### Many Social Security Change

The changes in the social security law signed by President Johnson on January 2, will mean a benefit increase of at least 13 percent in the social security checks of about 30,500 men, women and children in the 15-county Abilene District.

The Social Security Administration's high speed electronic computers are now figuring the increases and will include the increases in the checks delivered early in March.

Beneficiaries need not take any action to get the increase. It will be sent to them automatically.

Some social security beneficiaries will receive more than 13 percent increase. The minimum benefit for workers retiring at 65 is increased from \$44 to \$55.

The last increase in social security benefits to 7 percent, and was effective January 1965.

About 3 out of every 10 beneficiaries receiving an increased check early in March will be someone under 65, many of them the children of working fathers who have died.

The value of social security survivors insurance is often overlooked. Social Security is more than just a retirement system. It is also income protection for the family in case of the breadwinner's death or disability.

With the increased benefit payments provided under the new amendments to the law the face value of social security survivors insurance protection is increased to about \$940 billion. This is just about equivalent to the value of all private life insurance now in force.

Under the amended law, maximum payments to families now on the social security benefit rolls will go up from currently payable maximum of \$309.20 a month to \$322.40. In the future, the maximum payable monthly to any one family can be as high as \$434.40.

### Use 1040A Preaddressed

Dallas — Taxpayers who received a 1967 preaddressed Form 1040A are urged to file that form if it fits their needs and they are eligible to use it.

Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for Northern Texas, said today that substantial savings will be realized if the form provided is used because fewer key-punch operations are necessary to process the return. "It also helps us utilize the full capabilities for which the Automatic Data Processing system was designed," he said.

If you name or address has changed make the necessary corrections and strike through lightly the preprinted information. If you have a refund due, this will help insure delivery of the check to the correct address.

Taxpayers should also verify that their correct social security number is entered on the return they file.

### Color Photo On Drivers License

Austin — Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety reminded Texans today that a color photograph becomes a standard part of all drivers' license issued after January 1.

"The change makes it necessary for all drivers to renew licenses in person at one of our Department offices," Garrison said, "and we have been working toward setting up a procedure that will not cause excessive delay when a person comes to us to renew a license."

Garrison explained that the change in license was incorporated into law by the last legislature.

"Renewal notices will be mailed to each driver, just as always," Garrison said. "However, under the new procedure, each driver must take the renewal notice to the nearest DPS office. There he will be given a standard vision test, sign the renewal notice and step in front of our camera. The picture will be snapped and a receipt will be issued to enable the person to drive until he receives his new license in the mail."

Garrison explained that about 250 full-time license offices would be in operation over the state to service license renewals. Issuance of new licenses will also be conducted in many of these new offices as well as at offices already established.

There are currently over 5,800,000 licensed drivers in Texas and about 2,500,000 licenses are renewed annually. To facilitate the process all licenses after January 1 will be renewed to expire on the birthday of the licensee. If the person holds a license ending in an even number it will be renewed for a four-year term; if the license ends in an odd number, it will be renewed for two years the first time then for four years each time thereafter. The cost to the driver remains the same per year.

The new license will be approximately 2 1/8 inches wide by 3 3/8 inches long, or about the same size as a standard credit card.

### '68 Is To Be Full Political Year

AUSTIN — Any way you look at it, 1968 shapes up as quite the most action-packed political year for Texas in more than a decade.

It will start with a wide-open governor's race in the Democratic primary perhaps the roughest since 1956. Also, there may be some other close races for less exciting offices.

And of course, the presidential battle will hold the November general election spotlight. If Texas Republicans made good their threat to field a strong candidate for governor, and it seems they will, there will be plenty of action on that front almost the year around.

There is no sure way of predicting at this point whether U. S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough, Lt. Gov. Preston Smith, Secretary of State John Hill, former Att. Gen. Waggoner Carr, Dallas radio man Gordon McLendon, Houston attorney Don Yarborough or an unheralded dark horse will emerge the Democratic nominee for governor. Neither is it clear who the Republicans will put up to oppose him. Congressman George Bush of Houston? Sen. John Tower? An unknown?

While Texas national Democratic delegates obviously will be pledged to support President Johnson, state Republican leaders have not topped their hands as to their favorite candidate for nomination.

Although the winners can't be picked in advance, red letter dates can be marked on the 1968 political calendar.

Here are the main ones:

Feb. 5 — Last day for filing as candidate in primaries.

May 4 — First primary election and party precinct conventions.

May 11 — County party conventions.

June 1 — Second primary election.

June 8 — State conventions to pick national convention delegates.

Sept. 17 — State conventions to pick Texas party leadership (executive committees) and write the state party platforms.

Nov. 5 — General election.

Remember that, to participate in any of the action, you must register (it's free) with the county tax assessor-collector or authorized deputy by Jan. 31. Registration is simple and can be accomplished through the mail or forms published in this paper.

### POLICY CANCELLATION GUIDELINES SET

State Board of Insurance announced these general guidelines for cancellation of certain insurance policies or company refusal to renew coverage:

Family auto policies and auto coverage should be cancelled only for premium non-payment or for license suspension or revocation.

Companies should not balk at renewing family auto policies strictly on account of age of insured.

Thirty days' notice of non-renewal should be given before declaring to renew family auto policies and auto coverage, homeowners policies on one-family dwellings.

Cancellation cannot be ordered on home owner and standard fire policies for one-family dwellings solely because the company changes underwriting requirements during the policy term.

### SHORT SNORTS

John C. White has announced for a 10th term as Texas Commissioner of Agriculture.

State Securities Board reports handling a record volume of \$650,400,000 in permits to sell securities during the year, an increase of \$100,000,000 over 1966.

B. F. Masters, president emeritus of Kilgore College, resigned from the State Board of Education effective January 1.

Texas Commission of Alcoholism estimates there are 300,000 alcoholics in the state and warns that one out of 10 who drinks in an incipient alcoholic.

Texas Water Development Board is putting together a number of studies made since

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### the preliminary water plan

was unveiled in 1966 for meeting the water needs of 30,000,000 Texans to the year 2020.

Despite an approximate increase of 14 per cent in Texas hospitals' costs in the past year, Texas Hospital Association Executive Director O. Ray Hurst says the total cost per patient day in general hospitals here still is four to six per cent below the national average of \$55.82.

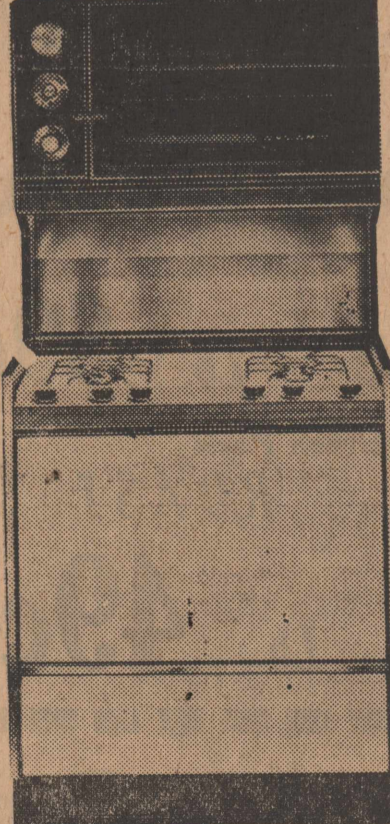

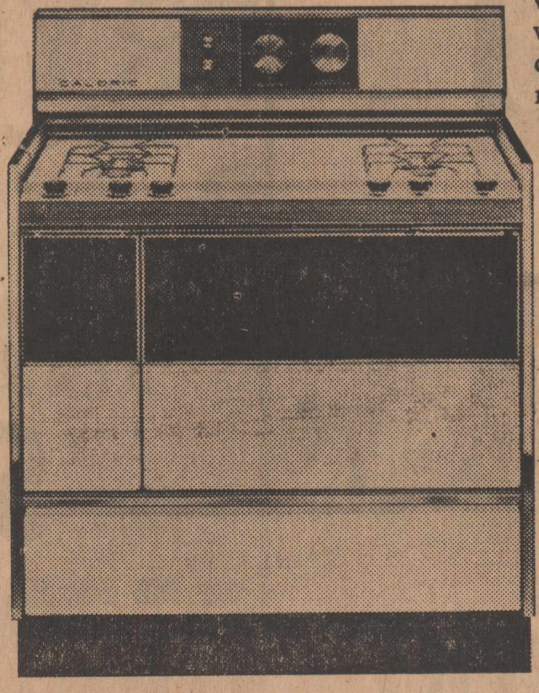
