parade at 10 o'clock each morning. The planes will take off at 10:01 each day and will fly over the city. In the afternoon there will be stunt flying, parachute jumping and other features.

Twisters made up, according to reports who lives west of Rule, the Rule and Sagerton and traveled in a northeasterly direction. The Rule was also in the track of twisters and considerable damage was done to the Teague Garage and the twisters were torn from the south side of the building in the business section of the town. The compress buildings were damaged considerably. Numerous out buildings were down or wrecked, all over the section.
