
EAS ENWITHOUT THE MET

Veteran Land Program Is Increased To \$15,000

Texas Veterans' land program is effective April 24, 1975, according to Ed Deaton, Fisher County Service Officer.

How It Works- An eligible veteran selects a tract of land and then requests application material from the Veterans' Land Board, Stephen F. Austin Building, 17th and Congress, Austin, Texas 78701. After the Application and Contract of Sale is executed by the veteran and with the 5% down payment, fees, and the necessary papers. The land is appraised by the Board to determine the fair market value and a commitment is issued based on the appraised value. If the commitment is less than the contract price the difference in amount must be submitted to the Board or the contract amended The Board purchases the land in fee and simultaneously executes a 40year Contract of Sale and Purchase with the veteran. When the purchaser fulfills his contract he is issued a deed by the Board. Basic Provisions of Texas Vet-

eans' Land Program: 1. Eligibility - Purchaser a. Must have served at

least 90 days continuous active military duty, unless sooner discharged for reasons of service or a platted subdivision the connected disability after September 16, 1940.





Outdoorsmen, particular-ly campers, are constantly confronted with a rust problem. Hammers, saws, pliers, machettes, knives and all other metallic ob-jects made of iron or steel demand frequent attention. These items are pro-

tected from moisture by a surface coat of wax, silicone, paint or oil. How-ever, as these coatings wear off, from frequent use, they must be treated again and again.

Dampness in the air, dew, rain and spray all create rust. Saltwater spray and the saltwater itself are, of course, most demaging damaging.

Perspiration, because it is slightly acidic, is an-other cause of rust. All perspiration marks and other dampness should be other dampness should be wiped from any iron or steel items to keep them rust-free and in perfect working order. Tools and other like e quipment should be stored in warm areas when possible.

Maximum protection against rust is achieved by applying a thin coat-ing of oil to the metal, from time to time. Wrap-ping the object in a soft oily rag is an excellent idea. Sewing-machine oil

Two At Rotan **Complete Food** Service Course

Earlene Tankersley and La Medrle Denton, of Rotan, were among forty individuals who received certificates for successfully completing a 114 hour training course in food service supervision. Graduation ceremoneis were held Sunday, May 4. at the Abilene Christian College Campus Center.

Mrs. Tankersley is employed by the Fisher County Hospital and Mrs. Denton is employed at the Leisure Lodge Nursing Home in Rotan.

The course has national approval by the American Dietetic Association and is state approved by the Texas State Department of Health. Graduates of the course are now eligible to become members of the national organization for trained food service supervisors: The Hospital, Institution, and Educational Food Service Society.

Students must successfully complete both academic and on-the-job assignments to receive certificates. The main purpose of the course is to increase the knowledge and skills of the food service supervisors in health care institutions to that they may provide better and more effective patient care. A secondary benefit of the course is a general upgrading of the quality of kitchen management. The students are trained in leadership and supervisory skills such as communication, motivation, work improvement, and training methods. They study in detail sanitation measures, personal hygiene, and general housekeeping standards for quanity food service. Kitchen safety and fire prevention is also studied. The curriculum included training in menu planning, food purchasing and storage, principles of food preparation, and various methods of serving food to maintain temperature and quality. Special emphasis was given to the study of nutrition and planning of modified diets.
