Cottonseed Has Growing Food Industry Potential

Cottonseed has potential for much greater use in the food industry as the result of new developments already commercialized, according to Nation Cotton Council President C.L. Denton, Jr.

While oil from seed has been one of the top quality vegetable oils in American diets for more than a century, Denton says the cotton industry now appears to be on the verge of seeing a significant part of its meal also going directly into human food products and greatly increasing their protein content.

He explained that this is possible through the use of glandless seed or by removal of the gossypol-containing gland of other cottonseed. The Council president praised members of the National Cottonseed Products Association for leadership in these efforts and said the move would become increasingly important to the entire cotton

Denton reported that a detail-

ed study of economic and market aspects of cottonseed protein---being made by the Council's market research staff in close cooperation with the Associationwill be completed about mid-year.

Turning to government regulations affecting the cotton industry, he said efforts are being made to see that the Occupational Safety and Health Administration director and his staff fully understand all the implications of cotton dust standards that have been imposed and are being considered.

While inspections and citations on cotton dust made at some seed-crushing plants in March have now been withdrawn as a result of these efforts, the Council president said gins and other plants also are being considered for coverage under a cotton dust standard.

"This is being done in spite of the fact that there is no published information that these employees

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of yours are getting byssinosis from their work environment," he said.

The Council president said he hoped the move could be headed off, but described it as an instance of "the strong effort of bureaucracy to widen its area of control, once established."

He pointed out that the Consumer Product Safety Commission whose flammability regulations also affect the cotton linter market is another example of growing bureaucracy.

With new processes providing both flame retardance and shape to cotton batting, Denton said the Council is working to delay applications of standards until the new batting products can be produced in the volume required.



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

AUSTIN — The Lègislature is racing toward its closing date with most of its major assignments unfinished but with reasonable hopes of finishing many of them.

School finance debate began this week in the House, while the Senate Education Committee wrestled with its version of how to help equal-

ize educational opportunity.
When all is said and done, a bill in the \$600 million range seems likely to emerge, with school teachers assured of a starting pay of \$7,600 to

\$8,000 a year. The Senate has passed a bill to establish a threemember statewide utilities regulatory commission, and the action this week switches to the House where a rival measure is pending.

Conference committees will get the job of working out differences between the two houses over both school finance and utilities regulation. Final agreement on a utilities bill is a reasonable expectation.

Two-year budgets have now been drawn by both the Senate Finance and House Appropriations Committees. Both are expected to leave close to \$600 million in unobligated revenues-most of which will go into the schools.

Some expect Comptroller Bob Bullock to revise his income forecasts to show \$677 million in unspent revenues over and above the budget.

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



To determine if a garden needs watering, a good gardener will not only check the soil surface but will also look at and feel the soil below the surface. A soil that is relatively dry at the depth of one to two inches will usually need additional water.

"It will not be surprising to us somewhat. if it develops that the textile recession did indeed bottom out ties, Denton said textile buyers in January," Denton stated.

According to Council estimates of textile unit purchases at the retail level, consumer buying decreased about 7 or 8 percent in 1974's last half, while mill fiber consumption dropped a third or more. "Obviously, that sort of thing couldn't continue indefinitely without emptying store shelves," the Council official said

Denton pointed out that retail textile inventories have been reported in good shape for several months now, and that cutters also have indicated no great excess of uncommitted goods. This--coupled with the stimulus in consumer buying expected soon from the tax rebate and lower withholding of 1975 taxes--makes it reasonable to expect a gradual upturn in textile operations probably several months ahead of the general economy, he said.

Another encouraging sign Denton saw for both cotton growers and textile people in the 'good progress' being made toward resolving letter-of-credit problems for U.S. cotton exporters in the Far East.

"This could mean that a significant part of the cotton involved might be shipped this season rather than being cancelled or deferred until next season as many people had expected," he stated

Denton said the matter is important to all those who buy and sell cotton because the issue of sanctity of contracts is at stake.




