1. Senator Wiley of Wisconsin in a Senate speech warned Alaska not to try gambling as an economic cureall. He stated that every dollar raised from such sources means five dollars spent in "higher police costs and higher court cost, higher penitentiary costs. and. higher relief cost."
2. Crime rate per 100,000 population: 907 per 100,000 in non gambling states; 1,756 per 100,000 in gambling states.
3. After Liquor-by-the-drink was legalized in Iowa, automobile accidents increased by 20 to 30 per cent. According to their experience, Texas can expect 673 additional highway deaths each year if liquor-by-thedrink is legalized.
4. The crime rate in states with liquor-by-the-drink is higher than package only states by 265.5 crimes per 100,000 population. In Texas this means that liquor-by-the-drink could be expected to bring 27,877 more crimes per year to the state. (Source: Uniform Crime Report: 1966, FBI)
5. The American Business Men's Research Foundation estimates that 57 per cent of the money spent on liquor goes out of the state to the manufacturer of the products. Of the remaining 43 per cent a very small amount goes for taxes. In Texas none of this remains in the local community. The cost of policing liquor caused problems falls on the local law enforcement people and the community receives nothing in return.

have been found tunneling in the new shoots of pecan
trees. Using the number of larvae found as an indication
of the number of larvae that will be present to damage the
nutlets in late May and early June, it appears that a very
large population can be large population can be ex-
pected.
The best time to control this pest is just after the eggs
have hatched in late May or early June, and before the pecan nut casebearer larvae en-
ter the small nutlets. At this time there is a two or three
day period when this pest can be controlled effectively. The
time at which chemical control measures should be ap-
plied varies from year to year. The most effective
method to determine the proper time for applying chemical control is by banding pe
