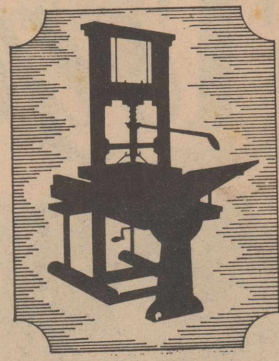

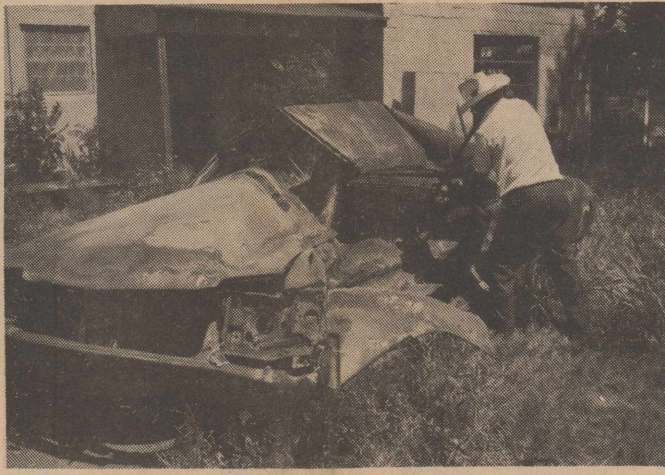

Fiery Two Car Accident Kills Darlene Price

Mrs. Thresa Darlene Price, wife of Jack Price of Rotan, was killed last Friday morning after the car she was driving was in collision with a pickup driven by Mrs. Olaf Stephens of Bangs, Texas, 10 miles west of Roby on Highway 180.

According to Albert Hataway, Texas Department of Public Safety, the Price vehicle was

heading west and the Stephens vehicle heading east at the time of the accident. Hataway indicated that from the investigation following the accident, it was determined that the Price vehicle was in the wrong lane just prior to the collision.

Both drivers of the vehicles involved in the accident were pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Ernest Roberts.

The Price vehicle was completely destroyed by fire and approximately one-half of the pickup driven by Mrs. Stephens was on fire. The Roby Volunteer Fire Department assisted at the scene.

Rotan Extension Center For WTC Opens In Fall

Western Texas College, which is making plans to open an extension center in Rotan in the fall of 1975, is requesting that persons interested in enrolling for courses complete and return survey forms indicating the course or courses they would like to take.

The forms have been sent home with public school students in Rotan, and additional forms are available from Patsy Hamric at Rotan High School. The form lists 22 courses which could be made available at the center, but the number of courses actually offered will depend on the number of persons who enroll. A minimum of 15 students is usually required for each class.

Students in extension centers pay fees of \$51 for one 3-hour course or \$57 for 2 three-hour courses plus lab fees when they are required. The total includes a \$25 minimum fee for tuition, a \$15 extension center fee, a \$5 registration fee, and \$3 fees for building use and activities.

WTC presently operates extension programs in Haskell and Colorado City. It has recently received approval for new extension programs in Rotan, Post and Sweetwater. Public school officials in each of those towns had requested that WTC offer extension programs for the benefit of

students who want to continue their education or who want to take courses for personal enrichment. Classes will be taught by qualified instructors in public school facilities.

WTC is accredited by the Southern Association of Schools and Colleges and the Coordinating Board of the Texas College and University System. It offers

both academic courses and occupational-technical programs and awards associate degrees and certificates of technology to students who complete the required courses.

The Rotan Masonic Lodge will have a barbecue for the District 78 area Masons and friends on May 24 at the Lee Raspberry farm.

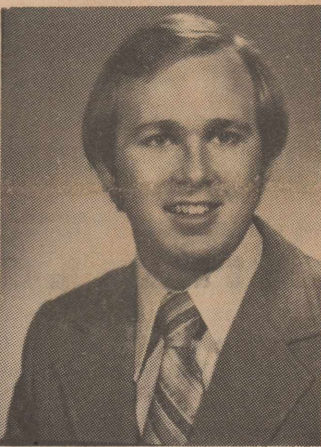

There will be classes for all ages, through high school age students. Sessions will begin at 9:00 a.m. and last until 11:00 a.m.

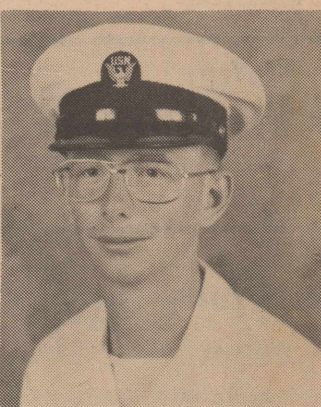

Debbie is the granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. John M. Young of Rotan.

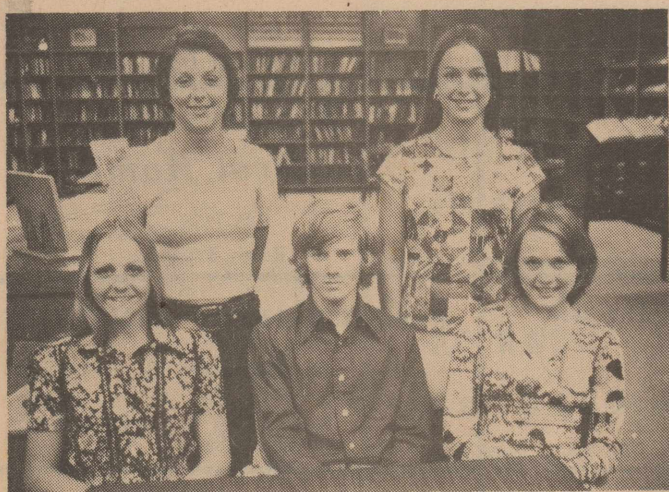
Annual Roby Cemetery Clean Up Day June 7

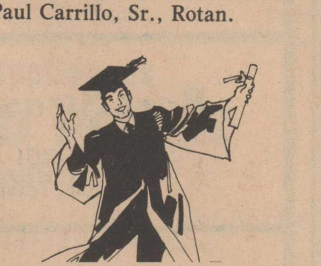

Mary Hooper Wins Art Show Awards, Check

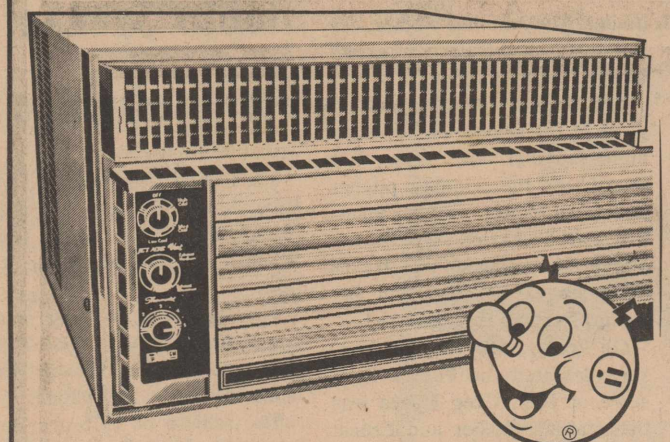

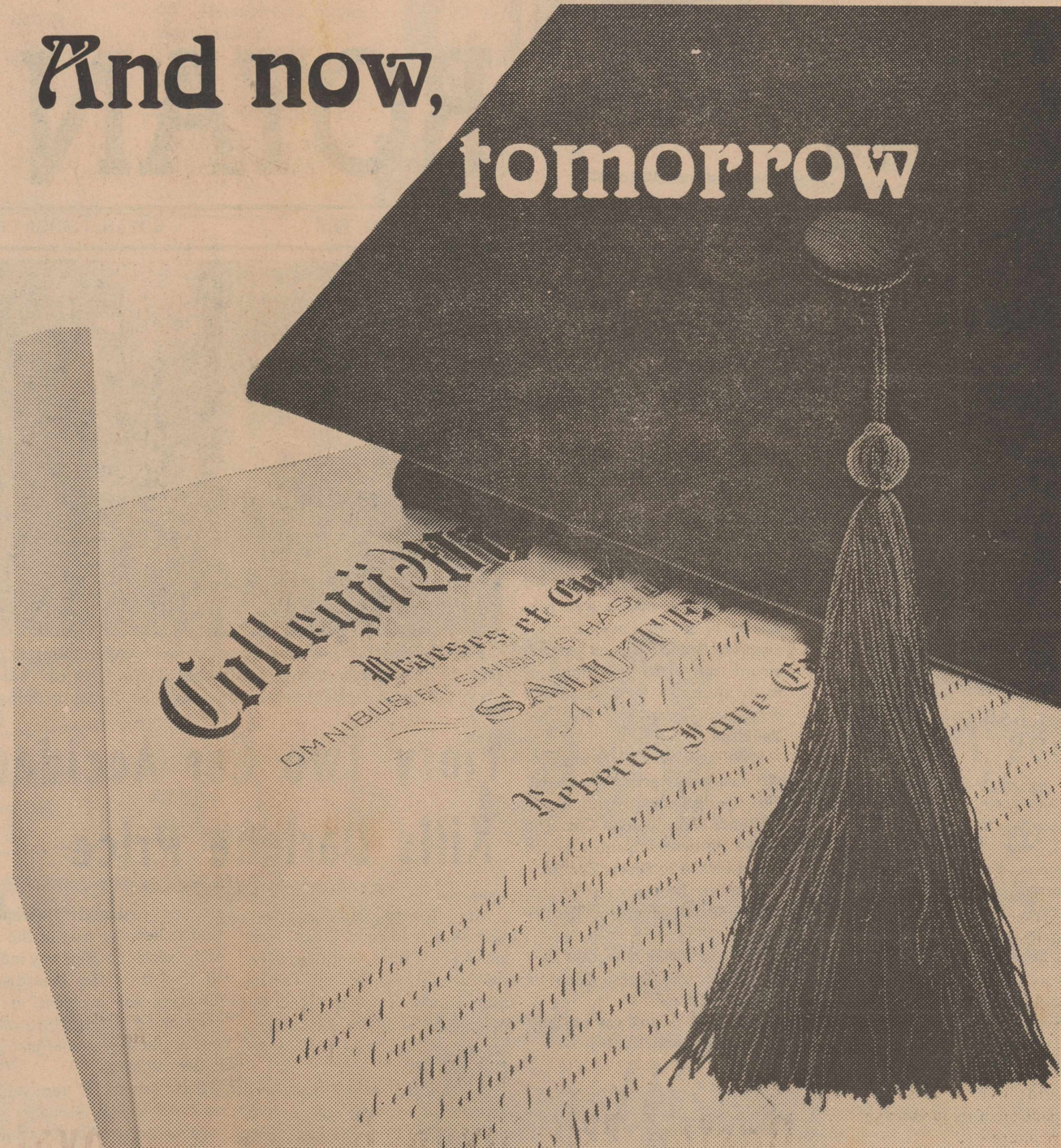

Six Flags To Greet 25th Millionth Guest

On Saturday, May 17, Six Flags Over Texas welcomed its 25-millionth guest.

On hand to greet the special guest was Theresa Pool, the very

first person to enter Six Flags' gates on its first day of operation August 5, 1961. Theresa is the 19-year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Pool of Arlington,

and was five years old when the park first opened.

Also greeting the honored visitors was Six Flags' newest personality, Prof. Cyrus Cosmo. During a brief welcoming ceremony, Prof. Cosmo presented a season pass to Six Flags Over Texas to the special guest and each member of the family.

When Six Flags Over Texas began its first season in 1961, the complex boasted 105 acres of entertainment features. The theme park now entails 145 acres, and the number of rides, shows and attractions has grown from the original 40 to more than 100.

Six Flags is the top tourist attraction in the state of Texas with more than two million visitors annually. The park is currently in its fifteenth operating season.

WTC Summer Registration Set To Begin May 28th

Registration is scheduled from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. on May 28 for the first summer session at Western Texas College, Dr. Duane Hood, Dean of Student Services and Registrar, has announced.

Classes will begin at 8 a.m. on May 29 and continue through July 8. June 2 will be the final day to register for the session. A second summer term is scheduled July 9-August 15.

Summer students at WTC will pay fees of \$38 for one 3-hour course or \$71 for two 3-hour courses plus lab fees where required.

Classes to be offered are Accounting 231, Introduction to Business 131, Economics 131 and 231, English 131 and 231, Geography 132, Government 231 and 232, History 131 and 132, Psychology 231, Reading 131 and 231, Sociology 231. Some of the courses will be available on an individualized study basis as well as through the regular class schedule.

Copies of the summer schedules are available at the office of the registrar in the WTC Administration Building.

Transient students (those attending WTC for the summer only) will need to submit an application for admission and a

statement of good standing from the registrar of the college they attend on a regular basis. They will not be required to submit transcripts.

Persons wishing further information may contact the office of the registrar during regular office hours. The office will be closed May 26 for the Memorial Day holiday.

Farmers Union Opposes Corps Water Expansion

The National Executive Board of the Farmers Union has issued a statement vigorously opposing a proposal by the Army Corps of Engineers to expand its jurisdiction over U.S. waters, especially those affecting agriculture.

Jay Naman, Waco, President of Texas Farmers Union and a member of the National Farmers Union Executive Board, said that the resolution was passed at the board's recent Cincinnati, Ohio meeting.

Naman said the Corps of Engineers has made four alternative proposals, any of which would involve a substantial expansion of its jurisdiction over agriculture.

The most stringent proposal would require every farmer to get permission to plow fields adjacent to flood control levees, enlarge stock ponds or erect anti-erosion structures to protect their land, said Naman.

The least restrictive proposal would require permits in coastal areas below the mean high water mark or salt water vegetation line, whichever extends further, and along inland waters to navigable waters and their primary tributaries to their headwaters.

"Being a coastal state and having several navigable rivers many farmers and ranchers all across Texas would be subject to regulation under the proposals put forth by the Corps of Engineers. Not only would this involve much bureaucratic red-tape but it would be contrary to the good conservation practices which have traditionally been carried out by farmers and ranchers as stewards of the soil," the Texas president said.

Naman said the Farmers Union objects to such a 'power-grab' over agricultural lands by the Corps of Engineers, which evidently has the support of the Environmental Protection Agency.

"It is important that farmers and other property owners voice their objection to this proposal by writing to their Congressman and to the Corps of Engineers,"

Naman said. The deadline for objections to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Washington, D.C. is June 6.

The Corps issued its proposals in response to a court suit which was won by the National Wildlife Federation and the National Resources Defense Council in U.S. District Court at Washington, D.C. on March 27. Judge Aubrey F. Robinson, Jr., said in that suit that the Corps' jurisdiction extended "farther inland than the mean high water mark" which has been the historic limit of its authority.

Doctor Bill Given House Approval

State Rep. Fred Head's bill to provide doctors for underserved small cities and rural areas successfully passed final reading in the Texas House of Representatives and now awaits approval from the Senate.

"The bill gives adequate financial incentive to insure that underserved areas of Texas will have ready access to qualified medical care," explained Representative Head.

Currently, 17 counties in Texas have no medical doctor. Residents of those 17 counties must travel several hours to nearby cities in order to receive any medical attention.

Citing the most common hardships incurred by rural residents whose communities lack the services of a qualified doctor, Head stressed, "That means there is no one to take care of the child whose flu takes a serious turn for the worse in the middle of the night; or to set a broken limb; or even to deliver a baby who arrives a couple of weeks early."

The bill allows for medical students to receive a \$100.00 monthly stipend after they sign a

contract to serve in a rural area for at least four years after their graduation and residency.

In order to insure an adequate number of rural doctors in the

future, the bill stipulates that at least 20 percent of each Texas medical school's new class must participate in the program.

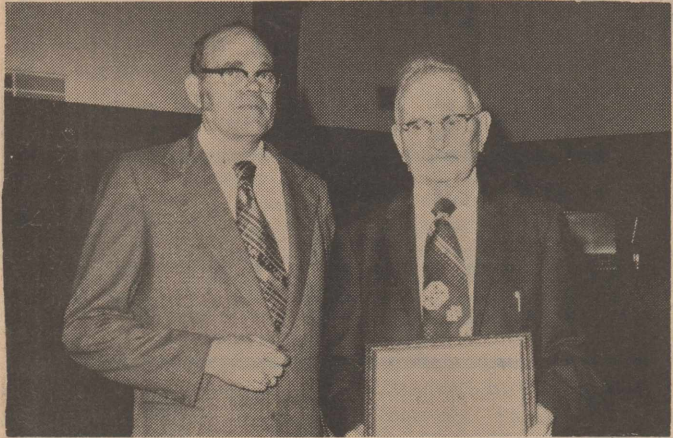

Crop Acreage Questions Need Farmers Response

During the last half of May, a random sample of some 24,000 Texas farmers will receive a crop acreage questionnaire from Charles E. Caudill, Agricultural Statistician in Charge of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Austin.

This information will be the basis for determining the planted acreage for the state of Texas and for each county. Texas covers such a wide area that state totals alone do not provide adequate information on Texas' most basic industry--agriculture. The Texas Legislature has provided a program of estimates for each county. This is a cooperative effort of USDA's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning production and marketings and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agricul-

ture. Farmers who receive questionnaires are urged to complete and return by mail. All individual reports are confidential and are used only for state and county totals.

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

Do my plants have enough room? This is a question all vegetable gardeners should be pondering as they view the progress of their seedlings. Spacing decisions are important too, when transplanting the potted plants bought from a nursery.

There is a tendency among new gardeners to crowd too many plants into a given space. It is most difficult to sow seed at a rate that will give proper space for plants as they grow toward maturity. Judicious thinning of seedlings is a technique that must be acquired through careful study and practice. Neophytes, should consult more experienced friends on the matter of spacing plants.

Vegetable gardening pamphlets available from the County Extension agent's office have tables of space requirements. Many seedsmen print spacing instructions on their seed packets, since each vegetable has a requirement for growing space inique to its kind. Different varieties of the same vegetable vary in the space needed for optimum growth and development.

For example, the tomato varieties, Tiny Tim and Atom, take only one square foot of garden space whereas Presto Hybrid needs four square feet and Terrific and Ultra Boy will cover at least 16 square feet when fully grown. These space requirements are for plants allowed to grow naturally on the ground. Trellising and pruning of tomatoes reduce space required, but also reduce the yield potential of the plant.

Gardeners can easily estimate the spacing for seedlings of root crops by visualizing the diameter of the mature root. Most every one who has prepared vegetables for meals can do this easily. For example, if the diameter of a radish is one inch, allow at least one to one and one-half inches between plants. Carrots that will be one and one-half inches across at harvest must be spaced one and one-half to two inches apart in the row. If a perfectly round, sweet, Spanish onion bulb of three inches is desired, the plants must be no closer than three to four inches in a row.

Most varieties of snap and dry beans produce maximum yields when plants are spaced two to three per foot of row. Fruiting plants require much more room.

Tomatoes to be trellised and pruned to a single stem need 15 to 18 inches between plants in rows at least three to four feet apart.

Thin out unwanted seedlings

by cutting the stems at ground level with a sharp knife. Never pull up the plants. Pulling unwanted plants will cause uprooting injury to the plants you want to save. Immediately after the thinning job is done, irrigate the soil to resettle the soil particles around the plants left to grow.

If in doubt about spacing, leave more space than you think is necessary, for too much is better than too little. Crowded plants do not receive enough light and air and cannot move freely between their leaves. In small gardens, space can be conserved by trellising plants. Tomatoes, cucumbers, whole snap beans and Lima beans, English peas, vine squash, and melons are well adapted to

slimling if provided with a vertical support of twine, wire or wood.

Thinning should be done when seedlings have only one or two true leaves. Unwanted plants should not be left in place until crowding occurs. The best practice is to space the plants properly as soon as seedlings emerge. *****

Cotton planting time is here again. Cotton variety and fertility tests are being established in the county. Newer varieties being tested include GSA71, Earlyred 32, Western 44, and Coker 5110. Results of all the Extension demonstrations will be published after harvest.

Vicky Faught performed two numbers and received a superior

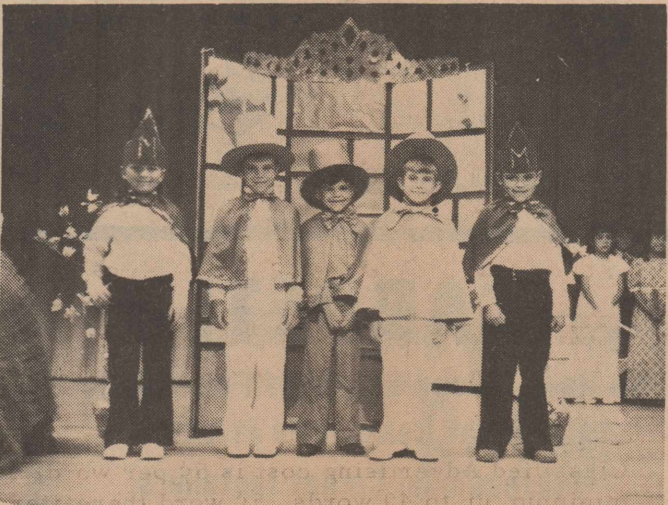

Stripcropping Is Good Practice

"Stripcropping is a good conservation practice to use for reducing wind erosion," stated Gerald Harmon, Soil Conservation Service employee.

The most common method of stripcropping is to plant a high residue crop in the cotton blanks. This gives an alternate pattern of cotton and a high residue producing crop such as grain sorghum or small grain. Most soils in Fisher County will be adequately protected when the sorghum or small grain stubble is left standing after harvest.

Several farms northeast of Rotan were protected from wind erosion this spring by one or two rows of small grain planted in the blanks. Some of the surrounding fields that were bare suffered heavy soil losses from strong winds. The small grain slowed down the velocity of the wind at the soil surface enough to control erosion.

An additional benefit of stripcropping is that organic matter is added to the soil. Organic matter improved soil tilth, increases water holding capacity, increases the infiltration rate, and helps to maintain soil fertility.

Contact the employees at the Soil Conservation Service office in Rotan for more information on stripcropping or other conservation practices.

Psalms 1; 3. "And he shall be like the tree planted by the rivers of the water, that bringeth forth its fruit in his season; his leaf also shall not wither; and whatsoever he doeth shall prosper.

One of the pronounced characteristics of the entire first Psalm is that there are two distinct ways put on exhibition. This is not unusual in the New Testament. No words of persuasion are used. Just a presentation of the two ways, and leaving the choice to each individual as to which one they shall take.

The inspired writer has no doubt traveled both ways, and is not speaking from knowledge he has obtained from reading a book. It is the voice of a veteran, saying here is the way it is, look the two ways over and make your choice between the two. There is no compromise between the two possible. The two ways will not mix. Therefore, the ungodly shall not stand in the judgment nor sinners in the congregation of the righteous. You can not have a part of one and a part of the other, for the two ways are in opposition the one to the other. So it is up to you as an individual, to look the two ways over and make your decision as to which course you will take.

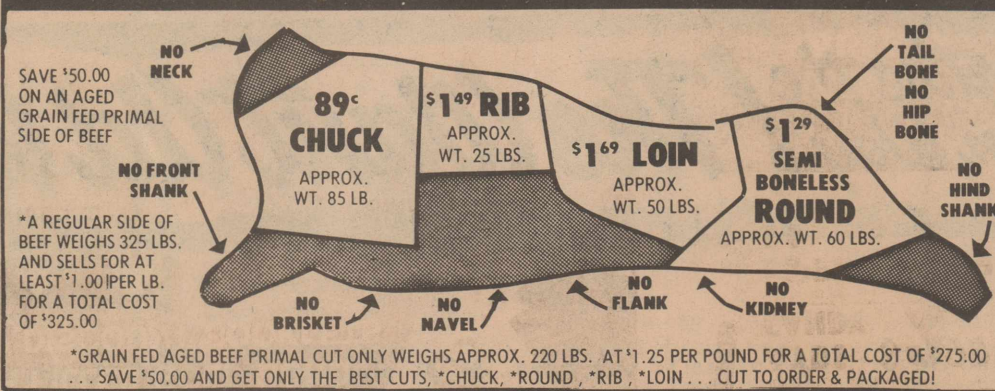
