Car Inspection Deadline Near

Patrolman Martin Kipp reported today that more than 50,000 vehicles still remain to be inspected in his area for the official 1968 inspection sticker before April 15 dead-

Patrolman Kipp's area includes Taylor, Jones and Fisher counties.

This area has 81,424 registered vehicles and only one 37% have been inspected.

Patrolman Kipp reminded vehicle owners that under new provisions of the inspection law, the inspection will include front seat belts in cars where the anchorage are part of the manufacturer's original equipment. Also under the new provisions the steering, wheels and rims will be inspected.

Those motorists who wait until the last weeks of the inspection period to have their cars inspected may find that they will need to install seat belts, and with the last minute rush, the supply of available seat belt kits may not take care of the demand. Dealers will have no way of knowing how many sets to have on hand, so to be on the safe side we urge all owners to have the work done as soon as possible.

Motor Vehicle Inspection Patrolman urge motorists to have their vehicles inspected early in order to avoid the long lines which will develop as the inspection deadline of April 15 draws near.

A person may have his vehicle inspected at any of the 5,336 inspection stations in Texas. 

THE TRUTH AND THE ONE CHURCH No. 2 Jesus, who has all authority in heaven and earth said "Upon this rock I will build my church" Matthew 16:18. Jesus did not say he would build a church, his churches or one of his churches. He said, "I will build my church". Now let us spell it: C-H-U-R-C-H that is how many Jesus promised to build. Everyone who knows the English language knows that nouns are singular or plural. The word "church" is singular and means one.

Paul teaches us that there is one body which is the church. "There is one body and one Spirit, even as also ye were called in the hope of your calling" Ephesians 4:4 "For even as we have many members in one body, and all the members have not the same office: so we, who are many, are one body in Christ, and severally members one of another" Romans 12:4, 5. "But now they are many members, but one body" I Corinthians 12:20. Paul taught time after time the oneness of the body. But does the body mean the church? "And he put all things in subjection under his feet, and gave him to be head over all things to the church, which is his body' Ephesians 1:22, 23. In this passage Paul tells us that the church is the body. "And he is head of the body, the church" Colossians 1:18. So the church is the body and the body is the church. How perfectly this agrees with Jesus promise: "I

will build my church" Matthew 16:18. The oneness of the church is seen in many scriptures and figures throughout the word of God. For example: (1) In the figure of the vinyard, God is the husbandman John 15:1. We do not see many vineyards but one. (2) In the figure of the vine and the branches Christ is the true vine and each redeemed person is a branch in the vine John 15:1-6. Christ speaking to his disciples emphatically said "ye are the branches" John 15:5. He was not speaking of churches as branches but men. (3) In the figure of the house or family we see a oneness also: "the house of God, which is commitments in Vietnam has the church of the living God' I Timothy 3:15. We do not see in the Bible a picture of several hundred different families, each with a distinct government of its own, each wear- equipment assets. ing its own name, and each claiming the same father. (4) The figure of oneness is again portrayed in the one fold and probable contingency challenone shepherd. "And they shall become one flock, one shepherd" John 10:16. (5) Still another figure of the human body describes a oneness. The church is presented in the figure of a human body with Christ as the head and all the redeemed as members of the body, working under the control and direction of the head I Corinthians 12:12-27; Colossians 1:18. One body, one head.

However, there is one closing scripture that needs to be noted in concluding this study of the one church of the New Testament. This passage is Christ's prayer to the Father found in John 17:20, 21. "Neither for these only do I pray, but for them also that believe on me through their word; that they may also be in us: that the world may believe that thou didst send me." Jesus prayed that all who believed on him may be one. This prayer is a cutting rebuke to a plurality of churches. Would Jesus pray for oneness and then turn around and establish many churches to create division?

During the early age of Christianity, there was but one church. It was neither Catholic nor Protestant, since the Lord's church existed centuries before either of these religious movements began in history. Nor was it divided into sects, parties, and denominations of various kinds. All who accepted Jesus Christ, as Lord and Savior, were added to this church upon obedience to their Lord in baptism Acts 2:38, 47 They did not "join the church of their choice", because Christ's church alone existed and there was no other choice!
