

From the beginning of time, man has offered excuses to God. For example Adam, Eve, Moses, Saul and the apostles all offeded excuses to God. People today are no different in basic human behaviour. Modern man continues to offer excuses to God. I hear them every day and you do too. "I'm too busy to go to church." "My job keeps me from obeying the Lord." "Sunday is my only day off and I need it to relax or persue my hobby." "Well I just didn't feel too well, so I stayed home." "You know how it is when the family drops in for a visit", "Preacher I would give to the church but you know what it takes now days to raise a family.", "I would obey the Lord but you know, it's just too hard to live the Christian life."

Do you see yourself in the above statements? Have you ever made them? Many excuses are offered to God today but NO ONE who is accountable has ONE REASON for rejecting to Lord or failing to do what he is able to do in the Lord's Church! Because a reason is valid or justification, and no one is ever justified in his own failure to obey the Lord and His will. Else why did Christ die? Was it in vain? It is for you if you "excuse" your way through life!


