





The frequency of observing the Lord's Supper according vate and public conduct, to Acts 20:7 is EVERY first day of the week, "and upon consideration toward other the FIRST DAY OF THE WEEK, when the disciples came men and other ideas - even together to break bread, Paul preached unto them". Thus in religion. early Christians met upon the first day of the week for the purpose of breaking bread. Does this mean that they took the Supper the first day of every week? It does not say "every week", but neither does it say that God commanded the Jews to keep every Sabbath. God said "Remember the sabbath day to keep it holy" Exodus 20:8. The faithful Jew understood this to mean every sabbath. It came once every week; therefore they were obligated to keep it every week. Furthermore, we know that the Jerusalem crurch "continued steadfastly in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in breaking of bread and the prayers" Acts 2:42. This passage indicates a regularity and frequency and not an dramas, for wild phychedelic occasional custom. Also, the church at Corinth ate the Lord's supper when they assembled I Corinthians 11:20. 
