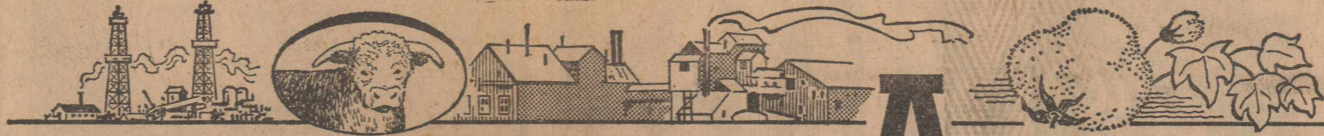

Betty Crocker Tests Dec. 3

A number of local high schools will join other schools across the nation in offering their senior class girls a written knowledge and attitude test on homemaking Dec. 3. With the test goes an opportunity to earn college scholarships.

Including local students, more than half a million senior girls representing some 15,000 of the nation's high schools will participate in the test on Dec. 3.

State winners will be given a \$1,500 scholarship and a chance to win one of four national awards ranging from \$5,000 for the girl chosen Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow, to \$4,000 for second place and \$3,000 and \$2,000 for third and fourth places respectively. Runners-up in every state will receive \$500 grants. The highest ranking girl in each local high school also will be awarded a specially designed silver charm.

This is the 15th year of the Betty Crocker Search, which General Mills, Inc., inaugurated in 1954-55 and has sponsored every year since.

National scholarship awards will be announced at a dinner in Williamsburg, Va., next spring when all the state winners and their school advisors will make an expense pair tour of that Colonial restoration as well as historical shrines in Washington, D. C.

Judging for national honors is based on original test scores plus personal observation and interviews while the girls are on tour. The program, designed to emphasize the importance of homemaking as a career, is the only national scholarship competition exclusively for high school senior girls. It is on the approval list of national contests and activities of the National Association of Secondary - School Principals.

Science Research Associates, Chicago, one of the nation's outstanding educational testing organizations, prepares the test and has charge of scoring and judging the contestants. Schools of state winners will be presented sets of Encyclopedia Britannica by Encyclopedia Britannica, Inc.

Rotan In Line For Air Port

Rotan is one of 5 area towns recommended by the Federal Aviation Administration as suited for new airports within a 5-year construction and improvement program.

Recommended as cities for basic utility airports were Anson, Winters, Munday, Rotan, and Stanton.

The Texas airport development projects included revision of its five year national Airport Plan are estimated to cost \$140,768,000, which will be provided mainly by state and local authorities.

All the new airports proposed in the program, which is aimed at relieving present airport congestion and accommodating further aviation growth were recommended for public ownership.

Approximately \$101,426,000 would be needed for new or improved airports for use by both scheduled airlines and general aviation and \$39,342,000 for airports used by general aviation only. About 205 Texas airports have been improved.

Tax Man Sam sez

The Commissioner of Internal Revenue gives these statistics on mathematical verification of individual tax returns in his Annual Report Summary for the Fiscal Year 1967:

* 65.4 million returns were mathematically verified;

* 3.9 million returns required correction;

* 2.4 million were taxpayer errors that caused the taxpayer to underpay his tax. IRS collected \$207.5 additional millions from these folks. However,

* 1.5 million made errors in favor of the government, and Internal Revenue refunded \$94.3 million to these taxpayers who had cheated themselves out of almost \$100 million through their own bad arithmetic.

This may not prove that most taxpayers would flunk grammar school arithmetic, but it seems to prove Internal Revenue's repeated warning: "Check it again carefully — before you mail it." That dollar you save will be your own.

Cotton Classing Passes Last Year

We've already classed more cotton this season than we did for the entire season last year. Last year we classed 260,000 samples during the entire season, and last week we bettered that mark by 20,000 cays B. B. Manly, Jr., officer in charge of the USDA Cotton Classing Office, Abilene.

Sample receipts have slowed down a little and for the past week we have been catching up anywhere from 2,000 to 3,000 samples per day. Last weeks classing total was 57,000 samples compared to 17,000 for the same week last year. This makes the seasons total 280,000 samples compared to 66,500 for a seasons total a year ago.

Grades changed last week with 45 per cent in the white category compared to 56 per cent for the previous week. Again, the remainder of 55 per cent were in the light spotted category Bark bales were up to 3 per cent last week compared to 1 per cent the previous week

Staple was up a little with 30, 33 per cent; 32, 14 per cent; 33, 5 per cent; 34, 3 per cent; and 4 per cent were 35 and longer.

Micronaire readings changed with 79 per cent in the premium or 3.5-4.9 range. Other readings were 3.0-3.2, 1 per cent; 3.3-3.4, 1 per cent; 5.0-5.2, 15 per cent; and 5.3 and above, 4 per cent.

Strength readings were down with 59 per cent reading 80,000 PSI (pounds per square inch) and above.

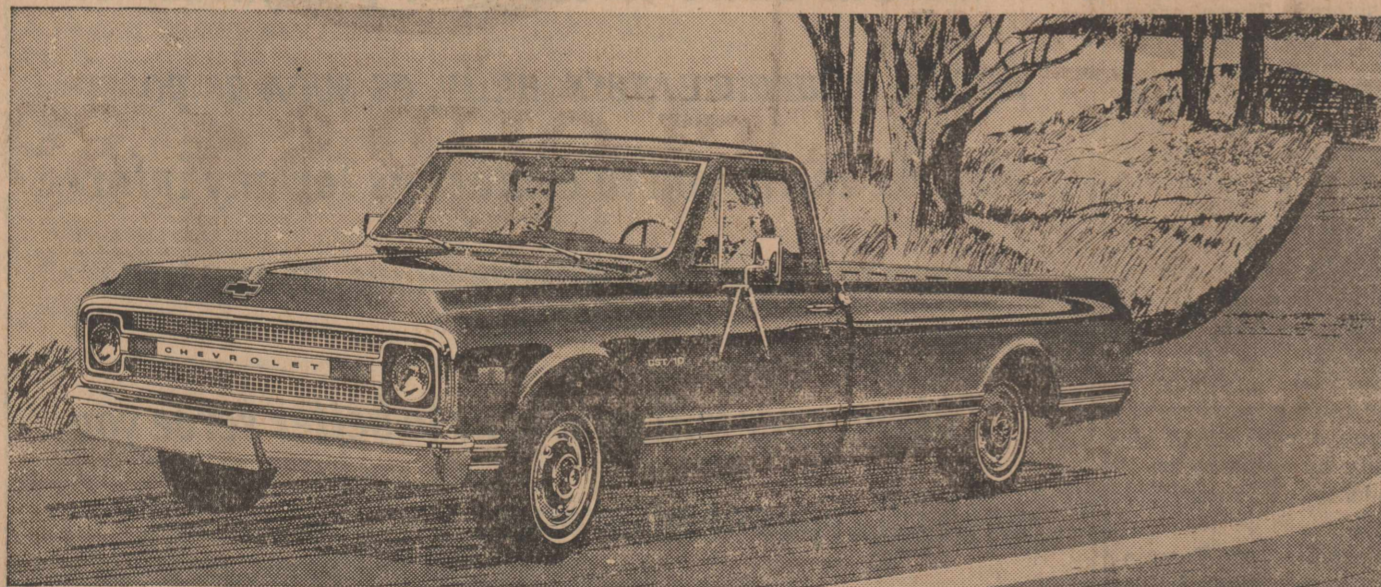
