# National Society Daughters of the American Revolution

### FEBURARY AS AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH

The month of February is observed annually as American History Month by the Daughters of the American Revolution. Many notable events have taken place in February, amongst them being the destruction of the Battleship Maine in 1898 in Havana Harbor; in 1899 the first U.S. Flag was raised on Guam; in 1945 General MacArthur entered Manilla, opening the way to regain the Philippines, and in 1962 the first manned orbital flight occurred with John Glen at the controls. February is the birth month of Presidents Washington, Harrison, and Lincoln, as well as of Thomas Edison.

One of the primary objjectives of DAR is to carry out the injunction of Washington in his Farewell Address to the American people. "To promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge." This has been done by establishing and financing two schools in isolated mountain areas, Tamassee DAR School in South Carolina, 1919, and in 1924, Kate Duncan Smith DAR SCHOOL in Alabama. There are over 1200 children enrolled at these two schools. The DAR also contributes to five other schools where children are taught who might not have had an opportunity for an education.
