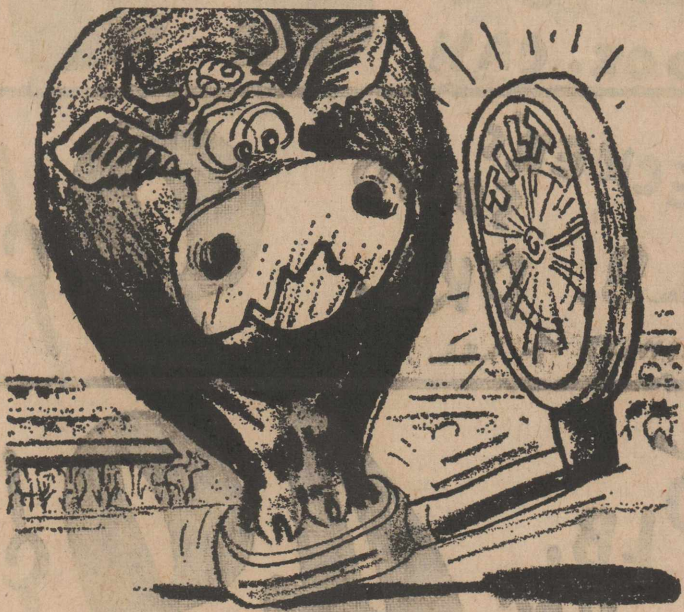

Equipment used for the application of herbicides should be properly cleaned following each use. Cleaning equipment that has been used to apply a water soluble chemical requires only a thorough flushing and rinsing with water. But, equipment that has been used for phenoxy herbicides such as 2, 4-D, 2, 4, 5-T, silvex, erbon or MCPA is more difficult to clean and requires one of the following methods (For hand sprayers or field equipment).

Method 1 (Amonia Rinse)

1. Add a box of nonsudsing detergent to 30 to 40 gallons of water, run through the pump, and bypass for five minutes. Discharge the solution through the boom.

2. Partly fill the tank with a solution of 1 percent to 2 percent household ammonia (1 to 2 quarts in 25 gallons of water or two teaspoons per quart). Leave this solution in the sprayer (including hoses and boom) overnight, drain and rinse thoroughly with water.

Method 2 (Charcoal Rinse)

1. Use at least one-third of a tank of water. For each 10 gallons of water, add one-quarter pound of activated charcoal and one-eighth to one-quarter pound of laundry detergent. Agitate vigorously to distribute the charcoal through the water.

2. Wash the equipment for two minutes by swirling the liquid around so that it reaches all parts of the tank. Pump some of the liquid through the hose and nozzles.

3. Drain the tank and flush the system with clean water. Since rinse water may damage plants, clean sprayers away from all desirable plants. Spray equipment used to apply herbicides should be used only for herbicide application.

Proper care of spray equipment prior to storage will prevent deterioration and insure a working condition for next season's use. Scrub the sprayer with a stiff bristle brush. Coat all iron parts exposed to the chemical with a rust inhibitor or light oil. Remove caps from the ends of

booms and stand them on end to remove sediment. Remove, clean and reassemble filters.

If the sprayer is powered with a gas engine, drain fuel tank and carburetor and pour a tablespoon of engine oil through spark plug hole. Turn motor over by hand to distribute oil on cylinder walls.

If the sprayer is to be stored outside, remove rubber hoses and keep in a cool dark place. Proper care of equipment will extend the period of trouble free operation.

From 1960-1967, the number of farms in the U.S. declined 23 percent. But, while those with less than \$2,500 annual sales declined by 27% those in the \$2,500 to \$4,999 sales category declined 42% and those in the \$5,000 to \$9,999 declined 23% during the period, those with farm sales of \$10,000 to \$20,000 decreased only 1%. And those with farm sales of \$20,000 to \$40,000 increased by 40%; and those with sales over \$40,000 and more rose by 62 percent.

The USDA report said farms in the largest three categories accounted for only 31.5% of all farms in 1967, they accounted for 85.1% of cash receipts from farming, more than 75% of the realized net income from farming.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR49)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 21 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"Section 21. All stationery and printing, except proclamations and such printing as may be done at the Texas School for the Deaf, and paper, except that for the Judicial Department, shall be furnished under contract, to be given to the lowest and best bidder under such regulations as shall be prescribed by law. No member or officer of any department of the government shall be in any way interested in such contract."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on

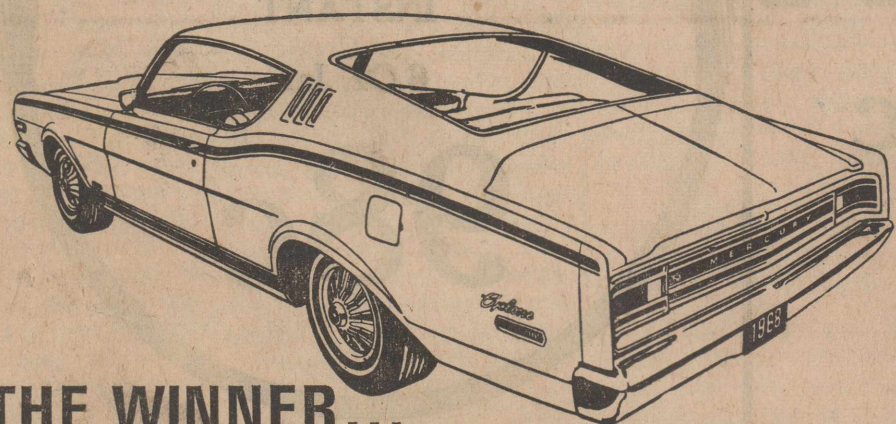
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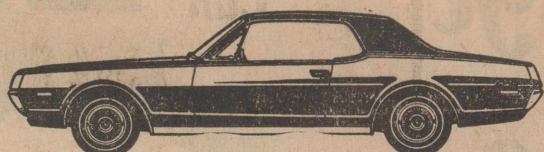
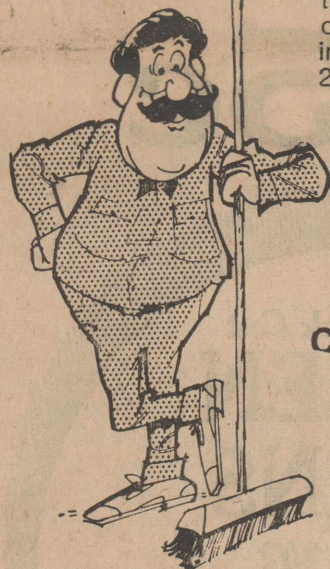

Insect Report No. 11

Emory P. Boring III Area Entomologist

Situation at a glance—Boll weevil populations continue to increase in fields where no control measures have been applied. Bollworms are causing moderate damage to cotton in several Rolling Plains counties.

Boll Weevils — Medium to heavy boll weevil damage was present in Cottle and Childress counties during the past week. Square damage reported from fields in these two counties ranged from 25 to 95 percent boll weevil punctured squares. Medium square damage (20 to 30 percent punctured squares) was observed in Wilbarger, Hardeman, Mitchell, Jones, Wichita, Collingsworth and Fisher counties.

Bollworms — Medium bollworm damage was found in fields in Jones, Wichita, Wilbarger and Cottle counties. Light damage was observed in Mitchell, Nolan, Childress, Collingsworth, Hall, Fisher and Schleicher counties. Increased bollworm egg deposition was observed in Baylor County, especially in irrigated cotton.

Other Insects — In Cottle County stink bugs were found in heavy populations, causing damage to young bolls. Aphids were observed in heavy spotted populations in Jones County. Light populations of cotton square borers were found in fields in Collingsworth, Wilbarger and Hall counties.

For control recommendations, refer to L-508 (1968), Texas Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects in the High Plains, Rolling Plains and Trans-Pecos Areas of Texas. Copies of this guide may be picked up at the office of the County Agricultural Agent.

The information used in the Rolling Plains Cotton Insect Report is compiled from local reports sent in by County Agricultural Agents, personnel of Texas A&M University System, branches of the USDA, chemical companies, and cotton producers. We hope that everyone who does any field checking will send us a report of the situation as he finds it.
