County Agent Column

With coton harvest coming up, listed below are some key factors for a proepr harvest:

1. Lint moisture should be down to about 8 percent. This point is reached when the relative humidity in the field is 60% or below. Moisture can also be checked by collecting a few locks of cotton and squeeznig them together in the palm of the hand. If the cotton balls up, it is too moist. If it fluffs out, it is dry enough for harvesting.

2. Strippers should be checked carefully to assure that they are properly adjusted and green boll separators should be operating efficiently.

3. Seed cotton should not be stored on trailers if the moisture level is about 12%. Seed quality will also be reduced drastically if stored with a high amount of trash.

4. Seed cotton should be grouped or separated when any difference in quality is suspected. Grouping should be based on variety, irrigation or dryland, disease, or insect damage, hail damage lint moisture, and planting date.


