FHA Loans Are Available

Several Fisher County low-income rural people have increased buying power, as a result of Federal opportunity loans, according to George M. Dorman, the Farmers Home Administration local representative.

Dorman, who has been Farmers Home Administration's Fisher County Supervisor for 4 year years, said funds are now available to farm and other rural families.

Over 2,700 opportunity loans have been made in Texas since the beginning of the program in January 1965 with more than 430 being made this fiscal year.

The opportunity loans are part of the Federal anti-poverty program, which Congress enacted three years ago. The loan program is administered by the Farmers Home Administration for the Office of Economic Opportunity.

Low-income rural people, through the local Farmers Home Administration office, may receive loans up to \$3,500 to develop income-producing businesses or to enlarge farming operations. Borrowers may take up to 15 years to repay the loan.

For the first time, according to Dorman, people who could never before qualify for loans now can get the money they need to develop or expand a business enterprise or a farming operation.

"But in all cases," Dorman added, "the enterprise—whether it is farming or business—must have a reasonable chance of success."

Through the Fisher County Office, loans have been made to purchase, or improve non-farm enterprises as blacksmith shops and senior citizen retirement homes.

In addition, 3 or more farmers may receive a group loan to buy machinery and equipment, ect. they couldn't afford individually. They could have up to 30 years to repay the cooperative loan.

Applications for loans are made through the Farmers Home Administration, Fisher County Office in Rotan.

FU Directors Take Action

The Board of Directors of Texas Farmers Union, meeting in regular session at San Antonio last week, asked members of Congress from Texas and USDA officials to take action on several important matters affecting Texas agriculture.

The governing unit of the statewide general farm organization, representing 110 organized county units in Texas, asked members of the Texas congressional delegation to bring about the extension of the 1965 Farm Act as a "priority matter, which should be acted upon without delay."

Texas congressmen and senators were asked to carefully study some of the amendments to the 1965 Act which have been proposed by various groups and USDA to determine whether or not they are "the long-time best interest of family farmers, and will increase net producer income."

The Farmers Union Board urged members of Congress to support the Mondale Bargaining Bill and speak out publicly for the proposal to give farmers and ranchers legal authority to negotiate price. The resolution emphasized the need to adopt Title I of the bill which is "essential for bargaining authority."

Turning to recommendations directed at USDA, the farm organization leaders asked Secretary Freeman to "assure an orderly marketing of cotton stocks remaining in CCC hands and an improved bargaining position for farmers by announcing an extension of the cotton loan program after July 1."

USDA was also asked to "comply with the recommendations of wheat farmers at the Amarillo hearing by announcing a mandatory diversion program with payments and an additional voluntary diversion program with payments to assure a substantial reduction in wheat acreage for 1969."

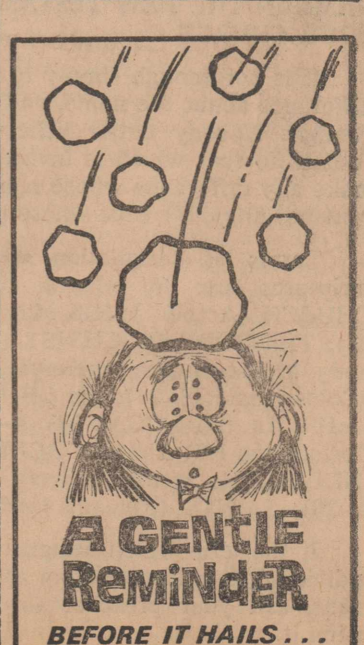
Grassed Waterways

Control of erosion by grassed waterways is important to both city and farm people. For the farm they provide safe outlets for terrace water and water that enters from adjoining land. For the city people grassed waterways prevent eroding fields from destroying roads and depositing silt in the water reservoirs and recreation lakes.

Grassed water ways properly established and maintained are not wasted acres. They may be used for hay, grazing, and seed production. In most instances gullied, silted in, or brushy areas are made productive and also prevent damage to the adjoining fields.

Cost share assistance is available through the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. Technical assistance is available through your local Soil Conservation Service office.

ASK YOUR PREACHER — No. 1

Preachers are looked upon as leaders of men, but if they are not permitted to offer the benefit of their knowledge and experience, they are to that extent handicapped in the possibilities of their service. Since preachers are constantly dealing with God's Word, it is expected, of course, that they should know more about the Bible than any other class of men; and it is but natural when one has a question that troubles him, that he should turn to the preacher for help. Any worthy preacher should be willing to give whatever assistance he can. He should be able to tell whether or not it is a Bible subject, and if so, what the Bible teaches on the question. Here are some questions to ask your preacher:

1. ASK HIM HOW MANY CHURCHES ARE REVEALED IN THE NEW TESTAMENT.

The Lord promised to build only ONE church: "Upon this rock I will build MY CHURCH" (Matthew 16:18). He is head of but ONE. "...gave Him to be head over all things to THE CHURCH, which is His BODY, the fulness of Him that filleth all in all" (Ephesians 1:22-23).

Every New Testament figure used to describe the church emphasizes its unity and oneness. It is THE BODY of Christ. (Colossians 1:18). "There is ONE body" (Ephesians 4:4). It is called the HOUSE (or family) of God (1 Timothy 3:15). God has but ONE FAMILY.

If the Lord has more churches than one revealed in the New Testament, ask your preacher to tell you where you can read about them.

2. ASK HIM WHERE YOU CAN FIND THE TERM OR NAME IN THE NEW TESTAMENT WHICH DESIGNATES YOUR CHURCH.

It is not enough simply to say that it doesn't make any difference about the name, and that one name is as good as another. Nobody either believes or puts into practice in actual life that which is involved in such a theory. Does it make any difference whose name a man's wife wears? Does it make any difference whose name is signed to a check?

Terms of designation which are authorized by the scriptures are: In relation to the WHOLE body—THE CHURCH (Acts 8:1); HIS (Christ's) BODY (Ephesians 1:22-23); THE BODY OF CHRIST (1 Corinthians 12:27); but the body is the church, therefore, the CHURCH OF CHRIST (Colossians 1:18, 24); the CHURCH OF GOD (1 Corinthians 15:19). In the LOCAL sense—the CHURCH OF GOD (1 Corinthians 1:2); the CHURCHES OF CHRIST (Rom. 16:16). INDIVIDUAL members were called—CHRISTIANS (Acts 11:26); SAINTS (Romans 15:25); DISCIPLES (Acts 13:52).

If the term which designates your church, or you as an individual, is different from those found in the New Testament, ask your preacher for the scriptural authority for using it.

3. ASK YOUR PREACHER TO TELL YOU WHERE THE BIBLE TEACHES THAT YOU CAN BE SAVED OUT OF THE CHURCH, AS WELL AS YOU CAN BE SAVED IN IT: OR THAT CHURCH MEMBERSHIP IS NOT ESSENTIAL TO SALVATION.

The Scriptures teach that Christ purchased the church with His own blood (Acts 20:28); and that He is the Saviour of it (Ephesians 5:23). ALL THE SAVED WERE ADDED TO THE CHURCH (Acts 2:47).

Ask your preacher where he gets his authority for saying that a man does not have to be a member of the church in order to be saved.

"IF ANY MAN SPEAK, LET HIM SPEAK AS THE ORACLES OF GOD" (1 Peter 4:11).

SCS Conducting Grass Studies

The Soil Conservation Service in Rotan is currently conducting cooperative grass adaptability studies on the Y6 ranch near Hamlin and on land operated by W. W. Butler of Roby.

The Soil Conservation Service plant materials center located at Knox City, constantly searches for new grass species that are adapted for use in Texas. Grasses used in studies are planted in trial plots at the center and evaluated for characteristics such as yield, seed production, and adaptability. Grass seed are harvested from the most promising plants and then tested on a cooperative basis with interested farmers and ranchers in the area. Generally three to four acre plots are planted. If results from the larger test plots prove favorable these grasses are released to the public for use.

W. W. Butler of Roby, has drilled a waterway to experimental Caucasian Bluestem. Grass seeds were drilled into a dead little cover. Periodic checks will be made to determine stand establishment, erosion retardance, drought resistance and life span of the grass stand.

The Y-6 ranch of Hamlin is conducting a study with the SCS to determine the adaptability of Arizona Cotton-top for seeding in old fields. Arizona Cotton-top is commonly found in pastures throughout Fisher County and is considered to be a highly desirable grass species.

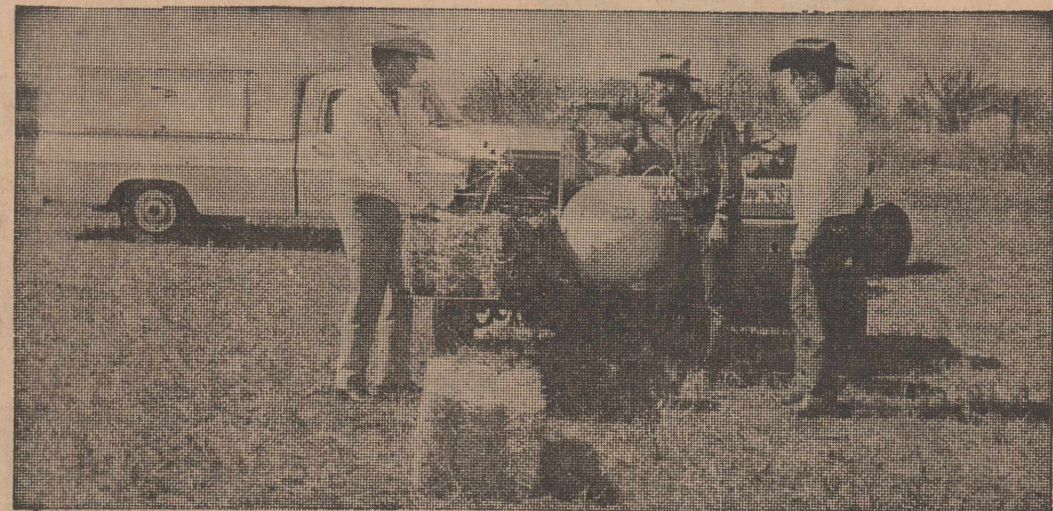
