

A few quick precautions can make your winter season more enjoyable. The best time to take these precautions is, of course, before the cold weather moves in, but it arately in determining the is never too late to:

\* Keep fresh air from getting to water pipes under the home by sealing off openings in the foundation ond other

\* Set heating system high enough to avoid freezing inside the house during short periods of absence.

\* Turn off water from outside the house and drain all pipes when planning to be away from home for longer

\* Insulate pumphouses or supply other heat with a r ular light bulb or heat lamphowever, don't rely on this vpe of heating if the pumphouse is poorly constructed. Wrap all exposed pipes

with heating tapes or cables, and take care to read all

directions with the devices.

You may not deduct the first \$100 loss to property held for personal use. Improvements to personal real property such as your residence, trees, shrubs and ornamentals are considered as an integral part of the property. A single loss is calculated by comparing the fair market value of the property as a whole before the casualty with its fair market value following the casualty, even if several items of personal real property are damaged. Damage to tangible personal property like autos, clothes, furniiture and household equipment is evaluated separately from personal real





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

### **Cotton Grades** Slightly Up

We are a little behind on classing says B. B. Manly, Jr., Officer in Charge, USDA Cotton Classing Office, Abilene. With the fair weather that prevailed last week, farmers were able to resume harvesting and our daily receipts again became greater than our daily classing totals. The fact that grades were up last week indicates that most producers are waiting for their cotton to dry before harvesting and ginning.

Grades were good with 33 percent in the white category, 62 per cent in the light spotted category and 5 percent in the spotted category. Seven per cent were called bark, the same as last week, and one per cent were called

about the same with 90 per cent falling in the 3.5-4.9 or premium range. Three per cent were 3.0-3.2; 3 per cent 3.3-3.4 and 4 per cent 5.0-

Strength readings were about the same with 62 per cent reading 80,000 PSI (pounds per square inch) and above.


