

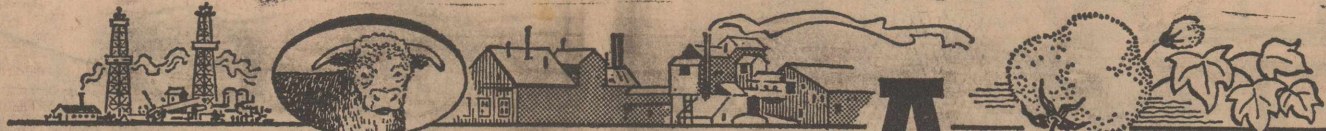

## Fire Damages New School Bldg.

Fire of undetermined origin did considerable damage to the new high school auditorium late Thursday afternoon. Workmen had stopped work some 2 hours before the smoke was discovered. It apparently originated in insulation material on the floor. No official estimate was available at press time, but reports give some \$15,000 damage. The Fire Dept. did a good job in holding the blaze and stood by for several hours after extinguished. School officials state that the auditorium probably will not be ready for use by school opening, but this will not delay the opening as classrooms suffered no damage.

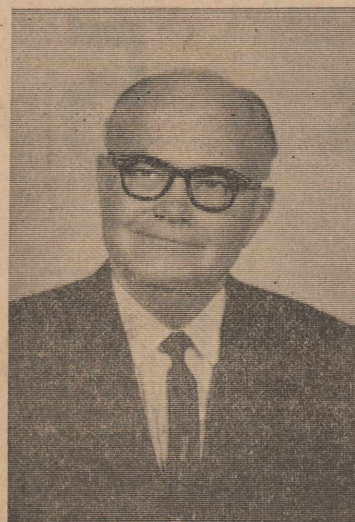

## 4-H Members To State Lab

Fisher County Extension Agents Mrs. Alice Ballenger and Richard A. Spencer have announced the names of the six 4-H club members who have been chosen to attend the State 4-H Club Junior Leadership Laboratory at Brownwood July 29 - August 3. The Lab is sponsored by Pennzoil United, Inc. in cooperation with the Texas Cooperative Extension Service.

## Local Youth Is Hero in Recent Lake Tragedy

We read of the tragic drowning of L. D. Rush of Hobbs, N.M. in Lake Sweetwater, July 4th, and the rescue of Mrs. Rush when their boat swamped, but the hero of the tragedy was not immediately named.

This week in a letter to Editor of Sweetwater Reporter, Mrs. Rush had found, several days after the rescue that a Rotan youth, Ronnie Kincaid had saved her life in swimming to her, and to safety. He is son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Kincaid of Rotan. Mrs. Rush in her letter below states that she would like to help with a scholarship for Ronnie in appreciation.

Since Ronnie is a 17-year old Senior in the 1968-69 Rotan Senior Class we feel that some of our civic organizations would take the project of completing the scholarship Mrs. Rush has started. We also feel sure the Hobbs community, where Ronnie was born and attended school until recently, would like to have a part on such move.

Ronnie and his family are very modest, and his heroism probably would have never been made public, but for Mrs. Rush showing her appreciation. She had difficulty in finding who had rescued her. Ronnie just thought he was doing what he should, regardless of endangering his own life—he was feared in such atmosphere. This act should give us renewed faith in our youth — not judging all by a very small minority of off-beats.

It's the American way of life to show appreciation when someone endangers his own life to save a fellowman, and since we now have it at home, we'll be happy to help any organization on a move.

Mrs. Rush's letter: Editor,

July 4th of this year, my husband drowned in Lake Sweetwater. Throughout all the tragic hours during and following the accident, many kind people in Sweetwater did all possible to help his family.

We particularly are grateful to excellent officials, Mr. Patterson of the funeral home personnel at Simmons Memorial Hospital and the James Rycroft family. Just how to convey this gratitude, we do not know.

If you can, I need your assistance in some small form of recognition to Ronnie Kincaid of Rotan, Texas, the 17-year old boy who pulled me from the water. There is no truly effective way I can thank him for saving my life — as a small token, I should like to start, if the conditions warrant, or add to his scholarship fund or plans for college. Since we are not wealthy I was thinking in terms of \$250. This is a pittance, I realize, but I have known young men who had scholarships of such an amount to complete their educations based on this as a start.

Since we live in Hobbs and I work, I should appreciate your help in the initial development of recognizing Ronnie, as well as some note of appreciation to the fine people of Sweetwater for their help in a truly distressing time.

**WHAT IS CONTOURING?**  
Contour farming is one of the easiest and most widely used conservation practices. It is the use of plows moving across a piece of land. When a farmer farms on the contour, he ignores the straight boundaries and rows, and follows curved lines whenever necessary to stay on the contour.

Contour farming should be used in combination with crop rotations, grassed waterways, fertilizers and returning organic matter to the soil. Contouring alone will not stop erosion but it reduces it nearly 50 per cent on a wide range of soil. Steepness of slope is important, as well as the crop grown and the condition of the soil.

There are other advantages of contour farming. In low-rainfall areas it helps hold and conserve rainfall. Farmers have found that it saves power, time, and wear on machinery.

## COUNTY AGENT NEWS

Drills, saws, sanders, and other electric hand tools are convenient and useful devices, but they can also be dangerous if used carelessly.

Such tools must be positively grounded for safe use as the ordinary voltages that power them can be fatal. If an ungrounded tool is used, its frame can become charged, and the current could go through the operator's body to the grounded surface he happens to be touching. This could be any mineral surface upon which he is standing, or any metal he touches.

Your safety is worth taking the time to check your tools to make sure that the frames aren't being charged. Water on the trigger switch, carbon from motor brushes, or broken or loose parts inside a motor case of the trigger switch, can all cause trouble. So can loose cord connections or worn or defective cords.

A three-wired cord and a three pronged-plug should be a part of every electric hand-tool you own or use. The third wire is used only as a ground to provide a better path for the current instead of through your body. Remember that the outlet must also be grounded. Otherwise, the ground wire remains unconnected.

It isn't necessary to throw away those extra flower and vegetable seeds left from spring plantings. If properly cared for, many seeds can be held over for next season use with very little loss of germination and plant vigor. Seeds to be held over for next year's use should be air dry and placed in glass jars with air tight lids. The sealed jars should be kept where the temperature will range from 35 to 55 degrees F. A refrigerator or cool basement are the most satisfactory places to meet these requirements.

ducton throughout the summer and fall, don't neglect your rose bushes. Continue to use a disease and insect control program. A preventive spray of folpet every 7 to 10 days will prevent black-spot and help control mildew.

An application of complete fertilizer scattered over the surface of the rose bed at the rate of one to two pounds of 10-8-6 or 16-20-0 per 100 square feet of bed area every four weeks will insure continued growth and strong canes for late summer and fall bloom.

To conserve moisture and reduce soil temperatures, the use of two to three inch mulch of sawdust, shavings, pine straw, cotton burs or other organic matter will help a great deal. As the mulch decomposes, it should be replaced.

Avoid mowing wet grass whenever possible. Dry grass cuts easier, does not ball up and clog the mower and gives a more finished appearance to the lawn.

For longer lasting cut flowers, cut them in the late afternoon or early evening. Avoid collecting them during the heat of the day. Place freshly cut flowers in a container of warm water and place in a draft free place until the water cools to room temperature. Flowers are then ready to use in any arrangement.

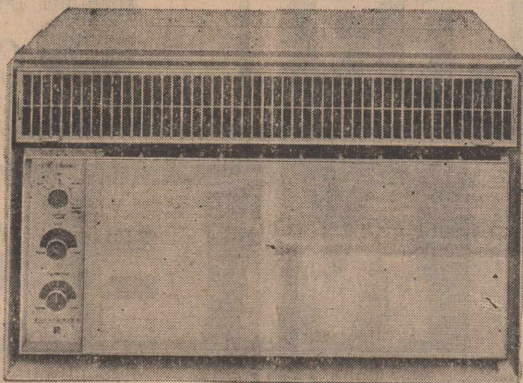

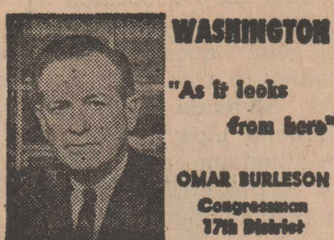

which those of us from Texas may have, are quick to comment upon the orderliness, its cleanliness, its courtesy, its lack of ballyhoo, which might otherwise be expected.

There is, however, one critical note. It has come under attack from numerous sources. It is the controversy of the film "Confluence USA" at the United States Pavilion. What does that mean? A coming together of peoples, a joining of forces—everything, nothing - but officials of the Department of Commerce, the Agency under whose jurisdiction comes exhibitions, fairs and expositions, say that "world's fair films are not suppose to mean, they are suppose to be, like laughter or morning dew." When Mrs. Lyndon Johnson saw the film she is quoted as saying "It lacks the element of hope." Former Ambassador Ed Clark, now Commissioner of the United States Pavilion at HemsFair, said "They had to pack up a thousand good things in America to find one of its bad things to show."

Not all officials of our Government nor our citizens think it is bad. Some view it as a great film that just sweeps down on you and says "Look America—Look what you are doing to yourself." At a bend in the corridor on leaving the theatre, you see yourself on television with the caption "Are you a part of the problem?" and at the next turn another television picture of yourself above which is "Are you a part of the solution?"

This comes about because after the film has shown many wonders of the United States—its great productive capacity, its beauties of nature, its enterprising people, its great flowing rivers and lakes, majestic peaks, waving fields of grain to feed millions in the world, its pulsing industry — comes the seamy side. It shows hunder and want, poor people and the disadvantaged, streams polluted by the refuse of our industrial plants, as well as the air from automobiles and smokestacks. It shows dead automobiles covering acres in junkyards; a newly married couple spend most of the day and night stuck in a freeway raffic jam in some great city.

The controversy, simply stated, is why show the bad or "seamy" side of America and does it mean that to not show it is a denial it exists. Several years ago, when Edgar R. Murrow was appointed Director of the United States Information Agency for our Government's propaganda overseas, he introduced the idea that we should portray America exactly as it is to foreign peoples. When questioned on this policy his reply was that we must not deny to foreigners that we do not have problems and that to honestly reveal them would be greater cause for them to believe the good things. Many of us disagree and questioned him at length.

A good salesman never says "You don't want to buy any of this, do you?" He extols the virtues of his product. Advertising people try to put in words, music or pictures the merits of what they are trying to sell to make people want to buy.

To withhold the seamy side of America is not to deny we have a lot of it. But the point is that by portraying the best, it emphasizes the system of Government which is able to produce more things for more people and where people are better off than any other place on the face of the earth.

It is not so important that we have more automobiles, more telephones, bathtubs, television sets and just about everything else than all the rest of the world put together. It is important to sell the idea that a free democratic society and a free enterprise system, made possible these wondrous accomplishments. It does not mean that our Nation is perfect but like individuals, we work toward perfection.

The article had suggested that employees bring their last year's W-2 form and proof of their age. It also suggested they file their application three months before they retire. Another article in the Advance suggested that all people born in Texas in 1903 or later write to Austin to see if they had a birth certificate as the state has a record of most births since that time. Mr. Clark wrote to the Bureau of Vital Statistics in Austin and found he did have a birth certificate. He had always assumed he did not have one.

**WHAT IS CONSERVATION?**

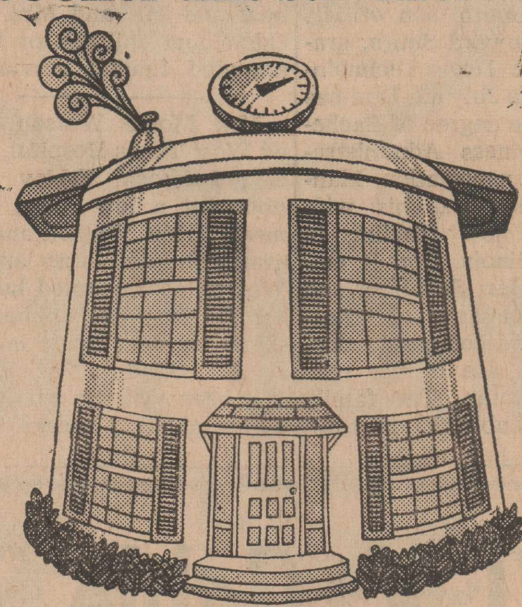

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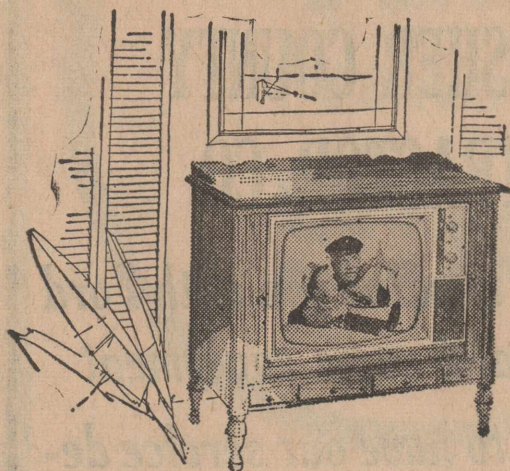
