## August US Bond Sale Report

R. L. Springer, chairman of the Fisher County Savings Bonds Committee announced today that sales in Fisher county totaled \$1,049 during the month of August. Sales for the first 8 months of 1967 totaled \$32,435 and this is 54% of the 1967 goal of \$60,000.

Series E&H Savings Bonds during August amounted to \$392 million which is 1.3 per cent over the \$387 million a year ago. The January-August sales totaled \$3,420 million; 3 per cent sales last year and an 11-year peak for 8 months' sales.

## Boll Weevil Infestation Here

Boll weevil populations remain heavy in many fields in Fisher County, County Agent Richard Spencer advises that early harvest, stalk destruction and plowing under plant debris will reduce the number of boll weevils entering diapause.

By cutting off the food supply of the boll weevil, this insect is not able to build up sufficient fat reserves to enter diapause or will enter diapause in a condition whereby it will be unable to survive the winter. To be most effective, Spencer says the program should cover a wide area.

In areas of the county where arsenic acid or phosphate-type defoliant will be used because of early maturity of the cotton, Spencer states that the addition of 0.5 lb. methyl parathion or 0.25 lb. of Guthion per acre to the defoliant will be helpful in reducing boll weevil populations. Care should be taken not to add these insecticides to chlorate defoliant or desiccants.

Stalk destruction as soon as possible after harvest will destroy the source of food for the boll weevil, he says. In situations where there are still squares and small bolls left on the cotton plants, flail-type shredders will kill a high percentage of the larvae.

Additional information concerning boll weevil control and early stalk destruction may be obtained at County Agent's office.

## Little Hammers Split with Anson

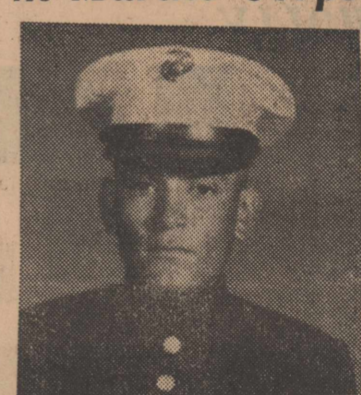
Rotan's Little Hammers split a 2-game play Tuesday night with Anson and much good football was in evidence.

## David Martinez In Marine Corps



PVT. DAVID MARTINEZ (PNO524) San Diego (FHTNC) Sept. 20 — Marine Private David Martinez, son of Mrs. Epigenio Martinez of 309 W. Johnston, was graduated from eight weeks of recruit training at the Marine Corps Recruit Depot here.

He will now undergo about three weeks of individual combat training and then, after leave at home, will report to his first Marine Corps assignment.

The intensified Marine recruit training emphasizes rigid physical conditioning and survival techniques, both at sea and ashore, to develop self-confidence and endurance, Marksmanship with the M-14 rifle and 45-caliber pistol are equally stressed, and close order drill instills the traditions of Marine Corps teamwork.

A thorough study of basic military subjects: hygiene; first aid and sanitation; and the customs, courtesies, history and mission of the Marine Corps serve to polish the new Marine's recruit education and prepare him to join Marine combat forces.

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### As It Looks From Here—

Congressman Omar Burleson WASHINGTON, D.C. — Who has the ball and what will they do with it.

Only three appropriation bills out of 14 have been enacted into Law in this Session of Congress. Departments, Agencies and Bureaus of the Federal Government not yet provided funds were unable to meet their obligations for the past few days.

A continuing resolution from the appropriations committee extending the Fiscal Year for 90 days was authorized June 30 and expired last Saturday, September 30th. Since Appropriation Bills are not passed, another Continuing Resolution was attempted last week extending the time for another 30 days. It was rejected on the basis of a proposal by the Republicans that 5 percent of the 1967-68 Appropriations be cut by the President before such authori-

zation was granted. This means that the President could apply the cuts at any place he desires. He could select any item or group of items to be reduced to the extent of \$5 billion, leaving those programs he favors intact.

It is a running criticism of many members of Congress and others, that the Congress has already delegated too much of its authority and responsibility to the Executive Branch.

Under the Constitution, the Congress has the responsibility of financing Government operations. Article I, Section 9, of the Constitution says "No money shall be drawn from the Treasury, but in consequence of appropriations made by law; and a regular statement and account of the receipts and expenditures of all public money shall be published from time to time." Congress must also levy

taxes and raise revenue. Action on taxes must originate in the House of Representatives. No other body — the Senate, the President, the Courts — has any such authority.

It follows therefore that the house cannot delegate these powers. Neither should it delegate authority to reduce expenditures from appropriations already made although it is conceded that the President, under law, can withhold funds appropriated.

Must the Congress say to the chief executive, "We, the Congress, are unable to cut spending — therefore we ask you, Mr. President, to do it instead?"

There is not one among us who does not know where the responsibility lies. A President does not and should not have this responsibility placed on him. The purse strings belong in the Congress — it is the Constitutional responsibility of the Congress.

Likewise the Congress, and specifically the House of Representatives, must levy taxes and raise revenue for the operation of the Government. A surcharge tax increase is proposed by the Administration to raise approximately \$7½ billion in Fiscal Years 1967-68 and 1968-69. The prevailing sentiment of the Congress is to offset the tax increase, whatever it may be, with a reduction in expenditures of a like amount. The Congress should carry out this idea by making its own cuts in spending and not leave it to the President to do it for us.

Proposal: Those of us of this mind believe that if taxes are to be raised, at least a comparable sum should be cut from all expenditures, excluding defense and interest in the public debt, but including our own salaries and all others, for the temporary period for which the tax increase is effective.

### Teachers To Hear New Methods At Workshops

"An exciting approach to teaching" will be explained to administrators and teachers in Region XIV in two separate workshops offered in Abilene through the Region XIV Education Service Center, Dr. Robert A. Montgomery, executive director, announced.

Region XIV includes all school districts in the counties of Taylor, Nolan, Mitchell, Scurry, Fisher, Jones, Stonewall, Haskell, Shackelford, Callahan, Stephens, Eastland, and Comanche.

The "process approach" to teaching science is now in its third year in the Abilene elementary science program. Approximately 200 Abilene elementary teachers are now involving students in the discovery and inquiry method. The process approach was developed under the sponsorship of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and is rapidly spreading across the United States.

Deadline for registration for the two workshops is Sept. 28. Bill Moore of Abilene is coordinator of the new program.

The administration or supervisory personnel workshop will meet five times from 9 a.m. to 12 noon on the following dates: Oct. 4., Oct. 10, Oct. 18, Nov. 1 and Nov. 8.

The second workshop for teachers in grades one through six will meet 20 times during the current school year, usually on Thursday, beginning Oct. 5. Sessions will be held from 4 to 5:30 p.m. Other dates prior to Christmas are Oct. 19, Nov. 2, 9, 16, and 30, and Dec. 6. All of these meetings will be held at Lamar Elementary School, North 6th and Hickory St., Abilene.

No registration fee is required for either workshop and all materials will be furnished by the Education Service Center on a loan basis. New elementary science textbooks are now being selected by the state textbook committee for use next school year. The new books will definitely use this new

approach to teaching. Dr. Montgomery pointed out.

A new bulletin is being prepared by the Texas Education Agency on elementary science which stresses inquiry and discovery as the most acceptable basis for learning, he said.

"The pupils who have experienced this new process approach in the classroom are telling Abilene teachers that science is their favorite subject," said Moore. "That is the best recommendation we can offer for this new program."

### PTA Is Now 58 Years Old

AUSTIN (Spl.) — Texas' branch of the Parent-Teacher Association will be 58 years old Thursday (October 19) and local PTA's in all parts of the state will be commemorating the founding with special meetings and programs.

Texas PTA was founded in Dallas during three days of meetings called by Mrs. Ella Caruthers Porter beginning October 11, 1909. Meeting site was First Methodist Church.

Texas PTA today maintains state office headquarters in Austin at 408 West Eleventh. Membership has grown from 6,638 in 1918 to 722,457 last year, ranking Texas second largest PTA state branch, after California.

More than 2,700 local PTA's may be found at work in all levels of school across the state. Currently serving as state president of PTA is Mrs. L. L. Ledger, Copperas Cove.

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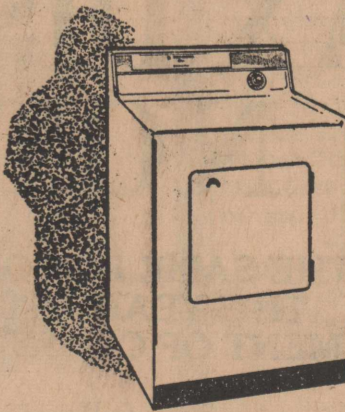


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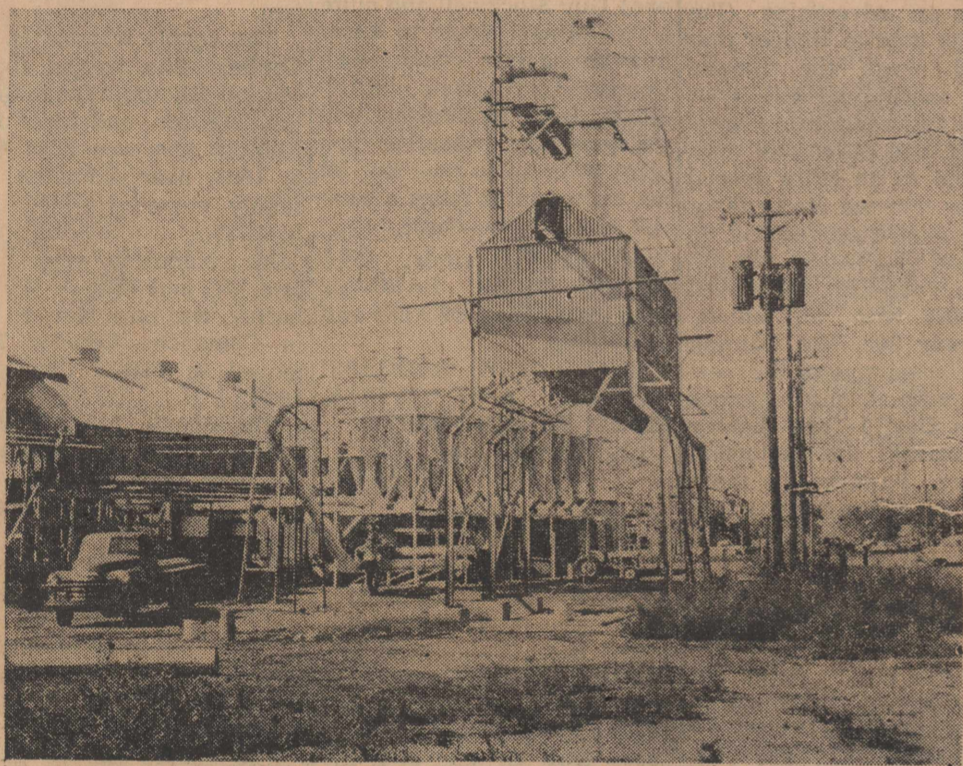
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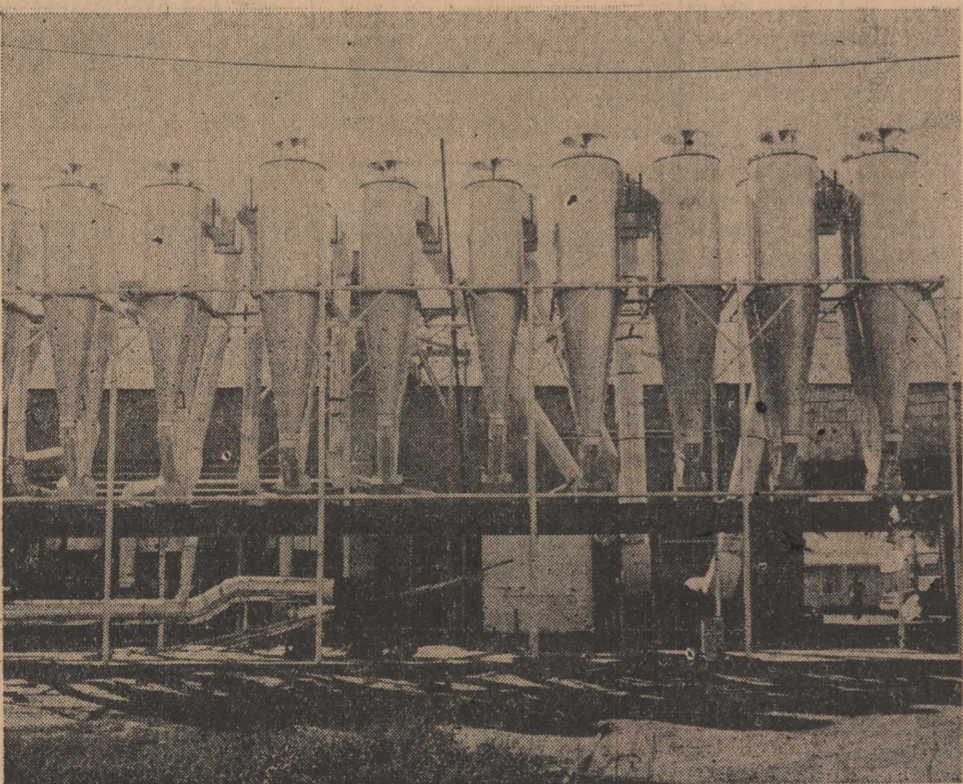
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
