Mrs. Johnnie Ammons Re-Elected As Leader

Mrs. Johnnie M. Ammons of Roby was re-elected to chair the Texas Rural Electric Women's Task Force during the 35th annual membership meeting of the association of Texas Electric Cooperatives in Amarillo August 6-8.

Mrs. Ammons helped organize the statewide group in 1969 and served as co-chairperson until the group's annual meeting last year in Dallas when she was elected to serve as the sole leader.

The Task Force operates as an auxiliary to rural electric systems, producing programs and fairs to raise funds for activities furthering rural electric objectives. One such event was an art and crafts fair presented in connection with the Amarillo meeting of rural electric leaders. Task Force members throughout the state provided handcrafted items valued in excess of \$15,000 for this affair.

Mrs. Ammons is a native of Fisher County, attended Sweetwater High School and McMurry College in Abilene. She was married to Johnnie M. Ammons in Roby in 1936. Ammons has been manager of Midwest Electric Cooperative in Roby since 1943. They are parents of three daughters, now grown and married.

Throughout her lifetime in Fisher County, Mrs. Ammons has been active in community, youth, and church work. While her daughters were "growing up," she was an active Girl Scout leader. She has also been active in garden club and she remains involved in Methodist Church work, presently serving as a Sunday School teacher, member of the Church Administrative Board, and chairman of the Missions Committee.

Hobbs School Registration August 18th

During the week long meetings there were various award programs, distinguished speakers, as well as educational exhibits and shortcourses. There were over 1,600 Vo-Ag teachers from all over the state at the annual event.

Roby School Board Told Rooms Complete Friday

The Roby Independent School Board met in regular session last Monday night and after considerable discussion, made the decision to begin school as scheduled on Monday morning, August 18. The decision concerning the opening of school was centered around the possibility that the primary building would

not be completely finished and ready for full occupancy.

The general contractor, Burl Nash, and architect, Don Hampton, were both present for the meeting. The opinion of Burl Nash was that the building would be partially ready for Monday. Nash did indicate that the partitions in the rest rooms

would not be installed. He expected the dividers to be installed around September 1st. The rooms have been re-painted, new ceilings installed, heating and air conditioning units installed, and carpet layers are supposed to be laying carpet at this time.

Superintendent Caffey Welch indicated that after a meeting last Monday with teachers they were all of the opinion that school should begin on schedule on August 18.

The next item of business by the board was a report by Superintendent Welch concerning the denial of an application to accept transfer students by state officials. The denial will affect 39 students that live in other districts and attend school in Roby. The board, after a motion by John Matthias and second by Joe DeLos Santos, voted to accept the 39 students. The school will lose between \$6,300 and \$7,000 because the student transfer request was turned down. In the motion by Matthias he asked the Superintendent to inform parents of the situation and brief them on what the district would be up against in future years. There was some discussion concerning calling a community meeting over the transfer denial.

The board voted to leave the lunch room cost to students at 40 cents for grades Kindergarten through 4th; 45 cents for grades 5th through 8th; and 50 cents for grades 9 through 12.

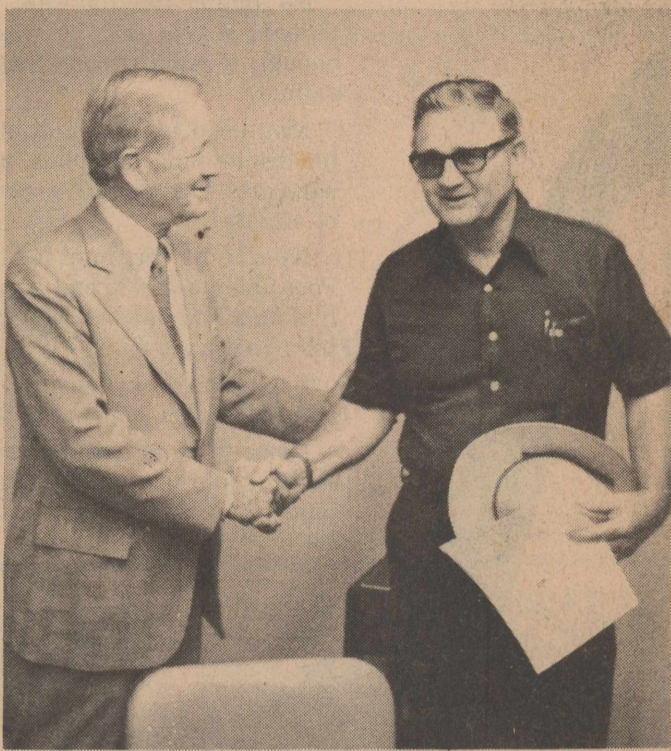
The bus drivers pay scale was left at last year's rate. The board did vote to pay all drivers \$5.00 for each out of town trip and pay for drivers' meals if they stayed all day at the event.

The board approved Valerie Morgan as the Kindergarten teacher and Diane Dawn Hunter as the full time band director. Miss Morgan is single and teaching for the first time this year. She will be helping out with the lower four grades during the first half of the school term and teaching Kindergarten the second half-year. Mrs. Hunter is originally from Hamlin and was a band teacher in California last year. Miss Morgan was hired at the state salary scale and Mrs. Hunter was hired at state salary, plus \$700 available under a new Bi-lingual program.

In final action the board accepted the milk bid of 10.50 cents for white milk and 11.00 cents for chocolate milk from Gandy's Dairy.

The dress code was discussed by the board and was left the same as last year.

COMMISSIONERS GIVE 10% PAY INCREASES

Fisher County Commissioners met in regular session last Monday morning and voted themselves a 10 percent pay increase along with an increase for all other elected county officials and employees.

The motion to grant the increase was made by Thurman Terry and seconded by A.J. Ford and approved by E.J. Kiker and Wayne Porter.

Under the new pay scale Fisher County Commissioners will receive \$678.00 a month with a \$125.00 expense allowance for a total of \$803.00 monthly. The salaries of first deputies under the 10 percent scale would have been raised from \$425.00 to \$468.00 but commissioners gave them a raise to \$475.00 per month. Some of the deputies in this category include Geneva Perkins in the Clerk's Office; Eileen Hale in the Sheriff's Department; Nell Wester in the County Attorney's Office; Doris Reed in the Judge's Office; and Margie Hale in the Auditor-Treasurer's Office.

Secondary deputies were increased from \$409.00 to \$450.00. All county road funds were increased from \$486.00 to

\$535.00 per month.

The county also voted to increase the mileage allowance to 16 cents for the probation officer, special investigator and court reporter as requested by the District Judge.

In other action the commissioners voted to pay Justice of

the Peace Ernest Roberts \$25.00 a month for utilities and telephone at his Rotan Office.

In final action the Fisher County Judge reported to commissioners on the Bi-Centen-

nial meeting held in Rotan at the Community Center last week. The Judge will serve on the Bi-Centennial committee along with commissioners E.J. Kiker and Thurman Terry.

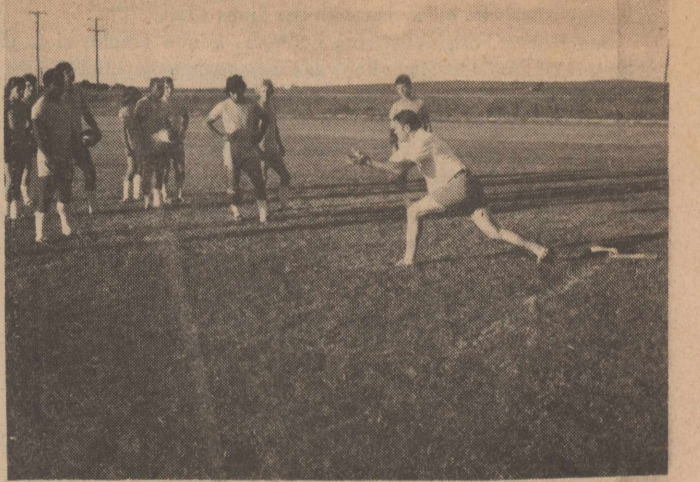
Rotan Booster Club To Purchase New Carpet

Rotan Council Approves Gas Company Increase

The Rotan City Council granted Lone Star Gas Company a 19.8 cent per 1,000 gallon gate rate increase to take effect in September at their meeting last Tuesday night. Frank Grevelle, Lone Star Gas Distribution Superintendent, made the request and estimated that the increase would amount to approximately \$1.34 per month on the average bill. Grevelle indicated that summer gas customers would see an increase of 20 to 30 cents on summer bills and from \$2.00 and \$2.30 on winter month bills. The motion to grant the increase was made by Lester Sescil, seconded by Chester Schick and approved by James Carter. Councilman Arvin White abstained and Councilman Bredemeyer was absent for the vote.

Three individuals appeared before the council to lodge complaints or seek explanations concerning the manner in which the police department has handled tickets or arrests concerning two local residents.

The three individuals, Jesse Heffernan, John Ross Hale, Jr. and John Ross Hale, Sr. were given an opportunity to present their views to the Council in open session. Rotan Police Chief Glenn Willeford explained the police department views concerning the matter. Mayor James Springer, acting as moderator for the council, exemplified much diplomacy in attempting to give each individual the opportunity to air their views. The council hear the complaints but did not take any formal action concerning the matter.

In other action the council discussed and accepted a piece of property belonging to Art McMillan's estate on 7th street. The council heard a report by Chief Willeford concerning the operation of the Rotan Police Department and reviewed the City's policy concerning leasing the dump ground area.

The council voted to pay the members of the equalization

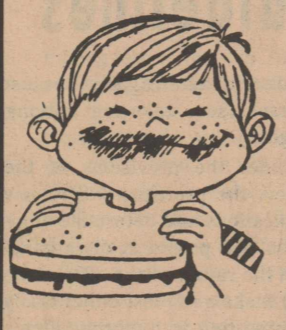

Hobbs, Rotan Announce Free Lunch Guidelines

Hobbs and Rotan I.D.S. Districts today announced their policies for free lunches and free milk for children unable to pay the full price of meals and milk served under the National School Lunch and Special Milk Programs.

Local school officials have adopted the following family size income criteria for determining eligibility:

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free meals and free milk. In addition, families not meeting these criteria but with other unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office at Hobbs School. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

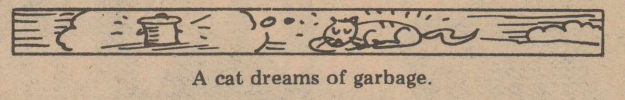
In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals and milk for them, it should contact the school.

In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will

be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, or national origin.

Under the provisions of the policy, the principal will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he may make a request either orally or in writing to Superintendents of the schools. They are Hobbs, Mr. Bill Denman, Rt. 2, Rotan; and Mr. Tom Harkey, Supt. Rotan Schools, Rotan, Texas for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

The office of both Rotan and Hobbs I.S.D. has a copy of the complete policy which may be reviewed by any interested party.

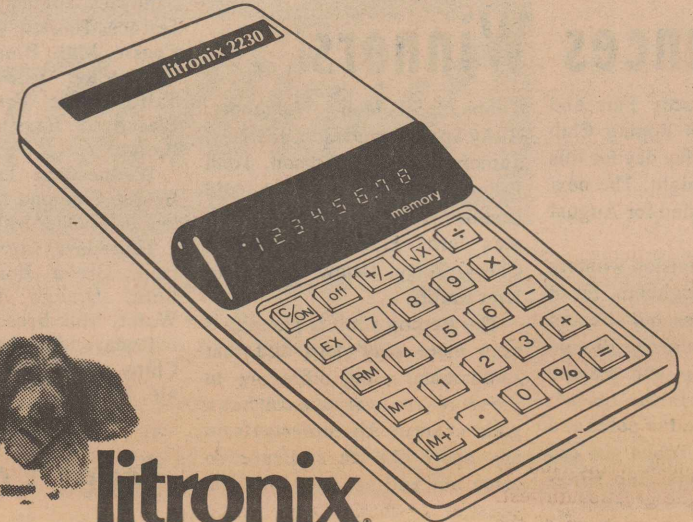

What Was The Rotan Development Company?

Can anyone supply approximate date and/or other information about ROTAN DEVELOPMENT COMPANY that once published an illustrated booklet for the purpose of selling lots in a so called beautiful "South Side Addition"? This sale was to include two hundred forty lots in conjunction with two hundred forty tracts of land located in Brewster and Val Verde Counties in Southwest Texas. Each specific lot and tract of land was to be sold at auction, and all purchasers were to be holders of paid up contracts. Specific rules governing sale and division of "South Side Addition" were included in the publication.

The first page is PURPOSES OF THIS COMPANY, and states, "In getting out this booklet we have endeavored to lay before you, in plainest and most straightforward manner, our plan of sale, together with a showing of what Rotan has done in the past brief period of her existence, and what she is doing now, and what she proposes to do in the future."

"Our statements are founded on facts, and we will take pleasure in proving them to you at any time. Our estimates and predictions of her future possibilities are not mere vague theories made at random, but are based upon the progress Rotan has already made, as well as upon logical deductions from the growth of other cities and towns under similar conditions."

"Our object is to acquaint you with our beautiful "South Side Addition", and to give you an opportunity to secure a home therein at a very low cost, and upon most liberal terms."

"Read our folder carefully, and if you are in doubt as to any of the statements contained therein, write to any Bank or business man in our city, as to our proposition and responsibility."

"Another section states, "ROTAN, the Metropolis and Commercial Center of Fisher County and Central West Texas...is located in the very heart of the most fertile land to be found in the great southwest. Being the terminal town of the Texas Central Railroad (M.,

K. & T.System), Rotan is so located geographically to be to Central West Texas what Dallas or Fort Worth is to North Texas."

"There isn't a town in West Texas that is surrounded by a finer farming country, and since the completion of the railroad, this country has been settling and developing more rapidly than ever before..."

"Rotan has one of the largest trade territories of any town in Texas, extending into the surrounding counties. With the extension of the railroad west into New Mexico, opening up the large and fertile territory to be added to Rotan's already immense territory, her commercial supremacy is now assured."

"The climate is delightful; the elevation is over 2000 feet. With this high altitude naturally go pleasant breezes, and there is seldom a night in midsummer that it is not the most refreshing. Malaria and chills are known. The annual rainfall is 30 inches."

Outdoor Drama Produced By East Texas Indians

The annual pilgrimage of summer outdoor theatre-goers have been pleasantly surprised to find in East Texas, America's newest outdoor drama production, Beyond The Sundown. The historically-based drama on the early struggles of the Alabama-Coushatta Indians is located on the East Texas Indian Reservation between Livingston and Woodville on US 190 and presented nightly except Sundays. The drama is scheduled to close on August 23.

The outdoor drama represents another step in a concerted effort by the tribe to enhance future economic potential of the 500 Alabama-Coushatta Indians living on the 4,600 acre reservation. Already, the tribe boasts of one of the fastest growing tourist attractions in the state with its unique tours and Indian dances which is open daily 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. The restaurant and the souvenir shop is open till 8:00 p.m. Monday through Saturdays.

Since very little has been written about the tribes, the Alabama-Coushatta Indians give visitors a unique experience by sharing their cultural heritage in the tours and Indian dances during the daytime and presenting a significant period in their history in dramatic fashion on stage in the evening. Such a combination for family recreation is rare indeed.

For a time, officials of the Indian Reservation regarded one of the actor's lines, "The gods are angry with us..." as a true reckoning of the unusually rainy days keeping attendance down during the normally dry month of July. However, since opening day on June 21, only two performances have been rained out.

Rotan Property Owners Can Buy Flood Insurance

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development announced today that effective August 8, 1975, Rotan has been accepted into the National Flood Insurance Program.

This means, said Acting Federal Insurance Administrator, J. Robert Hunter, that individual property owners here are now eligible to buy flood insurance protection at affordable federally-subsidized rates, offering more extensive coverage under the expanded program authorized by the 1973 Flood Disaster Protection Act.

"We think the new, expanded National Flood Insurance Program offers the best way of protecting property owners from the ravages of floods, while easing the burden on the general public," he said.

"Since flood insurance is now available," he added, "the law requires that it must be purchased by owners of property in areas identified as flood-prone by HUD, in order to be eligible for virtually all forms of Federal or federally-related financial assistance for building purposes in those areas."

"This would include FHA or VA mortgages, loans from the Small Business Administration, or loans from any federally-regulated or supervised banks and savings and loan institutions."

While flood insurance is available to all residents of the community, Mr. Hunter emphasized that the Federal economic sanctions against building assistance will not apply to property outside the danger zones.

Under the expanded program, broader coverage can be obtained for all buildings and their contents. The limit of insurance for single-family homes is now \$35,000, and \$100,000 for other residential and nonresidential buildings, at the subsidized rate of 25 cents per \$100 of coverage. The rate goes to 40 cents per \$100 for non-residential buildings.

The contents of all residential buildings can be insured up to \$10,000 per unit at 35 cents per \$100 of coverage, and the rate goes to 75 cents per \$100 for the contents of all non-residential structures up to a maximum of \$100,000 in coverage per unit.

Policies are effective immediately during the first 30 days the insurance becomes available. After the first 30 days, there is a 15-day waiting period.

The policies can be purchased from any licensed local property insurance agent or broker. The Home Insurance Co., 2100 Travis St., Houston Texas, has been designated as the flood insurance servicing company for this area. Agents and brokers may obtain policy forms, rates, flood insurance manuals and any other necessary information from this company.

The FIA, Mr. Hunter explained, is in the process of publishing maps showing the special flood hazard areas in approximately 20,000 communities across the country. He congratulated the local governing body here for taking action before the July 1, 1975 deadline imposed under the Act for enrolling in the program.

In becoming eligible under the program, a community must submit an application in which it certifies that it has adopted certain minimum flood plain management measures for the flood-prone areas of that community which conform with Federal requirements. These measures vary according to the characteristics of the community and the nature of specific flood threats. But they are generally designed to regulate the future development of flood hazard areas, and ultimately require minimum elevation and construction standards for floors and foundations of any new construction in these areas.

If you preserved foods in "loud mouth" jars that keep "talking" all year on the pantry shelf, help is at hand to prevent it happening again. These "talking" jars often spell spoilage.

Reasons jars don't seal and some suggested solutions are: Small particles of food left on rim of jar.

Remedy: Wipe off top of jar with clean damp cloth before placing lid on jar.

Sealing compound or lid doesn't seal.

Remedy: Lids may be old. Usually, they last five years. Some may have a year date on them, such as 1-75, to indicate the lid was manufactured in the first quarter of 1975 and should be used before the end of the first quarter of 1980. It's a good idea to mark date of purchase on the box of lids.

Bent or rusty rings. Remedy: Bent or rusty rings can cause the lids not to seal properly. Always remove rings when jars have cooled thoroughly and seals are tested.

Rings are necessary for the processing, but are not needed after the seal is made. Rings left on can rust and become difficult to remove--so store them in a dry place in a container that prevents them from being bent out of shape.

Examine rings before the start of each canning season and discard rusty or bent ones. Never use lids more than once, because they are designed for a one-time seal.

Rings screwed on "too tight" or "too loose."

Rings which are screwed on too tightly do not allow space for venting (escape of air from the jar). This makes pressure build up in the jar, causing the lid--and sometimes even the top of the ring to buckle.

Rings not screwed on tightly enough will not seal, because the compound is not pressed firmly enough against the top of the jar.

The main point to remember is to follow manufacturer's directions. Do not use lid tighteners recommended for zinc caps. Two-piece lids don't require tighteners.

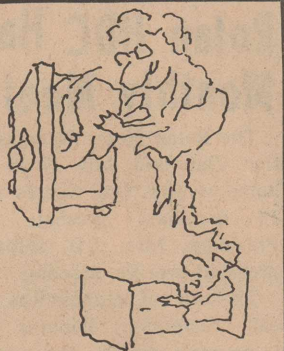
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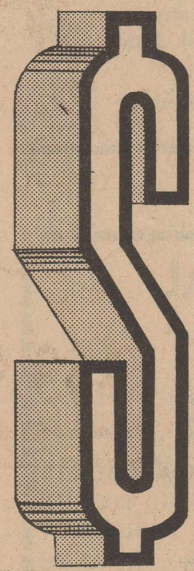
