Rotan Gin Has Open House

Rotan Gin Company was host for Open House Tuesday afternoon from 3 to 5 o'clock to show operation of their new Lummus Imperial \$300,000 gin plant.

A large crowd of visitors during the afternoon were shown the plant by gin personnel, including the board of directors and 358 stockholders. Directors are:

Bobby Gruben, president; Dick Edwards, vice president; Bobby Smith, secretary; Mack Blair, Walter Cleveland, Charles McCall, and Stanley Nowlin.

One feature of the new gin is the anti-air pollution system which eliminates all burning about the premises, which solves the smoke and flying lint that has plagued much of Rotan each ginning season.

The three Lummus Imperial 128 saw brush gin stands will replace the original 14 gin stands operated by the gin company in recent years, and will process more bales per hour than the original complex.

Charles McCall became new manager of the gin Wednesday morning, following the resignation of James Carter. Carter had managed the gin for the past year and Mr. McCall has been connected with the gin in various capacities for many years.

Washington D.C. — Congressman Omar Burleson announces that he has a limited number of 300 Vietnam and Asian Continent Maps which he is desirous of distributing to families and close relatives of boys serving in Vietnam.

The Congressman advises the maps are printed in several colors and indicate political boundaries and the topographic elevations of countries of Asia, with enlargements of Southeast Asia including an economic map illustrating the products of the various geographic areas. The intent is to provide a useful, factual and informative document but not to include any of the military aspects.

Burleson said he felt the document would give families of servicemen a better perspective of the area, layout and location where servicemen may be, and he wishes to place them with people who do have a son, husband, father or close relative in Vietnam and will welcome such requests, on a first-come, first-served basis. Students To Hear Aviation Opportunities

The present and future opportunities of aviation will be demonstrated to the students of Rotan High Schools during an assembly program on Tuesday, October 31, at 11 a.m., titled "In the Pilot's Seat" presented under the sponsorship of the Utility Airplane Council of Aerospace Industries Association.

A man and wife pilot team, Mr. and Mrs. Al Ott, will show films and discuss the operation of aircraft, career opportunities and the position of air transportation in the social and economic advancement of the students.

Mr. Ott served in the Air Force as a mechanic and crew chief and has been a pilot for 12 years.

The UAC is the association of manufacturers of airplanes and engines used in general aviation, the part of air transportation covered in the school program. General aviation is all civil flying except that of the airlines.

Joseph T. Gueting, Jr., Manager of the UAC with headquarters in Washington, D. C., said the industry has undertaken the school presentations because "aviation is such an important part of the lives of young people that they should understand it full potential so that they may be prepared for it."

There are more than 50 times as many airplanes being operated today in general aviation as by all the scheduled airlines combined, Mr. Gueting said. More than 130,000 new pilots are expected to be trained this year.

A report by the Federal Aviation Administration indicates that the number of persons traveling inter-city by air in their own airplanes is about half the total number of passengers carried by all airlines combined. It further stated that when the many other uses of general aviation airplanes are taken into account, training flights, pipeline and powerline patrol, aerial application, fish spotting and similar careers, — the number of persons using general aviation airplanes is about the same as those using the airlines.

Educators face a tremendous challenge, the UAC Manager continued, in preparing today's students for the environment in which they will live. "As an industry we recognize the responsibility to aid these educators by sharing knowledge we have of a specific field." In addition to the tour by Mr. and Mrs. Otto, the UAC also has two additional programs covering other parts of the country. Approximately 1,200,000 students are expected to see the program during the 1967-68 school year.

Teenagers To Aid Needy

Texas young people of various church organizations, working together, in their communities, will be among thousands of CROP workers during CROP WEEK, October 29 to November 4, as they call from door to door seeking "treats" for needy people abroad.

CROP is the Community Food Appeal of Church World Service and collects food, fibre and cash in communities throughout the United States for the world relief programs of the churches it has become as much a symbol of Halloween to the young people of Texas as the traditional "Trick or Treat", black cats, pumpkins, and witches.

The youth will join other CROP workers in the state who are seeking contributions of grain, livestock, rice and cash for the church overseas: material aid programs.

Since 1947, CROP has exported food and agricultural development supplies worth \$17½ million. In addition, 2½ million has been transferred to other relief agencies at donor's requests. It has helped to send more than \$69 million in government-donated foods since the U.S. commodity distribution program began in 1954. Its aid has gone to people in 50 countries during the past 20 years.

The community CROP appeals are sponsored by Ministers Associations, local Councils of Churches, Youth Councils, Councils of Church Women United, individual church groups and by local CROP committees formed by the churches, along with farm and civic organizations.

The youth who will be seeking to help needy people abroad through CROP this Halloween will be identified by a red on white CROP identification tag.

(X0156) USS Constellation (CVA-64) (FHTNC) Oct. 16 — Boatswain's Mate Third Class Wesley M. Hunsaker, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Forrest E. Hunsaker of Route 1, Rotan, has completed his third "on-the-line" period off the coast of North Vietnam aboard the attack aircraft carrier USS Constellation.

The 33-day line period came on the heels of a previous 36-day tour in the Gulf of Tonkin, The Constellation, in port at Subic Bay in the Philippines for only five days, was called upon to replace the fire-damaged USS Forrestal.

Pilots from the carrier's air wing hit the Lang Son Bridge, the major supply link for North Vietnam, and destroyed surface-to-air missile sites at An Phu, seven miles west of Haiphong. Air strikes accounted for the destruction of 115 barges, 67 trucks, three patrol boats and 18 bridges.
