

Hybrid tea roses may be oruned in mid-February i Central Texas. In North Tex as it should be delayed until late February or early March. If not severely pruned, roses will become large and difficult to care for, and the flowers will be small and of poor quality.

Cut the top growth back to 12 to 15 inches above the ground. Retain from 4 to 6 of the healthy canes arising from the bud union or within 4 to 6 inches above the union.

Remove all dead, diseased, injured twigs and branches as well as all the thin spindly growth frequently found at he base of the plant.

Prune climbing roses after the big flush of spring bloom two years old should be removed and last year's growth thinned.

The final step in pruning roses is to seal all cuts onetree wound paint containing an asphalt base. This material is relatively safe for concrete, asphalt, or brick surfaces and is much safer for your lawn and shrubs than the salt compounds so frequently used. In the absence of urea use any nitrogen type fertilizer rather than the customary salt application.

> Beautiful house plants are easy to grow and maintain if a few basic rules are followed. A thorough application of water should be applied so that the moisture will run through the pot into the saucer below the container. This prevents the buildup of soluble salts in the potting soil and insures a good root distribution throughout the soil ball. The excess moisture should be drained from the saucer so that it cannot be absorbed by the plant.

It is best to use water that is the same temperature as the room in order to prevent chilling of the plants.

Use fertilizer very sparingly throughout the winter months unless supplemental light is provided and the plant has good growing conditions.

House plants should not be placed directly in the air stream from heating ducts. Direct exposure to this hot dry air can cause extreme damage.
