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Conservation

Effective conservation of all our soil and water resources must be planned. Spur-ofthe-moment action to meet urgent problems will never give us full and complete protection along with maximum use of these resources. The very complexity of the probems involved demands that carefully thought out plans be made before extensive conservation operations are begun.

The farm or ranch is the basic unit on which conservation planning must begin. It is true that farm or ranch conservation plan is will not take effect until munities gain access to all only the beginning and it is of little value unless the cooperator's decisions are carplan seeks to put adequate adapted for use in small ried out. But the importance of the plan lies in fact that he needed land use changes and conservaion practices seldom will be applied in the right sequence without a good plan. That is why soil and range conservationists stress the importance of sound conservation planning.

There is nothing wrong with applying suitable conservation practices one at a time, provided each contributes toward a coordinated program. In fact, most conservation programs are carried out by applying single practices as they are needed; .e., in accordance with plans. But the application of single unrelated practices may increase the conservation risks of a whole farm or ranch instead of solving the problems if they do not fit into a coordinated plan for the entire

Conservation planning is decision making, based upon or land use and treatment. The farmer or rancher should participate in developing, with the help of the assisting technician, the most practical, sound alternatives for use and treatment. Then he will be able to make a sound plan. in line with his desires and financial resources.

Assisting farmers and ranchers in conservation planning is one of the duties of soil and range conservationists employed by USDA Soil Conservation Service.
