## Hobbs Approves School Budget

The Hobbs School Board approved a school budget of \$162,850 for the 1967-68 school year. The budget includes salary increases for all employees and teachers; remodeling and improvements in the Science Lab, Home-making Department, and shop and the initiation of a shop program for boys in the high school curriculum. In other action the Board agreed to purchase the milk for the lunchroom from Gandy's, to award contract for construction of football concession building and concrete bleacher piers to Teague and Hale, to purchase insurance for buildings and buses from Joe Burk, to employ Charlie Williams to audit the school records and to amend the 1966-67 school budget.

Most of us pay our taxes through withholding, but if you are in business for yourself you have to file an estimated tax by April 15 each year and pay your tax quarterly. If you have already filed and have made more than you anticipated, you need to amend your estimated tax return for the year by September 17.

## Attend NHA Lubbock Meeting

Miss Willardene Parker, business manager, Mrs. Alta Hinson, Director of Nurses, of the Fisher Co. Nursing Home in Rotan, were two nursing home staff members, who attended a conference in Lubbock, on August 10, on the implementation of Texas XIX, commonly referred to as medicare, of the Social Security Act in Texas.

The one-day meeting, sponsored by the Texas Nursing Home Association, State Department of Public Welfare, and Texas State Department of Health was based on the theme, "Meet The Challenge of Change", and dealt with the responsibilities of the nursing home and state employees under this new program.

Title XIX, being implemented in Texas starting September 1st will replace the current Kerr-Mills welfare programs which have been functioning in Texas since 1962. This new, joint federal-state program, will initially provide the following services to the certain categorical groups of the medically indigent welfare recipients: physician services, in-patient hospital services, out patient hospital services, skilled nursing home services, and other laboratory and x-ray services. These services will be available to the eligible blind, aged, and totally and permanently disabled and families of dependent children.

Medicaid was the companion legislation to medicare passed by Congress in 1965 as a part of Public Law 89-97. Since medicare is a joint federal-state program, while medicare is strictly a federal program, each state legislature had to pass legislation enabling the state to participate in the program.

Senate Bill 2, passed by the Texas Legislature and signed by Governor John Connally on May 11, 1967, was Texas' enabling legislation.

Conference speakers included Dr. David Wade, Assistant Commissioner for Medical Administration, State Department of Public Welfare; Arthur B. Taylor, President, Texas Nursing Home Association; L. C. Rouse, Director, Public Assistance Division, State Department of Public Welfare; Dr. B. C. Jordan, Chief, Medical Care Administrative Services Section, Texas State Department of eHealth; Bee Grisson, Director of Finance, State Department of Public Welfare; and John M. Crawford, Executive Director, Texas Nursing Home Association.

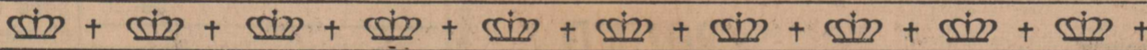

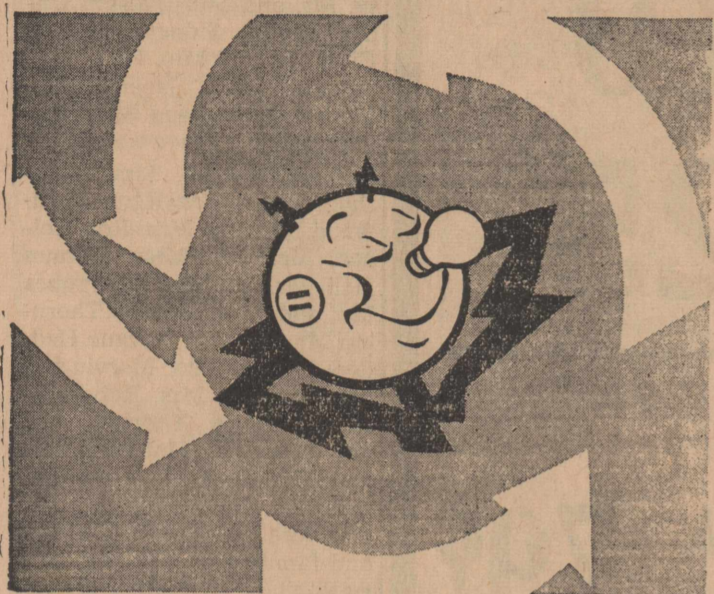

## PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section 13 thereto to read as follows:

"Section 13. Notwithstanding any other section of this article, the Legislature in providing for the creation, establishment, maintenance, and operation of a hospital district, shall not be required to provide that such district shall assume full responsibility for the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services or mental retardation services including the operation of any community mental health centers, community mental retardation centers or community mental health and mental retardation centers which may exist or be thereafter established within the boundaries of such district, nor shall the Legislature be required to provide that such district shall assume full responsibility of public health department units and clinics and related public health activities or services, and the Legislature shall not be required to restrict the power of any municipality or political subdivision to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations or to expend public moneys for the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units or clinics or related public health activities or services or the operation of such community mental health or mental retardation centers within the boundaries of the hospital districts; and unless a statute creating a hospital district shall expressly prohibit participation by any entity

other than the hospital district in the establishment, maintenance, or support of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units or clinics or related public health activities within or partly within the boundaries of any hospital district, any municipality or any other political subdivision or state-supported entity within the hospital district may participate in the establishment, maintenance, and support of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units and clinics and related public health activities and may levy taxes, issue bonds or other obligations, and expend public moneys for such purposes as provided by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment to permit municipalities, other political subdivisions, and state-supported entities located within hospital districts to participate in the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, or public health services."

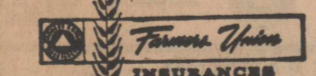

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-e, as follows:

"Section 49-e. The Parks and Wildlife Department, or its successor vested with the powers, duties, and authority which deals with the operation, maintenance, and improvement of State Parks, shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000). The bonds authorized herein shall be called "Texas Park Development Bonds," shall be executed in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by the Parks and Wildlife Department or its successor, but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds, shall not exceed four and one-half percent (4½%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein.

"All moneys received from the sale of said bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created with the State Treasurer to be known as the Texas Park Development Fund and administered (without further appropriation) by the said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, in such manner as prescribed by law.

"Such fund shall be used by said Parks and Wildlife De-

partment, or its said successor, under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by general law, for the purposes of acquiring lands from the United States, or any governmental agency thereof, from any governmental agency of the State of Texas, or from any person, firm, or corporation, for State Park Sites and for developing said sites as State Parks.

"While any of the bonds authorized by this provision, or any interest on any such bonds, is outstanding and unpaid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount which is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year, which includes any receipts derived during the prior fiscal year by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, from admission charges to State Parks, as the Legislature may prescribe by general law.

"The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Park Development Fund and the interest and sinking fund established for the payment of bonds issued by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor. Income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature.

"From the moneys received by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, from the sale of the bonds issued hereunder, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this section sufficient moneys to pay the interest to become due during the State fiscal year in which the bonds were issued. After

all bonds have been fully paid with interest, or after there are on deposit in the interest and sinking fund sufficient moneys to pay all future maturities of principal and interest, additional moneys received from admission charges to State Parks shall be deposited to the State Parks Fund, or any successor fund which may be established by the Legislature as a depository for Park revenue earned by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor.

"All bonds issued hereunder shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory nature."

## Phillips Back In States

U.S.N. — "I couldn't even find the 'chow hall,'" Dalton Ray Phillips comments as he recalls his first experience on the U.S.S. Hancock, which has now returned home after duty in the Vietnam war zone.

Phillips called his mother, Mrs. Joe S. Howard in Rotan July 22 from California telling her that he was safe and that he had seen his older brother, Wesley Phillips, also in the armed forces.

Phillips serves as shipfitter and metalsmith with the "R" Division on this Navy vessel, and his completed his third cruise to Vietnam.

The metalsmith works about eight hours each night — from 10 p.m. to 6 a.m. He says he enjoys this shift because "there are not so many people to get in your way, and it's cooler, too."

Recalling his first watch on the Hancock, Phillips comments: "An A4 plane crashed on the fantail, I was on the second deck at the fire fog generator. I didn't know what to do with the general panic that came. There was a pretty big fire but they had it under control in about ten minutes. Ever since I've never run around the fantail very much (the fantail is the far aft part of the hanger decks above the propeller)."

The 64" seaman gives his home address as 109 E. 4th St. in Rotan where his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joe S. Howard live. His dad is a cotton farmer about three miles northeast of Rotan, and his brother, Stanley Phillips, also lives in the town. The Howards are members of the Highland Home Baptist Church.

Phillips, 21, has spent three years in the service. After a short time at the San Diego Naval Training Center, he was sent straight to the Han-

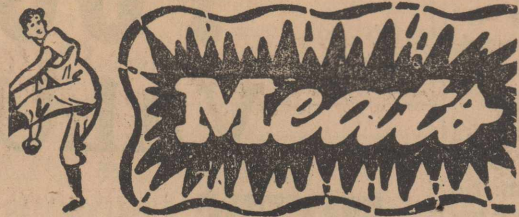

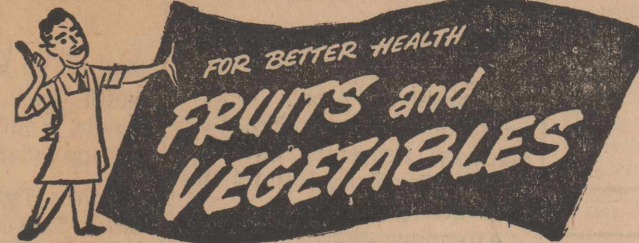

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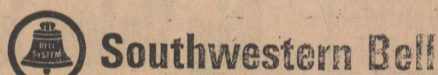


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## Red Means Wrong--

**AUSTIN —** Red means wrong on Texas freeways. The Texas Department has installed red reflectors on many Interstate and other controlled access highways to warn drivers that they are going the wrong way.

A broken red line of reflectors indicates to the driver that he is traveling the wrong way on the freeway. A red arrow pointing at the

driver from the pavement as he begins to enter a freeway ramp indicates that he is entering the wrong way.

These reflectors, in extensive use for about a year, are made of acrylic plastic — red on one side and white on the other. A driver going in the right direction sees the white side. A wrong-way driver sees the red. So red means "wrong way."

Thousands of these markers have been installed on such high-volume traffic highways as Interstate Highway 10 through Houston and Interstate Highway 35 through Austin, as well as on many

Installation of the markers is the Highway Department's second major innovation within the year to minimize wrong-way movements on freeways.

Earlier the Department began supplementing its "Do Not Enter" signs along freeways with "Do Not Enter Ramp" signs and "One Way" signs.

The reflective pavement markers are an effort to cut wrong-way accidents even more.

The lane lines in most cases are limited to metropolitan areas where there are high volumes of traffic. The reflective markers are placed at 40-foot intervals with 15-foot lines of white non-reflective button markers centered in between.

The arrows are placed on exit ramps to two-way frontage roads, exit ramps that have any history of wrong-way entry, and exit ramps where the design of the connection with the cross street or highway is such that traffic may have an easy access to the exit ramp, for wrong-way movement.

A big advantage of these markers, over paint or other devices, says a Highway Department spokesman, is that they are just as good when wet as when dry. This means that the reflectors can be seen during rainstorms.

"The Texas Highway Department is concerned about wrong-way accidents on our freeways," explained State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer. "We hope these new markers will help by warning motorists that 'Red means WRONG.'"

## As It Looks From Here

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Five years ago only 25 colleges and universities offered courses in some or all phases of Oceanography. Today there are about 100 private universities and Government laboratories concerned with the mysteries of the Ocean.

Young men and women looking for a future can find in the Sea a kind of frontier that has largely disappeared from the land.

Some phases of research now going on have the appearance of really being silly, but we already know enough about the Oceans and Seas, which cover approximately three fourths of the Earth's face, to be aware of tremendous potentials.

The President's commission on food supplies for the future points to disastrous circumstances for feeding the future billions of people who are shortly to inhabit the Earth. Population is expanding many times faster than our ability to produce food, even if the problem of distribution were overcome.

Mapping the bottom of the oceans, the seasonal current patterns at various levels, overcoming the main obstacles of a hostile element, will not be substantially completed during the lifetime of anyone now living, but what is learned by the scientists now busy in their explorations, may provide all the things that the land may not have in the years to come.

The scientists suggest that land now covered by the deep waters will furnish minerals, same possibility on Mars, great advances have already been made to live and exist under the Seas.

Japan has already established "Farms" and "ranches" in waters off its shores. They have built fences in which they raise and breed sea life for food.

For centuries, ocean fishing has been almost blind — little more than groping. Compared to future fish harvesting, present methods would be like depending on rabbit hunting in the woods to raising beef cattle as a source of meat.

Science already knows a great deal about the habits of food fish and about the minerals and oxygen content and temperatures of the water where fish are to be found. From this knowledge will spring new ways to farm sea life and even fatten it on managed "acreage" and to predict the numbers and movements of great sea schools.

It is known that fish can be "herded" with electrical fields, sounds and lights. From these things come a vision of the scientific harvesting of salt water food hundreds of times greater than at present.

On the spot where fish are harvested, processing plants will be erected to produce the finished products. Packaged foods will be available to the floating towns and cities which may be built around the factory, and for market on land. Imagine apartment ships with shopping centers, having protected sea gardens between them with airport ships and the things we now have on the land.

In the future we will depend on the ocean for minerals, chemicals and oil. The land is being depleted of natural resources while we permit the rivers to pour our wealth into the Oceans every day.

The possibilities of harnessing today waves and currents to produce electric energy is a reality insofar as the scientists are concerned. It is a matter of finding ways to reduce the cost of production. The race for underwater minerals is under way on the Continental Shelves all over the world. Giant corporations are making huge investments.

From the military standpoint, we must know the surface of the bottom of the Seas and take from nature what we know to be beneficial to mankind. A great source of protein needed by hungry millions can be harvested and converted to fish meal, with

any added flavor desired.

With these developments will come the need for international law for the Oceans' bottom, more complicated than the laws of the Sea applying to the surface.

Flipper and his companions may one day be "cowboys" and ranch "managers."

## Questions To Draft Boards

(Ed. note:) Below are questions now being asked at draft boards. The answers are by Col. Morris S. Schwartz, State Selective Service Director, 702 Colorado St., Austin, 78701. He will welcome your questions.

Q — What must I do to qualify for II-S classification as an undergraduate college student?

A — You must file a written request with your draft board after June 30, 1967. At the end of each school year you must furnish the board with convincing evidence that you are continuing to pursue satisfactorily a full-time course of instruction.

Q — How is the phrase "satisfactorily pursuing a full-time course of instruction" defined?

A — An undergraduate student taking a four-year course must earn 25% of the credits toward his bachelor's degree at the end of his first academic year, 50% at the end of his second, and 75% at the end of his third. If five years of study are prescribed by the school for a bachelor's degree in some field, a student must earn 20% of the total credits toward the degree each year.

Q — What is meant by a "student's academic year"?

A — In determining a student's eligibility for classification in Class II-S (college student), his academic year shall include the 12-month period following the beginning of his course of study.

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## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 9, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty-five Cents (35¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy a tax rate in excess of Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year for general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes; provided further that at the time the Commissioners Court meets to levy the annual tax rate for each county it shall levy whatever tax rate may be needed for the four (4) constitutional purposes; namely, general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund so long as the Court does not impair any outstanding bonds or other obligations and so long as the total of the foregoing tax levies does not exceed Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year. Once the Court has levied the annual tax rate, the same shall remain in force and effect during that taxable year; and the Legislature may also author-

ize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further maintenance of the public roads; provided, that a majority of the qualified property taxing voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed Fifteen Cents (15¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of the property subject to taxation in such county. Any county may put all tax money collected by the county into one general fund, without regard to the purpose or source of each tax. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws. This Section shall not be construed as a limitation of powers delegated to counties, cities or towns by any other Section or Sections of this Constitution."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund."

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section in Article III to be known as Section 52e, reading as follows:

"Section 52e. Each county in the State of Texas is hereby authorized to pay all medical expenses, all doctor bills and all hospital bills for all Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that the county shall continue to pay the maximum salary of these officials while they are incapacitated, but such salary payment shall not continue beyond the terms of office to which they were elected or appointed."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November

11, 1967, at which time the ballot shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing each county in this state to pay the medical bills, doctor bills and hospital bills for all Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that the county shall continue to pay the maximum salary of these officials while they are incapacitated, but such salary payment shall not continue beyond the terms of office to which they were elected or appointed."

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 33, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust, or profit, under this State except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard or Air National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the Air National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, and the Organized Reserve of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps. It is further provided, until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature by general law and such restrictions and limitations as the Legislature may prescribe, that a non-elective State officer or employee may hold other non-elective offices or positions of honor, trust, or profit under this State or the United States, if the other offices or positions are of benefit to the State of Texas or are required by State or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

"FOR the constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."
