Proposed Constitutional Amendment—Authorizing Legislature to Grant Confederate Pensions Regardless of Date Pensioner Came to Texas or When Widow Married Pensioner or When She Was Born.

H. J. R. No. 15.
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION.
Proposing an amendment to Section 51, Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing a tax levy for Confederate soldiers and sailors and their widows, and providing for the payment of pensions for the widows of such soldiers and sailors in this State at any election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1928, and providing the necessary proclamation and appropriation to defray expenses of proclamation, publication and election.
Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
Section 1. That Section 51, of Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:
"The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public moneys to any individual, association of individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever; provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors under such regulations and limitations as may be deemed by the Legislature as expedient; and to their widows in indigent circumstances under such regulations and limitations as may be deemed by the Legislature as expedient; to indigent and disabled soldiers, sailors and their widows who are in indigent circumstances, and who are or may be eligible to receive aid under such regulations and limitations as may be deemed by the Legislature as expedient; and also grant for the establishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sailors, their wives and widows and women who aided in the Confederacy, under such regulations and limitations as may be provided for by law; provided the Legislature may provide for husband and wife to remain together in the home. There is hereby levied in addition to all other taxes heretofore permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a State ad valorem tax on property of seven (\$0.07) cents on the one hundred (\$100) dollars valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the payment of pensions for services in the Confederate army and navy, frontier organizations and the militia of the State of Texas, and for the widows of such soldiers serving in said armies, navies, organizations of militia, provided that the Legislature may reduce the tax rate herein levied, and provided further, that the provisions of this section shall not be construed so as to prevent the grant of aid in cases of public calamity."
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1928, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon "For the constitutional amendment authorizing aid to Confederate soldiers and sailors and their widows in indigent circumstances, and authorizing tax levies therefor, and against the constitutional amendment authorizing aid to Confederate soldiers and sailors and their widows in indigent circumstances and authorizing tax levies therefor." Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses or the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote or the proposed amendment.
Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The sum of \$5,000.00 or so much thereof as may be needed is hereby appropriated for the expense of publication of said Amendment Approved by the Governor, March 30, 1927.

Proposed Constitutional Amendment Providing for a State Board of Education and Relating to Terms of School Officers.

H. J. R. No. 14.
Proposing an amend Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto Section 16, providing that the term of all officers of the public free school system, including State institutions of higher education, may be fixed not to exceed six years; proposing to amend Section 8 of Article 7 of the Constitution, authorizing the appointment or election of a State Board of Education to serve not to exceed six years; requiring said amendments to be submitted to the people for adoption and making appropriations therefor.
Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
Section 1. That Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 16 as follows:
"The Legislature shall fix by law the terms of all officers of the public school system and of the State institutions of higher education, inclusive, and the terms of members of the respective boards, not to exceed six years."
Sec. 2. That Section 8 of Article 7 of the Constitution be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:
"The Legislature shall provide by law for a State Board of Education, whose members shall be appointed or elected in such manner and by such authority and shall serve for such terms as the Legislature shall prescribe not to exceed six years. The said board shall perform such duties as may be prescribed by law."
Sec. 3. The foregoing constitutional amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State, at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1928, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:
(1) "For the amendment to Article 7, adding Section 16, providing that school officers, including boards of institutions of higher education, shall serve for a term not exceeding six years."
(2) "Against the amendment to Article 7, adding Section 16, providing that school officers, including boards of institutions of higher education, shall serve for a term not exceeding six years."
(3) "For the amendment to Section 8 of Article 7 of the Constitution, providing for the appointment of a State Board of Education."
Against the amendment to Section 8 of Article 7 of the Constitution, providing for the appointment of a State Board of Education."
Each voter shall scratch out one of the above listed clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment to which it relates.
Sec. 4. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation ordering an election to determine whether or not the proposed constitutional amendments set forth hereon shall be adopted, and to have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. And the sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated from any funds in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of printing said proclamation and of holding said election.
Approved by Governor March 25, 1927.

D. 1928, in a suit numbered on the docket of said Court No. 308A wherein Marie Whigham is plaintiff and Homer Whigham is defendant.
The nature of plaintiffs demand being as follows, to-wit: Plaintiff sues defendant for divorce on account of cruel and outrageous treatment, alleging that

WILBARGER POOL BEING ELECTRIFIED
Electrification of the New Consolidated Pool in Wilbarger county, Texas, is well under way and indications are that this big oil field will shortly join the ranks of the many fields in West Texas which are electrified almost exclusively.
Work of tapping the 66,000-volt high line running from Vernon to Holiday carrying the power into the Wilbarger field over a 12,000-volt aluminum transmission line, has already begun.
The West Texas Utilities Company also is constructing a 1,000 kva 66-12 kv latticed steel substation at the east side of the H & T C railroad's property.
The new high lines and substation will be capable of furnishing an unlimited supply of power to this field. It is believed that within a short time the New Consolidated Pool in Wilbarger will rank electrically along with the Noodle Creek field, where nearly 30 wells, either drilling or pumping, all but three are using electric power.
The service is being extended at once to the Simms Oil Company's leases and others for electric pumping and drilling. There are now approximately 30 drilling wells using steam rotary rigs in this field.

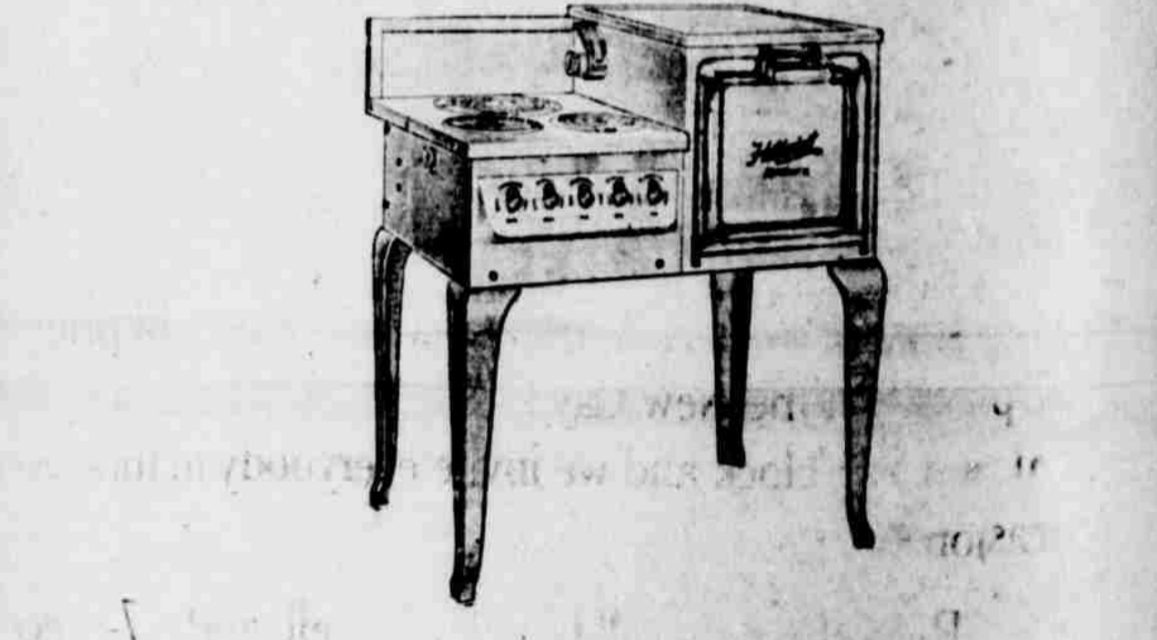

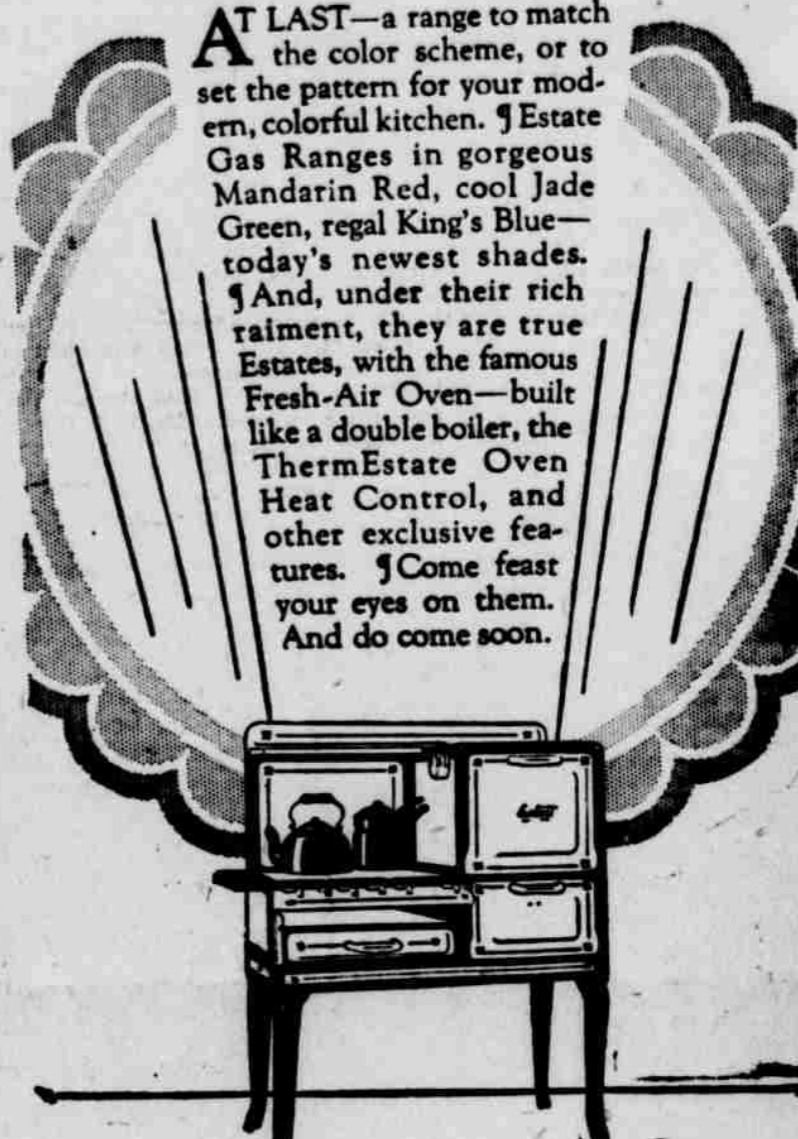

TELLING THE WORLD

Outside and Inside Dope on Haskell County People As Told By Our Rambling Representative.

We are glad to give a little more information regarding the International Poultry Show which we attended at Ardmore, Okla. last week. We believe our people are entitled to know just how Texas is progressing in all lines, but of course this mention here is in poultry production, but Texas is there with the goods in many other lines.

Final Results of the Show
With the final awards at the International Poultry Show which closed at Ardmore Saturday night, one fact stood out indisputable—that Texas is coming into its own as a poultry State.

Approximately 2,300 birds were entered in the show from as far north as Maine; birds from California; birds from West Virginia, Mississippi, Louisiana, Oklahoma—in fact birds from 24 different States in the Union. Twenty-six silver cups, as well as many cash prizes were offered as sweepstake specials. One of the most beautiful trophies ever offered a poultry exhibitor was that donated by United State Senator W. B. Pine for the best pen of birds in the show, all varieties competing.

Every exhibitor looked with longing eyes upon the Pine trophy—it became the goal of all goals.

After the regular awards were made, the sweepstake judges began their tremendous task of elimination, and when the smoke of battle cleared away, the four pens that remained in the race for the cup were "ALL-TEXAS" pens.

They were: Best pen in American class, S. C. Rhode Island Reds from the Coffman Farms, Josephine; best pen in English class, Dark Cornish, belonging to Harris & Williams, Fort Worth; best pen, Asiatic class, Black Langshans belonging to C. C. Squires, Irving; best pen in Mediterranean class, Black Minorcas, belonging to Harry, Kettle, Dallas.

The final decision was in favor of Kettle's Black Minorcas, giving him the champion pen of the entire show as well as Senator Pine's much to be desired silver trophy. The Coffman Reds were next in line, winning the silver cup offered by Governor Johnson of Oklahoma for second pen, all varieties competing.

Big Prizes for Texas.

Not only were the grand prize and the Governor's cup carried off by Texas exhibitors, but Kettle's Black Minorcas were awarded four additional silver cups and \$10 in gold, as well as a goodly share of the cash awards, he winning cash award for the best black bird in the show, best cock and best pen of the Mediterranean class, best display of Minorcas, best display of Mediterranean class, etc., placing 51 birds out of 53 under the ribbon.

The Coffman Farm Reds also brought home four silver cups in addition to the Governor's cup and many cash awards. The Rhode Island Red class was the largest class in the entire show, there being approximately 200 Reds on exhibit, but the Coffman Farm won every blue. They won the cash awards for best cock, American class; best cockerel, best pullet and best pen, American class; best colored male and female of the Red class; best shaped male and female of the Red class. They placed 27 birds under the ribbon out of an entry of 29 birds.

World Judges Present.

Inasmuch as this international show was held in conjunction with the annual convention of the American Poultry Association, poultry judges were present from all over the United States as well as Canada and Cuba, and they were unanimous in their praise, not only of the quantity but the quality of the birds on exhibit.

Walter Krone of York, Pa., stated that he had attended the Madison Square Garden Show for many years, but that it had nothing on the International Poultry Show for quality and type. It is significant, therefore, that Texas birds should enter the worldwide competition in a show of such proportions and be able to "bring home the bacon" in the form of the grand champion trophy of the show, as well as practically half of all cash specials and half the silver cup awards, in addition to their share of the regular show premiums. In the parlance of the day, we feel like we are beginning to "know our poultry."

Texas Poultry Prospect.

It is true that "What Texas makes makes Texas," and Texas soil, sunshine, feeds and care have made these champions of the poultry kingdom—but they, in turn, are making Texas the coming poultry State of the entire United States!

Haskell county had nothing in the show, but within her confines there are some of the best birds in the United States. Mr. Applegate who was a member of our party to attend the show has some Buff Wyandottes as good as we saw in the show. This was not our opinion but it was the belief of a poultry judge who judged his birds in the Haskell county fair last season and he has some better birds this season than he had last year. We wish to see our county in the lime light with the states best breeders which means also the world's best breeders. Climate, feed and every condition favors, Texas and Haskell County is the place around which all the other sections hinge.

A Visit to the J. O. Jackson Farm

Last Friday morning the writer accompanied by Wesley Applegate drove out to the J. O. Jackson Poultry farm. Although Mr. Jackson has a number of good farms from which he grows the staple crops of this section, yet he is not noted for that, but the fact is he has developed the poultry industry and has proven beyond question that it will pay when poultry is looked after. He has not left it to guessing that it pays, but he is keeping books on every minute phase of the business and knows what he is doing and his word can not be doubted.

He is breeding the White Leghorn for egg production alone and there is where he is getting his profit. He stated in the brief time that we were in his home that his hens were making him a living.

He is not leaving it to the hens to provide their feed and shelter but he has the very best for them and it is provided by him, but the hens are paying for it. A visit to his place will convince you.

A Visit to the J. W. Driskill Farm

Accompanied by County Agent Trice we visited the J. W. Driskill farm west of Rule last Friday afternoon. It is always inspiring to visit this home for many reasons. It is one of the best kept homes in the county. Everything about the place is given personal attention by Mr. and Mrs. Driskill. They have recently built a new 7 room stucco residence which is very beautiful and modern in every respect. His crops of cotton and feed are very good. On this farm is some of the best maize we have seen growing in the county this year. Mr. Trice made a thorough examination of the cotton and he could not find any sign of worms except a slight appearance of boll worms, but they were not numerous enough to do any serious damage. This family raises their

chicken for the supply of their own hogs for their meat and lard, cows for their milk and butter and plenty of feed for all live stock on the farm. Some of the folks on the farm had already begun to head the fine maize crop. Mr. and Mrs. Driskill have berries, all kinds of garden vegetables that grow in this climate. Blackeyed peas vines of all ages, some bearing and some just above the ground from last planting. Mr. Driskill never buys anything that he can grow on his farm. Above all things he plants plenty of feed and keeps plenty to run him all the year round. He has some fine sweet potatoes growing this year. He has some good melons and he cut two nice ones and we had a real feast while we were there. It's a real inspiration to visit this home.

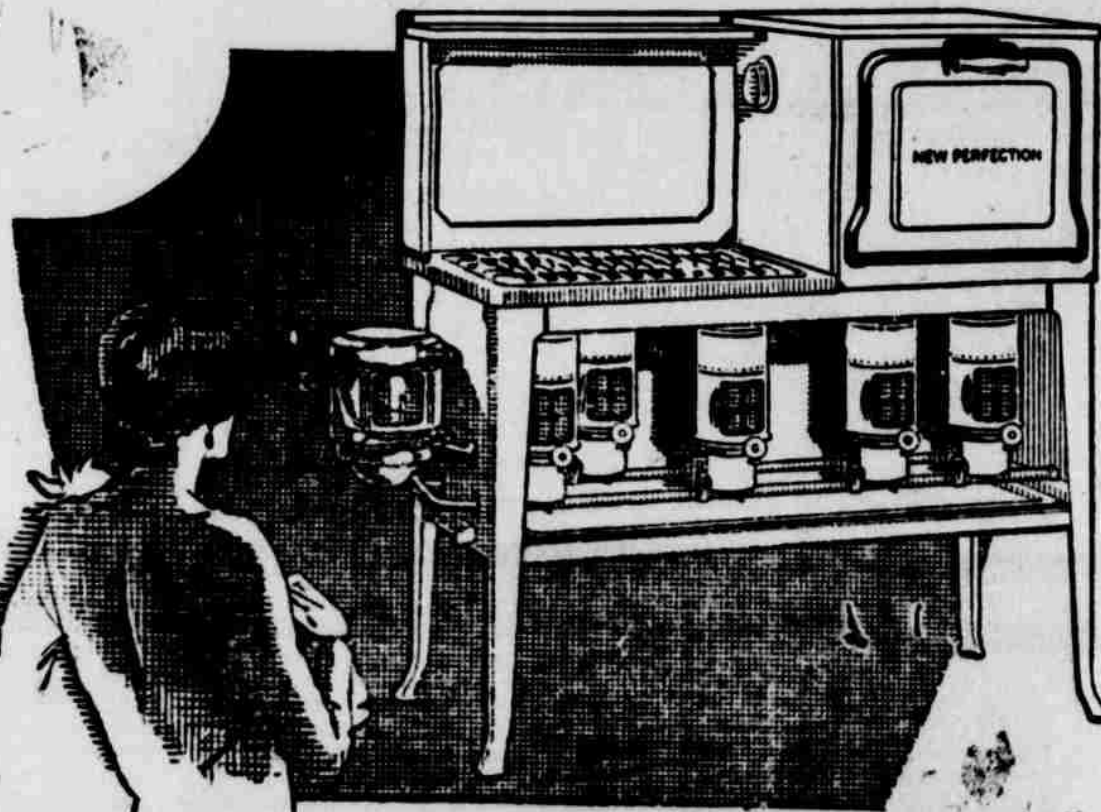
