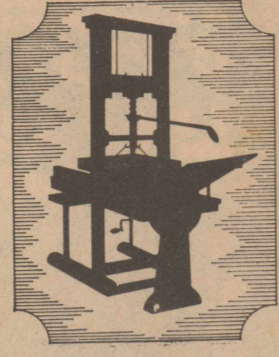
WTC Registration For Rotan Branch Aug 26th

A schedule of registration dates for Western Texas College extension courses has been announced by Dr. Duane Hood, Dean of Student Services and Registrar.

Extension students in Colorado City and Haskell are to register on August 25. Students in Post and Rotan will register on August 26, while students in Sweetwater are to register on August 28. Classes for all extension students are to begin on Sept. 4.

WTC will be offering extension courses in Post, Rotan and Sweetwater for the first time this fall. Extension classes have been offered in Haskell since the fall of 1973, and classes were offered in Colorado City for the first time in the fall of 1974.

Registration on the WTC campus is scheduled Sept. 2 and 3.



County, Rotan Get \$65 Mix Drink Tax Money

Comptroller Bob Bullock said Tuesday that more than \$2.5 million is being sent to 188 counties and 298 cities across Texas as their share of the mixed

drinks tax for the April-June quarter of 1975.

This share to cities and counties is 30 per cent of the total tax collected in each locality. The remaining 70 per cent, \$6.5 million for the quarter, goes to the state general revenue fund.

The tax is 10 per cent on all gross receipts.

This quarter's total local share was up slightly from the first quarter's \$2.3 million, Bullock said. The \$8.9 million total tax receipts for the second quarter were well above the \$7.5 million per quarter average 1974.

The collection of the tax is administered by the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission.

The total Fisher County tax revenue amounted to \$437.04 with the City of Rotan receiving \$65.56 and Fisher County received \$65.56 said Bullock.

Raymond King Leading Roby Baptist Revival

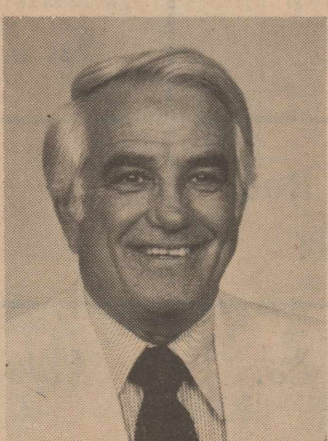
Raymond King will lead revival services at the First Baptist Church in Roby beginning August 10 and continuing through August 17, according to Allan Cartrite, pastor.

Ed Letsinger will lead the song services and will direct the youth program during the revival.

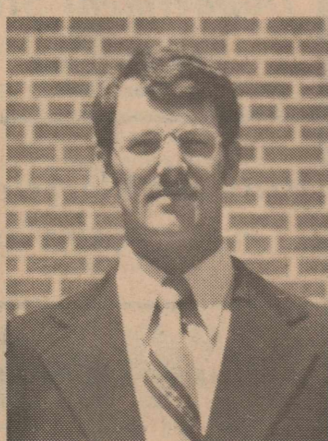

Hospital Board Approves Change, Buys Equipment

The Fisher County Hospital Board met in regular session last Monday night and approved the purchase of approximately \$6,115.00 in Stryker labor, operating and delivery room equipment.

Those present for the meeting included Hospital Board President Ralph Ammons, board members Allan Houston, Kermit Terry, David Williams and Wendell Morrow, Administrator J.N. McCallay, Norman Arnett and hospital employees Reva Jo Hull and Alta B. Hinson.

The board received a change order for the installation of two hand sinks in the kitchen and conduit for the dictaphone equipment. The additional cost of the conduit is \$445.57 and the hand sinks will raise the cost by \$994.82. The changes were approved by the board.

There was a discussion concerning the conductive flooring to be installed in the operating room of the new hospital. The board is expected to meet with the doctors on the staff at the next meeting to discuss the floor.

BICENTENNIAL MEETING DRAWS COUNTY CROWD

A preliminary meeting concerning proposed Bicentennial activities for Fisher County was held Monday night at the Community Center. Mr. Pat Wester, President of Rotan Chamber of Commerce, presided.

Mr. Wester discussed the role and objectives of the Federal and State Bicentennial Commissions and requirements for local commissions wishing to be recognized as official Bicentennial cities or counties. The consensus of opinion seemed to be that, because of population figures, it would be preferable to function as a Fisher County unit.

Mr. Wester had previously written to the State Bicentennial Commission for information about procedures and goals. He noted some requirements that must be met before applying for state certification. An organization must be set up and governed by a local committee which would include the Fisher County Judge, two of his commissioners, a General Chairman, and a Chairman for each of the required goals. These goals are Heritage (recognition and preservation of past history and heritage), Festival (promoting current activities), and Horizons (something of permanent and lasting value for the future). The three objectives are of value in preserving the past as it relates to the present, becoming cognizant of the present as a link in history, and constructive planning for the future. Also, each organization in Fisher County would be invited to have a representative on the county commission adopt at least one project.

Stating that Fisher County is later than most, but not too late, Mr. Wester said, "This is a chance to re-establish patriotism which seems to be at an all time low. To be effective it must involve every segment of the community. This can be done through participation of the schools, churches, civic organizations, and all youth groups."

During a brief intermission punch and doughnuts were served to the more than forty persons who registered for the meeting. A gratifying number of these were young people. Approximately twenty organizations had representatives present.

Highway construction contracts let in July by the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission include Fisher County area work.

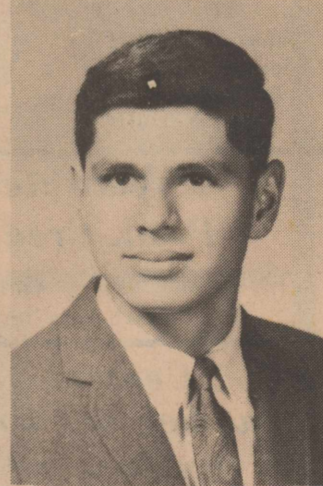
The work will be supervised by District Engineer Roger G. Welsch.

A former student of Diamon Hill Jarvis High School, Fort Worth, he joined the Marine Corps in April 1972.

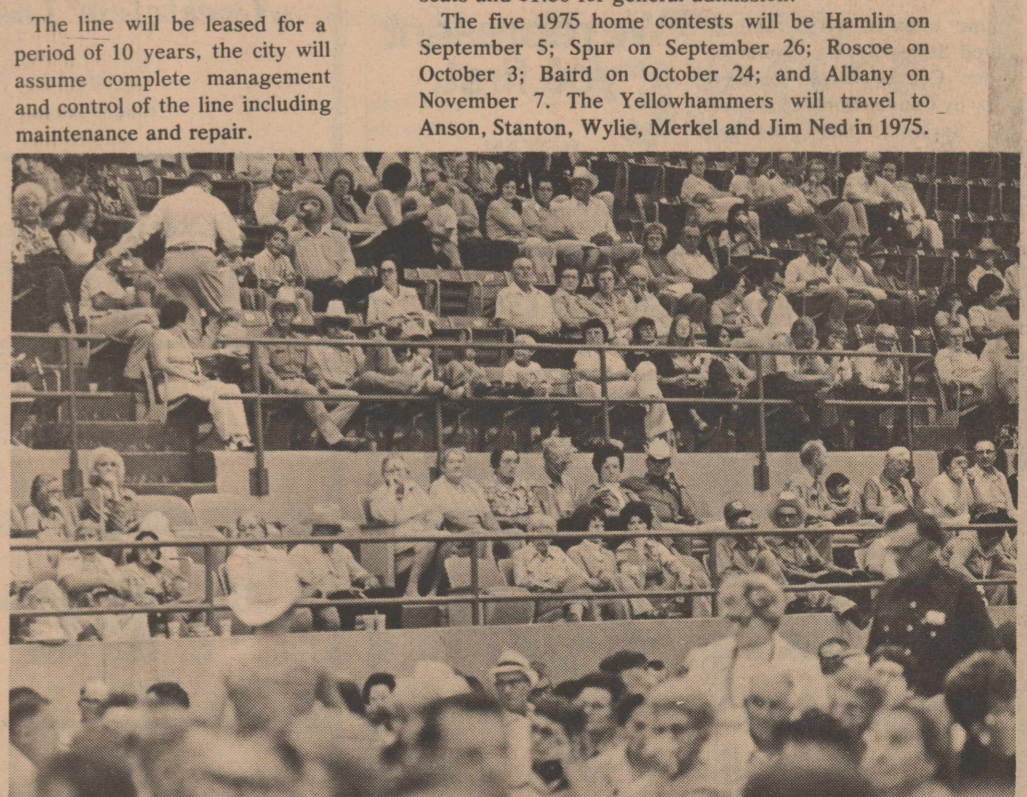
Rotan Football Fans Can Purchase Tickets

Rotan school teachers will report for in-service training on Monday, August 11. They will meet from 8:30 until 9:00 for a coffee sponsored by the classroom teachers association.

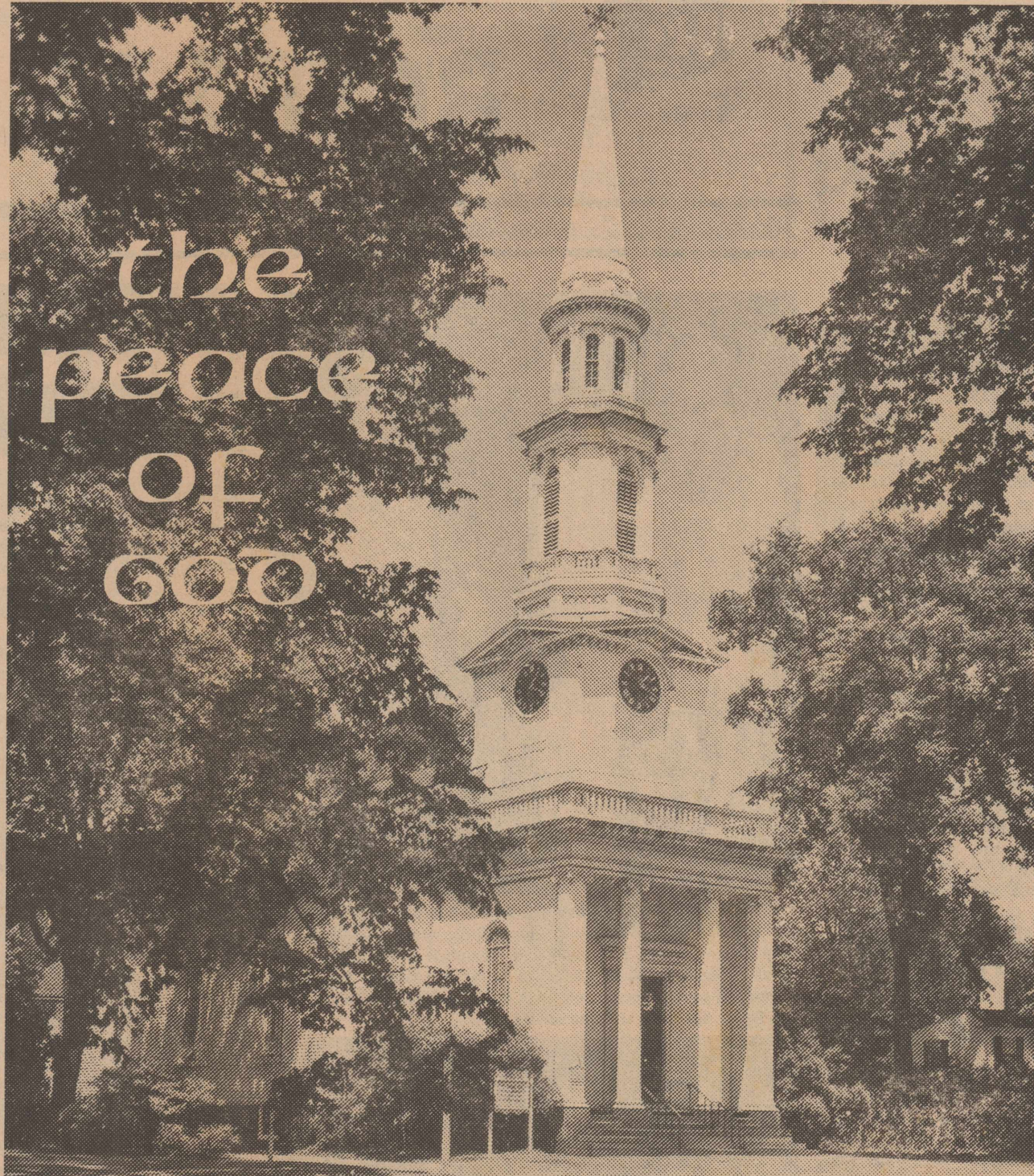

Jay Naman Calls For Halt To Secret Export Control

"The Ford Administration is using a secret export control system to depress grain prices received by U.S. farmers," Jay Naman, President of Texas Farmers Union, charged today.

"This secret system is being worked out in private conversations with grain trading companies and foreign governments, according to information the Farmers Union has gleaned from trade sources.

"A limit of about 250 million bushels of wheat and 315 million bushels of corn has been set for export sales to the Soviet Union. This limit on sales to Russia is calculated to prevent grain and soybean prices from rising significantly.

"This is what we read also between the conflicting lines of what President Ford says to farmers about 'Freedom from Government Meddling with Free Markets,' and to consumers about keeping food prices down.

"This is the third year in a row that the Nixon-Ford administration has used controls on exports to depress farm prices. In 1973, Nixon embargoed exports of soybeans and some 40 other agricultural commodities. In 1974, Ford stopped grain sales that had already been contracted, and government officials pressured other governments and buyers all year to cut down on their purchases from the 1974 crop. That's what turned grain prices around last fall despite the shortest supplies and strongest demand since World War II.

"The Nixon-Ford deeds prove the falseness of the Nixon-Ford promise of a free market for agriculture. They want the farmer to be free to go broke when there's a surplus, but they are continuing to interfere with the market to prevent prices from going up freely when demand is strong.

"The Farmers Union recognizes that consumers deserve and demand protection against food shortages. But farmers deserve protection against surpluses too.

"It's long past time for an honest farm and food policy in this country, that will be spelled out in the full light of day and written down in the laws of the land for farmers and consumers alike to see and understand.

We are outraged by the administration's present system of double-talk for farmers and other ordinary citizens, secret conniving with the grain traders and the communists, and political pressure on other export customers of the American

farmer. We appeal to consumers and others who believe in fair and above-board government to support the Farmers Union's plan with a non-recourse price

support loan floor of 90% of parity to protect farmers in times of surpluses, and automatic release of reserves at 110% of parity to protect consumers in times of shortage."



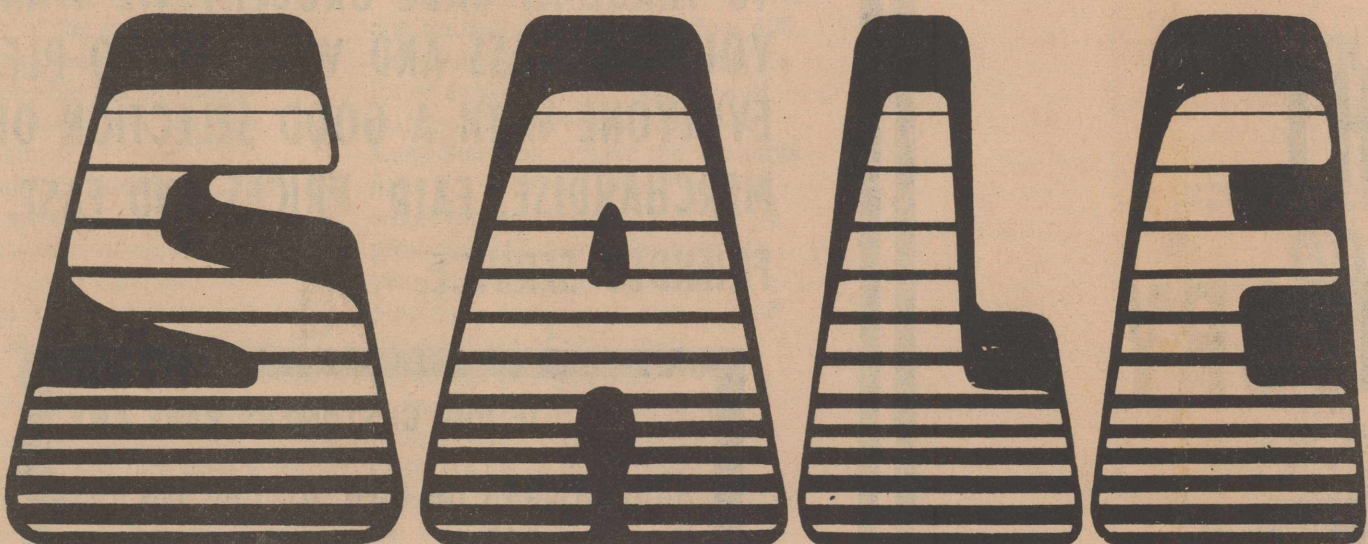

George McGovern To Give Soil Conservation Talk

Senator George McGovern will make the keynote address at the 30th annual meeting of the Soil Conservation Society of America in San Antonio on Monday, August 11.

Theme of the meeting, which runs from August 10-13, will be "Land Use: Food and Living."

The senator is a long-time friend of conservation interests and served as a special assistant to President John Kennedy and director of the food for peace program prior to his election to the Senate in 1962.

Other speakers during Monday's opening session include Mrs. Francine I. Neff, Treasurer of the United States; San Antonio Mayor Lila Cockrell; and Ms.

Peggy Toben, San Antonio Conservation Society. Program Chairman Edward E. Thomas, state conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service in Temple, will preside.

More than a thousand profes-

sional conservationists from the United States, Canada, and Mexico are expected to attend the four-day meeting, which begins Sunday, August 10, with registration and a reception.

The Society is a nonprofit scientific and educational organization dedicated to advancing the science and art of good land use. It has about 14,000 members throughout the world.

Official hosts for the San Antonio meeting are the members of the Society's Texas Council of Chapters.

Speakers at Tuesday's general session include Dr. A.H. Hannah, assistant deputy minister, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, Ontario, Canada; Dr. Gerald Thomas, president, New Mexico State University, Las Cruces; and Mel Davis, administrator, Soil Conservation Service, Washington, D.C.

At the general session on Wednesday, August 13, speakers will include Dr. Anson Bertrand, Dean of Agricultural Science, Texas Tech University, Lubbock; John White, regional administrator, Environmental Protection Agency, Dallas; and Dr. Keith Arnold, director, Division of Natural Resources and Environment, University of Texas, Austin.

Other speakers at a series of 10 concurrent technical sessions will consider the land use implications of meeting domestic and foreign food demands. They will also discuss the impacts expanded agricultural production will have on the nation's soil, water, and other natural resources.

Vetrans Loans Have Big Plus For County GI's

The Veterans Administration suggests that during these times of rising housing costs, veterans interested in becoming homeowners should consider the advantages of a GI loan.

Officials noted the agency has approved nearly nine million loans valued at \$111.3 billion since World War II, and more than half the loans have already been repaid in full.

"As buying a home generally is the largest and most important expenditure a family ever makes, care should be taken to insure value received for money paid," officials stressed.

A veteran who buys a home with VA assistance usually finds the loan easier to obtain because the agency guarantees part of the loan. No downpayment is necessary unless required by the

lender, or the purchase price exceeds the reasonable value as determined by VA.

Also, direct loans are available in Fisher County and are made for the purpose of purchasing, refinancing, construction, repairing, or improving a home, mobile home, to be occupied by such eligible veteran. The loan may be repaid over a long period of time at a moderate interest rate, with the option of paying off all or part of the loan in advance without penalty. VA appraises the home to determine its reasonable value in the market prevailing at time appraisal was made.

For assistance in obtaining a loan from the VA, contact Fisher County Veterans Service Officer, Ed Deaton, Post Office Building in Roby.

Senator Farabee Praises Rural School Organization

State Senator Ray Farabee said today that he was glad to see recent efforts to organize rural school districts. Several large meetings of school officials have been held across the state recently in an effort to organize school districts in non-metropolitan areas to more effectively represent their interests at the state level.

Senator Farabee told nearly 400 West Texas school officials at a recent meeting in Munday that an organization of rural school districts would give non-metropolitan legislators increased support when representing the interests of those districts in the Legislature. Farabee stressed that school finance is still the state's number one problem. "We can't afford to leave politics to those who go out and run for office," Farabee said. "We have to organize to make better legislation."

During the meeting the inequities of the present ad valorem tax structure were pointed out. Organizers of the

rural school effort pointed out that real property accounts for only 25% of the total amount of property in urban areas. Since ad valorem taxes are based on real property, as opposed to other forms of wealth such as stocks and bonds, a disproportionate tax burden is placed on rural areas.

Various state and local officials were in attendance at the meeting. State officials included House Speaker Bill Clayton of Springlake, Senator Farabee, Senator Kent Hance of Lubbock, Representative Bill Heatly of Paducah, Representative Mike Ezzell of Snyder, and Representative Elmer Martin of Colorado City.

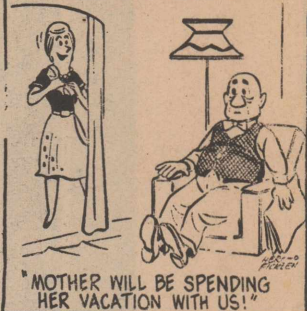

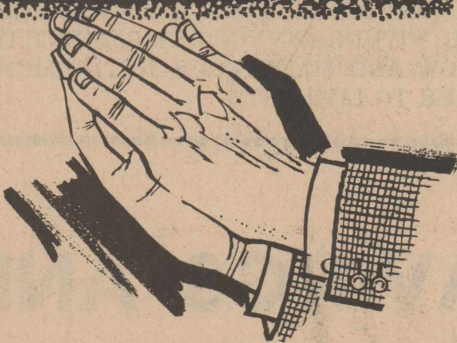

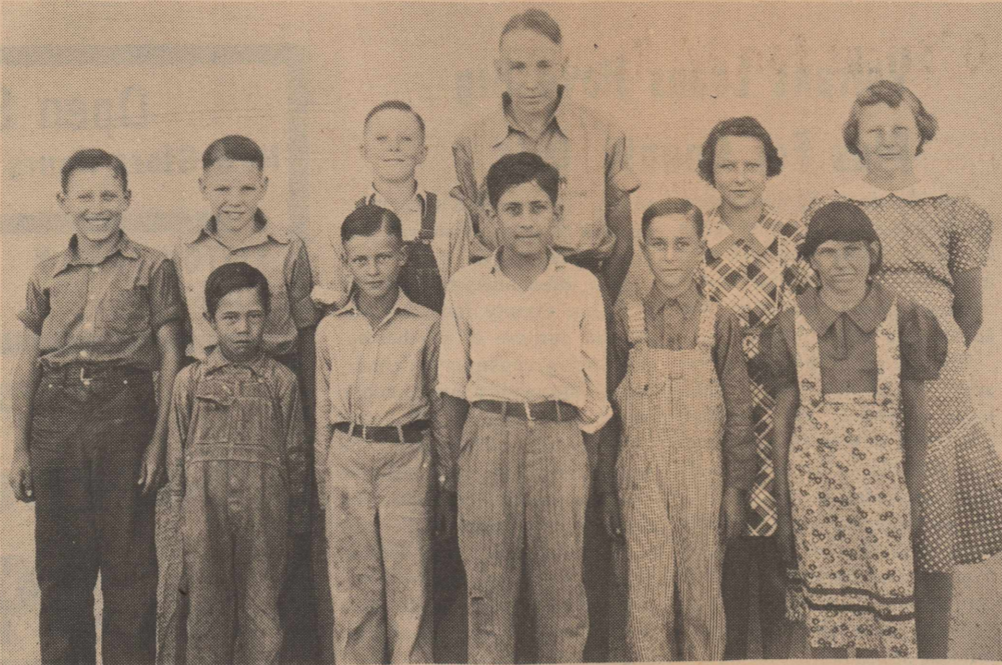

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COUNTY AGENT NEWS

BY RICHARD SPENCER

Interested Texas cattle producers will have an opportunity to express their views on proposed changes in the state's brucellosis eradication program during a public hearing September 4 in Austin, scheduled by the Texas Animal Health Commission.

On July 1, 1975, 24 Texas counties had qualified as bovine brucellosis free areas and 23 other counties had no known infection. Current regulations do not contain provisions for protection of these clean areas.

The TAHC has proposed a number of major changes in the brucellosis program. The Commission voted to propose the regulation changes to bring the Texas program more in line with national brucellosis standards contained in the "Uniform Methods and Rules" for eradication recommended by the United States Animal Health Association.

Changes under consideration include:

1. Outlining the manner in which cattle may move into, within, and from certified areas to protect the status of these areas. If an adequate number of breeding cattle are being sampled at the time of slaughter from a clean area, the Commission could allow cattle to move from these areas without further tests.

2. Authorizing testing of all eligible test cattle prior to loan, lease, sale, or any change of ownership except, (a) breeding cattle that are consigned from herd of origin directly to slaughter and (b) animals originating in certified brucellosis free herds. These changes would give the Commission flexibility in handling the various situations that occur in different parts of the state.

3. Requiring "S" branding of brucellosis exposed cattle only when going on permit to slaughter or to a quarantined feedlot. This would comply with federal regulations which become effective on April 22, 1975.

4. Authorizing and providing for using supplementary tests in certain phases of the program.

5. Allowing official brucellosis calfhood vaccination down to two months of age instead of the present three months of age.

6. Outlining provisions to move breeding cattle from a county which has lost its modified certified free status.

7. Providing for methods of handling brucellosis negative cattle at livestock markets by keeping them separate from infected, exposed, or unknown

status cattle.

The proposed changes will be posted in every Texas courthouse for at least 30 days prior to the September 4 public hearing.

The Texas Animal Health Commission also is planning a series of information meetings throughout the state to explain these proposed changes to livestock owners.

Questions concerning the rural populations in Texas and the United States are now declining at a slower rate than during the 1960's. And that brucellosis program should be directed to the Texas Animal Health Commission in Austin or to TAHC field veterinarians.

A meeting will be held in Abilene Thursday, August 21, at 8:00 p.m. at the old Courthouse Courtroom on the subject.

The "rural" counties of the area, which are included in District 3 of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, are Archer, Baylor, Childress, Cottle, King, Dickens, Fisher, Foard, Hall, Hardeman, Haskell, Kent, Knox, Motley, Shackelford, Stonewall, Throckmorton, Wilbarger and Young.

These counties showed a 1.6 percent population decline from 1970-1973 compared to a 17.6 percent drop from 1960-1970. Nationally, rural areas have shown a population growth of 4.2 percent from 1970 to 1973.

While certain counties continue to reflect a declining population, the rate is much slower than between 1960 and 1970. In addition, a recent U.S. Census Bureau report indicates a growth in the population base of many counties that had lost population during that 10-year period.

Rural areas working through their county Extension committees and the appropriate Extension specialist are overcoming some of the problems created by the massive outmigration of citizens during the 1960's. District 3 rural counties lost 17.6 per cent or 22,094 individuals between 1960-1970.

Some examples of how country groups are working to slow the exodus of people and even reverse the trend are mentioned. Hall County citizens are working closely with their county Extension in obtaining fire protection equipment which is vital to their health and well being. Young County groups working with their county Extension agent have recently

obtained two trucks from the Texas Forest Service to support their countywide volunteer fire department.

Elsewhere, rural people are becoming more concerned with economic development and community facilities to try to make a better "home" for those desiring to live in rural areas.

Citizens of rural areas are realizing that if they want to progress, they must have a balanced community.

As It Looks From Here

The Department of Health, Education and Welfare was created as a full cabinet post during the Eisenhower Administration with Mrs. Oveta Culp Hobby as the first secretary. Since that time in 1953 a succession of Secretaries has come and gone. The turn-over has been more often than in any other Cabinet position. Since the Department was created, there have been 11 Secretaries, including a new one coming in. Maybe there is good reason for it. The comments of some Secretaries on their departure indicate a feeling of frustration of being unable to make function this colossal agency. It is a gigantic job to preside over a network of 130,000 employees and a \$118 billion budget.

The Congress and the American People would do well to heed the concerns of those who have headed this agency with all its far-flung activities.

Mr. Elliot Richardson when resigning as Secretary in 1972 warned of the growing gap between promises and performance in the multitude of programs under H.E.W. and there is evidence all around us to prove his point. Utopia was seemingly the goal of the Great Society concept. Who could be against Utopia as a goal-the best of all things for everybody? But perfection is not yet and never can be on this earth.

This, in essence, is what Mr. Weinberger, now exiting from the Secretary position, is saying. The other day in his farewell speech he lamented a "faceless, gray egalitarianism that will ensure an equally mediocre existence for everyone, achieved at the cost of personal liberty." He sees ruination in the readiness of Congress to expand the more than a thousand Federal grant programs already on the books and enacting new ones. The Secretary says that if the Congress does not learn to say no and practice restraint, the Nation will wind up as broke as New York City.

The Ominous fact is that Secretaries of H.E.W. have come and gone without making real progress on basic dilemmas. It seems some of them have had a real intent of bringing H.E.W. under reasonable control but with its vast and entrenched bureaucracy, we have to wonder if it is possible.

It is not much wonder that resistance comes to reforming some of the expansive and questionable programs now in operation. Those which obviously have failed are more often given more money to expand, and by becoming bigger, hope to succeed. Too often, the failures also become bigger. Everybody wants his particular program continued and contends that if reductions are to be made, they should be made in other places.

So it seems that no one really knows how to slice off the pieces of these vast operations which have proved failures but there is an awareness in the Country that Government is too big, too expensive and trying to do too much. It could be the beginning

of needed changes. This awareness focuses on the fact that a welfare state spends beyond its means, leaving the day of reckoning to another generation. Action may come when enough people believe that we are that other generation.

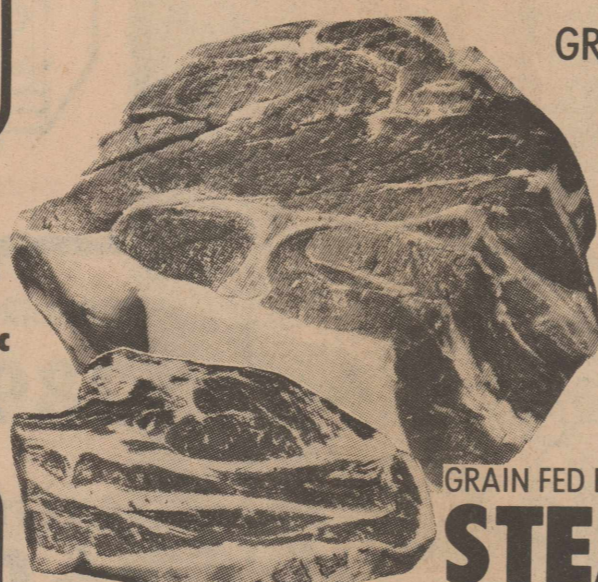

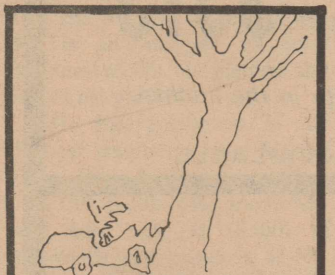
