SEVEN DEADLY SINS--NO. 3

COVETOUSNESS

"Thou shalt not covet thy neighbor's house, thou shalt not covet thy neighbor's wife, nor his manservant, nor his maidservant, nor his ox, nor his ass, nor anything that is thy neighbor's." Exodus 20:17. This is the tenth com-mandment of the decologue. This is the only one of the commandements which treats solely of a sin of the mind and heart. In so doing it strikes at the very root of sin.

Covetousness is not a mere desire for more. It is an inordinate desire. This is an immoderate, excessive or disordered desire for more. It is that desire that is uncontrollable by reason, or conscience, or the word of God. It is a desire to gain for self, at the expense of others, at the expense of higher and better things. The parable of the rich man who "laid up treasures for himself and was not rich toward God" (Luke 12:21) is a good Bible example. Our Lord prefaced this parable with this statement: "Beware of covetousness: for a man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things which he possesseth." Luke 12:15.

The apostle Paul says in Colossion 3:5 that "covetous-ness is idolatry." This means that when one practices covetousness the covetousness secures the affections which properly belong to God, and is, therefore idolatry. Of all the basic passions, this is the one that MOST dethrones God from the soul.

Covetousness is the root of all crimes, oppressions and wrongs of all kinds. Covetousness makes a fiend out of a person. It is disastrous to character and will eternally damn the soul! Are you covetousness? If so you must repent or perish. Luke 13:3.
