Shallow water at the edges is troublesome. It grows undesirable weeds and protects too many little fish from the bass. A minimum depth of 18-24 inches is good but 3 feet is better. Getting rid of shallow places is worth more than it costs.

The watershed should be vegetated to protect the pond from silt. Silt fills the pond and muddy water reduces fish populations. If ivestock muddy the pond by wading, the pond should be fenced, otherwise livestock help to control weeds and grass along the water's edge.



now is the time to give vege- Hereford heifers. table and flower gardens a head start next spring. The job that will do it is the destruction of the winter homes of disease-causing organisms.

Many gardeners, although the growing season, are not self-propelled combines. always aware that the pests causing the trouble remain alive during the winter. Much like the plants they attack, these organisms, such as fungi, bacteria and nematades, become dormant during the

By knowing the places where these pests spend the winter, they can be reduced in numbers or even destroyed, thus eliminating much of their damage next spring and sum-

Favorite overwintering home for the trouble makers are dead or diseased plant parts. The fungus causing black spot of roses overwinters on dead, infested leaves. Namatodes, though capable of surviving in the soil, can overwinter in much larger numbers in the roots of infected plants not destroyed in the fall. Bacteria causing diseases such as soft rot of potatoes spend the winter in cull piles or other plant re-

It is suggested that fallen leaves and branches be raked and burned. The stubble and roots of plants removed from the garden should also be destroyed. A good cleanup job done now will not only put you ahead next spring, but can also reduce next spring and summer's disease

Two new cases of screwworms were confirmed in the county last week and two more cases are pending. Cases were confirmed on the J. J. Anderson ranch near Trent and on the Floyd Noles farm located nine miles south west of Rotan, Cases are expected to be on the increase until frost.

8. In closely controlled studies grain reconstituted in ground form has failed to show the improvement in feed efficiency shown by grain reconstituted in whole form.

9. Reconstituting ground grain to 20, 30 or 40 percent moisture for 24 hours before feeding failed to increase feed efficiency as compared with dry grain.

10. Whole grain reconstitute for 10 days showed as much improvement in feed efficiency over dry grinds finthan does dry grain, and reconstituted for 5 days gave as much of this effect as for 20 days.

12. Water temperatures of 60 and 120 degrees F. caused no difference in the reconstituting effect in feeding. The rate of \$120 degrees water uptake by the grain was higher than of 60 degrees water during the first few dours but were essentially the same after 140 hours.

13. Varieties of sorghum grain differ significantly in digestibility of dry matter and protein as measured by in vivo and in vitro methods.

Two brown-seeded varieties showed lower values than six varieties without the brown pigment.

14. Ground moist sorghum heads (35-45% H-2 O) containing approximately 25-30 percent stems showed increased feed efficiency as compared with ground dry grain and when properly supplemented, were successfully used in all concentrate rations for finishing cattle.

16. As with dry grain, moist sorghum rations tend to be calculogenic to steers, but the condition can be successfully controlled by supplying 1.5 ounces of NH-4 CI per head daily in the feed for finishing steers. No dates are available on bulls.

17. Feeding Sudan grass as hay or haylage in growing and finishing rations for cattle caused no difference in animal performance but haylage gave higher acre production of weight gain than

18. Costal Bermuda and Alfalfa haylage (50 percent moisture) produced no essential differences in feedlot performance or carcass charac teristics of the cattle fed the two roughages.


