



Cattlemen's **Roundup Set**

To anyone who knows anything about the Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children. It will come as no great surprise to learn that C. A. (Charlie) Morris of Abilene has one again been named general chairman of the Round-Up which annually provides approximately onethird of the operating funds of the West Texas Rehabilitation Center in Abilene.

What may come as a surprise is the fact that he has been renamed so early. The giant sale is still nearly three months away-set for Sept. 30.

"I guess everybody in the Big Country-if not everybody in the state of Texasknows that we had a long, hard winter," said District Judge Raleigh Brown of Abiene president of the WTRC board of directors. "We were face to face with the possibility of having to close the doors of the Center for good when the generous public came to our rescue."

Judge Brown referred to Operation Survival, when people from all over the nation chipped in a total of nearly \$180,000 in less than two months when it became public that the non-profit Center had outgrown its budget.

All that money isn't gone, but a good part of it went to pay off old bills, and some of it to begin construction on a new wing to take care of the increased patient load," he explained. "It means, simply, that the Round-Up will have to be more productive than ever before so that the Center may continue to give the free treatments to the children of the Southwest."

Last year's Round-Up raised some \$82,000 toward the Center's annual budget of some \$262,000. Other funds come from memorial donations, Easter Seals, and various United Funds.

"We know that if we're to have a more successful Round Up than in the past, we're going to have to start earlier. so that's what we're doing." Judge Brown said, adding that Morris would be appointing area chairmen in the near future.

"We'll start taking animals anytime now, and will feed

Following are shocking facts about mental retardation:

1. Five and half million Americans are disabled because their minds did not develop normally.

2. Number of retarded persons is increasing.

3. Mental retardation cost the nation billions of dollars annually.

4. Good prenatal care is a safeguard against mental retardation, yet more than a third expectant mother's do not get adequate medical attention.

5. There are nowhere near enough educational and recreation facilities. For at least 80% of them, no educational or training programs are provided.

Some hopeful facts are that with proper training at least 85% of mental retarded can support themselves to some degree.

Mental retardation is not a disease or a sickness and should not be confused with mental illness.

More than 200 diseases and conditions can cause mental retardation.

The child that is neglected, can become retarded.

The basic needs for retarded children and adults is love, kindness recreation and education.

Scientists have been made considerable progress during the past few years in controlling bloat in cattle. It can be successfully controlled by the use of products now available provided they are used in accordance with the manufacturer's recommenda-

Although present-day building in Roby. knowledge pertaining to bloat is important, some facts remain unknown. Clinical cases of bloat may vary in severity. Treatment is not always satisfactory and surgery may be required for severe cases. Frothy bloat which is us-


ually present in cattle pastured on legumes is more difficult to treat than the dry bloat more commonly seen in cattle on dry feed.

Present-day products are effective but good managefent and commonsense prevention are aways in order. The following suggestions are offered as aids in starting cattle on legume pasture: 1. Start bloat prevention medication several days in advance. Follow the manufac-

turer's directions and make sure that each animal has a daily intke of the medication equal to the recommended dose.

2. Check all cattle at frequent intervals and be prepared for treatment. 3. Call a veterinarian at the

first sign of trouble. 4. Keep a supply of bloat preparations on hand at all times and know how to use them. Bloat is a known killer. Rapid death loss is one of



ASK YOUR PREACHER (No. 5)

Every person sustains an affirmative position to that which he practices in religion. If we engage in singing as praise to God; we are obligated to prove that singing is authorized by the Lord, or, that the New Testament sanctions the singing of "psalms, hymns and spiritual songs." The person whose practice is to worship with a mechanical instrument is obligated to prove that such practice is scriptural, authorized by the New Testament.

The New Testament authorizes vocal music (singing) in the worship. "Speaking to yourselves in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, SINGING and making melody in your heart to the Lord" (Ephesians 5:19). "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom; teaching and admonishing one another in psalms ad hymns and spiritual songs, SING-ING with grace in your hearts to the Lord" (Colossians 3:16). These and many other passages establish authority for vocal music. Now ask your preacher:

WHERE THE NEW TESTAMENT AUTHORIZES IN-STRUMENTAL (MECHANICAL) MUSIC IN WORSHIP TO GOD. Mechanical music:

IS NOT BY THE AUTHORITY OF CHRIST. Jesus said, "All authority hath been given unto me in heaven and on earth" (Matthew 28:18). Having commanded the apostles to baptize those taught into the name of the Father, and the Son and the Holy Spirit, Jesus then instructed them to "Teach them (those baptized) to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you" (Matthew 28:20). Instrumental music is not commanded by Christ, therefore cannot be used by His authority and with His sanction.

IS NOT PART OF THE TRUTH. Jesus promised to send the Comforter (Holy Spirit) to the apostles (John 16:7) and then said, "When he, the Spirit of truth is come, he will guide you into all truth" (John 16:13). The apostles were not guided to use insruments of music in the worship. Since they were guided into ALL TRUTH and were not guided to use instrumental music in the worship, it must follow that instrumental music does not belong to the system of truth delivered by Christ.

CANNOT BE DONE BY FAITH IN GOD. "Faith comes by hearing and hearing by the WORD of God" (Rom. 10:17). Only as man acts by the instruction of God does he act by faith. Since God has not instructed us to use instrumental music in the worship, it cannot be done by faith.

JEOPARDIZES THE SOUL. "He that goeth onward and abideth not in the doctrine of Christ hath not God" (2 Jn. 9). To use instrumental music in worship is to progress beyond the truth. NOW ASK YAUR PREACHER FOR HIS AU-THORITY FOR USING INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC IN THE WORSHIP SERVICE.

distinguishing charac istics of bloat. During an emergency every minute counts; therefore, have the needed equipment and materials handy and rady for use.

The 1969-crop wheat program has been announced by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and features a nationalallotment of 51.6 million acres, down 13 percent from '68. Diversion payments at the maximum rate authorized by law will be offered to farmers for planting less than their acreage allotment and diverting this land to conserving uses. Details on the program are or soon will be available from county ASCS

offices.

For continued flower production throughout the summer and fall, don't neglect your rose bushes. Continue to use a disease and insect control program. A preventive spray of folpet every 7 to 10 days will prevent blackspot and help control mildew. An application of complete fertilizer scattered over the surface of the rose bed at the rate o fone to two pounds of 10-8-6 or 16-20-0 per 100 square feet of bed area every four weeks will insure continued growth and strong canes for late summer and fall bloom. To conserve moisture and reduce soil temperatures, the use of a two to three inch mulch of sawdust, shavings, pine straw, cotton burrs, or

ing the situation is the investments of American industries overseas. It is one thing to place quotas and tariffs on foreign owned and produced goods. It is another to limit shipment of goods produced abroad by our own industries. A case in point is petroleum products. Until the late 1940's and early 1950's the United States was a net exporter of petroleum products. Commencing at about this time we became a net importer. With the opening of the vast oil fields in the Middle East; with heavy involvement by our own major oil companies; with uncontrolled production and wages at 28c a day, our independent oil operators have been in trouble ever since.

In 1957 a mandatory import oil program was passed by the Congress, limiting imports of foreign crude oil to 12.2 per cent of domestic production.

The law was based on national security considerations. In time of war or disruption such as occurred in the Middle East and the lack of the use of the Suez Canal, which has since twice occurred, it has proved the proposition that we should not permit our domestic industry to deterio-
