

Kleingrass is easily established from seed, and seedling plants are sturdy, have good root development, but grow slowly initially. The seeds are low in viability immediately after harvest because of seed dormancy. Care should be taken to avoid planting freshly harvested seed. Viability increases with time and good germination is obtained after about six months.

Grazing should be restricted until new plants are well established. Also, because initial seedling development is slow, weed control in new

plantings is highly important. For best animal performance, kleingrass should be utilized before it is mature. It appears to tolerate rather close grazing, but may be damaged and animal performance reduced by extended periods of close grazing.



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
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
